What We're About

A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brother-hood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

- A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.
- It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, onroad or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.
- You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to *A.B.A.T.E.* Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just *that* wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

So scan through our newspaper. If you like what you read, check out the chapter meeting listing on the back cover. Drop in on a meeting and see what we're about. You just might find a new family in *A.B.A.T.E.* And as Melinda says: "Bikers give great hugs."

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. (A.B.A.T.E.)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR–3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the *American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.)*, Ron Roloff of the *M.M.A.* of California, and Ed Armstrong

from *A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago* presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the *D.O.T.* because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

Autumn is here and winter is coming. This isn't necessarily an end to riding for the year. With good quality riding gear (heated if you're lucky) winter riding can be very enjoyable as long as you ride

defensively and within your abilities, while giving full consideration to the road conditions.

Autumn means fallen leaves on the road. Avoid riding on them whenever possible.

Visibility is typically less in the fall/winter, and rain seems to make cars blind to anything not directly in front of them, so staying alert is even more important in poor weather conditions.

Even though it's late in the year, there has been precious little rain. But like the inevitability of death and taxes, it's going to rain eventually.

All summer long cars and trucks have been dropping oil on the roads and the first bit of rain brings it right to the surface. This can make for very





slick riding conditions.

When riding in the wet, try to avoid the center of the lane and stay in the tire paths of the cars. And beware of painted lines always.

Intersections also collect a lot of oil, so ease into the brakes at lights if there's rain. Under hard baking in the wet, it's easy for your front wheel to step aside and show you the road up close.

Stay warm and ride smart.

Executive Board Reports

Highway Bill Amendments Improves Motorcycle Safety



The science subcommittee on research and technology approved two amendments that both greatly benefit motorcyclists.

The first amendment halts the federal funding of motorcycle-only roadside checkpoints and then assigns a study to the National Academy of Sciences to determine the best methods of preventing motorcycle crashes.

The amendment sponsor, representative Randy Hultgren (R-IL) had this to say: "If the federal government is providing grants to improve motorcycle safety, these grants should be focused on ways that actually improve the safety of motorcycle riders."

The second amendment would prohibit the federal department of

actions at the federal, state, or local levels of government.

Currently the lobby ban is only applicable at the state level.

Hultgren added, "I do believe that we can be doing more to improve the safety of motorcyclists on the road, and there are reasonable [regulations] that motorcyclists should all follow. But before the federal government casts down another top-down mandate on local enforcement officers, we should be sure that we are not wasting valuable police time, while singling out and *infringing on the rights of* [regulations]abiding motorcycle riders, unless there is a compelling safety related reason for doing so."

Washington State CoC and A.B.A.T.E. Prevent Motorcycle Profiling

The Washington state traffic safety commission (W.S.T.C.) and Washington state patrol were planning targeted motorcycle safety patrols from July 31 through August 16. These patrols would be in direct violation of R.C.W. 43.101.419, the regulation prohibiting motorcycle profiling.

Through the unified efforts of the *Confederation of Clubs*, *A.B.A.T.E.*, and the *U.S. Defenders*, these planned patrols did not happen and an alert was been issued to participating agencies to help ensure profiling did not occur.

In response to a letter outlining these grievances from *CoC* attorney Mike Myers, the W.S.T.C. claimed the original press release announcing the patrols was a mistake. They apologized, reversed their position, and even issued an alert to all participating agencies outlining the state prohibition on motorcycle profiling.

The following retraction was posted on the W.S.T.C. *It's a Fine Line* site:

"Update: A draft press release was mistakenly distributed earlier this week which raised some questions about our motorcycle safety campaign. Motorcycle safety patrols are beginning this Friday, July 31, and running through August 16 in Pierce, King, and Snohomish counties. Motorcyclists are over-represented in crashes that result in serious injuries and death. These patrols are focused in areas where there are a high number of motorcycle rider fatalities. These patrols will be focused on all motor vehicle drivers and motorcycle riders who commit traffic safety violations. The Washington traffic safety commission and participating enforcement agencies condemn profiling. Trained and commissioned enforcement officers will be conducting these patrols enforcing traffic violations as defined by Washington state [regulations]. An updated press release will be distributed to the media and posted on this web site on Friday, July 31, 2015."

"The Washington state motorcycle rights movement continues to provide an exemplary model for the fight against profiling and the advancement of our rights base," said Double D (chair of the Confederation of Clubs of Washington) and Lyle Coyle (state coordinator, A.B.A.T.E. of Washington) in a joint statement. "Simply put, the motorcycle profiling [regulation] in Washington state has the power to reverse discriminatory policy making conducted by state agencies and reinforce the regime of protection legally enjoyed by motorcyclists in our state."

Stop Motorcycle Checkpoint Funding Act Advances

The U.S. senate passed a six-year federal highway bill on July 30 with a bipartisan vote of 65-34, and the measure now moves to the house for further action. But congress also passed its sixth short-term funding extension in six years to move the bill off the front burner until late October.

The senate-passed version of the highway bill contains the following bill text, on page 539 of S–1647, the D.R.I.V.E. Act. (Developing a Reliable and Innovative Vision for the Economy Act)

Part II—Stop Motorcycle Checkpoint Funding Act

Section 34121. short title.

This part may be cited as the *Stop Motorcycle Checkpoint Funding Act*.

Section 34122. Grant restriction.

Notwithstanding section 153 of title 23, United states code, the secretary may not provide a grant or any funds to a state, county, town, township, Indian tribe, municipality, or other local government that may be used for any program --

- (1) to check helmet usage; or
- (2) to create checkpoints that specifically target motorcycle operators or motorcycle passengers.

Minnesota Motorcycle Road Guards

Certified motorcyclists known as "road guards" are hitting Minnesota roads as of August 4th, and they'll be able to stop and control traffic for large motorcycle group rides throughout the state.

The new state regulation requires road guards to:

- Successfully complete a driving record review and a training course to receive a motorcycle road guard certificate.
- Meet safety and equipment standards outlined in the regulation.
- Only act as a flagger for group rides with twenty motorcycles or more.
- Notify each statutory or home rule charter city through which the ride is traveling.
- Receive consent from the chief of police of city of the first class through which the ride is traveling.

Drivers stopped by a certified road guard must obey the flagger's instructions and stay stopped until they are given the "all clear" signal from a flagger or police officer. Road

guards are not allowed to hold traffic for longer than ten minutes.

Legislators Define Autocycles

Part car, part motorcycle.

It's an autocycle.

Three-wheel vehicles like the *Elio*, *Polaris Slingshot*, *Campagna T-Rex*, *Tanom Invader*, *Morgan*, and *Toyota*'s new *i-Road* all definitely drive differently than motorcycles. But currently, because these vehicles are technically motorcycles in the U.S., drivers are required to wear a helmet in many states and are also required to obtain a motorcycle license.

North Carolina most recently passed a bill signed by governor Pat McCrory to define an autocycle as a "three-wheeled motorcycle that has a steering wheel, pedals, seat safety belts for each occupant, anti-lock brakes, air bag protection, completely enclosed seating that does not require the operator to straddle or sit astride, and is otherwise manufactured to comply with federal safety requirements for motorcycles," meaning drivers won't need a special license nor will they need to wear a helmet.

In May, the 84th Texas legislature pushed through SB–449, which similarly defines an autocycle which can be operated without a motorcycle license and requiring no motorcycle training, but requiring a helmet. (Helmet requirements and exceptions for autocycles are the same as those for motorcycles.)

In Indiana, as of March 12, autocycles are defined as "a three-wheeled motor vehicle in which the

operator and passenger ride in a standards until such time as the completely or partially enclosed seating N.H.T.S.A. can promulgate final area that is equipped with:

- 1. A roll cage or roll hoops.
- 2. Safety belts for each occupant.
- 3. Anti-lock brakes

and is designed to be controlled with a steering wheel and pedals."

Helmets and goggles are not mandatory, but a motorcycle license is needed to drive them. At the same time autocycles are not included in the "dead red" regulation allowing motorcycles to run a red traffic light after waiting two minutes without a signal change.

With these currently classified as motorcycles by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, and various conflicting rules across the country that regulate them, on March 12, 2015, U.S. senator David Vitter (R-LA) introduced the Autocycle Safety Act (S–685). House companion resolution (HR-2892)representative John R. Moolenaar (R-MI) was also introduced which creates the new classification "autocycle" for enclosed motor vehicles with three wheels and aims to set a single standard for all three-wheeled road vehicles, hopefully making it easier for companies to bring autocycles to mass markets.

To date, twenty-six states have enacted or are currently developing classifications for enclosed, threewheeled vehicles as autocycles at the state level, requiring individual states to determine helmet and motorcycle endorsements for these vehicles, so enacting federal legislation will provide consistency across country.

The legislation provides autocycle manufacturers must immediately meet certain safety safety regulations covering autocycles.

To be eligible for the new classification of autocycle, the vehicle must qualify as meeting federal motor vehicle safety standards (F.M.V.S.S.), not limited to, but including most standards for passenger vehicles under 10,000 pounds.

Some of the requirements will be F.M.V.S.S. for seat belts and seat belt anchors, child restraints, roof crush, and meet upper interior impact standards.

Autocycles also must have front three-wheelers and side curtain airbag protection.

> In addition to numerous safety standards needed for qualification, autocycles must meet F.M.V.S.S. for motorcycles as well.

> The legislation also requires the continued investigation of additional standards appropriate for autocycles, developing additional safety standards for these vehicles.

> Automotive fuel standards also apply to autocycles.

States With Worst Roads

U.S. department of transportation secretary Anthony Foxx is fed up with congress' inaction to pass a long-term transportation funding measure, and in a July 9 blog post, secretary Foxx once again called out congress for their lack of action, followed by statistics of American roads and bridges by state.

Altogether, 65% of roads in the United States are in "less-than-good" condition, according to the American Society of Civil Engineers 2013 report card for America's infrastructure.

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.






