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

## A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A. T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

• A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as BikePAC.

• It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, onroad or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.

• You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to A.B.A. T.E. Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just that wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

# "You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. (A.B.A.T.E.)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the Huns Motorcycle Club in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California, and Ed Armstrong

from A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through

congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of A.B.A.T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road. reprinted with permission )

California Senate Committee Unanimously Approves Lane-Splitting Bill

The California state senate committee on transportation and housing unanimously approved a revised lane-splitting bill (AB–51) on June 14. The 11-0 vote sends the proposal to the appropriations committee.

The *American Motorcyclist Association* supports this bill.

The proposed legislation would formally legalize lane splitting, a maneuver in which motorcyclists pass between rows of stopped or slowly moving traffic. The practice has been condoned by California enforcement agencies for years because no regulation prohibits it there.

California is the only state where lane splitting is permitted.

If AB–51 becomes effective, the state would become the first to codify the practice, representing a major victory for motorcycling advocates.

AB-51 was modified by state assemblyman Bill Quirk (D-Hayward) for the 2016 legislative session to remove specific speed restrictions. As introduced in 2015, the bill would have permitted motorcyclists to split lanes at speeds

of up 50 mph, as long as the rider was not traveling more than 15 mph faster than surrounding traffic.

The revised bill defines lane splitting and authorizes the California highway patrol to develop educational guidelines for safely splitting lanes. In developing those guidelines, the C.H.P. would work with the state department of motor vehicles, the department of transportation, the office of traffic safety, and a motorcycle organization focused on motorcycle safety. The University of California at Berkeley published a report in May 2015 that concludes that motorcyclists who split lanes in heavy traffic are significantly less likely to be struck from behind by other motorists, are less likely to suffer head or torso injuries, and are less likely to sustain fatal injuries in a crash.

# *G.H.S.A.* Report Advocates Universal Helmet Requirement...Again

*Washington, D.C.*– Last week, the *Governor's Highway Safety Association* (*G.H.S.A.*) released its preliminary data and findings regarding motorcycle fatalities in 2015.

(The *G.H.S.A.* represents the state and territorial highway safety offices that implement programs to address highway safety.)

Although *G.H.S.A.*'s primary mission is to improve traffic safety, their latest report appears to be more focused on thinly veiled demands for nationwide universal helmet requirements despite their failure to provide real data demonstrating the effectiveness of such regulations.

While the report highlights that the preliminary data suggests a 10% increase in motorcycle fatalities in 2015, it fails to connect the presence or lack of universal helmet requirements to the projected increase. In fact, there are a number of other factors that may explain the projected increase, including the climate, education and experience of the motorists involved, and the inclusion of faulty data in the making of this report.

## **Climate Effects**

In 2015 many parts of the country enjoyed a longer riding season than in previous years. Warmer and drier weather leads to additional time and riding hours on the road.

While the report does address this possible explanation, it does not conclude that it has the same influence as the absence of a universal helmet requirements.

## **Education and Experience**

Another issue that G.H.S.A. barley addresses is the consideration of education and experience.

For example, one of the most populace states that experienced a decrease in motorcycle related fatalities was California. While the state has not had any changes to their helmet regulation, the state did engage in a motorcycle awareness campaign for motorists.

This suggests that perhaps other factors, such as motorist education and awareness initiatives, impact fatalities.

Further, the report identifies a connection between riding experience and increases in fatalities. It states that roughly 25% of all motorcycle fatalities are the result of invalid motorcycle licensure.

These statistics underscore the belief long held by the *Motorcycle Rider's Foundation* that training and education are crucial components to motorcycle safety.

## Flawed Data

Perhaps one of the biggest questions raised from reading the report is the data itself and specifically, what "counts" as a motorcycle.

According to federal statute, a motorcycle is defined as, "*a motor vehicle with motive power having a seat or saddle for the use of the rider and designed to travel on not more than three wheels in contact with the ground.*"

With the rise of autocycles, a new class of vehicle that has attributes of both a car and motorcycle, it raises the question if this type of vehicle was included in the data supporting the statistics in the *G.H.S.A.* report. As this type of vehicle continues to emerge as a form of transportation, it will be critical that they are addressed independently, and not unfairly categorized with motorcycles or any other form as transportation so as not to skew the data. It is not clear from the report that this consideration is given.

## Failure to Connect the Projected Increase to the Lack of Universal Helmet Requirements

Despite the report's effort to relate the projected increase in motorcycle fatalities to the lack of universal helmet requirement, it fails to provide any data suggesting a connection between those who were wearing helmets versus those who were not wearing helmets when the fatality occurred.

Of the nineteen states that currently have a universal helmet requirement in place; twelve experienced an increase in motorcycle fatalities between 2014 and 2015.

Of the sixteen states that saw a decrease in motorcycle fatalities in 2015, only six have a universal helmet requirement. The other ten either allow adults to make their own choice or have no requirement at all.

The report also suggests that the increase in motorcycle fatalities in Michigan is due to the state's modification of its helmet requirement in 2012, which allowed adult riders to choose whether to wear a helmet. The report suggests that the 2015 increase



in motorcycle fatalities in Michigan is due to fewer riders wearing a motorcycle helmet but have not provided any data to support this claim.

However, the report fails to explain the 18.8% decrease in motorcycle fatalities between 2013 and 2014. According to the *National Highway TransportationandSafetyAdministration* (*N.H.T.S.A.*), Michigan motorcycle fatalities dropped from 138 to 112 in 2014 despite the change to the state's motorcycle helmet requirement.

In conclusion, despite its best efforts, the G.H.S.A. report fails to make any connection between the rise in motorcycle fatalities in 2015 and the implementation of universal helmet requirements.

It is unfortunate that entities such as the *G.H.S.A.* continue to hold such a myopic view when it comes to motorcycle safety.

The *Motorcycle Rider's Foundation* encourages the *G.H.S.A.* and other groups interested in a meaningful campaign to enhance motorcycle safety to adopt a strategy that focuses on avoiding motorcycle crashes, not merely surviving them. .. for the final year

# N.C.O.M. Convention Rolls Into Atlantic City

Odds are, it may not have been the largest convention ever, but you can bet it was the largest venue, as nearly a thousand biker rights activists from across the U.S. converged at the sprawling *Harrah's Resort* in Atlantic City, New Jersey for the *31st Annual N.C.O.M. Convention*, May 5-8, 2016.

For more than three decades over Mother's Day weekend, the National Coalition of Motorcyclists (N.C.O.M.) has provided a platform for diverse factions of the motorcycle community to come together in the spirit of unity and teamwork to address issues of mutual concern, such as pursuing biker anti-profiling legislation, supporting Save-the-Patch litigation, and reviewing freedom of the road victories and defeats, as well as attending seminars such as Holding Effective Fund Raisers, Organizational Effectiveness, and Enforcement Interaction.

## Maryland Governor Signing Anti-Profiling Bill Into Effect

Hundreds of bikers descended on the state house in Annapolis on Thursday, May 19, for a historic ceremony with governor Larry Hogan signing only the second motorcycle profiling measure in the country into effect in Maryland. The motorcycle anti-profiling legislation passed unanimously through both chambers of the legislature, and without opposition from enforcement

without opposition from enforcement agencies, and emulates anti-profiling

legislation passed in the state of Washington in 2011.

SB-233, passed 47-0 in the senate on 04 April and HB-785 passed 137-0 in the house on 07 April.

They require a specified statement condemning motorcycle profiling to be included in police policies and require training of officers on "motorcycle profiling," defined in the legislation as "*The arbitrary use of the fact that an individual rides a motorcycle* or wears motorcycle-related clothing or paraphernalia as a factor in deciding to stop, question, take enforcement action, arrest, or search the individual."

## High Performance Racing Modifications Need Protected

Bowing to political pressures and public outcry, the federal *E.P.A.* announced on April 15, 2016 that it would remove provisions from proposed regulations that would have prohibited street-legal vehicles, including motorcycles, from being modified for racing.

But regardless of the *Environmental Protection Agency* backing-off this issue at this time, congress is considering bipartisan legislation in both the house and senate to guarantee that vehicles can continue to be modified for competition on the track.

HR-4715 and S-2659, the *R.P.M.* Act (Recognizing the Protection of Motorsports Act of 2016), would ensure that the U.S. tradition of modifying vehicles into dedicated racetrack competitors is not only continued for today, but will be protected for future generations of race fans as well.

## Congress Acts To Curb Higher Ethanol-Blended Fuel

In response to recent congressional legislation promoting the use of E15 gasoline (HR-4673 *R.E.F.U.E.L. Act*), members of the U.S. house of representatives have co-sponsored a measure to prevent the *E.P.A.* from further forcing the controversial fuel onto the U.S. marketplace.

E15 contains 50% more ethanol than previously-approved E10 gas and has not been approved for use in motorcycles, A.T.V.s, and other small engine applications. In fact, even its inadvertent use can invalidate manufacturer warranties and cause damage.

HR–5108 (Food and Fuel Consumer Protection Act of 2016) was introduced May 10, 2016 by U.S. representative Bill Flores (R-TX) "to alleviate the ethanol blend wall under the renewable fuel program." Specifically, the bipartisan bill would cap the ethanol content of fuel at 9.7%, and would also affect the *e.p.a.*'s renewable volume obligations under the *Renewable Fuel Standard*.

Under proposed *R.F.S.* volume requirements for 2017, the *E.P.A.* calls for 18.8 billion gallons of biofuel next year, representing a nearly 4% increase despite lower demand for higher ethanol blends.

HR-5108 would also ensure continued availability of ethanol-free gasoline for older motorcycles.

## Europe's Emissions Regs Will Change Motorcycles

Your favorite bike may be influenced from afar.

"This year promises to bring a record crop of new and updated models from virtually every manufacturer thanks to wide-ranging regulation changes coming

into force thousands of miles away in Europe," according to Motorcyclist Magazine. "Those changes might not directly affect us, but given the way bikes are developed with global sales in mind, many of the new models being developed to meet the latest European regulations are sure to be coming here too."

On January 01, 2016, a whole new set of rules was adopted across Europe. European Union regulation number 168/2013 makes significant changes, in particular to exhaust emissions limits, but also to things like braking systems and electronics. Tests for noise levels have also been changed.

The emissions limits are of course much tighter. Called Euro 4, the new limits reduce the permissible levels of carbon monoxide, unburned hydrocarbons, and oxides of nitrogen in exhausts. Previously U.S. rules on emissions were tougher than Europe's, but now in order to pass the Euro 4 tests, new bikes are being fitted with much larger exhausts and kits that include charcoal canisters to reduce evaporative emissions.

"Next year we'll be seeing a lot more things like that," predicts Motorcyclist author Ben Purvis, explaining that "While the rules were passed into effect back in 2013 and came into force at the start of 2016, their implementation is staggered to give manufacturers a chance to adapt."

Since January first, all newly launched models have needed to comply to be legally sold in the E.U. But the more important date is January 01, 2017, because that's the deadline when existing models must also come into line, though manufacturers can apply for a twoyear extension.

What else is changing?

Emissions aside, the big change is that in Europe all bikes over 125 cc will have to be fitted with automatic braking system (A.B.S.) while smaller bikes will need to have either A.B.S. or a combined braking system.

There are also changes to the lighting rules, with daytime running lights becoming mandatory as well as U.S.-style side reflectors.

Europe is the closest to the United States in terms of the types of bikes that are popular, but while the U.S. consumes less than a half million motorcycles a year, riders in the European Union (E.U.) purchase well over a million.

Like lower emissions exhaust systems, economies of scale will likely dictate that even what's not legally required in the states, like A.B.S., will become standard equipment on increasing numbers of our U.S.imported bikes, as it won't make sense for manufacturers to build different versions just to suit a relatively small number of American customers.

Unfortunately, E.U. regulation number 168/2013 also provides for the next-generation Euro 5 emissions tests, tougher still, and the deadline for their implementation is less than five years away, beginning with 2020 new models.

### B.M.W. To Install "S.O.S." **Button For Emergencies**

B.M.W. Motorrad has announced plans to offer a safety option on its bikes that would automatically contact emergency services in the case of a crash or emergency situation.

The Intelligent Emergency Call system features a vehicle-integrated e-call system that's been available in B.M.W.'s cars in Europe since

1999. The system will be extended to B.M.W. motorcycles starting next year.

According to B.M.W., in the case of an emergency or a crash, the bike's emergency system sends out the position data to a B.M.W. call center to initiate the rescue chain. The system can either be triggered automatically by the bike, or manually by the rider.

#### No Helmet = No Gas

Due to a rise in motorcycle crashes attributed to non-use of helmets, under a new penalty instituted in Bhagalpur, India, motorcyclists caught riding without a helmet will not be allowed to buy fuel, in addition to other fines and penalties.

#### **Paris Off-Limits To Older Motorcycles**

Bikers with pre-2000 motorcycles will be banned from Paris, France. From July 01 all private cars registered before January 01, 1997 (for gas) and 2001 (for diesel) and all two-wheelers before June 01, 2000, will be banned from Parisian streets on weekdays as part of the city's efforts to cut pollution that has at times seen the air in the capital more polluted than Beijing.

The anti-pollution measures will be progressively extended so that by 2020 Paris will ban all cars registered before 2011 and all motorcycles before July, 2004.

# **Settlements and Verdicts**

Oregon biker settles for \$1.125 million

In an ongoing effort to keep motorcyclists informed as to the results of the continuing battle for their legal rights, Aid to Injured

Motorcyclists (A.I.M.) submits the following case study:

About two years ago, an Oregon biker was hit by a delivery vehicle making a left turn across the biker's path. The biker suffered permanent damage to his leg and foot. Oregon A.I.M. attorney Sam Hochberg had the case worked up right away by a private investigator. The corporate defendant approached Hochberg's office, asking to settle. The case resolved in a mediation session for \$1,125,000.

Sam Hochberg, incidentally, after twenty-nine years with A.I.M. and N.C.O.M., is now associated as "of counsel" with the new Aid to Injured Motorcyclists lawyer for both Oregon and Washington, Christopher Slater.

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# **Clip This Corner, Avoid A Helmet Ticket**

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.


