A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A. T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

• *A.B.A.T.E.* is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.

It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, onroad or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.
You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to A.B.A. T.E. Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just *that* wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

So scan through our newspaper. If you like what you read, check out the chapter meeting listing on the back cover. Drop in on a meeting and see what we're about. You just might find a new family in *A.B.A.T.E.* And as Melinda says: "Bikers give great hugs." -- Rot Path, crusty ol' editor A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the *National Highway Transportation Safety Administration* (*N.H.T.S.A.*) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the *National Custom Cycle Association*. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to *A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments.* (*A.B.A.T.E.*)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. *D.O.T.* (*Department of Transportation*) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the *M.M.A.* of California, and Ed Armstrong from *A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago* presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the *D.O.T.* because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the *1975 Federal Highway Act*, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road. (reprinted with permission)

I don't know about you, but there are way too many riders out there who rely on us, who cannot pick up the fight any more. It is to them that we owe our freedoms we enjoy right now.


It's time to get involved in who we are.




Just a reminder : We do not have our normal May meeting.

Stay alert and ride safe,



Josephine County Chapter is proud to be able to organize a southern Oregon motorcycle awareness rally. Our goal is not to take away from the Salem group, but to spread the awareness around the state. 
This event is always well attended. We get lots of good drawing prizes and auction items donated so everyone seems to anxiously wait for this event each year. The kids we help are always grateful.


He'd also like to get some photos from the swap meet.

I will list by name those who came and helped out during the event. (Everyone appreciates an "atta boy/ girl" as opposed to an "aw sh**".) That will be in the Sergeant's Report elsewhere in the next month's issue, space permitting. If not this issue the next one. C.o.e.'s call. Don't bug him about it.

Since there was little to no(?) time to pull this off, I don't feel too bad overall. Here are some of the walls/ roadblocks that slapped me (us) to start with:

Last year, at the end of the state spring swap meet, Wheels, Kay, and Linda were good enough to set us up with a spring date for the 2013 event. Circumstances interfered. Starting with the calendar. Since I didn't officially take the position as swap meet coordinator for this year until January 1, 2013, I couldn't make any commitments on behalf of A.B.A.T.E. That didn't mean I couldn't negotiate with different parties. That part, I started back in June 2012 (behind closed doors, so to speak) and then in November or December, in earnest.

I did try to keep our executive board updated on a rather slack schedule. Why bother them if nothing had changed lately? Didn't hear any whining and for that, thanks, for your support.

For those who aren't/weren't aware, even though we had money on deposit from spring 2012 with the Oregon military department that oversees the assorted armories here in Oregon, we were supposedly denied use of customary areas at the Kleiver armory in Portland, as I was told, "by the federal restrictions" that had surfaced over the last year. (As a former G.I., I can still understand (somewhat) the double speak that is sent out by the gubermint.)

I was told we could not use the following normal (for us) areas for our event:

• The parking lot next to northeast 33rd street where our customers are accustomed to parking while shopping.

• The gravel parking area(s), due north of the rear side of the building. (Vendor parking area)

What we *could* use:

• The east side hardstand inside the fence. (Back yard?)

• The interior of the armory. (Our usual setup.)

• The south side where tailgaters are accustomed to being.

• Parking out front around the flag pole. (Mainly for riders and a few handicapped marked spots by law.)


I was forced to ask myself, "How can we (A.B.A.T.E.) put on a show if there is no place to park for the majority of us?"

He was wondering if we were still on for the end of April, which had been set up by the above-named folks on our behalf last spring. At that time I made a trip to the armory for a face-to-face discussion on why were weren't going to be there this spring. Interesting, civil discussion, having already discussed it with his predecessors my views of the restrictions.



I was informed, that we were

welcome to return, either this fall or next year, if we wanted to. I thanked him, signed the papers which caused us to forfeit our deposit of \$100. A.B.A.T.E. could have lost much more.

The paperwork has already been turned in to the treasurer. That account is clear. Stop and count it. Four managers in six months. Kinda tight, ya think?

That is a question that you, the members will have to let me know how you feel. That subject will arise in a future state board of directors meeting, come June or July. I'll let you know.

'Nuff for this one. Now it's up to you to locate the other one. Again, thanks for those who supported this event more than most of you are aware.

Miss-spellings intentional, (mostly). I talk the same way. Those who know me, would understand.

Thanks to all. Hope to see you in the fall. Got a date already. Up to you. Where? Tell your state representative which way each chapter feels on this.

The primary reason for developing the technology is claimed to be for increased road safety, efficiency, and reduction of traffic congestion.

We, as riders, don't want to be a splattered part of the learning curve for driverless cars. The question on most riders' minds is, "Will the robo car's sensors detect motorcycles?"

Some proponents of the technology advocate fitting transponders to motorcycles that would send out a signal, alerting robo cars that motorcycles were around. As a British rider might say, "That's plain daft." That's placing a burden on riders for the shortcomings someone

schools to create vehicles that else's technology. And it wouldn't protect bicycle riders or pedestrians. The state of robotics and computers

is such that they normally examine, then react to the world around them in semi-real time. (There will normally be a slight time lag for computations and decision making, but it will decrease with technology advances.)


Humans grow up learning cause and effect, remembering what events lead to a particular results. We can anticipate what is about to happen based on previous experience, reacting *before* an event occurs. That is something that cannot be successfully handled in real time by present computers.

Where does the emerging use of robotic cars leave us, the motorcycle riders of the world?

We may be entering the beginning of a new phase in transportation, one where robotic cars are taking their first tentative drives on our roadways. By future standards, they are crude and primitive compared to what they will become if their technology develops fully. Which means that we two and three-wheeled riders will be contending with someone else's (or something else's) learning curve until the technology and programming mature.

So if society is moving towards what are essentially self-driving vehicles, then it is time to consider implementing science fiction writer
















Motorcycle Riders Foundation Sensenbrenner Introduces Ethanol Legislation

[15 March 2013] Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner (R-WI) introduced HR–875, a bill that would require the U.S. *Environmental Protection Agency* (*E.P.A.*) to conduct a thorough independent study of the effects of gasoline/ethanol blends above 10%. Currently the *E.P.A.* is allowing the use of blends up to 15%.

Sensenbrenner had this to say, "There have been several tests and warnings highlighting E15's harmful effects on engines and their components, but they have all been dismissed by the E.P.A. Therefore, we must force the E.P.A. to stop the use of E15 fuel until the serious safety, durability, performance and environmental concerns have been addressed."

The bill would halt the sale of E-15, the 15% blend, until the studies' findings have been completed.

The *Motorcycle Industry Council* (*M.I.C.*) has cautioned owners against using the blend.

At a recent hearing held by the U.S. house science committee all witnesses agreed that more testing was needed into the effects of E-15

Described as a "mini *Meeting* of the Minds", the event was designed to educate the attendees


about motorcycle regulations and legislation. It also served as a networking session for the who'swho of the motorcycle rights world in the mideast part of this country.



California Bill Lane Sharing Introduced

No sooner had the *California Highway Patrol* published guidelines on how to safely maneuver your motorcycle between lanes of slowmoving traffic, than SB–350 was introduced by state senator Jim Beall (D-San Jose) to codify the rules into regulation.

California is the only state that allows "lane sharing" or "lane– splitting," precisely because there are no regulations against it, though officers have a variety of charges they can levy against a reckless rider such as unsafe lane change or too fast for conditions.

Beall's bill would restrict the practice by prohibiting motorcycles from splitting lanes unless specifically allowed:

"... when a highway has been divided into three or more clearly marked lanes for traffic traveling in the same direction, a person operating a motorcycle shall not pass another vehicle in a portion of a lane occupied by that vehicle unless the following conditions are met:

1. The passing occurs during traffic congestion.

2. The passing occurs at a safe speed."

Following furious feedback from motorcyclists opposed to overregulating an act that 87% report doing almost daily during crowded commutes, senator Beall soon pulled his proposal and turned it into a twoyear bill for future reconsideration.

In the meantime, although A.B.A.T.E. of California did not

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.

Research Shows Drivers Cause Most Crashes With Motorcycles

For motorcycle riders, people in "cages" bear a disproportionate share of the blame for the high number of motorcycle crashes, while car drivers feel careless motorcyclists careening in and out of traffic are putting their own lives at risk.

So who's mostly to blame when four-wheel and two-wheel vehicles collide? According to a recent Florida department of transportation study, bikers are right. Motorists driving cars and trucks are mostly at fault, often failing to yield the right of way to the smaller vehicles.

In analyzing ten years of Florida motorcycle crashes, Chanyoung Lee, a senior researcher at the *University* of South Florida's center for urban transportation research, found that 60% of the time motorists in other vehicles are at fault when they collide with motorcycles.

But the study uncovered more: When looking at all motorcycle crashes, motorcycle operators bear a lot of responsibility as well. They have a significantly higher number of single-vehicle crashes than other drivers.

Some 34% of motorcycle crashes involve one vehicle, according to the study, compared to only 19% of car crashes involving one vehicle.

When looking at really severe and fatal motorcycle crashes, 50% involve just the motorcycle and no other vehicle, but when multiple vehicles are involved, greater blame falls on four-wheeled drivers. And most motorcycle crashes involve other vehicles.

But it's also a matter of awareness, according to Lee, who is part of *FD.O.T.*'s *Motorcycle Safety Coalition*. In driver surveys, *F.D.O.T.* has asked people how often they see motorcycles. Those with motorcycle endorsements on their driver's licenses report seeing motorcycles all the time, while those without endorsements who live in the same area report occasionally seeing motorcycles.

Due to minimal levels of protection to their riders, approximately 80% of motorcycle crashes result in injury or fatality, according to the *Network* of *Employees for Traffic Safety*, while only 20% of passenger car crashes injure or kill the vehicle occupants.

M.M.A. Helps Defeat Yarmouth Sound Warrant

The *Massachusetts Motorcycle Association* (*M.M.A.*) is pleased to report that a town by-law proposal has been successfully defeated in Yarmouth, Massachusetts. With short notice, the *M.M.A.* in concert with the Yarmouth chief-of-police and deputy chief attended a recent board-of-selectmen meeting and were successful in convincing the board that such a by-law would be unsuccessful.

Armed with prior testimony used successfully around the state, including used to overturn a similar by-law passed in Falmouth and subsequently struck down by the Commonwealth attorney general, *M.M.A.* legislative director Rick Gleason joined the chief and deputy chief of the Yarmouth police department in their argument that town by-laws cannot exceed state law, and that such a measure would essentially be meaningless.

The *M.M.A.* has long held strong opposition to the use of the O.E.M. *E.P.A.* stamp on stock exhausts as an enforcement tool, because it is a consumer protection mechanism and not meant to be used against the

consumer. It is also hard to locate on many models of motorcycle, hidden under seats on sport bikes, under saddle bags of cruisers, or simply facing the wrong way for aesthetic reasons. Most critically, per the very regulation that entitles it, it expires in one year or 3,729 miles, whichever comes first.

Instead, the *M.M.A.* (http://www. MassMotorcycle.org) continues to hold a firm belief that the existing regulations on the books are sufficient if properly implemented and enforced, specifically that simple test procedures do exist for muffled exhaust, whether replaced with after-market or not, with a reasonable sound level.

License Plate Cameras – A New Way To Nab Scofflaws

First came red light cameras attached to traffic lights to catch drivers trying to beat the light. Then came speed cameras along the roadway to ticket lead-footed speeders. But now police are deploying cameras in their cruisers to scan our license-plates in order to get instant feedback on unpaid tickets and other warrants.

It also allows authorities to monitor where average citizens might be at any particular time. That bothers some privacy advocates and organizations like the *A.C.L.U.* who oppose public intrusions into individual privacy. The groups are becoming more alarmed about license plate tracking as a growing number of police departments acquire the technology for electronic surveillance of traffic on public streets.

Little Rock, Arkansas police chief Stuart Thomas said the police enforcement benefits outweigh any concerns about possible abuse of the information, which, as a public record, is legally available for anyone to see.

Legislators in several states, including Minnesota and Utah,

have suggested setting a time limit for their departments regarding how long such data can be collected and stored, but many places like Little Rock have no set policy and have a growing archive of license plate photos, along with time stamps and locations, showing where motorists were at certain times.

Privacy advocates worry about the potential uses for such information outside police enforcement, from snooping by stalkers and private investigators to businesses that "Given how sell personal data. few rules are currently on the books to protect our privacy, it's plausible that private investigators and datamining companies could acquire this location data," said A.C.L.U. staff attorney Catherine Crump, adding that the organization has requested more information from government agencies, but hasn't filed any lawsuits.

Australia Bans Brothers **Behind Bars**

Since last November 19, the state Queensland in northeastern of Australia has banned the distribution of the monthly newsletter Brothers Behind Bars in its prisons. Brothers Behind Bars is a digest of biker club and motorcycle news edited by retired Sons of Silence patch holder Iron Mike Davis and is an outreach program supported by the National *Coalition of Motorcyclists (N.C.O.M.)* B.B.B. is specifically aimed at motorcycle club members and is stubbornly non-partisan.

Mike Davis was notified that the words he publishes were illegal in Oz with a peremptory, unsigned form letter from the government of Queensland that read in full:

"On 7th of November 2012 Queensland corrective services issued a directive from head office that all correspondence between prisoners who are members of an outlaw motorcycle gang (O.M.C.G.) and O.M.C.G. members and associates was to cease immediately. As a result the author of this letter has been identified to be either a member or associate of an O.M.C.G. as such your mail has been returned to you."

Iron Mike recently told the Aging

Rebel (http://www.agingrebel. **com**), "Something I've said for years: 'Australia today, Canada tomorrow, and the U.S.A. the day after.' I truly believe countries like Canada, Germany, U.S.A., and others are watching to see what works in Australia to outlaw motorcycle clubs – starting with the 1%er ones."

The Aging Rebel article went on to describe "anti-bikie laws" down under: "Queensland has been trying to outlaw motorcycle clubs since 2009 when the state passed legislation formally called the Criminal Organisation Act of 2009. These anti-bikie [regulations] give police the power to declare which organizations are criminal and which are not. Similar sets of [regulations] have been passed in the Australian states of New South Wales and South Australia, and have been challenged in the courts by the Hells Angels, Finks, and Rebels motorcycle clubs. Australia's strategy has been difficult to implement in the United States because the U.S. constitution specifically guarantees citizens' and visitors' rights to move freely, assemble peaceably, to keep and bear arms, and to express themselves freely in numerous ways including the right to wear a patch on your back. Various federal police forces in America including the F.B.I., the A.T.F., and increasingly the Department of Homeland Security have attempted to subvert these constitutional guarantees using the Racketeer Influenced And Corrupt Organizations Act (R.I.C.O.) and in several recent cases, trademark [regulations]."

Canadian Riders Balk At Hefty Insurance Hikes

Saskatchewan premier Brad Wall says "maybe mistakes were made." Saskatchewan government The will revisit motorcycle insurance rate hikes proposed recently by Saskatchewan Government Insurance. (S.G.I.) "Our [members of the legislative assembly] are reporting a lot of feedback on the issue, not just from those who are riders or have motorcycles, but others in general who note that these increases seem to be very high," Wall told reporters.

When the legislature reconvenes for its spring session next week,

the Saskatchewan party caucus will discuss its next steps, Wall said. He said he's not convinced S.G.I. has exhausted all of its options to help eliminate a \$9-million deficit between crash injury pay outs and fees charged to motorcyclists. "Obviously, what's being proposed by S.G.I. for the rate rebalancing means huge increases and immediate increases, if approved, for riders," Wall said.

S.G.I.'s proposal the to Saskatchewan rate review panel would mean a sudden 73% jump in insurance costs for the average motorcycle owner, compared to an overall vehicle insurance rate increase of 1.03%. The move prompted a backlash from bike enthusiasts and business owners, who fear a big blow to new and used bike sales which could devastate the motorcycle industry.

If approved, the rate increases would take effect in August, but Wall said the chance is "slim" the proposal will stay as is. He wants the government and S.G.I. to look at other creative options, such as using better price incentives to reward motorcyclists who have taken training courses.




