Suggested Speed + 10? ... Not!



Riding or driving on Oregon roads, folks often encounter yellow warning signs for curves with a smaller safe speed sign mounted underneath the main sign. One of the first lessons beginning drivers seem to learn (unofficially) is that you can add ten miles an hour to the recommended safe speed under normal dry driving conditions. All that is changing.

Ever wonder how highway engineers came up with those safe speeds?

Back in the early part of the previous century (1930s) traffic safety-types with slipsticks would



drive around curves in vehicles of the day with



a metal ball sitting in a pool of mercury or an aircraft bank indicator mounted firmly to said



vehicle. Curves were signed based on speeds that produced very little centrifugal force.

Cars, pick-ups, trucks, buses, and motorcycles have changed considerably in the last eighty years. Suspension systems and tires have improved, allowing vehicles to comfortably cruise through curves at higher-than-posted speeds.

A 2008 study by *Oregon State University* found that there was inconsistent signing of safe curve speeds in Oregon. The original report can be viewed at:

In the interests of consistency, the standards for curve speed signing were updated

nationally in 2009. (Using vehicles from the 1990s, so we're still twenty years behind.) Measuring technology utilizing accelerometers and computers was used to update the math behind computing safe turn speeds.

Oregon department of transportation (O.D.O.T.) updated its standards to match the national comfort thresholds in 2011.

In most cases, safe curve speeds are going up.

That means that the previous practice of adding 10 m.p.h. to the posted safe curve speeds can end up causing you to enter curves at dangerous speeds that could cause skids and unintentional off-road activity. (Crashes.)

Signs are being updated, but there is no visual difference between old and new curve speed signs.

The O.D.O.T. communications division is supposed to be outreaching to road users about the changes. How many of you are aware of these changes?

A better idea would be to put reflective red and white tape under the revised curve speed so that road users had a visual indication that signs had been updated.



The bottom line when riding roads new-to-you is to approach curves at the suggested safe speed.

A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brother-hood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. (A.B.A. T.E.)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR–3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the *American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.)*, Ron Roloff of the *M.M.A.* of California, and Ed Armstrong

from *A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago* presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the *D.O.T.* because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through

congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

Legislative director: V A C A N T

Don Mason thanked all the people who came to Salem once or repeatedly, especially Paula Leslie and Mike Friend. This is how democracy is supposed to work.

The legislature ended on July 6, and now the legislators are home and looking forward to their next election. Between now and November they will all be eager to attend your meetings. Invite them to come and tell you about their experiences in Salem, and to listen and learn about your concerns and issues.

Paula Leslie reported a number of issues that *BikePAC* will be discussing for future action.

- 1. **Ignition interlocks on bikes**: Currently, a judge may require a camera to be installed with the breathalyzer. Only one place in Oregon will install an interlock on a motorcycle, but the cameras are not waterproof and they won't install one.
- 2. **Milkman Mike bill**: Define motorcyclists as vulnerable road users.
- 3. Anti-profiling in police activities.
- 4. **Lane filtering**: *O.D.O.T.* said that recessed reflectors on highways have been complained about by motorcyclists, so they make

lane filtering too dangerous.

Paula said that *N.H.T.S.A.* is coming to assess Oregon's motorcycle safety program and she has been asked to give a presentation about how *BikePAC* and *A.B.A.T.E.* communicate their goals and issues. Mike Friend will also be giving a presentation on behalf of Bikers for Christ.

A.B.A.T.E.'s BikePAC representative: Brian Stovall had no additional information to share.

M.R.F. representative: Brian Stovall reported that the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) is proposing new rules for motorcycle helmet standards to make it easier for enforcement to ticket "non-complying" helmets. You can submit your comments on this proposal, and other issues, by going to the Motorcycle Riders Foundation web site:

If the proposed rule is adopted, we are likely to see more tickets and harassment over the helmets we choose to wear.

- 1. Save the Patch campaign to raise money to help the Mongols Motorcycle Club with legal expenses over the government's attempt to take away their trademarked logo. A second club, Devils Disciples, has now been targeted as well.
- 2. Using social media and technology to advance our rights and goals.



Motorcycle-Only Checkpoint Defunding

U.S. Jeanne Shaheen senator (D-N.H.) urged fellow senators Bill Nelson (D-Fla.) and John Thune (R-S.D.) to include language from her Stop Motorcycle Checkpoint Funding Act in the surface transportation authorization bill.

Thune is chairman committee on commerce, science and transportation. Nelson is the ranking member.

Shaheen's bill (S–127) would

prohibit the secretary of transportation from providing grants to be used for motorcycle-only checkpoints or programs to check for helmet use.

Texas Defines Autocycles

Effective in May, the state has an official definition for "autocycles."

SB-449 created the "autocycle" category for vehicles with no more than three wheels on the ground, seats instead of saddles, and steering wheels in place of the handlebars. The autocycles are designed to meet federal safety requirements for motorcycles. Operators do not have to complete motorcycle training, but they must comply with state motorcycle helmet requirements.

Possible Interstate Tolling Expansion

June 16, 2015

As a member of the *Alliance for Toll-Free Interstates* (*A.T.F.I.*), the *Motorcycle Riders Foundation* (*M.R.F.*) works with the *A.T.F.I.* on a regular basis to ensure that your right to ride is not infringed upon with heavy interstate tolling. Please take a few minutes to review this and respond.

The *M.R.F.* has learned that the U.S. senate environment and public works committee (*E.P.W.*), which has jurisdiction over the interstate highway system, is considering expanding interstate tolling at its June 24th bill markup.

Please take action by sending an e-mail to your senator if they sit on the *E.P.W.* committee. Add a sentence urging them to contact chairman Inhofe directly about rejecting tolls.

Tell the *E.P.W.* committee "no tolls" in just fifteen seconds

Over the past seventeen years, the *Interstate Reconstruction and Rehabilitation Pilot Program* (*I.S.R.R.P.P.*) has served its purpose

and demonstrated the unviability of tolling existing interstates. Six states have pursued tolls via the *I.S.R.R.P.P.*, and all failed primarily due to the widespread public outcry over tolling's negative consequences, which in some cases even triggered legislative action to protect interstates from tolls. Pilot programs are meant to be temporary. Now approaching twenty years, the *I.S.R.R.P.P.* has run its course and should be repealed, not expanded or made more flexible.

We all know that tolling existing interstates would have serious negative consequences. Businesses would face higher operating expenses and be forced to pass those costs on to consumers. Commuters and travelers would face steep cost increases, and hourly employees might have to work an extra hour per day just to pay the toll to and from work. Traffic diversion around tolls onto secondary routes would cause congestion, increased crashes, create higher road wear and repair costs for local governments,

and slow first response times. The cost to ride will be dramatically higher.

Additionally, our founding fathers gave congress the responsibility to regulate commerce. This now includes funding and maintaining the interstate highway system, and passing the buck to the states is an abdication of duty and violates the spirit of the U.S. constitution's commerce clause. It may be politically expedient to frame it as a "states' rights" issue, but this ignores the safety, equity, and interstate commerce implications. Most importantly, it will not solve the highway funding problem.

Please join the *M.R.F.* in urging the *E.P.W.* committee and its chairman, senator Jim Inhofe (R-OK), to protect interstates from the burden of new tolls.

D.O.T. Crackdown On Novelty Helmets

U.S. transportation regulators on Wednesday, May 20 called for stronger rules for motorcycle helmets, proposing additional safety requirements in an effort to crack down on "novelty" helmets that do not meet federal standards.

Department of Transportation officials say such uncertified helmets are unsafe and do not protect riders in crashes, despite being sold and marketed for use on the road.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) proposes to amend Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standard (F.M.V.S.S.) No. 218 to modify the existing performance requirements of the standard by adding construction requirements.

Its proposed rule making changes would further define what makes an acceptable motorcycle helmet, from its thickness to its compression ability, "in an attempt to help riders and state enforcement officials identify inferior Such changes aim "to helmets." reduce fatalities and injuries resulting from traffic [crashes] involving use of motorcycle helmets" that fail to meet federal standards, D.O.T. regulators told Reuters news agency, adding that rider deaths are disproportionately high due in part to the high number of motorcyclists wearing substandard

It is not clear why so many motorcycle riders use inferior helmets, said the regulators, but they say part of the problem seems to be that riders do not understand the risks. Novelty helmets can also be cheaper and appear "more comfortable or stylish," they added.

So-called "novelty" helmets generally cover a smaller area of the head, have

thin liners and are often sold with disclaimers stating that they are not for highway use "yet they are sold to highway users and used in great numbers by motorcyclists."

Tougher standards are expected to help authorities prosecute sellers of noncompliant helmets in states where helmets are mandatory, regulators said.

D.O.T. Lobby Ban Repeal Attempt Thwarted

A provision contained in a federal appropriations bill could have struck down the D.O.T. lobby ban implemented by congress in 1998 to prevent the department of transportation from strong-arming states on helmet regulations and other unwanted legislation.

However, thanks to the swift actions of national and state motorcyclists rights organizations, riders across the country rose to the occasion and supported an amendment introduced by congressional representatives Tim Walberg (R-MI), Jim Sensenbrenner (R-WI), and Reid Ribble (R-WI) to strip the offending provision.

When the U.S. house of representatives addressed the 2016 Transportation, Housing and Urban Development Appropriations Act (HR–2577) on June 3-4, section 102 was removed.

Oregon Motorcyclists Get Limited Red Lights Exception

Changing traffic regulations that affect motorcyclists often spark plenty of debate in state legislatures, but that was not the case with a measure allowing two-wheel vehicles to go through malfunctioning stoplights that passed the Oregon legislature unanimously and was signed into effect by governor Kate Brown on May 21st.

Under SB–533, riders will be allowed to proceed through a red light only after it fails to go through one full cycle -- and then only if done with caution. State Representative John Davis (R-Wilsonville) calls it a "very, very limited exception" to the normal rules covering red lights.

Effective January 1, 2016, Oregon will join sixteen other states with similar "dead red" regulations that allow riders to proceed through red lights that do not detect their presence and fail to provide a green light: Minnesota (2002), Tennessee (2003), Arkansas (2005), Idaho (2006), Wisconsin (2006), North Carolina (2007), South Carolina (2008), Missouri (2008), Oklahoma (2010), Kansas (2011), Virginia (2011), Illinois (except Chicago – 2012), Nevada (2014), Indiana (2014), Kentucky (2015), and Washington (2015).

In Texas and California, state regulations requires stoplights to be fitted with sensors that detect motorcycles.

Nevada Amends Handlebar Height Regs

After passing the state assembly unanimously, AB–422 was signed into effect by governor Brian Sandoval on May 21, 2015 to amend the state's handlebar height regulation.

Effective October 1, 2015, section 1 of this bill prohibits a local authority

from enacting an ordinance governing the operation and equipment of a motorcycle or a moped which is in conflict with any existing state regulations.

Under existing statutes, a person is prohibited from riding a motorcycle or a moped equipped with handlebars which extend above the rider's shoulders.

Section 2 of this bill provides that handlebars may extend not more than six inches above the rider's shoulders.

Alabama Motorcycle License Bill Passes

Alabamians will need to have a motorcycle classification on their license and take a written exam or safety course under a bill that has passed the state legislature and awaits the governor's signature.

Alabama is the only state that doesn't require a specific motorcycle license, and this measure "will make sure that those who are riding motorcycles are qualified and know enough about motorcycle safety," said the bill's sponsor state representative, Phillip Pettus (R-Greenhill).

Pettus' house bill 212 now goes to the governor for his signature.

Currently, only motorcyclists age 14 and 15 have to take a written test and get the M classification. Those older than that may get the classification but don't have to. Motorcyclists who already have the M classification will be grandfathered in.

Upon governor Robert J. Bentley's approval, the new licensure requirement will become effective January 1, 2016,

and enforcement will then be able to issue tickets to motorcyclists who don't have the M classification.

The bill also allows drivers to complete a safety course instead of the written test. There's a \$5 fee for the written test.

Motorcyclist Fatalities Drop For Second Straight Year

Riding a motorcycle in the U.S. is continuing to get a little safer. Based on a preliminary survey of 2014 fatality data, the Governors Highway Safety Association is predicting a second consecutive year-over-year drop in deaths for the first time on record since 1997.

The G.H.S.A. is predicting 4,584 motorcyclist deaths in 2014, a 1.8-percent drop. The organization bases its forecasts on motorcycle fatality data for January through September in all fifty states and the District of Columbia. From this raw information, deaths fell in 27 states in 2014, increased in 19 and remained the same in four, plus DC.

While good in the short term, the G.H.S.A. still thinks there's a lot to do to reduce rider deaths; 28% of fatal crashes in 2013 involved riders with a blood alcohol concentration above 0.08, 34% of those killed were speeding, and 25% didn't have a valid motorcycle license.

Of course the G.H.S.A. recommends that all states adopt universal helmet requirements, noting that currently only nineteen states and D.C. require all riders be helmeted.

Presidential Hopefuls Ride High On The Hog

Demonstrating the political capital of motorcycles, seven of the republican candidates running for president in 2016 descended on Iowa on June 6 to participate in freshman senator Jodi Ernst's inaugural Roast and Ride fundraiser. Senator Ernst hopped on her Harley-Davidson Softail alongside Wisconsin governor Scott Walker on his Road King along with more than 300 motorcyclists in tow for a 38-mile ride from Des Moines to the Central Iowa Expo in Boone for the pig roast, which Ernst hopes will become an electoral tradition.

Former governor Rick Perry, R-Texas, took a different route to the roast, riding in with a group of veterans from the town of Perry, and was the only other 2016 contender to arrive on two wheels. Carly Fiorina rode a tractor in a local parade and renewed her attacks on Hillary Clinton. The audience remained engaged throughout the speeches of South Carolina senator Lindsey Graham, Dr. Ben Carson, Florida senator Marco Rubio, and former Arkansas governor Mike Huckabee.

Now that former Florida governor Jeb Bush has officially launched his presidential bid, senator Ernst invited him to the first-in-the-nation caucus state for a ride; "I'd love to see him on a Harley" and she offered to "hook him up" with a motorcycle.

Motorcyclists possess some of the traits she would like to see in a future president: "I think you have to be a leader and you have to make decisive determinations of what path you take," Ernst said. "Whatever that path is, you have to follow it."

Weird News **Cops Create Traffic Jam To Catch Bikers Splitting Lanes**

New York police officers were recently caught on camera intentionally causing a traffic jam on the highway to catch motorcyclists splitting lanes through the stopped vehicles.

The YouTube video has gone viral on the internet, and was picked up by www.filmingcops.com, a conglomerative blogging service documenting police abuse otherwise ignored by traditional media outlets.

The narrator of the YouTube clip claims that the police actually shut down the entire highway for the sole purpose of catching bikers driving in between lanes. Several unsuspecting bikers can be seen in the video being pulled over as cops demand their license and registration, while the video shows the rest of the traffic on the highway at a complete stop for some time so that the cops can generate ticket revenues; "This appears to be one of the most epic parasitic wealth-extractions in recent memory."

Clip This Corner, **Avoid A Helmet Ticket**

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.
