What We're About

A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A. T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

• A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as BikePAC.

• It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, onroad or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.

• You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to A.B.A. T.E. Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just that wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

So scan through our newspaper. If you like what you read, check out the chapter meeting listing on the back cover. Drop in on a meeting and see what we're about. You just might find a new family in A.B.A.T.E. And as Melinda says: "Bikers give great hugs."

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

by Bill Bish (A.B.A.T.E. of California; executive coordinator, National Coalition of Motorcyclists)

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. (A.B.A.T.E.)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the Huns Motorcycle Club in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California, and Ed Armstrong

from A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through

congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of A.B.A.T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road. reprinted with permission)

Some the fault of cages, some the fault of riders.


We need to pay attention to the road and all the hazards out there so we can live to ride another day. Live to ride but *ride to live*.

Todd also informed the board that he will not be able to serve in this position next year but will be happy to help the new swap meet coordinator get up and running.



Historian: Teresa Hepker said she saw Godron Hieronymus at the *May Motorcycle Awareness Rally*, and he said all of the newsletters he produced while he was newsletter editor were handed over in electronic form when his term ended. Teresa has not yet been through all the historian's tubs. Rot Path said he had some 3-1/2" floppies that he will try to review to see if they are the archives. Teresa said she has gotten bogged down in scanning because the magazine formatted newsletters have to be unstapled and cut up to be scanned.

Web page editor: Carl Earl said the web site is updated and he and Kathy Sahlberg are working together to generate a fresh mailing list each month for the newspaper.

Quartermaster: Gene Mortimore delivered \$966 to the Fossil E.M.T.'s from the raffle of Laura Stewart's leather jacket. He has no reports yet on firewood sales, can returns, or breakfasts at the high school. Everything has been moved out of Bear Hollow and is back in storage at his place.

SB3–94 (lane filtering) passed the senate by 2/3 majority. Although we had the votes on the house floor, heavy lobbying by O.D.O.T., Portland police, and the *Governor's Motorcycle*



Safety Advisory Committee, the bill was not given a house committee hearing and died.

Don praised A.B.A. T.E.'s cohesiveness for a great 40th anniversary year: a big success in the legislature, a successful spring swap meet, and a successful *Fossil Campout*!

A.B.A.T.E.'s BikePAC representative: Brian Stovall thanked Don for his report, and said that all but one chapter of A.B.A.T.E. are BikePAC members now. Southeast Portland is not on the list, and he said they have been strong supporters in the past and hopes they will join again.

As you can see by Don's report, *BikePAC* is a good investment in our future. Please join if you are not a member.

M.R.F. representative: Brian Stovall reported that on June 4th the United States house of representatives agreed to an amendment to the 2016 transportation, housing and urban development appropriations bill that struck down a provision that would have overturned the U.S. department of transportation lobby ban. The measure was approved on the house floor reports the Motorcycle Riders Foundation. Thanks to everyone who responded to the recent call to action on this bill.

Confederation of Clubs representative: Pat "Spanky" Allen said the *CoC* web site has a form for reporting profiling or discrimination problems. The forms are sent to the attorney's office of Sam Hochberg, who is collecting this data for legal and legislative action if necessary.

Paul Hering remarked that *N.C.O.M.* has hired an investigator to research the Waco, Texas shootings that have been in the press.





Additional shirts may be ordered and picked up at the next state board meeting, or shipped to you. (Cost of shipping will be added.) The state products department has only eight shirts.



American Motorcyclist Association

A new study by the University of California Berkeley shows that motorcyclists who split lanes in heavy traffic are significantly less likely to be struck from behind by other motorists and are less likely to suffer head or torso injuries, the A.M.A. reports.

Researchers, led by Dr. Thomas Rice of the *Safe Transportation Research and Education Center (SafeTREC)*, reviewed nearly 6,000 motorcycle-involved traffic collisions between June 2012 and August 2013, including 997 in which the riders were splitting lanes at the time of the crash.

"Perhaps one of the most dangerous situations for any motorcyclist is being caught in congested traffic, where stopand-go vehicles, distracted and inattentive vehicle operators, and environmental conditions increase the risk of physical contact with another vehicle or hazard," said Wayne Allard, A.M.A. vice president for government relations. "Reducing a motorcyclist's exposure to vehicles that are frequently accelerating and decelerating on congested roadways can be one way to reduce rear-end collisions for those most vulnerable in traffic."

Among the U.C. Berkeley findings:

• Lane-splitting is safe if done in traffic moving at 50 mph or less, and if motorcyclists do not exceed the speed of other vehicles by more than 15 mph;

• 69 percent of lane-splitting motorcyclists were exceeding the traffic speed by 15 mph or less; speed differentials up to 15 mph were not associated with changes in the frequency of injury;

• Compared to riders who were not splitting lanes, lane-splitting motorcyclists were markedly less likely to suffer head injury (9 percent vs. 17 percent), torso injury (19 percent vs. 29 percent) or fatal injury (1.2 percent vs. 3 percent); • Lane-splitting riders were significantly less likely to be rear-ended than nonlane-splitting riders (2.6 percent vs. 4.6 percent);

• Lane-splitting motorcyclists were more likely to be wearing a full-face helmet than other motorcyclists (81 percent vs. 67 percent);

• Compared to other motorcyclists, lane-splitting riders were more often riding on weekdays and during commuting hours, were using better helmets and were traveling at slower speeds;

• Lane-splitting riders were less likely to have been using alcohol.

"These new findings bolster our position that responsible lane-splitting is a safe and effective riding technique that can be beneficial for riders and motorists alike," Allard said. "Lane splitting eases traffic congestion by taking motorcyclists out of the line of cars and trucks. And the practice increases safety by allowing motorcycle riders to avoid the risk of rear-end collisions in stopped or slow-moving traffic."

Motorcycle lane splitting is a common practice in many countries throughout the world, particularly in the highly urbanized areas of Europe and Asia. Long recognized as a way to alleviate traffic congestion and reduce the risk of crashes, the practice nevertheless remains largely prohibited in the United States, with California currently being the exception.

The *U.C.-Berekley* study is the latest to examine crash data related to lane splitting and follows a similar report issued in October 2014.

"We want to remind motorists that permitting lane splitting is not the same as requiring it," Allard said. "Where it is allowed, lane splitting is an issue of choice, and formalizing the practice will give riders and law enforcement alike clear guidelines for its responsible practice."

Lane-Splitting Motorcyclists Safer

The *A.M.A.* formally endorses responsible lane splitting and will continue to assist groups and individuals working to bring legal lane splitting and/or filtering to their states.

Harley-Davidson Offers Free Riding Academy Training To U.S. Military

The Harley-Davidson Motor Company is offering free motorcycle training to all current and former U.S. military personnel from May 16 (Armed Forces Day) through September 13.

The *Learn to Ride* program will be provided through the company's riding academy and is available to active-duty, retired, reservists, and veterans.

Motorcycle Riders Foundation

Ethanol Production Slashed

The Environmental Protection Agency (E.P.A.) announces Friday, May 29th that it would reduce the amount of ethanol requirements for gasoline, reports the *Motorcycle Riders Foundation* (*M.R.F.*). This proposal would cut ethanol production for 2014, 2015, and 2016. The *E.P.A.* cites market conditions and the lack of non-corn renewable fuel sources like plant waste from being developed on any sort of commercial scale.

A 2007 regulation, known as the *Renewable Fuels Standard* (*R.F.S.*), requires refiners to blend in an increasing amount of biofuels into the United States gasoline supply each year. According to the proposal, the levels of ethanol will still continue to increase, but less than it would have, preventing the administration from achieving the goals of the 2007 legislation.

"The E.P.A. has missed several deadlines to lay out the production levels for 2014 and 2015, and this announcement is the reason why," said Jeff Hennie, vice president of government relations and public affairs for the Motorcycle Riders Foundation. "They know that the R.F.S. amounts were going to be unattainable, and now we know too." Hennie also testified at an E.P.A. hearing on the R.F.S. in favor of a study that would examine the lasting effects of E15 on internal combustion engines.

With today's domestic oil boom, and the

fact that we are consuming less gasoline than we were in 2007, a void for biofuels was created. Add in the fact that the U.S. is only importing about a third of its oil, and the need for biofuel all but disappears.

In its proposal the *E.P.A.* would increase the levels of blended in 2015 to 16.3 billion gallons, four billion less than what the *R.F.S.* requires. In 2016 the *E.P.A.* would require about five billion less gallons than the regulation requires.

This is obviously a blow to the affected industries around ethanol and a boom for big oil. Whatever side of this equation you end up on, one thing is certain: raising levels of ethanol in fuel from 10 percent (E10) to 15 percent (E15) overnight has been hard on motorcycles. This is why the *M.R.F.* is supporting HR–21 in the United states house of representatives. HR–21, a bill authored by James Sensenbrenner (R-WI), would require a full examination of what effects the higher blends of ethanol have on motors.

Contact your member in the U.S. house of representatives to cosponsor this important legislation.

Bikers Inside the Beltway

This year was another highly successful *Motorcycle Riders Foundation* (*M.R.F.*) event in our nation's capitol. We were blessed with perfect weather and a robust number

of citizen motorcycle lobbyists on the most important day of the year for motorcyclists.

Motorcyclists from Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Louisiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Virginia, Washington, and Wisconsin descended onto capitol hill to defend the freedoms of motorcyclists.

This years only national lobby event for motorcyclists resulted in over 500 individual interactions with senate and house offices to advance the *M.R.F.* agenda in Washington D.C.

The focus of *Bikers Inside The Beltway* 2015 (*B.I.T.B.*) was HR–1861 and SB–127, bills to prohibit federal funding of motorcycle-only roadside checkpoints.

The group also lobbied for HR–21, a bill that would require the *Environmental Protection Agency* to halt the sale of E-15 gasoline and conduct an independent study on the effects of the E-15 blend on internal combustion engines.

The group also advocated for the passage of black box privacy legislation.

Autocycle legislation was also discussed.

Representative Jim Sensenbrenner's letter of inquiry to the *E.P.A.* was hand-delivered to multiple relevant members of congress during the event. This year's congressional program was held on the house side of capitol hill. The attendees heard from several members of congress who were all very supportive towards the motorcycle rights community.

This years *Bikers Inside the Beltway* was a tremendous success.

The *M.R.F.* thanks all of you who attended from near and far to defend liberty.

N.C.O.M. Hails Third Decade With Denver Convention

You could smell it in the air, as distinct as a Denver dispensary and just as intoxicating: unity, and cooperation in the face of critical challenges affecting today's motorcyclists.

Coming Together in one of the largest gatherings of bikers' rights activists in America, the *30th Annual N.C.O.M. Convention*, May 7-10 in Denver, Colorado addressed issues of mutual concern for the betterment of biking.

For three decades, over Mother's Day weekend the *National Coalition* of *Motorcyclists* has provided a forum for diverse factions of the motorcycle community to meet in the spirit of teamwork to tackle topics such as biker anti-profiling legislation, save the patch litigation, freedom of the road and use of the courts, as well as seminars on public relations and social media, lobbying 101, and working with your legislators.

Friday's opening ceremonies was one of the best-attended ever and the energetic congregation of concerned riders from across the country encompassed various segments of motorcycling from clubs to rights organizations and from touring groups to sport bikers, all there to learn and share with mutual respect.

Special meetings were on the weekend's agenda in support of N.C.O.M.'s many outreach programs for Women In Motorcycling, Clean and Sober Roundtable, National Sport Bike Association (N.S.B.A.), and Christian Unity Conference, in addition to the Confederation of Clubs general patch holders meeting.

Right-To-Repair Decision Expected From U.S. Copyright Office

In July, the U.S. Copyright Office (U.S.C.O.) is expected to issue a decision about a vehicle owner's right to alter any of the computer software or code that controls the vehicle's operations.

Though the decision is based on briefs filed by agricultural and automotive vehicle manufacturers, it could potentially have implications for motorcycles, A.T.V., U.T.V., personal water craft, and other vehicles that use computer software to control ignition, fuel, stability, traction, braking, and other vehicle operating systems.

In the briefs, the manufacturers argue that allowing owners, non-manufacturer approved service technicians, or anyone but their own designated technicians to view or alter the computer software or codes is not allowed under the anti-circumvention prohibition in section 1201 of the *Digital Millennium Copyright Act* (*D.M.C.A.*) which, if applied as manufacturers suggest, restricts vehicle software inspection, repair, and modification. The original intent of the *D.M.C.A.*, however, was more to prevent code copying that could involve copyright infringement. Every three years, the librarian of congress, working with the copyright office, hears requests from members of the public whose speech and other rights are affected by the legislation and considers whether to grant exemptions.

Maryland Bans Motorcycle-Only Checkpoints

The Maryland legislature has joined a growing list of states to prohibit enforcement officers from conducting roadside checkpoints that specifically target motorcyclists.

HB–917, introduced by Maryland delegate Benjamin Kramer (D-Wheaton) and companion bill SB–716 introduced by state senator Jamie Raskin (D-Takoma Park) state that "*a police officer at a motor vehicle checkpoint may not target only motorcycles for inspection or evaluation.*"

The bipartisan legislation passed unanimously in the house 137-0 on March 19, and the senate 47-0 on March 29, then was signed into effect on May 12, making Maryland the eighth state to pass legislation against motorcycle-only checkpoints. Another eleven states have prohibited such discriminatory roadblocks either on constitutional grounds or by judicial action.

Kansas Creates New "Autocycle" Classification

Under a new regulation in Kansas, "autocycle" is now defined as a three-wheel motorcycle that has a steering wheel and seating that does not require the operator to straddle or sit astride it.

House bill 2044, signed into effect by governor Sam Brownback on May 7, 2015 after passing the legislature near-unanimously by both chambers, creates the new classification of vehicles which proponents say are neither cars nor motorcycles and need their own classification to protect drivers from breaking regulations.

The federal government classifies any vehicle with less than four wheels as a motorcycle, which requires a motorcycle license to operate. But some say the motorcycle license test isn't helpful for operating autocycles because they aren't driven the same way.

"It's a requirement that makes absolutely no sense," said Joel Sheltrown, vice president of governmental affairs for Elio Motors, a Phoenix company that plans to start making autocycles in 2016. "My customer base, a lot of them, don't have motorcycle licenses and they're not going to go out and rent a motorcycle, learn how to drive it, go down and take a test just so they can drive our vehicle, especially seniors."

HB–2044 allows drivers to operate an autocycle without a motorcycle endorsement. Sheltrown said about eighteen states are working on legislation for autocycles and six states already passed legislation for defining autocycles. Otherwise, out-of-state drivers could run into trouble if they drive into a state where a motorcycle license is required, as drivers would automatically be breaking regulations and could face tickets or possibly get their vehicle impounded until they could prove they had a motorcycle license.

Wisconsin Legalizes Colored Lighting

The Wisconsin legislature has passed a bill legalizing colored motorcycle lights.

Current Wisconsin regulations (and in most U.S. states) prohibits operating a motor vehicle with lights other than white or amber in front and red in the rear.

The bill's assembly sponsor, John Jagler (R-Watertown), says colored L.E.D. lights are becoming more popular on motorcycles. He says more lights will

increase motorcycle visibility, making *h* them safer.

Under the bill, people could equip their motorcycles with any color lights aside blue as long as they don't flash or rotate.

The assembly passed the bill. The senate passed the bill on a voice vote on May 6, sending the measure to governor Scott Walker.

In the meantime, a similar measure, HB-3944, would amend the Illinois vehicle code to "provide that a motorcycle may be equipped with auxiliary accent lights, including standard bulb running lights and light emitting diode pods and strips. Provides that the auxiliary accent lights shall not be red or white or oscillating, rotating, or flashing lights. Defines 'auxiliary accent light'."

The measure passed senate transportation committee 16-0 on May 13 and has been placed on the senate calendar.

Georgia Governor Vetoes "Dead Red" Bill

Georgia governor Nathan Deal has vetoed a bill passed by the state legislature that would have allowed cyclists, both bicyclists and motorcyclists, to ride through unresponsive red lights, sometimes referred to as "dead red" legislation.

On May 12, 2015 the governor nixed senate bill 76, *Motorcycle Mobility Safety Act*, relating to the safe operation of a motorcycle, inoperative trafficcontrol signal, issuing the following veto message:

"While I am sympathetic to the concerns and causes of motorcyclists and bicyclists, this legislation does not provide an adequate solution and presents a confusing exception to motorists. Furthermore, senate bill 76 would eliminate the current fifteeninch height restriction placed on motorcycle handlebars. Motorcycles equipped with handlebars more than fifteen inches in height pose a safety hazard due to the increased difficulty in steering and decreased control. In 2014, crashes involving motorcycles and bicycles accounted for thirteen percent of the fatalities on Georgia roads, and I do not see how this legislation will enhance roadway safety. Therefore, in the interest of providing the necessary roadway safety Georgians deserve, I hereby veto senate bill 76."

Aussie Cops Swap "Criminal Motorcycle Gangs" For "Outlaw" Tag

Queensland police have dropped the term "criminal motorcycle gangs" for bikies in a sign of a new political climate, quietly reverting to the more widely used "outlaw" tag, the description used by the new labor police minister.

The term "criminal motorcycle gangs" was coined by the former Newman government, which directed police to adopt it from the outset of its legislative and public relations campaign against bikies in 2013.

However, the new Palaszczuk labor government is reviewing the controversial bikie regulations, including antiassociation and mandatory sentencing provisions, after pre-election promises to repeal them.

A government source told *Guardian Australia* that all other Australian police forces, as well as the Australian crime commission, refer to the bikies as O.M.C.G.s, adding that bikies refer to themselves as outlaw motorcycle clubs, 1%" clubs, or simply motorcycle clubs.

Insurer Claims Motorcyclists Are Their Own Worst Enemy

According to *Progressive Insurance*, single-vehicle mishaps accounted for more motorcycle-related claims last year than any other event. The insurer processed 3.5 times more of such claims than for rear-end crashes, the next-most common motorcycle incident.

Excess speed is the most common rider-related factor in fatal motorcycle crashes.

Riding while intoxicated on alcohol or controlled substances is another leading cause of motorcycle crashes where another vehicle is not involved.

Weird News Briton Deported For Riding Nude

A British man was to be deported from Cambodia after he was caught riding a motorcycle naked. The 24-year old student from the *University of the West of Scotland*, was booted out for "violating the beautiful customs and culture" of the country.

He spent the weekend in jail after being caught with two other nude riders, a 22-year-old Finnish woman and a 30-year-old Italian man, appearing in a video posted on *YouTube* before being stopped by police fifty miles after shedding their clothes. It's been reported they are to be permanently barred from Cambodia for indecent exposure.

Kandal police chief Eav Chamroeun told the Phnom Penh Post, "I think that this was the first time there have been foreign people driving motorcycles naked in Cambodia. Their actions have seriously violated Cambodia's integrity, the beautiful customs and culture of Cambodia, and Cambodian [regulations]. We cannot allow them to commit pornography like this in our country."

Sok Phal, head of the ministry of interior's immigration department, said: "The general department of immigration has asked the leadership of the ministry of interior to expel them from the country as punishment."

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
Clip This Corner, Avoid A Helmet Ticket

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.
