

What We're About

A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brother-hood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

We also do business as (DBA) American Bikers Aimed Toward Education.

- A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.
- It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, on-road or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.
- You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to *A.B.A.T.E.* Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just that wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. (A.B.A.T.E.)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized ''choppers'' which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the *American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.)*, Ron Roloff of the *M.M.A. of California*, and Ed Armstrong from *A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago* presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of A.B.A.T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.



A.B.A.T.E. chapter reports -- **Hub City**

Car versus motorcycle is not move along and heal well. something we really want to see or read about, but is a possibility every time we put a leg over our bikes.

This dark possibility became a stark reality for me the end of June and transformed my summer into a very different one than I planned, as I write this article in a wheelchair.

I thought I would share with my brothers and sisters some lessons I have learned during my recovery, so bear with me!

The skilled surgeons did a great job putting me back together over five surgeries.

Then it became my turn and it became apparent that my attitude would be a huge factor in my recovery. It came in the form of gratitude for the attitude. Being grateful for everything that was great in my life became the foundation for the attitude I needed to

My family is number one on this gratitude list. The love and support and all the time they have spent with me, especially early on in the trauma center was, without a doubt, a life saver for me. I am forever grateful to my beautiful wife and two children who where at my side whenever possible. My brothers and sisters in this community were always there, lending whatever was necessary to help me.

After a call out to Riders Needing Assistance, they built a wheelchair ramp for me and set up a meal train for when I finally made it home. (A real blessing.) Thank you R.N.A. If you don't' know these guys, look them up.

Insurance: Yeah, that pesky little thing. There is this thing called uninsured/underinsured. It is the same as liability limits. So if you have 100/300 (\$100k per person, \$300k maximum),

your uninsured/ underinsured will be \$100k. The cost to move those up is not that much. I will definitely be upping those on my motorcycle insurance in the

future, likely to 250/500 given the cost to put me back together again. This is something worth checking out, just in case.

Local ambulance service subscription. Many local departments have banded together to offer coverage

Safest Sturgis Rally In Five Years

Final Sturgis Motorcycle Rally figures indicate a slight decrease in overall attendance, but including a third fatality reported on Sunday, traffic deaths were the lowest since 2014 when two motorcyclists died. Four people died in traffic crashes during the rally last year.

Crashes were also down this year, with 52 injury crashes reported, down from 56.

There were 41 non-injury crashes compared with 50 in 2018, according to the state department of public safety.

The number of vehicles counted entering Sturgis, South Dakota during the ten days of the 79th Annual Sturgis Rally, from Friday, 02 August through Sunday, 11 August, was down 1.2% from 505,969 in 2018 to 499,654 this year, according to the state department of transportation, which has been counting since 1990.

The record vehicle count was 604,441 for seven days (Monday through Sunday) of the rally in 2000, the 60th anniversary, according to D.O.T. figures.

The record attendance, by head count, was an estimated 738,000 in 2015, the 75th anniversary, according to rally officials.

Trade War Heats Up

A trade war continues to escalate, and with motorcycles once again caught in the cross hairs. Whatever the outcome, the cost of motorcycles is likely to go up.

Trade tensions between the European Union (E.U.) and the United States involving ongoing disputes regarding aircraft subsidies has led the Trump administration to respond with \$11 billion in proposed E.U. tariffs, including many motorcycles imported from countries in the E.U.

The U.S. trade representative

on motorcycles 500-700 cc, as well as parts and accessories for motorcycles, including mopeds. (H.T.S. subheadings 8711.40.30 and 8714.10.00.)

The retaliatory tariffs could have farreaching consequences for Europeanbased motorcycle manufacturers, including *Ducati*, *B.M.W.*, *Husqvarna*, *K.T.M.*, *Triumph*, and *Vespa*.

As of now, the product list is preliminary, and riders are urged to make their voices heard.

M.I.C. Initiative To Inspire New Riders

The *Motorcycle Industry Council* (*M.I.C.*) has announced a broad, long-term initiative to bring more people into the world of motorcycling.

"It's clear the industry needs to reach and inspire new customers. While many of us, with our individual businesses, have taken steps to grow ridership, we also should be working together, and the M.I.C. wants to help make that happen," said Paul Vitrano. (M.I.C. board chair and senior assistant general counsel at Indian Motorcycle and Polaris Inc.) "To help us fully understand the barriers to entry, and to create an inclusive strategic plan to conquer those barriers that will be available to all stake holders, we have partnered with a team of researchers and strategists to bring fresh perspectives to this challenge and opportunity."

To initiate this strategic plan, the *M.I.C.* has hired consulting firm *Centauric L.L.C.* to lead the first phase of this initiative. *Centauric* has committed an impressive multi-disciplinary team of behavioral scientists, engineers, and business consultants, taking a unique approach to problem-solving. "We are excited to be working with them on this critical initiative," Vitrano said.

The plan was presented at the *M.I.C.*'s *American International Motorcycle*

(U.S.T.R.) has proposed 100% duties *Expo* (A.I.M. Expo) in Columbus, Ohio, on motorcycles 500-700 cc, as well as 26–29 September 2019.

"This is not designed to be a quick fix, nor is it just about sales," said Chuck Boderman (M.I.C. vice chair, and vice president, motorcycle division, American Honda Motor Co., Inc.) "It's about showing people how motorcycles can fit into and enrich their lives, no matter where they live, what they do, what their hobbies are, or how old or young they are. This will take time, so we are committed to building a campaign that takes the long view and how united as one, we can attract new riders to motorcycling."

F.E.M.A. – Be Prepared For Electric Bikes

"In about ten years it will probably not be possible to buy a motorcycle with an internal combustion engine in most, if not all, European countries," warns Dolf Willigers of the Federation of European Motorcyclists' Associations. (F.E.M.A.), based upon information gathered during Sustainable Energy Week in Brussels. (Three days of presentations about how to make our society more sustainable.) "When you think about future transport, think electric. Not biofuels, not hydrogen, certainly not carbon-based fuels, but electric battery-powered vehicles is what we can expect."

Transport is seen as a big contributor to the greenhouse effect. According to the *E.F.A.* (*European Environment Agency*), road transport emits nearly 21% of the E.U.'s total emissions of carbon dioxide (CO2), the main greenhouse gas.

Both the European Union and countries inside and outside the E.U. want climate-neutral transport by 2050.

"This looks far away," says Willigers, "but remember that cars, the largest part of the vehicles, in Europe have an average lifespan of about twenty years. To have all cars on the road emission

free in 2050 means that cars that do emit CO2 should no longer be on the market after 2030. Now it suddenly gets closer."

According to Williger, in just over ten years, there should be a complete transition from cars with a (carbonbased fuel) internal combustion engine to battery-electric powered cars.

Already the governments of Denmark, Germany, Ireland, India, Israel, Netherlands, and Sweden have announced that they will ban the sale of new carbon-fueled cars from 2030.

France, China, and the U.K. have announced to plans to stop the sale of new cars with an internal combustion engine from 2040.

On the other hand, Norway wants to ban the sale of these cars already from 2025.

"Indeed, I'm talking about cars, not about motorcycles," Williger explains, "But lets be realistic. When the sale cars with an internal combustion engine are stopped after 2030 in one country (the Netherlands) and also the sale of mopeds with an internal combustion engine, how big will the chance be that an exception will be made for motorcycles?"

British Government Considers Banning Hands-Free Devices

England and Wales could make hands-free cellphone devices illegal for drivers, after research showed that it is no safer than using a hand-held phone. A ban on communications systems for motorcyclists would be included.

The commons select committee has said that the government should consider extending the regulation against using a mobile phone while driving and has called for a public consultation

on the issue by the end of 2019. The committee also recommended increasing the penalty for using a hand-held device and wants the police to do more to enforce the regulations.

Smart helmets and other communication systems are gaining in popularity for riders, as having access to our phones at all times has become a social and often professional requirement,. In recent years the communications industry has been booming with increasingly versatile devices.

The committees recommendation is based on a study that determined these systems are as distracting as using a handheld device. Whether behind the wheel or behind the handlebars, your attention is divided.

According to the national safety council, drivers on the phone miss up to 50% of what's happening in their surroundings while taking a call. Their field of view is dramatically narrowed down. *Chances are*, a similar proportion applies to riders.

If such a ban is imposed in the U.K., it *could* spark discussions of similar bans in the rest of Europe and *perhaps* the rest of the world.

No Helmet, No Gas

Although India has a national helmet requirement, as of 05 August the highly urbanized city of Bengaluru will begin implementing a "No Helmet, No Fuel" policy that means any motorcycle rider, including their passenger, will not be allowed to buy fuel at any gas station within the city limits if they are **not** wearing their helmets.

"The Bengaluru traffic police has spoken with petrol pump owners across the city seeking their cooperation to enforce the 'No Helmet, No Fuel' initiative," Bengaluru city additional traffic commissioner P. Harishekaran told News18. "This is being done purely for the interest, safety, and security of people."

Bengaluru is not the first city to take such a step. On 01 June 2019, the state of Uttar Pradesh, which has a population of 200-million, enacted a "No Helmet, No Fuel" policy and also prohibits motorcycle riders from using the expressway if they are not wearing their helmets.

Netherlands Sergeant-Major Choice: Motorcycle or Military Job

The Netherlands ministry of defense has suspended a soldier for the first time because of his role in the world of motorcycle clubs, threatening sergeant major Maurice Vissers with removal from his job with the ministry for being involved in a prohibited motorcycle gang.

Vissers is not a member of a forbidden club, but is vice president of the *Veterans Motorcycle Club*, a military motorcycle club in the Netherlands to which many soldiers and former soldiers are affiliated. But he stands accused of having contacts with the *Hell's Angels* as the clubs maintain friendly ties.

Earlier this year, the ministry of defense announced in a statement regarding the behavior of defense employees that security clearances will be withdrawn if they have contact with a criminal organization or are "involved in outlaw motorcycle gangs such as Satudarah, Hell's Angels, No Surrender, or the Bandidos."

Where the ministry previously discouraged its staff from becoming members of 1% clubs, action is now being taken against soldiers who, for example, have a child or a partner in a prohibited motorcycle club, labeling them a security risk.

Despite having no criminal record and no other security issues, the ministry of defense has given the soldier a choice: leave the motorcycle club or military.

Putin May Be Cited For Riding Without Helmet

The *Moscow Times* has reported that Russian president Vladimir Putin recently attended a biker show organized by the *Night Wolves Motorcycle Club* in annexed Crimea. State television showed Putin at the handlebars of a *Ural* motorcycle without a helmet on.

At least two people have filed complaints with the authorities on the basis that Putin had violated Russian regulations by not wearing a helmet, and a Russian lawyer has requested the traffic police fine Putin \$15 over the infraction.

"Putin is violating [the requirements] again," said regional legislator Oleg Khomutinnikov in a complaint to Russia's prosecutor generals office, writing on Facebook. "So what, the violations are minor. But does that make them non-violations?"

Easy Rider Star Peter Fonda Dead At 79

Oscar-nominated actor Peter Fonda, who became a counterculture icon when he co-wrote, produced, and starred in the seminal 1969 road movie *Easy Rider* fifty years ago, died 16 August of lung cancer at age 79.

The son of Hollywood legend Henry Fonda, he appeared in numerous biker movies, including *The Wild Angels* (1966), *Ghost Rider* (2007), and *Wild Hogs* (2007).

Fonda earned an academy award nomination for best original screenplay for *Easy Rider*, which was added to the national film registry in 1998, having been deemed culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant.

In 1991, Peter Fonda attended the *National Coalition of Motorcyclists* 6th annual *N.C.O.M.* convention to receive the *Silver Spoke Award* for entertainment: "In appreciation for improving the image of motorcycling."

He was inducted into the A.M.A. Motorcycle Hall of Fame in 2002, not only for his work on Easy Rider but

also for his motorcycle-related charity work, including the *Love Ride*.

His interest in motorcycles was the direct result of rebelling against the elder Fonda. "My father didn't want me to," he once told the Los Angeles Times newspaper. "It was like, "in your face". As soon as I could, I bought a Harley. That was the beginning. Loved it. Never have stopped."

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.


