A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

We also do business as (DBA) American Bikers Aimed Toward Education.

• *A.B.A.T.E.* is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.

• It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, on-road or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.

• You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to *A.B.A.T.E.* Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just that wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

So scan through our newspaper. If you like what you read, check out the chapter meeting listing on the back cover. Drop in on a meeting and see what we're about. You just might find a new family in *A.B.A.T.E.* And as Melinda says: "Bikers give great hugs."

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

("You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!")

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the *National Highway Transportation Safety Administration* (*N.H.T.S.A.*) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the *National Custom Cycle Association*. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to *A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments.* (*A.B.A.T.E.*)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized ''choppers'' which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR–3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California, and Ed Armstrong from A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates. Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 *Federal Highway Act*, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

at how good you are at it. Hell, ya might even like it.


How hard can it be? You're with bikers.



State Membership Report 09 Nov 2018

Fall has a typical slowness due to the fact that people are getting back into routines following the summer and gearing up for the holidays.

Keep up the good membership work of talking to people you meet about *A.B.A.T.E.* and encouraging others to get involved.

Renewals for October 2018 came at a slower pace for a total of twenty throughout the state.

New memberships were also slow at a total of ten.

Washington County led the pack by adding three new members last month, followed by Southeast Portland and Douglas County.

Over the years, our membership program has been managed by many different people. Periodic corrections and updates keep the database as current and as accurate as possible.

This month, membership is conducting an audit of *Southeast Portland Chapter*. Many of you may be confused about why we are doing this. Primarily, it is to test the database, to make sure that members information and history are correct. We started with *Southeast Portland* because it is Oregon's largest chapter, and our executive team was reporting a higher level of inaccuracy. This need for correction was the result of providing monthly membership rosters and keeping lines of communication open. This audit should be completed by 01 December.

So far, only minor corrections have been necessary in contact information such as new cell numbers or e-mail addresses.

The big thing that we've been able to capture are original membership start years. This helps us to accurately capture a member's history and the cumulative history of *Oregon A.B.A.T.E.*

A special thank you goes out to Craig Blair for highlighting the need for this audit because of his appreciation for the importance of *A.B.A.T.E.*'s history.

Members who renew every year or two, get new cards all of the time, but our lifetime members may have cards that have been through the washer a few times or are worn out from use.

Another thing that membership

is doing this month, is renewing the membership cards for all of our lifetime members and thanking them for their service and dedication to *Oregon A.B.A.T.E.*

Sending new cards gives us an opportunity to extend a special thanks to these dedicated members who have stepped forward financially to express their support for *Oregon A.B.A.T.E.*

Together, our lifetime members have contributed \$41,200 in revenue to *Oregon A.B.A.T.E.* over the years, just through membership fees.

New membership tri-folds have been ordered with some minor changes which were approved at the annual planning session in October.

Aside from some basic grammatical corrections, these minor changes will make the membership application easier to read and reduce confusion over the membership fees and benefits.

Simple changes include moving from single to individual and couple to plus-one. This takes into account that not every pair is a couple but maybe a father-son, siblings, or roommates.

Helmet Use Indian Creek Freelance Thought

I don't have to go over it. You can read it printed on the inside page of each month's news rag. Helmet restrictions (as other restrictive measures) started as far-back as 1968.

In 1972 A.B.A.T.E. came about to fight such infringements on our personal freedom.

One issue of the news rag, thensecretary Teresa Hepker had a very small article, Did You Know?, dealing with a very brief history of Oregon's helmet regulation. Let me refresh you:

1968-1977 the feds mandated (through the threat of withholding highway dollars) all states institute helmet use. 05 May 1976, Gerald Ford rescinded said funding threat and as a result, 04 October 1977 Oregon repealed the mandatory use of helmets for riders 18 years plus.

16 June 1989 by referendum referred to to the voters (with one of the lowest turnouts in state history) the helmet requirement was reinstated.

In 1997 house bill 2454 (repeal mandatory helmet use) was introduced and passed both house and senate and on 15 August 1997 went to the desk of then governor John Kitzhaber, who with his expert knowledge as an "emergency room doctor " saw the pitfalls of such a bill and vetoed HB–2454 for our own protection, because "we" aren't smart enough to know any better!

Next on the agenda: News rag – November 2018, October A.B.A.T.E. state board meeting. Greeted by legislative director Don Mason and I quote, "We were fighting for helmet choice in the past. It has been demonstrated that we will not be able to get such legislation passed in the current political climate. "

Duh. Big red truck!

Today's political climate (and I don't care if you're a jackass or a fatass) both parties at present are not concerned with the people (a government of the people, by the people, and for the people), but with the concept of protecting the party at all cost! The party comes first. All else is secondary!

President Trumps Bikers, Authorizes E-15 Fuel Year-'Round

President Donald Trump has given the environmental protection agency (E.P.A.) the authority to lift current restrictions on E-15 gas (containing 15% ethanol) to allow year-around sales of the higher ethanol blend.

Following the federal rule making process and public comment period, the expanded sales are expected to begin during the summer of 2019.

In 1978, a *Clean Air Act* waiver allowed the use of ten volume percent ethanol in gasoline (E-10), and today almost all fuels are E-10 blends.

In June 2011, the E.P.A. approved a partial waiver for blends of 15% volume ethanol in gasoline for use in model year 2001 and newer passenger cars, pickups, and medium-duty vehicles. However, the E.P.A. does not approve the use of E-15 in small engines such as motorcycles or A.T.V.s, and its use can damage vehicles and void manufacturer warranties.

Currently, gasoline retailers throughout most of the country are prohibited from offering E-15 during the summer months. The president's directive to the E.P.A. is to change that.

C.H.P. Uses Federal Funds For Motorcycle Safety

The California highway patrol is using a federal grant to promote motorcycle safety throughout the state, with the goal of reducing the most dangerous traffic violations which they say are speeding, improper turning, and driving under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. There are more than 1.4 million people with a motorcycle licenses in the state. The education campaign is called *G.E.A.R.S.* (*Get Educated And Ride Safe*)

The year-long campaign will include the C.H.P. deploying officers on enhanced motorcycle safety enforcement operations in regions with a high number of motorcycle incidents. There will be a series of motorcycle traffic safety education campaigns, including the *May is Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month.*

Officers plan to stress the use of properly approved helmets for all riders and raise motorists' awareness of sharing the road with motorcyclists.

According to provisional data from 2017, the number of motorcycle crash victims shows a 6% decrease compared to the previous year.

A.B.S. For New Bikes In Japan

In an effort to reduce the number of traffic-related motorcycle crashes and fatalities, Japans ministry of land, infrastructure, transport, and tourism (M.L.I.T.) made amendments to the country's safety standards for road transport back in January 2015, including the requirement for all new motorcycles (125 cc or larger) to be equipped with standard anti-lock braking systems (A.B.S.) effective on October 1, 2018.

Additionally, newly launched twowheelers from 125 cc and below must come with either A.B.S. or C.B.S. (Combined braking system, which allows simultaneous front and rear brake application with a single input.) Continuous production motorcycles have until October 1, 2021 to comply.

Dirt bikes specifically designated for off-road use and competition are exempted from the requirement.

Europe has had A.B.S. regulations since 2016, and India's obligatory braking system regulations came into effect earlier this year. Taiwan and China are expected to follow in 2019 and 2020 respectively.

Here in the U.S., the national transportation safety board (N.T.S.B.) has made recommendations to the federal government to enforce the same measures, while countries like Australia and Brazil are also considering similar regulations.

As more countries get on board, vendors around the world have reportedly been bracing themselves for possible slowdowns in motorcycle sales due to higher manufacturing costs.

Philippine Police Seize Modified Motorcycles and Accessories

The past few months have been very busy for enforcement officers in the Philippines, where police have apprehended traffic violators, cited smoke belching vehicles, and impounded erring motorcycle riders property.

Among those apprehended were motorcycles fitted with certain modifications, which have been serving as a bone of contention for both riders and enforcers, according to **MotoPinas.com**.

Among those accessories confiscated were auxiliary L.E.D.

lighting systems, after market mufflers, after market side mirrors, and upgraded brakes which aren't compliant with motor vehicle inspection system (M.V.I.S.) guidelines.

The motorcycle rights organization (M.R.O.-Philippines) suggests that when apprehended for fitting illegal accessories, refuse the order to remove your accessories and insist the apprehending officer remove the accessories from your motorcycle because as far as the L.T.O. (land transportation office) is concerned, you are within set regulations, adding "Do not argue with the apprehending officers. There is always a proper/lawful venue for contesting the apprehension."

Driver Found Guilty Of Biker Homicide

On 17 May 2017, a speeding driver struck renowned *MotoGP* motorcycle racer Nicky Hayden as he was riding a bicycle in Italy, tragically passing away from his injuries five days later. Nearly a year and a half later, we have learned that the driver was charged with murder.

The unidentified 31-year-old driver at the wheel of a *Peugeot* 206 was reportedly driving at roughly 43 miles per hour (70 kph) in a 30 mph zone. Although Hayden was zipping down a crossing street and ran through the intersection, the judge in charge of the ruling considers had the driver respected the speed limit, he would have had time to react to

Hayden's presence.

The driver has been found guilty of road homicide and sentenced to a year in prison. His license has also been revoked and he will be expected to pay all the court fees. The driver's attorney has said they will appeal the ruling.

The driver is not only facing a criminal sentence but also a civil lawsuit, as Hayden's family is suing the driver for \$6 million, the maximum covered by the Italian insurance policy.

Nicknamed the Kentucky Kid, 35-year-old Nicky Hayden began his career in MotoGP in 2003 with Repsol Honda and went on to win the *MotoGP* championship in 2006. He also competed in American dirt track racing, winning a few grand national events. Hayden continued racing in MotoGP through 2015, competing for Ducati Team (2009-2013) and Aspar Honda (2014-2015). Hayden made the jump to the world superbike championship for the 2016 season, becoming the sole American in the series until his untimely death last May.

Motorcycle Racing Incident May End Up In Court

Moto2 rider Romano Fenati was disqualified after he astonishingly grabbed the brake of rival motorcycle racer Stefano Manzi at high speed during a mid-September race in Misano, Italy. Romano has since been banned for two races, the F.I.M. racing authority suspended his license, and his team contract has been canceled.

But now the fallout from the disgraced racer's brake-grabbing incident continues, with Italian

news agency *A.N.S.A.* reporting he could now face a charge of private violence.

The public prosecutor of Rimini (in Italy) is said to have opened the investigation for the less serious charge, rather than that of attempted murder.

Private violence is akin to a motorist cutting off another driver on the road. However, the use of such a charge for competitors in a motor race would set a very worrying precedent.

Fenati pulled Manzi's front brake after the pair had clashed repeatedly during their home race, and although extremely dangerous, both riders remained upright.

Trade Deal Nets Cheaper Motorcycles For E.U.

A trade agreement between Japan and the European Union could spell disaster for British bike buyers, as the *British Motorcyclists Federations* (B.M.F.) reports that the deal removes common E.U. external customs tariffs from Japanese manufacturers imports.

Under the E.U.-Japan economic partnership signed earlier this year, the 6% tariff affecting motorcycles will be abolished over the next five years, meaning cheaper bikes for E.U. buyers. European consumers will also benefit from common standards of type approval on product safety as well as emissions.

However, this free trade deal is unlikely to apply to Britain due to Brexit, with that country's exit from the E.U. E.U.-based manufacturers will also enjoy more competitive access to the Japanese market, while those in the U.K. will continue to than new bikes, and contribute face tariff constraints. 40% of the total carbon monoxide

But Japan's prime minister Shinz Abe did recently state that Japan would welcome Britain with open arms to the eleven-country *Trans-Pacific Partnership* (T.P.P.), though the timeframe is not likely to be soon.

So while E.U. riders look to benefit from less expensive bikes and Japanese-standard type approval, Brits are still in the dark as to what this means

Singapore To Ban Older Motorcycles

When the national environment agency (N.E.A.) announced on 06 April that motorcycles registered before 01 July 2003 would be banned from the roads after 30 June 2028, many riders dreams of having an older classic motorcycle or handing down their precious bikes to their children, went down the drain.

Calling it a plain injustice, bikers say the ban will push rare, vintage bikes into oblivion.

The N.E.A. told *Channel News Asia* that the government is trying to reduce emissions from some 27,000 older motorcycles as part of a push to meet Singapore's air quality targets by 2020.

Owners of older motorcycles have been offered up to \$\$3,500 to deregister their bikes within the next five years. Beyond that, emission standards for such motorcycles will be tightened, before the 2028 ban kicks in.

These initiatives come as N.E.A. figures indicate that older bikes emit up to 30 times more pollutants

than new bikes, and contribute 40% of the total carbon monoxide emitted by motorcycles on the road. Bikers counter that all motorcycles, regardless of age, must pass inspection and emissions testing, though older bikes are subject to less stringent standards.

Explaining its rationale for the 01 July 2003 cutoff date, N.E.A. said Singapore adopted Euro 1-type approval standards for new motorcycles on that date. Motorcycles registered before that are more pollutive than newer models which comply with the Euro 4 standard.

Some of these bikes, however, may be able to stay on the roads even after the ban, provided they are converted under the classic vehicle scheme, which allows vehicles to be used for up to forty-five days in a calendar year.

But the catch is that to qualify for the scheme, the bikes must be at least thirty-five years old, meaning that when the ban begins in 2028, affected bikes registered after June 1993 will not qualify, so nearly two decades of bikes will be destroyed, put into storage, or exported.

YouTube Posting Gets Man One-Year Motorcycle Ban

A motorcycle rider who ran from police at speeds up to 143 m.p.h. was caught when his own helmet cam video posting was spotted on *YouTube*. The rider had fled from a St. Charles, Illinois officer who spotting him making an illegal turn and riding a bike without a registration plate, according to a report in the *Daily Herald*.

Come on spring.

The incident was included in a compilation video of motorcycles running from police that was posted to the *FailsandFlights YouTube* account, and shows the elusive motorcyclist waiting at a red light, turn his head toward the officer who is signaling for him to shut the motorcycle off, but instead pulls away through several stopped cars, runs the light, then accelerates down the road.

At one point, the video displayed a link to the video star's personal *YouTube* page, which investigators used, along with his other social media channels, to track him down and make an arrest.

He was charged with several felonies, but agreed to plead guilty to misdemeanor reckless driving and will perform 100 hours of community service and cannot own or ride a motorcycle for one year.
