What We're About

A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

- A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as BikePAC.
- It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, on-road or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.
- You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to A.B.A.T.E. Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just that wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

So scan through our newspaper. If you like what you read, check out the chapter meeting listing on the back cover. Drop in on a meeting and see what we're about. You just might find a new family in A.B.A.T.E. And as Melinda says: "Bikers give great hugs."

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. (A.B.A.T.E.)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the Huns Motorcycle Club in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California, and Ed Armstrong from A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of A.B.A.T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

Towards the end of the great depression in the early twentieth century, jobs could still be difficult to come by.

Our father wasn't having much work success two years after graduating from high school. (His employment in an auto service department ended prematurely when he forgot to put the pan plug back in during an oil change.)

He finally resorted to joining the U.S. Army, ending up stationed in central California during the summer.

One time when he and other privates were sweltering in their wooden barracks, a sergeant came by looking for volunteers to work in the ice plant. (Before refrigeration was wide-spread, cooling for food was achieved with large blocks of ice created in freezer facilities.) Naturally several of the overheated

solders jumped at the chance, including our father. Off they went, already envisioning the coolness of the base ice plant.

Their pleasant daydreams were rudely interrupted when they were issued shovels and wheel barrows, then told to weed out sturdy little thick-leaved desert foliage known as ice plants.

The next time our father volunteered, it was for aviation training. (Standing ramp watches beat digging up ice plants.)

One of the first pieces of advice bandied about among enlisted recruits is to never volunteer, which is in fact bad advice.

One needs to be selective about volunteering, as the story above illustrates.

Trouble is, that original advise about never volunteering tended to spill over into civilian life, resulting in vets and non-vets who are afraid to get involved in anything. (Like life.)

But consider this: Every one of you who now rides a motorcycle chose to do so voluntarily. And didn't your life get better once you got settled in the saddle?

It's all about selective volunteerism.

When volunteering benefits not only yourself, but others, doesn't it make sense to offer your services?

A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon thrives and helps save lives when good people such as your fine self get involved by volunteering to help out with events or to become a chapter or state officer. You may not realize it, but you have a lot to offer your sisters and brothers of A.B.A.T.E. And you have a chance to learn new skills that can carry over into your personal life.

U.K. Ban On Gas-Powered Vehicles

The *Motorcycle Industry* Association (U.K.) has welcomed reports of a ban on new fossil fuel-powered vehicles starting 2040, saying it will be a "tremendous stimulus" for bike makers.

The government is due to announce a ban on the sale of new petrol (gasoline) and diesel vehicles from 2040 as part of an effort to tackle air pollution, according to several national newspapers. The measure is expected to include a ban on new hybrid vehicles and "could mark the beginning of the end of the prevalence of the internal combustion engine in automotive transport," reports www. BritishDealerNews.co.uk.

The announcement will be in line with a similar commitment already

made by France.

Steve Kenward, C.E.O. of the *Motorcycle Industry Association* (*M.C.I.A.*), pointed out that no specific mention had been made of motorcycles but added: "*I think there's a great opportunity*."

"For all the congestion-busting abilities of motorcycles and the abilities to make electric bikes I think it's a tremendous stimulus for the motorcycle industry," Kenward predicts. "It's a tremendous commercial trigger to push on with electric motorcycles."

Motorcycles made before 2007 are already set to be hit by a £12.50 (\$16.10 USD) daily pollution toll for entering London beginning in 2020.

India Largest Motorcycle Manufacturer

India has dethroned China from a long reign as the world's largest motorcycle manufacturer, having already overtaken China to become the largest domestic motorcycle market three years ago. The growth curve is continuing, as India's growing domestic market and partnerships with English and European bike builders have put the country at the forefront of worldwide two-wheeled production.

While overall new motorcycle sales in the U.S. have been about 500,000 a year, and around 125,000 are sold in the United Kingdom, the total sales of machines made in India for the last financial year came to 17.6 million. (More every three days than are sold in the U.K. in a year. More every 11 days than are sold annually in the U.S.)

Meanwhile, China's domestic motorcycle market has been in decline for five years as government policy has incentivized electric bicycle sales and denied motorcycles access to city centers across China.

Conversely, the relentless growth of motorcycle sales in India is beginning to reshape the global marketplace. According to *New Atlas*, sales within India grew 6.9% last year, thanks to a fast-growing 1.32 billion domestic population that is quickly urbanizing and emerging from poverty. (India has the fastest G.D.P. growth of any major country.) A massive Indiawide road construction program is also fueling car and bike sales, just as it did in the United States a century

ago.

Currently India's domestic motorcycle marketplace is dominated by sub-125cc scooters and motorcycles, but larger capacity "luxury" classes are taking an increasing share as the market matures.

Royal Enfield, built in India for the past 62 years, sold more than 700,000 motorcycles last year, a figure nearly equal to the combined worldwide sales of Harley-Davidson, K.T.M., BMW, Triumph, and Ducati. And their production target for this fiscal year is 900,000.

Licensed Motorcyclists Don't Ride

Nearly eight million U.S. citizens have a motorcycle license, but don't own a bike. These phantom riders, referred to as "sleeping license holders," have come to the attention of motorcycle manufacturers seeking new customers as baby boomers age out of riding, wanting to wake them up.

Many of these 'sleepers' were active motorcyclists who had things happen in their life that caused them to quit riding: marriage, kids, financial pressures, a job that demands most of their time, or simply a change in interests. Others completed rider training, got their license, but never bought a bike.

All of which has led *Harley-Davidson*, *Indian*, and other bike makers to devise new marketing strategies.

Harley has set a goal of attracting two million new U.S. riders in the

next decade and says it's committed to introducing 100 new motorcycles over the next ten years, including an electric bike, and that effort is expected to bring some sleeping license holders into bike ownership.

Indian Motorcycle Company is also digging into why the sleepers aren't taking that next step to become motorcycle owners. "I think, collectively as an industry, we need to answer that," said Kevin Reilly, vice president of motorcycle marketing for Indian.

The median age of U.S. motorcyclists is about 45, according to a report in *Cycle World* magazine, with an overwhelming number of new bike buyers over the age of 50.

Driving Under Influence Of Electronics (E-DUI)

Washington state has enacted a new "E-DUI" regulation that imposes stiff penalties for driving under the influence of electronic devices.

Under their new distracted driving statute, referred to as "E-DUI," drivers in the *Evergreen State* will no longer be able to use a cell phone or any electronic device while driving, even when stopped at a traffic light. The bill was drafted in response to a 32% increase in deaths from distracted driving from 2014 to 2015.

"Put the cell phones down, preserve life," governor Jay Inslee said on the steps of the capitol in Olympia, according to Q13 Fox News.

Inslee says the bill is called "electronic driving while-impaired" for a reason. "When you are driving with a cell phone, you are a more dangerous driver than if you are driving drunk with a 0.08 blood alcohol level," he said.

The first citation will cost drivers \$136, nearly doubling for a second offense within five years. Tickets issued for driving while using hand-held electronics will go on a motorist's record and be reported to their insurance provider, says a web site set up by the state explaining the new regulation.

In addition, according to the new statute, drivers can also get a \$99 ticket for other types of distractions like grooming, smoking, eating, or reading if it interferes with safe driving and you are pulled over for another traffic offense.

Sturgis-Bound Bike-Riding Highway Heroes

A group of music row power brokers bound for *Sturgis* from Nashville helped yank ten people from their cars and trucks 04 August 2017, just before fire raced through the scene of a crash in southern Illinois.

A semi-truck had plowed full speed into cars that had stopped for construction on the highway, explains a newspaper article appearing in *The Tennessean*, causing a chain-reaction eight-car pileup. Just in front of that pileup: A ten-person crew of music industry executives riding bikes from Nashville to the *Sturgis Motorcycle Rally* in South Dakota.

Two of the bikers, brothers from a talent agency who were paramedics for ten years in San Diego, got in touch with 9-1-1 operators and immediately began organizing bystanders, while the amateur rescuers went quickly vehicle by vehicle pulling victims to safety: First, a family of six with children ages 6 to 11; then, a couple of guys in a pick-up truck, one with a bad head wound; finally, a woman, screaming, stuck in a car that looked like a crushed beer can.

The Nashvillians couldn't get her out of the car, so they got about ten guys together and dragged the entire car, three feet at a time, across the highway into a grassy median away from the fire. And like in the movies they did so just before flames ripped through three vehicles that already had been emptied of passengers.

"It was a trip. I'm still tripped out by it," one of the highway saints was quoted as saying in USA Today. "There's no doubt, had we not sprung into action like we did, there would've been fatalities."

Nebraska Rolling Ads Promote Motorcycle Awareness

Eight delivery trucks will carry a motorcycle awareness message for ten weeks this summer while traversing the *Cornhusker State* as part of a Nebraska highway safety council campaign.

Signs on the delivery trucks' panels warn motorists to "watch for motorcycles everywhere," by checking mirrors and looking both ways when at intersections and changing lanes.

The state department of transportation, enforcement agencies, and motorcycle safety groups created the campaign to counter a spate of fatal crashes.

Nebraska highway safety administrator Fred Zwonechek said similar campaigns funded by federal motorcycle safety grants have been used in the past to push awareness. "You want to reach drivers, and this is a way to do it," Zwonechek told the Journal Star newspaper.

Harley-Davidson Pollution Fine Reduced

The U.S. justice department has rescinded a requirement that *Harley-Davidson Inc.* spend \$3 million on a project to reduce air pollution as part of a \$15 million fine the Obama administration levied last year for selling illegal tuning kits that cause its vehicles to emit too much pollution.

Under direction from the Trump administration, however, the justice department has determined that the \$3 million to retrofit wood-fired stoves was not appropriate, saying: "The original consent decree would have required defendants to pay a non-governmental third-party organization to carry out the mitigation project. Questions exist as to whether this mitigation project is consistent with the new policy."

The move followed a recent decision by attorney general Jeff Sessions to halt a long-standing practice under which polluters could be compelled to pay for environmental or community projects, in addition to fines and direct compensation to victims.

Now, a bill working its way through congress could make Sessions's policy legal policy. The bill, sponsored by representative Robert W. Goodlatte (R-VA), would prevent the government from using settlement money from civil cases

for purposes other than direct victim compensation or remediation, like cleanups of environmental disasters.

Cage Drivers Feel "Biker Envy"

If you've ever come across one of those drivers who seem determined to prevent you from passing on your bike, you may feel a sense of satisfaction in knowing that they're probably just jealous. And it's going to take them some time to calm down after they arrive late for work.

A recent survey has found that 27.8% of drivers experienced "biker envy" when motorcyclists passed them in traffic. It took them an average of 34.2 minutes to feel calm and in control again after getting to work late.

The survey of 2,000 commuters by British motorcycle insurer *Devitt Insurance* also found that employees lose on average 29.6 minutes of work a week because of heavy traffic, costing the U.K. economy £203,846,153. (\$261,351,152 USD)

Almost 13% had missed a job interview while stuck in traffic, while 32.3% said they would try to sneak into work unnoticed on arriving late.

Here's a better idea: Get a bike!

California Assembly, Senate Pass O.H.V. Program Bills

Two bills now go to governor for signature

California legislators passed two bills that extend the state's nationally renowned off-highway vehicle (O.H.V.) recreation program and provide more stability for the program's future.

SB-249 extends the operation of the *California Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation Program* (O.H.M.V.R.) indefinitely, eliminating a provision that historically had required periodic reauthorization and making the program permanent within state parks.

SB–159 provides funding for the program.

Without these key pieces of legislation, the program would have ended 31 December.

The American Motorcyclist Association was part of a broad coalition that defended the O.H.V. program against opponents who sought its demise. The group worked with legislators for months to rework the originally introduced version of SB–249 into an acceptable piece of legislation.

The bills now go to governor Jerry Brown, who has until 15 October 15 to sign them into effect.

"The California O.H.V. program is a model for the nation," said A.M.A. western states representative Nick Haris. "In its original form, SB-249 would have dismantled decades of

work and ended the most important parts of this critical program. Our revisions provide quality, sustainable, family-oriented recreation for citizens and visitors, emphasize environmental sustainability and protection and public safety and include partnerships with federal government agencies that provide O.H.V. opportunities."

The California O.H.M.V.R.program was created in 1971 and signed into effect by then-governor Ronald Reagan. The program operates nine state vehicular recreation areas and provides maintenance grants to many local and federal partner agencies that provide O.H.V. recreation opportunities.

Clip This Corner, Avoid A Helmet Ticket

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.


