Getting Ready For The 21 August Eclipse

The middle part of Oregon, from west to east, will experience a total or partial eclipse of the sun on the morning of Monday, 21 August 2017.

If you live near the path of the eclipse, there are a few things you can do to make life easier for yourself and others.

• A week before the eclipse, buy enough food to last a few days.

That will leave food on the shelves for thousands of visitors expected to descend on the state that weekend.

• Ensure your vehicles are fueled up well before the



eclipse.

Traffic may be chaotic for several days surrounding the eclipse event and service stations may run low on fuel.

• Don't plan on traveling on the day of the eclipse.

There will be thousands of drivers flooding our state who are unfamiliar with our roads. To say that the roadways will be crowded and chaotic is to understate the situation considerably. Road and enforcement agencies have canceled time-off and vacations in antici-... pation of driving conditions. Many officials are concerned that out-of-area drivers will simply pull over or stop when the eclipse begins, causing crashes.

Buy safe sun viewing glasses.
 Don't fry your eyes. Don't try to look directly at the partially eclipsed sun. Spring a couple of bucks for approved glasses that filter out harmful radiation that can

cause permanent blindness.

Don't try to use smoked glass or DVDs.



A #14 arc welding filter is one of the safest ways to view solar events. (If any are left in stock at welding shops.)

 Protect your optical "eyes" as well.

Cameras, binoculars, and telescopes need protection too. Some companies offer a safe film filter that folds together to be taped onto lenses.

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. (A.B.A.T.E.)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the Huns Motorcycle Club in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California, and Ed Armstrong from A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of A.B.A.T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

What a gorgeous summer we have been having after the sun decided to come out and play. There have been lots of motorcycle events going on across the state from poker runs to weekend-long rally's and camping. I hope everyone is getting out there and participating in these events. A big *thank you* to everyone who worked on and helped get *Driver's Responsibility Act* (HB–2598, also known as the Milkman Mike bill) passed. It will become a statute as of January 2018. What a great accomplishment for all motorcyclist. Hopefully lane sharing will be the next bill to come into effect in a year or two. Again thank you.

I am sure everyone has read or seen tips for riding in the heat, but as it gets really hot this time of the year, I thought it would be a good time to review a couple of them.

- First one is to bring more water than you think you will need. It is really easy to get dehydrated while riding. One tip I have to keep the water cool is to freeze half the bottles you are going to bring and then pack them next to the ones that you had in the fridge. This way the ones from the fridge stay cool and by the time you are ready to drink the frozen ones you still have nice cool refreshing water. (Or *Gatorade*, if you choose.)
- Second tip is to include stops where you can cool off at, such as a local diner, restaurant, or even a convenience store. You can get something cool and refreshing to eat or drink and just relax for a bit. It is also a great way to meet the local people of a community. They





might even be able to tell you about some great roads to ride. We found about Cascades Lake Highway this way and what a beautiful ride that was.

• Last tip of the day is to dress properly and keep your skin covered. (Yes, even in the heat.) Exposed areas of skin are much harder to cool as the sweat evaporates from the warm rushing air and causes you to become


Updates

Turn This Safety Rig Around

we don't need forty acres

c.o.e. – 187

(Personal views of the editor. Not to be confused with reality or endorsement by A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon.)

Yer crusty ol' editor is feeling increasingly frustrated that so many motorcyclist organizations seem to be preoccupied with and focused on side issues. Sure, many of those concerns are important, but they often fall into the "nice-to-have" category.

Utmost in our primary efforts should be the safety of riders and their riding experience on the nation's roadways. That means protecting us from our fine selves and from cage drivers.

We're losing far too many riders due to mistakes in judgment, their own or other's.

Not one to normally advocate for increased bureaucracy, yer crusty ol' editor is increasingly of the opinion that there needs to be independent safety investigation departments at state and national levels that are free of interference from political, police, or insurance interests. The safety investigators would determine the cause of auto, pick-up, and motorcycle crashes, then have the power to issue mandatory corrections to riding and

driving procedures that, if followed, would eliminate reoccurrence of the same crashes.

Any information provided to such safety investigators could *not* be used for legal proceedings.

It is only by riders and drivers be given the opportunity to share their actions without fear of reprisal that the actual causes of crashes can be determined and eliminated.

The aviation industry has been operating under a similar system for quite a while, resulting in safer flying and dramatic decreases in crashes. We can do the same.

In talking with folks from the *Fossil Campout* who responded to the *Gypsy Jokers* tragedy last May, the crash may have happened due to road configuration and the car driver overreacting to night-time circumstances, thereby losing control of her vehicle.

The crash happened late in the evening after dark near a hill and a curve somewhere around milepost 60

or 61.

In coming over the crest of the hill, the motorcycle headlights, even on low-beam, would have been shining down into the eyes of any on-coming driver.

In this case, the driver may have been surprised and temporarily blinded by the sudden appearance of multiple bright lights, pulling to the right and starting to go off the road. Over-correcting may have caused the car to slew around across the road to the left just as the group of motorcycles arrived.

This is not to suggest that the driver was blameless or that circumstances were beyond her control. It is a matter of trying to understand what happened so that such tragedies are not repeated.

What could have been different?

• Using attributes of road construction to detect other vehicles. Often there are power or other utility lines on poles to the side of roads that will reflect the headlights of on-coming vehicles at night, even when they are hidden by curves or hills. Sadly, there was no such

aid to night-time drivers on that stretch of road.

- Driving slower and being especially attentive after dark. Lonely country roads can invite attention to wander. Resisting that temptation by not allowing electronic or critter distractions to pull attention away from driving responsibilities separates professional from casual drivers, nonevents from tragedies.
- Taking advanced driving and riding courses that teach how to regain control of a vehicle if control is suddenly and unexpectedly lost. In this, insurance companies need to encourage such education by stepping up and offering discounts to riders and drivers who take those courses.
- Increased mass media presence of responsible riding and driving messages. Too often bad driving or riding is featured in movies, commercials, or television programs, thus socializing viewers into copying such actions. Safe driving and riding information needs to get out to present as well as future road users. Token efforts are not enough.

We all need to take road safety even more seriously and get pushy about having government safety departments





do their jobs properly.

And above all, riders and drivers need to take personal responsibility for their actions.

A member of yer c.o.e.'s family who served on military ships often observed that ours is "an east-coast Navy", meaning that policies and decisions are centered around the United States' capitol area. ("D.C.", not "Washington".)

Meanwhile, we in *Oregon A.B.A.T.E.* face a somewhat similar situation regarding how organizational and political power is distributed in our state.

Many people in the south and east parts of Oregon feel that decisions and power are concentrated in the upper Willamette Valley, primarily around Portland.

We need to move beyond such perceptions and work together.

Eclipse 2017 update - June 9, 2017

Arrive Early, Stay Put, Leave Late

Oregon could experience a cosmic traffic jam if one million people expected to travel into the path of totality to view the 21 August eclipse in Oregon don't properly plan ahead and come prepared.

Many Oregon state agencies, including O.D.O.T., are working hard to help everyone be prepared.

All construction and non-emergency maintenance on state highways in the path of totality will be stopped 18-22 August, when eclipse watchers are here.

Construction work could be curtailed in other parts of the state depending on traffic impact.

You should:

Help keep roads clear.

Staying off the roads helps emergency service vehicles get through. Ride your bicycle [or motorcycle--c.o.e.] when possible.

Travel with friends. Joining friends and family for the trip to totality will reduce

the number of cars on the road. Find carpool information at:

http://www.drivelessconnect.com

Meet your needs in advance.

Take care of those errands before 21 August. Limit your trips in the days immediately around the eclipse to help keep roads clear.

• Be prepared.

If you're traveling, plan for basic needs such as food, water, and bathroom breaks. Plan to get to where you need to be before you need to go.

• Expect traffic changes.

Communities may close streets to through traffic or ban left or right turns to keep traffic moving, especially around large events.



• Caution friends and family.

If visitors are coming, warn them to drive healthy.

Arrive early, stay put during the eclipse, and leave late afterwards so everyone doesn't jump on the highways all at once. All travelers have a shared responsibility to stay safe.

• Work from home.

Consider adjusting your work schedule in the days around the eclipse.

We're all in this together. Be prepared.

Biker Anti-Profiling Measures Under Consideration

House resolution HR-318 and senate resolution SR-154: "Promoting awareness of motorcycle profiling and encouraging collab-oration and communication with the motorcycle community and . . . enforcement officials to prevent instances of profiling," was referred to the subcommittee on crime, terrorism, homeland security, and investigations on June 2, 2017.

Concerned motorcyclists are encouraged to contact their federal legislators in the U.S. senate and house of representatives to co-sponsor and support these bills.

Under the companion measures in the house and senate, "motorcycle profiling" means "the illegal use of the fact that a person rides a motorcycle or wears motorcycle related apparel as a factor in deciding to stop and question, take enforcement action, arrest, or search a person or vehicle with or without legal basis under the constitution of the United States."

Federal Legislation Could Proliferate E15 Gas

Despite objections that the proliferation of E15 gasoline into the U.S. marketplace will negatively impact every American who owns a car, lawnmower, or boat, two new federal bills have been introduced to expand availability of the higher concentrate ethanol fuel.

Senator Deb Fischer (R-Nebraska) and U.S. representative Adrian Smith (R-Nebraska) introduced the "Consumer and Fuel Retailer Choice Act" (SR–517 and HR–1311) amending the Clean Air Act to allow the sale of E15 (15% blend ethanol gas) during summer months. (June 01 to September 15)

Motorcycle and A.T.V. owners risk damaging their machines by even inadvertently putting E15 in their tanks,

as the higher blends of ethanol can cause engine and fuel system damage, void manufacturers' warranties, and violate federal regulations.

Motorcyclists should also be concerned about the availability of compatible fuel supplies if gas stations primarily provide E15 gasoline that's E.P.A.-approved for the majority of their driving customers. But no on-road or off-road motorcycles or A.T.V.s appear on the E.P.A.'s list of vehicles approved to use E15.

New "Don't Wait For Washington D.C." Electric Bike Program

A recently launched program was created to advocate for electric motorcycles and assure buyers they will get the electric motorcycle federal tax credit

"Don't Wait For Washington D.C." assures "up to \$1,869 on a zeroemmisions motorcycle if the government fails to reinstate the electric motorcycle tax credit."

The initiative serves the dual purposes of driving the conversation on electric motorcycles forward while legislation languishes in Washington D.C., and of motivating would-be electric motorcycle riders to join the e-movement.

Should the federal government fail to reinstate the tax credit by the end of the year, then *Zero* will step up and send 10% cash back to buyers, matching the expired tax credit for new, eligible 2017 *Zero* motorcycles.

Mainstream Media Promotes Ridership

According to the *Motorcycle Industry Council* (*M.I.C.*), a not-for-profit national trade association, their 2014 rider survey reports that "56% of generation Y riders

use their motorcycles as a primary means of transportation," and that factoid recently appeared in a *Ride To Work Day* graphic on the front page of the June 19 edition of *U.S.A. Today*'s *Life* section.

"This major mainstream media placement is especially significant to the M.I.C. as the industry association is actively promoting motorcycles as transportation and seeking new generations of riders," says the M.I.C. communications department, which has previously worked on Ride to Work Day segments with Good Morning America, A.B.C.'s national morning news show, and with The KTLA Morning News, the biggest morning news program in southern California.

The M.I.C. exists to "preserve, protect, and promote motorcycling through government relations, communications, and media relations, statistics, and research, after market programs, A.I.M. Expo, development of data communications standards, and activities surrounding technical and regulatory issues."

New Licensees Learn How To Interact With Police

Louisiana governor Bel Edwards has signed into effect a requirement that driver education classes must include a segment on interacting with police in their course curriculum.

Introduced by senators Ryan Gatti (R-Bossier), Wesley Bishop (D-New Orleans), and Gary Smith Jr. (D-Norco) on 20 March 2017, SB–17 "Provides for driver education to include instruction on appropriate driver conduct when stopped by a law enforcement officer."

The bipartisan measure was signed by the governor on June 16 as act number 286 with an effective date of January 1, 2018.

Maryland Modifies Handlebar Height Regulation

Maryland has become the most recent state to modify or repeal their antiquated and discriminatory handlebar height regulation, which many states enacted in the sixties to provide an enforcement tool for pulling over bikers on their choppers.

Governor Larry Hogan approved senate bill 668 on 25 May 2017, "Increasing, from fifteen inches to twenty inches, the maximum height that the handlebars of a motorcycle may be above a specified part of the motorcycle seat in order for a person to [legally] operate the motorcycle."

SB–668 was introduced 03 February 2017 by lead sponsor senator H. Wayne Norman, Jr. (R-D35) and becomes effective 01 October 2017.

A.B.A.T.E. of Maryland advises to "Remember that the height is measured from the seat to the highest point on the handlebars, not from the bottom of the handlebar to the grips or highest point."

New Hampshire Okays Motorcycle Colored Headlamps

New Hampshire governor Chris Sununu signed HB-458 into effect on 08 June 2017, an act relative to motorcycle headlamps. Sponsored by representative James Spillane (R-Deerfield), "This bill allows headlamp colors approved by the director of the division of motor vehicles for automobiles to be considered approved for motorcycle headlamps," with an effective date [sixty] days after its passage." (07 August 2017)

Oregon Defines Trikes and Autocycles

In dealing with the increased popularity of three-wheeled vehicles, Oregon legislators have passed two new bills to make it easier for riders to get in the saddle.

House bill 3125 was signed into effect by governor Kate Brown on 14 June 2017 to define an "autocycle" and provides that a person may operate one without a motorcycle endorsement. The act takes effect immediately under the emergency clause.

Sponsored by the committee on transportation policy, under HB-3125 "autocycle" means a motorcycle that,

- 1. Is manufactured to travel on three wheels.
- 2. Has a steering wheel for steering control.
- 3. Has non-straddle seating.
- 4. Is equipped with a manufacturerinstalled three-point safety belt or safety harness.

Senate bill 36 "Provides that department of transportation may waive skills test for person seeking motorcycle endorsement to operate three-wheeled motorcycle [trike]," and was also signed by the governor on 14 June.

South Dakota License Plate Mounting Options

Effective 01 July 2017, motorcycle owners in South Dakota will be allowed to mount license plates to their motorcycle "... in any visible manner other than upside down."

Governor Dennis Daugaard signed senate bill 79 into effect on 09 March after overwhelmingly passing through both chambers of the state legislature.

Most Cagers Know They're Bad Drivers

Millions of drivers admit that they don't always make thorough mirrors checks when pulling away, according a driver survey, with 25% admitting they don't look in their mirrors when pulling out into traffic.

Of 2,025 drivers polled, 15% admitted not always looking at road signs, 68% admit rarely driving with both hands on the wheel, and over half (52%) believed bad habits such as these would ensure they failed the driving test if they had to do it again.

Too many people are injured on the roads due to poor judgment and a lack of road skills says David Carter, spokesman for Accident Advice Helpline in the U.K., which conducted the research, adding: "It is worrying that more people don't feel confident in their own skills on the road and feel that they've developed bad habits which would cause them to not pass their driving test."

Gone, But Not Forgotten

This year has been tragic for our bikers rights family, suffering the loss of two past *N.C.O.M.* board of directors: Butch Harbaugh (*N.C.O.M.* legislative task force), and Dennis "Big D" Watson (*N.C.O.M.* region IX).

Both had been recipients of the Ron Roloff Lifetime Achievement Award (2003, 2006) in whose memory the recent National Coalition of Motorcyclists' convention in Reno was dedicated.

Now we regretfully report the passing of longtime biker advocate and *Easyriders* magazine writer "Twiggy" Blakeboro (73, of Lompoc, California) who died June 11, 2017. Twiggy was much beloved by his peers and was a past recipient of the *N.C.O.M. Silver Spoke Award* for media (1997).

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.
