A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

We also do business as (DBA) American Bikers Aimed Toward Education.

• A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as BikePAC.

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. (A.B.A.T.E.)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the Huns Motorcycle Club in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California, and Ed Armstrong from A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of A.B.A.T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

I want to say thanks to all of those kind folks who enjoyed hearing Jimmy and I sing Friday and Saturday early evening.



"Hunh. What's the point?"


"You're always complaining about how things are run. This is your chance to do something about it, make things better."

Motorcyclists Included Under Oregon Vulnerable Roadway User

Back in 2007, the Oregon legislature passed house bill 3314, creating an enhanced penalty for careless driving if it contributes to serious physical injury or death to a vulnerable user of a public way, providing legal protections for nonmotorized roadway users such as bicyclists and pedestrians.

The concept of vulnerable roadway user had previously been widely used by planners and safety organizations in Europe to categorize and describe non-motorized roadway users, incorporating the inherent vulnerability of humans who use the roads without the benefit of being encased in a fourwheeled protective steel cage.

On 11 June 2019, Oregon governor Kate Brown (D) signed senate bill 810 into effect, modifying the definition of "vulnerable user of a public way" in Oregon to now include persons operating or riding on a moped or motorcycle.

Congressman Tim Walberg Accepts *N.C.O.M.* Silver Spoke Award

Congressman Tim Walberg (R-MI) was selected as this year's recipient of the *N.C.O.M. Silver* Spoke Award for government. Unfortunately, he was not able to attend the 34th Annual N.C.O.M. Convention in Orlando, Florida to receive the award in May, so it was taken to Washington, D.C. recently and presented there by several members of the *N.C.O.M.* board of directors.

N.C.O.M. Confederation of Clubs liaison Boar, Ed Schetter (region IV co-director), and John Bilotta (region VII co-director) were in the nation's capital taking part in the *Motorcycle Riders Foundation's* event, *Bikers Inside the Beltway*. They were also meeting with their legislators and staff members. During their visit to the capitol, they met with congressman Walberg and personally presented the award on behalf of the *National Coalition of Motorcyclists* (*N.C.O.M.*) in recognition of his work in congress for the benefit of all of Americas motorcycle riders.

Representative Walberg introduced a recently-passed house resolution that addresses profiling of motorcyclists.

Walberg and representative Michael Burgess (R-TX) head up the *Congressional Motorcycle Caucus*.

Missouri Governor Vetoes Transport Bill That Included Motorcycle Helmet Repeal

Missouri governor Mike Parson vetoed senate bill 147 on Friday, 12 July, a bill that would have allowed most adult motorcycle riders to ride without helmets.

Despite voting in favor of such legislation in the past as a state legislator, the republican governor blocked the omnibus transportation measure which, among other things, would have repealed Missouri's helmet requirement for motorcyclists 18 and older who carry medical insurance.

Governor Parson didn't express opposition to relaxing helmet requirements for motorcyclists. But in a letter to legislators he wrote that he vetoed the bill because of a section that dealt with suspending driver's licenses over unpaid fines related to traffic violations, which his office deemed to be unconstitutional.

Bikers rights activists and state legislators have been trying for decades to repeal the helmet requirement, passing a bill in 1999 that was vetoed by then-governor Mel Carnahan. Another bill in 2009 was vetoed by governor Jay Nixon. (Both democrats.)

"The governor was looking forward to signing this bill and still supports freedom of choice," wrote Jay Widmer, legislative coordinator for Freedom of Road Riders (F.O.R.R.-MO) on their Facebook page. "We are working toward a meeting with the governor and his staff to work with them towards a remedy."

North Carolina Legalizes Motorcyclist Face Masks

Like many states, North Carolina regulations generally prohibits a person from wearing a mask, hood, or other device, to conceal the identity of the wearer.

Limited exceptions now include: A person may wear a mask for the purpose of protecting the person's head and face when operating a motorcycle.

House bill 257/senate bill 321 (An Act To Permit The Use Of A Face Mask While Operating A Motorcycle) was signed into effect by governor Ray Cooper (D) on 11 July 2019 and goes into effect December 1st.

Amidst nationwide furor over political groups like *Antifa* wearing masks while engaging in civil unrest, HB–257 passed the house on 27 March by a vote of 111-1, while companion bill SB-321 passed the senate unanimously on 27 June, 48-0.

Enforcement officers in some states had begun stopping and citing motorcycle riders, particularly patch holders, for violating local anti-mask regulations.

The new regulation will require the person to remove the mask during traffic stops, checkpoints, roadblocks, or when approached by an enforcement officer.

New Washington Statute Requires Motorcycle Liability Insurance

Washington motorcycle owners must make sure their rides are insured once a new regulation went into effect on 28 July 2019, requiring motorcycle operators to obtain and carry proof of liability insurance coverage when cruising on Washington's roadways.

The new rules stem from house bill 1014, which was signed into effect in April by governor Jay Inslee (D).

Unlike other motor vehicle drivers, in virtually every other state, motorcycle riders in Washington have previously been exempt from obtaining and carrying proof of insurance.

According to a 23 April statement from the bill's sponsor, representative Bill Jenkin (R-Prosser), the regulation will require those operating a motorcycle to meet the insurance requirements, or equivalent, for registered motor

Thousands Ride To Honor Seven Bikers Killed In New Hampshire Crash

More than 3,000 motorcyclists rode across New Hampshire on Saturday, 06 July in the *Ride for the Fallen Seven* to honor seven bikers killed and three injured in a collision with an oncoming pickup truck in June,. State police escorted the group along a 90 mile route to the site of the deadly crash.

The victims were Marine veterans and their spouses (members of the *Jarheads Motorcycle Club*) who were traveling west on route 2 on their way to a charity event. A pickup truck and trailer crossed into their lane from the opposite direction, plowing through the pack, according to a criminal complaint.

Commercial trucker, 23-year-old Volodymyr Zhukovskyy of West Springfield, Massachusetts has pleaded not guilty to seven charges of negligent homicide. (He is an immigrant from the Ukraine with a documented history of multiple drug and alcohol arrests and convictions in numerous states.)

In the days following the fatal crash, the Massachusetts department of transportation revealed that Zhukovskyy had received an intoxicated driving charge in Connecticut in May, which should have led to the termination of his Massachusetts commercial drivers license.

Massachusetts governor Charlie Baker (R) has announced changes to the state's registry of motor vehicles, which include running all 5.2 million licenses through the national driver register to keep suspension information up-to-date and creating a new position to oversee safety and set requirements for commercial drivers in the state.

On 13 July, as thousands more gathered at *Gillette Stadium* in Foxborough, Massachusetts for a memorial service organized by the *Jarheads Motorcycle Club*, *New England Patriots* N.F.L. team owner Robert Kraft made a surprise appearance to present a \$100,000 donation to the crash victims' *GoFundMe* campaign.

Prank Lands Man In Jail For Attempted Motorcyclist Murder

Late one night, on the morning after Christmas [?!], a 45-year-old motorcyclist in Japan got a rope tangled around his neck causing him to dump his bike, severely injuring his back and hip. Luckily, the man who strung the rope across the road was caught on security camera footage, and Japanese police quickly tracked him down and charged him with attempted murder.

Japan Today reports that police arrested Koichi Deki (41), who claims the rope strung across the road was nothing more than a stress relieving prank. There is no indication whether Deki knew a motorcyclist was coming down the road when he tied a rope to a sign and a pole on the other side of the street. He is quoted as saying he did it to relieve his stress and didn't think his rope prank could kill anyone.

The motorcyclist hit the rope roughly 15 seconds after the rope was stretched across the road, according to the time code on the surveillance footage. Now the prankster faces a prison sentence of several years.

Ireland May Ban All New Gas-Powered Vehicle Sales After 2030

The Irish government has reaffirmed its plans to ban the sale of new petrol and diesel vehicles by 2030, as part of a new strategy aimed at protecting the environment.

In 2015, the United Nations agreed to seventeen sustainable development goals.

Ireland's recently released *Climate Action Plan* details how that nation intends to achieve them.

The greatest potential impact on Irish motorcyclists, according to Motorcycle Consumer News (M.C.N.) involves halting the sale of all new non-electric vehicles by the year 2030, adding, "It's worth noting that nowhere in this plan is any mention made of motorcycles or other two-wheeled vehicles as having any considerations separate from those of all other vehicles."

There is an ambitious plan included to refine and develop an E.V. (electric vehicle) charging infrastructure throughout the country that can sustain 800,000 E.V.s by the 2030 deadline as well as possible consideration of an I.C.E. (internal combustion engine) car scrappage program to be implemented as soon as 2020.

This is, according to *M.C.N.*, partially in response to the United Kingdom potentially moving its

2040 I.C.E. ban forward to 2032.

At this time, nine countries around the world have plans in place to begin phasing out I.C.E. vehicles in the very near future.

Norway's approach of incentivizing its citizens to adopt E.V.s over I.C.E. vehicles resulted in an impressive 52% of cars sold in 2017 being E.V.s, according to *Reuters*.

The city of Amsterdam has also come forward to state that it will be banning non-electric vehicles by 2030.

Ethiopia Bans Motorcycles In Capital City

Officials in Ethiopia's capital city of Addis Ababa said a ban on motorcycle use will be implemented in the city starting from 07 July in a bid to curb rising criminality.

The capital city of an estimated five million plus population is generally considered a safe city, but rising incidences of violent crimes using motorcycles has alarmed residents and officials.

Mayor Takele Uma said criminals have in recent months been using motorcycles to engage in assaults and robberies. The motorcycle use ban was implemented in the city after a one-week long study revealed many criminal activities are done using motorcycles.

German Court Rules Sikhs Must Wear Helmets

One of Germanys top five federal courts has ruled that Sikh individuals are not exempt from country-wide motorcycle helmet requirements. The ruling was in response to an appeal by a Sikh

not successfully fit a helmet over his dastaar, the traditional turban that Sikh men (and some women) wear within their faith.

Federal administrative court of Leipzig presiding judge, Renate Philipp, said, in his ruling, "People wearing a turban on religious grounds are not for that reason alone exempt from the obligation to wear a helmet," according to Deutsche Welle newspaper.

One argument the court made against the man's claim is that wearing a helmet doesn't only protect the rider. It also helps drivers avoid trauma if they cause injury to a rider without a helmet. Any riders wearing helmets would more readily be able to assist others in a crash.

Several countries have exemptions from existing helmet requirements for Sikh motorcyclists, including the Great Britain, and the Canadian provinces of Alberta, Ontario, British Columbia, and Manitoba.

Around the world, in places including Australia and India, exemptions and even proposals for exceptions draw a range of opinions

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.


