
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

What We're About

A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brother-hood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

We also do business as (DBA) American Bikers Aimed Toward Education.

- A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.
- It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, on-road or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.
- You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to *A.B.A.T.E.* Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just that wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

So scan through our newspaper. If you like what you read, check out the chapter meeting listing on the back cover. Drop in on a meeting and see what we're about. You just might find a new family in *A.B.A.T.E.* And as Melinda says: "Bikers give great hugs."

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. (A.B.A.T.E.)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized ''choppers'' which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the *American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.)*, Ron Roloff of the *M.M.A. of California*, and Ed Armstrong from *A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago* presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of A.B.A.T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

A.B.A.T.E. chapter reports -- River City

The Northwest Cherry Festival in The Dalles has a parade. A tradition that has developed over the years is for motorcyclists to strap on a teddy bear and ride through the parade, then donate the bear to the hospital at the end. It was for many years sort of impromptu, a loose group of bikers with big hearts.

Fourteen years ago, River City Chapter held its first Cherry Festival Poker Run. Just because everybody on two wheels is lumped together, the chapter gradually became more involved in helping the parade be organized, and helping collect bears for the hospital.

This year, rider participation was lower than previous years, as well as the teddy bear haul that went to the hospital. We were able to collect only 240 bears this year. (Weather probably a factor.)

Due to circumstances at the poker run, the third place high hand winner was there to accept the prize.

The Northwest Cherry Festival He said, "Spend it on more bears."

This led to a proposal we are considering for next year's Teddy Bear Parade to boost teddy bear numbers:

- Promote the *Teddy Bear Parade*, not just poker run.
- Get loud public address system for K-mart parking lot. Tell people how the parade works, talk about teddy bears.
- Sell 50/50 tickets before and after parade. Drawing right after all teddy bears have been collected. No waiting.
- Give a door prize ticket for each bear donated. Organize this so several people are giving tickets and accepting bears. In the mean time, sell 50/50 tickets!
- Starting as soon as possible, solicit primo door prizes and collect them throughout the year.
- Partner with *Mid-Columbia Medi*cal Center for publicity. Their volunteer coordinator is interested in working with us.



- Ask Gorge Gospel Riders to partner with us again to help with parade.
 As we have been doing now for several years. Thank you G.G.R.)
- Organize a community bear drive for the month before *Cherry Festival* to supplement parade bears. Get barrels in businesses where people can donate.

Plans for the poker run are still being discussed. Chances are, format will change. Watch for news here and flyers in the spring.

We have a team of chapter membership secretaries, the statewide treasurer, and myself keeping a watchful eye on human-input errors and on-going corrections so that we can keep the record accurate.

The membership audit is complete.

In order to make the "counts" reflect a more real-time statistic, a few adjustments were implemented:

First, we moved all of the members showing expired for one or more years to a category called "canceled" which preserves their information but moves them out of the counted "expired" category. Members who are more than a year expired have been contacted at least three times in writing prior to moving them to the "canceled" category.

Those members who are less than a year expired will also receive three renewal notices before the one-year mark and if they don't respond, their record will have moved to the "canceled" category after one year.

People are responding to the renewal notices. We have had numerous members pulled out of the "canceled" category to become active members again. We have also seen a great number of members bring their membership up-to-date. Timely renewal mailings have encouraged members to renew on time.

Currently, we have only 150 expired members throughout the state.

The Governor's Advisory Committee on Motorcycle Safety (G.A.C.M.S.) will meet at 4 p.m. on 17 May at O.D.O.T.'s technical leadership center (Alsea conference room) located at 4040 Fairview Industrial drive SE in Salem.

Participants improve coordination of clutch, throttle, and steering inputs to keep the motorcycle balanced at low speed while executing tight turns and U-turns with precision and control. The course is challenging, but great fun.

Whether you attend chapter meetings or operate at the state level, how people outside our organization perceive us and our mission is affected by public relations.

The A.B.A.T.E. officer position of public relations is not a required office at local or state level. Many chapters without such an officer have a casual arrangement where most of the members act as delegates for interacting with the general public. (That's as it should be - each of us should be an A.B.A.T.E. messenger.)

There are advantages to having someone tasked with the performance of public relations:

- A single voice speaks for the group, rather than multiple opinions or guessing
- It makes it easier for media reporters if there is a single point of contact for your
- Having someone who can prepare press releases puts the organization in charge of events, not reporters or rumor mongers.
- Being able to send someone to speak to other groups or officials in order to clear up stereotypes and present our mission statement.

If you've ever witnessed a major news

event, you may have noticed that the way it's reported may not exactly match what vou saw and heard.

That's because reporters are rumored to be humanoid. Every day they deal with multiple topics of which they have little or no knowledge. They try to take notes or work from memory, but what is said may not be what they hear and report.

That's when public relations comes to

- A public relations officer (PRO) can provide both verbal and written material so that reporters have no excuse for getting reports wrong.
- PROs can guide reporters towards the most interesting sights and angles of an
- And PROs act as a knowledgeable source of information, both in a present event or for fact-checking future articles.
- If a PRO doesn't know an answer, they know who in the organization will have the information and can obtain it quickly.

One of the sad truths of public relations is that at any given event, if no public relations officer is available, reporters invariably find

their way to the loudest, most outspoken, and borderline crazy person belonging to an organization. That person and their opinionated ranting become the public face of the organization.

Is that what you want?

And remember, leaving the fourth letter out of "public" is an L of a mistake.







Statement On Road to Zero Report

Today, the *Motorcycle Riders Foundation* (*M.R.F.*) released the following statement in response to a report issued by the Road to Zero Coalition which is managed by the national safety council.

The report, A Road to Zero: A Vision For Achieving Zero Roadway Deaths By 2050, was released in April and identifies policies and practices to achieve the very notable and worthy objective of attaining zero deaths in the United States in thirty years:

Motorcycling and the safety of riders who engage in this growing mode of transportation remains a key priority of the *M.R.F.*, its board of directors, and its network of 220,000 riders across the U.S. In fact, the *M.R.F.*, either directly or through our member networks, have numerous initiatives geared towards rider safety touching on issues such as motorcycle awareness, rider education and training, impairment, as well as technological advancements for motorcycle and equipment manufacturers. Because the safety of the motorcycle

community is so paramount to our organization, we commend the objective behind *Road to Zero*. As such, we have been present and an active participant in almost every *Road to Zero Coalition* meeting since the unveiling of the program in 2016. During these workshops we've offered the motorcyclist's perspective on key issues areas, making recommendations and

playing a proactive role in the dialogue.

Therefore, it is discouraging that the recently issued report reflects none of this input, instead emphasizing only one countermeasure in which to mitigate motorcycle fatalities. Consequently, the report fails to mention the presence and participation of our organization as well as other key motorcycle organizations, which collectively represent over half-a-million motorcyclists in the United States.

Within the report, the assessment on motorcycle fatalities again and again points to helmet regulations as a proven countermeasure. However, there is the notable absence of mention of proactive measures, which prevent a collision from occurring at all. Reactive steps may or may not offer some level of injury mitigation only after a crash has already taken place. If the goal is to eliminate all traffic deaths by 2050, there should be an emphasis on crash prevention and not simply safer crashing.

These potential steps can manifest in a

variety of ways including initiatives on rider education and training for new and returning riders, motorcycle awareness education for other roadway users, and a variety of others.

In reviewing the report, the only proactive measures mentioned in regard to motorcycle fatalities are automatic emergency braking, self-balancing control mechanisms for motorcycles, and a connected vehicle system.

However, each of these presents its own set of concerns: a motorcycle coming to a halt could result in throwing an unprepared rider; the self-balancing technology is not yet available; and there are numerous studies which indicate that motorcycles are not consistently identified by lane assist, collision warning, or emergency breaking systems as a part of a connected roadway system. While these are certainly areas that should be reviewed, discussed and improved, they are not yet tangible solutions and there is uncertainty that they may even come to fruition by 2050.

Instead the *M.R.F.*, despite not being recognized in the report, have communicated, collaborated, and participated in the various meetings and workshops that have taken place over the last two years, highlighting and advocating for tangible and practical initiatives that can be deployed immediately to include proactive countermeasures to reduce or eliminate motorcycle fatalities.

The absence of any acknowledgement of these ideas and lack of recognition of participating motorcycle organizations that represent our nation's riders have unfortunately contributed to a flawed report that is neither practical nor inclusive when it comes to motorcycle safety.

If the objective of *Road to Zero* is to truly achieve zero roadway deaths by 2050, we encourage leadership behind the program to be inclusive of input and ideas from all roadway users and to consider discussing practical proactive measures for motorcyclists.

treatment of the

United States Flag

U.S. code, title 36, chapter 10

section 7 Position and manner of display

- a. The flag should not be displayed on a float in a parade except from a staff, or as provided in subsection (i) of this section.
- b. The flag should not be draped over the hood, top, sides, or back of a vehicle or of a railroad train or a boat. When the flag is displayed on a motorcar, the staff shall be fixed firmly to the chassis or clamped to the right fender.



section 8 Respect for flag

- b. The flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water, or merchandise.
- d. The flag should never be used as wearing apparel, bedding, or drapery.

Bunting of blue, white, and red, always arranged with the blue above, the white in the middle, and the red below, should be used for covering a speaker's desk, draping the front of the platform, and for decoration in general.

- i. The flag should never be used for advertising purposes in any manner whatsoever.
- It should not be embroidered on such articles as cushions or handkerchiefs and the like, printed or otherwise impressed on paper napkins or boxes or anything that is designed for temporary use and discard.

Advertising signs should not be fastened to a staff or halyard from which the flag is flown.

j. No part of the flag should ever be used as a costume or athletic uniform.

Congressional Ethanol Bill Would Limit E-15 Fuel

A measure to limit proliferation of E-15 fuel (gasoline containing 15% ethanol) has been introduced in the U.S. congress.

The Growing Renewable Energy through Existing and New Environmentally Responsible Fuels Act has been introduced in the U.S. house (HR–5212) by U.S. representative Peter Welch (D-VT) and in the senate (S–2519) by senator Tom Udall (D-NM).

This proposed legislation intends to cap mandated ethanol content in the nation's fuel supply at 9.7% and would stop the federal government from forcing E15 fuel into the market. Capping the ethanol mandate would ensure continued availability of fuels deemed safe for motorcycles, such as E-10, since E-15 fuel is not approved for use in motorcycles and can damage fuel systems and void manufacturers' warranties.

Europe Exempted From Trump Tariffs

Harley-Davidson is breathing a sigh of relief at news that the European Union will be temporarily exempted from America's new tariffs on imported steel and aluminum. European ministers had specifically named the motor company, along with Levi's jeans and Jack Daniels whiskey, as a target for punitive European import duties in retaliation against president Trump's announced 25% tariff on imported steel and 10% tariff on foreign aluminum.

At least for now, the E.U., along with Argentina, Brazil, Australia, and South Korea, has been temporarily exempted from the U.S. tariffs, giving those countries time to try to negotiate permanent exemptions. For other countries including Russia and Japan, the tariffs are set to go into effect.

Despite the exemptions, prices may still

be driven up by the additional costs that *Harley*, and other U.S. manufacturers will encounter due to the new American import tariffs.

Appeals Court Strikes Down Gag Order In Waco Case

A Texas appeals court has struck down a gag order issued in a case arising from the 2015 shootout involving motorcycle clubs and police outside a Waco restaurant that left nine bikers dead and dozens more injured.

In a six-page opinion issued Wednesday, March 21, a three-judge panel of the 10th Texas court of appeals ruled that the McLennan county district attorney's office had failed to make a case for the order.

State district judge Doug Shaver of Houston had issued the order at district attorney Abel Reyna's request in the case of Matthew Clendennen, one of 154 motorcyclists indicted after the shootout. The order prevented prosecutors, attorneys, and investigators from commenting publicly on the case.

Clendennen's attorney appealed, supported by media groups that included the Associated Press, arguing the order was overly broad and unconstitutional.

Deadwood Casinos To Implement "No Colors" During Sturges Rally

Following a February 16 request from enforcement for the South Dakota commission on gaming to ban colors in casinos during the *Sturges Motorcycle Rally*, the commission put the onus on the city of Deadwood and the individual gaming properties in coming up with a solution, tasking them with "taking the lead" to implement policies to monitor potential

increased bike gang presence during *Sturgis Motorcycle Rally*.

Deadwood Gaming Association (D.G.A.) executive director Mike Rodman briefed the commission on the industry's response plan at the April 3 gaming commission meeting in Deadwood.

"We believe that the best path forward to keep Deadwood safe is for each individual property to have their security and management teams work with the city of Deadwood and its safety officials on proper safety planning that takes their unique properties into consideration. We do not believe there is a 'one solution fits all' approach that would be effective overall," said Rodman in a letter to South Dakota commission on gaming executive director Larry Eliason.

The letter was drafted in response to correspondence from Eliason requesting proposals from the city and the industry as to how they would proceed to comply with the commission's directive.

The commission asked for a list of *D.G.A.* member casinos that will and won't allow colors during the rally.

Oregon Governor Signs Driver Accountability Bill

Oregon governor Kate Brown formally signed house bill 2598, the *Driver Accountability Bill*, into effect on 28 February 2018, providing some relief for riders who are victims of reckless drivers.

"HB-2598 makes it a crime for a driver who recklessly injures a motorcyclist," explains the Oregon Confederation of Clubs web site, www.oregoncoc.com

"This [regulation] also covers the passenger on a motorcycle. If convicted, the reckless driver can be charged with vehicular assault and will have a class A misdemeanor on their record. The punishment can be doing time up to one year in prison with a maximum fine up to \$6,250."

Great thanks to *Oregon Aid to Injured Motorcyclists* (A.I.M.) attorney Christopher Slater, "who took a brilliantly simple idea and seeing that concept to its very end and conclusion."

This will be a powerful tool to punish those who violate a biker's right-of-way or otherwise injures a rider due to a driver's recklessness.

"Too often drivers have crashed into a motorcyclist getting away without even a ticket. With this [regulation], there will finally be some teeth in ensuring that reckless drivers who injure riders or their passengers will be convicted of a crime," wrote Mike of the Oregon C.o.C. on their web site.

Much thanks to *BikePAC* and *A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon* for their skillful efforts of organizing the hearing testimony, and great appreciation for the riders who testified.

Riding In Unison For Female Ride Day

Lady bikers around the globe took to their motorcycles on Saturday, May 5th for the 12th edition of *International Female Ride Day*. (*I.F.R.D.*) Celebrations were hosted in countries worldwide by women's clubs, foundations, and individuals. The organization hosted an open house at *SF Moto* in San Francisco featuring guest speakers, test rides, and some of the latest motorcycle products designed for female motorcyclists.

Created in 2007 by Vicki Gray, a Toronto-based road and race instructor, *I.F.R.D.*'s purpose was to highlight and celebrate the tens of thousands of women who ride globally. The event takes place annually on the first Saturday of May each year.

Other countries that took part in the 2018 event included Canada, U.S.A., Iceland, India, Australia, South Africa, Brazil, the Caribbean, Germany, the Netherlands, Czech Republic, Hungary, Russia, Japan, China, and Israel.

Three-Wheel Autocycles Don't Require Motorcycle License

More and more states are adjusting their regulations towards three-wheelers that aren't quite cars and aren't quite motorcycles, like the *Polaris Slingshot*.

The latest state to do so is Mississippi, where all you need to drive a Slingshot is a regular driver's license with no motorcycle endorsement necessary.

The new vehicle classification means residents of the magnolia state can now legally drive "autocycles" sans motorcycle endorsement, thanks to three-wheelers that have traditionally been classified as motorcycles being re-designated as "autocycles." This makes Mississippi the 43rd U.S. state where driving an autocycle only necessitates a class C license. But you do need to follow the state's motorcycle helmet requirement if you want to drive a *Slingshot*.

Appeals Court Sides With Cops Using Biker Photos To Lobby

Fighting a bill that would have allowed Floridians to openly carry guns, two Orange county sheriff's deputies in 2011 moved forward with a plan to give legislators a glimpse of some people who might be able to pack heat publicly, such as outlaw bikers.

The deputies pulled together booking or driver's license photos of "one percenters" (members of outlaw motorcycle clubs) who might be able to openly carry guns, and provided the photos to the senate judiciary committee in opposition to the measure.

In the end, legislators did not approve a broad open-carry proposal for people with concealed-weapons licenses, but their use of the photos led to a legal suit that resulted in a federal appeals court rejecting arguments by three members of the *Outlaws Motorcycle Club* that the officers had violated a privacy regulation

using the photos without their knowledge or permission.

The civil case focused heavily on whether the officers violated a federal regulation known as the *Driver's Privacy Protection Act*, but the ruling by a three-judge panel of the 11th U.S. circuit court of appeals sided with the officers, upholding a lower-court ruling that an exception to the federal privacy legislation covered lobbying, and additionally that the officers were entitled to "qualified immunity".

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Clip This Corner, Avoid A Helmet Ticket

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.
