What We're About

A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

We also do business as (DBA) American Bikers Aimed Toward Education.

- A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as BikePAC.
- It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, on-road or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.
- You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to A.B.A.T.E. Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just that wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

So scan through our newspaper. If you like what you read, check out the chapter meeting listing on the back cover. Drop in on a meeting and see what we're about. You just might find a new family in A.B.A.T.E. And as Melinda says: "Bikers give great hugs."

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. (A.B.A.T.E.)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the Huns Motorcycle Club in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California, and Ed Armstrong from A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of A.B.A.T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

 - **6.** Try exit interviews with lapsed or canceled members.

7. Create personal connections. Use your phone tree to send reminders of chapter meetings or events. New members should also always get a personal phone call. At every meeting or event, introduce yourself to someone you don't know. And get involved. Volunteer to help with at least one event a year. (And that means not just planning, but working the event.)

- **8.** Make a chapter web site. Nothing appeals more to millenials than being plugged in. Make it easy to learn about the next event or meeting by posting new stuff on your very own site. Then include a link to the state web site and have a "contact me" button. Just don't forget to respond quickly.
- **9.** Appreciate your members. A package of blank certificates and a free template web site is all you need to make someone's day. Recognize someone who volunteered. Make a birthday



list for everyone in your chapter and then send a fun online "happy birthday" greeting. accomplishments, Celebrate even if they aren't A.B.A.T.E.related. Use prizes certificates to make people feel included and special.

- 10. Diversify your events. Identify and implement at least one event per year that appeals to the millenials. Also, welcome all riders. That means sport riders, street riders, and vintage riders.
- 11. Send automated reminders. Use your expired roster to send invitations and reminders.
- 12. It's okay if you can't do anything about it. You are not going to be able to keep them all, so when one strays, realize you will always have some losses you can't control. But, make sure everyone leaves A.B.A.T.E. with a good impression. Send them a thank you note for staying as long as they did and always welcome them back when they are ready.


As the old saying goes, "Come to kindly terms with your ass, for it bears you."

Impact Of *Brexit* On Bikers

It's been two and a half years since the referendum that started Britain on its journey out of the European Union. Now time is running out and *Brexit* is due to take place on 29 March 2019, deal or no deal. With the British parliament squabbling, the prospect of a no-deal *Brexit* is now looking increasingly likely. And that outcome would affect many things, including motorcycles.

You may have heard about the United Kingdom reverting to World Trade Organization (W.T.O.) rules when it comes to trade. British biker web site http://www.visordown explains what that will mean: "The W.T.O. maintains an immense database that records types of products and the import duties that countries or trading blocs impose on them. At the moment we're part of the European Union (E.U.), which means we can trade with other European countries without incurring any tariffs. But once we leave, we'll be outsiders, subject to the taxes they impose."

On motorcycles under 250 cc, the E.U. charges an 8% tariff, and on bikes over that size there's a 6% duty. Meanwhile, motorcycle parts and accessories are taxed at 3.7% and bike tires are subject to a 4.5% import duty.

For consumers, if you're buying a bike made in the E.U. (such as *B.M.W.*) there will be an extra 6% tax to be incorporated into its cost. Even a UK-based manufacturer, like *Triumph*, would be subject to an import duty on motorcycle parts from E.U. suppliers, like their *Brembo* brakes. So even British-

made bikes are likely to become more expensive in a no-deal scenario.

Exports might be less of an immediate concern to the everyday bike buyer, but they have an impact on the motorcycle industry in Britain. Without a deal in place, exported bikes would be taxed by the E.U. at W.T.O. rates.

Of course, once out of the E.U. the United Kingdom government will need to negotiate their own trade deals, not only with Europe, but with other trading partners such as Japan, the U.S., and China.

But the bottom line is that there's little prospect that a no-deal *Brexit* will make bikes or bike-related parts any cheaper.

In the meantime, the uncertainty of Britain's economic future has negatively impacted motorbike sales in the U.K., plummeting 17.9% in December following an overall 2.9% gain in 2018.

Federal Jury Decides Mongols Must Forfeit Logo

In a first-of-its-kind verdict with far-reaching legal implications, a federal jury ruled that the *Mongols Motorcycle Club* must forfeit the logo worn by its members, finding in favor of prosecutors novel claim that there is a direct link between the clubs crimes and its trademarked insignia.

Last month, the jury in U.S. district court in Santa Ana, California, found the *Mongol Nation* guilty of racketeering and conspiracy, classifying the group as a criminal organization. Their verdict on Friday, 11 January 2109 was the second phase

of a trial that focused on forfeiture of assets in a decade-long quest by the government to dismantle the club.

The verdict will lead to the forfeiture of the group's legal interest in the word "Mongols" and some of their patches, as well as Mongols items seized during the investigation, prosecutors said. If upheld, this will give the right to any enforcement officer who spots a club member wearing the logo to stop him and confiscate the branded item.

The trial next moves to a third phase, in which U.S. district judge David O. Carterwill decide how the forfeiture is carried out. He declined to immediately order the logos forfeited and set a hearing next month to address possible first amendment issues raised by the verdict, agreeing to solicit briefs from a variety of experts, including trademark attorneys, legal school professors, civil rights organizations, and think tanks.

The judge's decision highlights the new legal ground being broken in the unprecedented case, which has attracted national attention and is virtually guaranteed to go before the ninth circuit U.S. court of appeals and perhaps the U.S. supreme court.

California To Begin Enforcing Modified Exhaust Penalties

As of 01 January 2019, a modified exhaust on an automobile or motorcycle in California, excessively loud, can no longer be cited as a correctable violation. Previously, if you were cited you had time to get

it fixed in order to avoid paying the fine. But assembly bill AB–1824 carves out an exception for exhaust noise by removing the opportunity to correct the violation and requires a citation to result in a fine only.

AB-1824, which was sponsored by the assembly committee on budget and signed into effect by then-governor Jerry Brown in June of 2018, does not change existing regulations pertaining to exhaust noise or sale and installation of after market exhaust systems, but rather amends how excess exhaust noise violations are handled by enforcement agencies.

Beginning this year, a vehicle cited for violating the current exhaust noise statute will no longer receive what is commonly known as a "fix-it ticket". Instead, violations will result in an immediate mandatory monetary fine.

The fine for a California traffic ticket for a loud exhaust system is up to\$1,000 dollars.

Helmet-Free E-Scooters

Assembly bill 2989, the e-scooter bill sponsored by California assemblyman Heath Flora (R-Ripon), removes the requirement for riders of motorized (electric) standup scooters in the golden state to wear a bicycle helmet, provided they are 18 or older. The new traffic regulation also prohibits riding a motorized e-scooter on highways with a speed limit greater than 25 mph, or roads with a speed limit greater than 35 mph, unless it is within a marked bikeway.

Meanwhile, assembly bill 3077, sponsored by then-assemblywoman Anna Caballero (D-Salinas) provides enforcement agencies the ability to issue a fix-it ticket to anyone under 18 who doesn't wear a helmet while on a bicycle, skateboard, or skates. The newly enacted violation is correctable if the minor completes a bicycle safety course and gets a helmet that meets safety standards within 120 days of the ticket being issued.

Utah Lowers D.U.I. Limit To 0.05 Percent

The beehive state made history on 30 December by becoming the first state to lower its blood-alcohol concentration (B.A.C.) for drunken driving to 0.05 percent, just in time for new year's eve.

Utah lowered the drunken driving B.A.C. from 0.08, the national limit imposed by former president Bill Clinton in 2000, to 0.05, making it the nation's strictest D.U.I. regulation.

Utah's new statute also says anyone who "operates a motor vehicle in a negligent manner causing the death of another" will have committed criminal homicide, which is a felony.

In 1983, Utah was the first state to lower its blood alcohol limit from 0.10 to 0.08 for impaired driving. It would take nearly two decades for every state to follow suit. But as they did, the nation's rate of alcohol-related traffic deaths dropped 10%.

Utah state representative Norm Thurston (R-Provo) sponsored the bill at the request of the *National Transportation Safety Board*, which has been urging states to lower D.U.I. limits to 0.05 since 2013.

The American Beverage Institute says the new lower limit targets social drinkers and calls the regulation an "attack on the restaurant and hospitality industries," claiming nearly 70% of alcohol-related fatalities in the U.S. are caused by drivers with a much higher B.A.C. of 0.15 and above.

Science Proves That Riding A Motorcycle Is Good For You

Motorcyclists have always said there's no better prescription for stress than riding a bike. Now a study from the Semel Institute for Neuroscience and Human Behavior, at the University of California, Los Angeles, seems to confirm that.

The recent study, funded by *Harley-Davidson Inc.*, demonstrated potential mental and physical benefits of riding, including decreased levels of cortisol, a hormonal marker of stress.

Three *U.C.L.A.* researchers studied more than fifty motorcycle riders in tests that recorded their brain activity and hormone levels before, during, and after riding a bike, driving a car, or resting. The bike ride resulted in a 28% decrease in biomarkers of stress, according to the researchers.

On average, riding a motorcycle for twenty minutes increased participants' heart rates by 11% and adrenaline levels by 27% (similar to light exercise) as well as their focus and alertness.

Harley-Davidson says the study's findings validate what it's known

for more than a century: that riding is good for your mental health.

This means the next time you are sitting at your computer feeling sluggish or that you get home after a long a stressful day, the answer to getting back on track or relieving some of the tension could be to simply go out for a ride, doctor's orders!

Do Self-driving Cars See Motorcycles?

Lane-splitting is an accepted maneuver by motorcyclists all over the world. But in the United States, it is only practiced by riders in the California.

California-based *Tesla*, whose cars are well represented on California highways, seems to be aware of motorcyclists unique filtering capabilities there and has been working to ensure their *Autopilot* systems detect the presence of a lane-sharing rider in traffic.

However, YouTuber Scott Kubo recently posted a video to test the functionality of motorcycle detection while lane-splitting, and apparently detecting an approaching motorcycle seems to be hit and miss in version 9 of Tesla's neural net Autopilot software. It's clear from the clip that the system confuses motorcycles with cars at times, and can even miss a motorcycle entirely if the motorcycle is moving at a good clip. It's tough to determine how useful this detection would be in its current state in real-world application.

In the *YouTube* clip, Kubo explains that the current 360 camera system (2.0 and 2.5) can process 200 frames per second (or 200 fps)

spread across the eight cameras positioned around his *Tesla* car. So, each camera has an equivalent frame rate of 25 fps. (A decent digital S.L.R. camera can have over 100 fps and an *iPhone* can shoot at up to 240 fps.) It might be that the current system just doesn't have a high enough frame rate to capture fast moving motorcycles.

Self-driving cars are still a burgeoning field of technology with some bugs to work out. *Tesla* warns that *Autopilot* should not be used without some sort of human interaction. But would you want to be rolling up behind a robotic car knowing that an inattentive driver may not be quick enough to take over the manual controls if they didn't see the motorcycle?

Driverless Car Kills Robotic Pedestrian

In what some are labeling "roboton-robot" crime, an autonomous self-driving *Tesla* car struck and killed a robot roaming down the middle of the roadway in a hitand-run crash during the recent *Consumer Electronics Show* (C.E.S.) in Las Vegas.

Many mainstream news agencies worldwide reported the incident as legitimately newsworthy, though it is generally believed to be an overthe-top public relations stunt staged by Russian robotics company *Promobot* ahead of the C.E.S.

Dutch Police To Quickly Ban Outlaw Biker Gangs

Dutch authorities want parliament to speed up a legislative proposal that will allow the justice minister to immediately ban outlaw motorcycle gangs emerging in the Netherlands, said police chief Pim Miltenburg, in charge of the motorcycle gang file at the police.

Currently, banning an outlaw motorcycle club is a lengthy job in the Netherlands. A court must decide whether the gang is acting in conflict with public order. "The disadvantage of this type of procedure is that we can not arrange it in a short period of time, but it takes months or years before it is completed", Miltenburg told NLTimes.nl.

The police say they would prefer if the minister of justice and security can ban a motorcycle gang immediately, with a judge testing the ban afterwards.

So far Dutch courts banned two well-known motorcycle clubs, Satudarah and Bandidos. The public prosecutor also stated plans to get the Hells Angels and No Surrender banned sometime this year, adding that some two thousand people in the Netherlands now belong to an outlaw motorcycle gang.





Clip This Corner, **Avoid A Helmet Ticket**

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.

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
