## *A.B.A.T.E.* is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

• *A.B.A.T.E.* is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.

• It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, on-road or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.

• You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to A.B.A.T.E. Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just that wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

So scan through our newspaper. If you like what you read, check out the chapter meeting listing on the back cover. Drop in on a meeting and see what we're about. You just might find a new family in *A.B.A.T.E.* And as Melinda says: "Bikers give great hugs."

## A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

( "You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!" ``

*Easyriders* magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the *National Highway Transportation Safety Administration* (*N.H.T.S.A.*) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the *National Custom Cycle Association*. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to *A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments.* (*A.B.A.T.E.*)

*Easyriders* began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized 'choppers' which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR–3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California, and Ed Armstrong from A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 *Federal Highway Act*, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

## A.B.A.T.E. chapter reports -- River City

Wow, we have had three meetings in a row without a snow or ice storm making us close it down! Spring is truly on the way.

**Treasurer**: As of our last meeting, Lorraine reported \$2,113.44 in checking, \$6,307.70 in savings, total \$8,421.14. Payment of *Chamber of Commerce* dues is still pending, as the office has been closed twice when Rick went by to talk to them.

**Membership**: Bob reported fifty-five members, as of the December 2016 report. Some of those, including Bob, show as expired but have not received renewal notices. No updated membership report has been received since December.

**Legislative**: Brian reported that *BikePAC* is working in Salem, and will have a call-to-action on their web site within the next two weeks. They are working two *BikePAC* bills and monitoring a number of other bills introduced by other people on the same subjects. Calls and e-mails to our senator, Ted Ferrioli, are in order. He is not well informed about lane sharing and needs reasonable information from his constituents. (That means us!)

Ways and means, products: Teresa reported that she received an e-mail from Lisa, our contact at *See's Candies*, apologizing for dropping the ball on getting leftover peanut brittle boxes picked up for the order error this year. Her e-mail said her roof collapsed in the snow, and during cleanup they found asbestos, so she was dealing with the full hazardous material crew while that got taken care of. We received the refund right away but still have the candy, which is now past code date. She authorized us to throw it away. Teresa and Gene have taken care of that. We have products available, too: shirts, hats, bumper stickers. Teresa will start bringing the *Square* device so we can run credit cards for product sales.

**Run coordinator, web master** – Rebel has gotten poker run details pinned down, except for unanswered questions about whether our insurance will meet *Maryhill Museum*'s standards for using the historic highway. He talked with Randy Haines at the radio station, and has arranged to take Rick along for an interview in a few weeks to promote the poker run. Also, Randy is making changes to *Neon Classic* weekend in August, and won't be offering the same setup this year. We will not be having a booth, which will allow more chapter members to be involved in the August state board meeting and *Beaver Creek*.

Public relations - Rick reported that



Harley-Davidson is now a major sponsor of *Pendleton Bike Week*. If you want a motel room, you had better get a reservation now. They might already be gone. We discussed possible "swag" for giving away at the booth: beer cozies, bottle opener key chains, and kick stand pads are possibilities. This will be a state event, not *River City*'s, but most volunteers will probably come from the east side of the state. Dusty suggested getting shirts for the booth volunteers, so we will have a consistent identity during the event.

**Fossil promotion**: Rick has been in contact with *A.B.A.T.E. of Washington* and has permission to hand out *Fossil Campout* information at the *Monroe Swap Meet* on March 26. Rick will not be able to go, but Gene and Steve plan to go take care of business.

Real food tastes good, has little or no processing done to it before landing on our plates.

It's a sad commentary on our society that it takes effort to track down real food these days. It tends to be obscured by fake food advertising and placement whose real goal is to increase corporate profits at the expense of our health.

One trick is to shop around the outside aisles of stores and markets. That's where meat, fruit, and veggies tend to be. (Real food.) The more central aisles tend to loaded up sugary products, often containing excessive amounts of highly refined wheat products, which our bodies treat like sugar. (Fake food.)

American Motorcyclist Association

Including motorcycles in a trade dispute over U.S.-raised beef products reflects "a cynical approach to trade policy to look for the largest grassroots reaction you can find to pressure European governments," the American Motorcyclist Association told a federal agency.

"This is a highly inappropriate use of the motorcycle community," A.M.A. president and C.E.O. Rob Dingman told the office of the U.S. trade representative (U.S.T.R.) in a letter responding to questions and comments made during a February 15 hearing in Washington, D.C. "It appears that to this committee, motorcyclists are simply pawns in a game of international chess."

Accompanying the letter was a petition containing 6,579 signatures of motorcyclists opposing the proposed tariff.

The U.S.T.R. proposed a 100 percent tariff on 51 cc to 500 cc motorcycles imported from the European Union.

Motorcycles are recommended for a tariff alongside other products as part of a dispute with the European Union over the amount of U.S.-raised beef E.U. countries accept. The dispute originated over the U.S. beef industry's use of hormones.

The tariff would affect motorcycles from Aprilia, Beta, B.M.W., Ducati, Fantic, Gas Gas, Husqvarna, K.T.M., Montesa, Piaggio, Scorpa, Sherco, T.M., and Vespa.

Dingman's rebuttal letter reiterated his comments made during the February meeting after William L. Busis, chair of the U.S.T.R. section 301 committee explained why his office included motorcycles in the tariff proposal.

When Dingman and motorcycleindustry representatives challenged the U.S.T.R.'s proposal, Busis responded that the agency hoped American motorcyclists would reach out to their European counterparts "and suggest to them maybe they could talk to their government, who could then talk to the commission,

and then maybe we could resolve this dispute."

"In reality, this committee is playing with peoples' lives and livelihoods," Dingman wrote in his rebuttal. "The negative effects of the proposed trade sanctions would cause dramatic and possibly irreparable harm to the motorcycle industry and spread through the after market equipment sector, recreation equipment sales, the sports entertainment industry, and further down the line.

But those who will suffer the most from this proposed tariff are the Americans who use small- displacement motorcycles and scooters for outdoor recreation and urban riding," Dingman continued. "These are products that are not offered by American manufacturers.

Instead of viewing the American motorcycling community as pawns with an imagined grassroots reach far beyond our shores, the committee needs to grasp the significant hardships this tariff will cause to hardworking, everyday taxpaying Americans," Dingman concluded.

Dingman met personally with the president of the *Fédération Internationale de Motocyclisme (F.I.M.)* in Geneva, Switzerland, and asked him to weigh in on this issue. In a subsequent letter to the U.S.T.R. that Dingman included as part of his testimony, *F.I.M.* president Vito Ippolito asks that motorcycles be removed from the tariff list.

The *A.M.A.* also objects to threatening a tariff on nonagricultural products to create leverage in a purely agricultural trade dispute.

Before the February hearing, opponents sent more than 10,300 e-mails to congress on this issue, posted more than 9,400 comments to Regulations.gov, and sent nearly 5,300 e-mails to president Donald Trump. Of the comments sent via Regulations.gov, 82 percent came from the A.M.A.

He was a regular at many A.B.A.T.E. runs around the state, often helping A.I.M. chief of staff "Gunny"(now retired) at the A.I.M./NC.O.M. tables. He was known and highly respected in the biker's-rights community nationwide.

Butch also participated in many NC.O.M. conventions. In 2003 he was bestowed with the Ron Roloff Lifetime Achievement Award, NC.O.M.'s highest tribute. This year's 32nd annual convention will

#### N.H.T.S.A. Seeks To Curb Driver Distractions

Driver distraction is a specific type of inattention that occurs when drivers divert their attention away from the driving task to focus on another activity. This distraction can come from electronic devices, such as texting or e-mailing on cell phones or smart phones, and more traditional activities such as interacting with passengers, eating, or events external to the vehicle.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) is proposing new federal guidelines to provide a safety framework for developers of portable and after market electronic devices to use when developing visual-manual user interfaces for their systems.

According to N.H.T.S.A. and the department of transportation (D.O.T.), their Visual-Manual N.H.T.S.A. Driver Distraction Guidelines for Portable and Aftermarket Devices (docket number N.H.T.S.A.-2013-0137 ) will "encourage innovative solutions such as "pairing" and "driver mode" that, when implemented, will reduce the potential for unsafe driver distraction by limiting the time a driver's eyes are off the road, while at the same time preserving the full functionality of these devices when

they are not used while driving."

Crash data indicate that visualmanual interaction (an action that requires a user to look away from the roadway and manipulate a button or interface) with portable devices, particularly cell phones, is often the main distraction for drivers involved in crashes.

In 2015, 10% of the 35,092 traffic fatalities involved one or more distracted drivers, and these distraction-affected crashes resulted in 3,477 fatalities, an 8.8% increase from the 3,197 fatalities in 2014. Of the 5.6 million non-fatal crashes in 2014, 16% were distraction-affected crashes and resulted in 424,000 people injured.

At any given time, an estimated 542,073 drivers are using hand-held cell phones while driving.

Currently no safety guidelines exist for portable device technologies when they are used during a driving task.

[--*c.o.e. note*: Notice that these are *guidelines*, not legal requirements.]

#### Lane-Splitting Bill Introduced In Texas

Texas is contemplating becoming the second state, after California, to allow motorcycle riders to split lanes in heavy traffic under certain conditions.

Senate bill 228 was introduced on December 9, 2016, and if passed, would make it legal for motorcycles to ride between lanes of traffic on limited-access or controlled-access highways during periods of traffic congestion at a speed not more than 5 mph above the speed of other traffic, and only if that traffic is moving at 20 m.p.h. or less.

Lane-splitting, which was a long-

standing but legally-ambiguous practice in California until it was made legal there in 2016, is common in Europe where motorcycles typically "filter" to the front of the line at intersections and ride between lanes of traffic in crowded cities. Lane-splitting advocates in the U.S. cite the safety of the practice overseas as well as its effect on reducing traffic congestion.

#### New Hampshire Could Repeal Handlebar Height Regulation

Senate bill 27 by senator Harold French (R-Franklin) repealing the restriction on the height of motorcycle handlebars carried the New Hampshire senate by a voice vote on January 19 and has been referred to the house of representatives where most likely it will be assigned to the transportation committee.

The current regulation prescribes that the hand grips can be no higher than the shoulders of a rider seated in the saddle.

Charlie St. Clair, executive director of the *Laconia Motorcycle Week Association*, told the *Laconia Daily Sun* that if the house endorses and the governor signs the bill, New Hampshire will become the 19th state and first in New England not to restrict the height of handlebars. But it's not clear whether the restriction will be lifted before the 94th running of *Laconia Motorcycle Week* in June.

As the host of the nation's oldest rally, which attracts visitors from across the country, St. Clair said that New Hampshire should not impose restrictions that may inconvenience motorcyclists from other states. Limits in other states

vary considerably from shoulder height in Massachusetts, Maine, and Connecticut, to eye level in some states and to heights above the saddle measured in inches in others. Most restrictions on high bars, called "ape hangers" were introduced in the 1960s. Although touted as a safety measure, many motorcyclists claimed the restrictions were imposed to provide police with a pretext for stopping and searching bikers.

#### Mississippi Considers Lowering Motorcycle Sales Tax

House bill 1631 by representative Steve Hopkins (R-D7) has been introduced which would "*reduce the sales tax rate on retail sales of motorcycles from 7% to 5%*," as well as reduce the sales tax on other agricultural and farming products.

On February 15, the legislation was referred to the house ways and means committee.

#### Quincy Midnight Motorcycle Ban — False!

According to the *Massachusetts Motorcycle Association (M.M.A.)*, a recent report on **quincy.com** indicating that the city of Quincy, Massachusetts has instituted a ban against any motorcycle being ridden between the hours of midnight and 5 a.m. (unless exempted for work or emergency purposes) is **not** correct.

Although such a proposal was indeed filed, the council member who introduced it *"immediately asked that it be withdrawn*" after learning that such a proposal would not be legal.

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#### Clip This Corner, Avoid A Helmet Ticket

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.
