What We're About

A.B.A.T.E. is a not-forprofit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subvesive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcycists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcyclle issues

- We are not a motorcycle club or gang. Instead, A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as BikePAC.
- It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride on.

We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, on-road or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.

MISSION STATEMENT

A.B.A.T.E. or Oregon, Inc. promotes motorcycle awareness, education, safety and liberty through community involement and legislative action.

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the Nationa Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments (A.B.A.T.E.).

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the Huns Motorcycle Club in Connecticut convinced his congressman, Rep. Stewart Mckinney, to introduce H.R.3869 to end the Federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet laws.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California and Ed Armstrong of A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the House Sub-Committee on Surface Transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because Governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet law mandate, Roloff helped convince California Senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by

President Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached Congress twice over the past few years, first to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through Congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of A.B.A.T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of Freedom of the Road.

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Millenium Ride

7 March 2003 **Summary**

Today Milward heads from Honduras to Nicaragua. Here he recounts his visit to Bin Laden's black volcanic beach hideaway in Monterrico Guatemala and his impressions of beautiful Honduras. In continuing his consideration of how motorcycles are used in rural health deliveries, he helped an N.G.O. in Guatemala introduce a system of maintenance for their fleet of 20 motorcycles. In Honduras, with high level approval, the chief of the department of transport at the Honduran Public Health Ministry has produced a plan to train their 526 health motorcyclists in preventative motorcycle maintenance. This project with sustainability at its heart now awaits US\$15,000 funding.

Dear everyone,

First of all a big thanks to Mike Forrester who is continuing to do a superb job on my web page where you can find some new pictures:

www.millennium-ride.com

Tegucigalpa (Tegus), Honduras — Right, I'm out of here now. I just picked up the project proposal of the national Health Ministry, to train their 526 riders in basic preventative maintenance, and am heading to Nicaragua to continue my trip through Central America. I shall take the mountain road to the border.

It is always exciting to be off on the road again. I have been in this area only a week but am looking forward to seeing what's over the next mountain range.

It amazes me how every time I ride on super roads with breathtaking scenery I could swear that they are the best in the world!

In England we have rolling hills.

In Honduras they are rolling mountains, dressed with delicious smelling pine forests, which are a pure delight to journey through. The ride from Guatemala was fabulous including a 100km stretch of dirt road.

On the tarmac the nobbly rear tyre is wearing sufficiently to smooth out the high speed wiggles of my 400kg motorcycle. The biggest problem with nobbly tyres is that they encourage me to venture off up steep dirt and rocky tracks just for the sake of it. My newest trick is to stop and turn around before falling off!

Honduras, with 26 years of democratically elected government, is home to a generally content but pessimistic lot of people. It is one of the most sparsely populated and poorest countries around here. Compared to their neighbours who had civil war until recently you would have thought Honduras to be better developed socially and economically.

But no.

Today's newspaper comments that half of the people think their parents lived better at the same age and that their children will be worse off than they are at this age. I can't see any reason for this, but of course if the people believe it then it will be! Shopkeepers, receptionists and everyone will happily tell you they can't help when they actually can, so doing any sort of business here can be rather taxing. My hotel landlord believes that it is because the establishment is so corrupt.

Having children outside marriage is the norm and A.I.D.S. is a big problem. Last night a woman said we could "hace amor" if I gave her a 10 Limpira (0.70c) gift. I decided against it.

Massive banana corporations spray poisonous pesticides over the crop here. Local people are warned not to go outdoors and the soil and water is ruined. Think again about those big unblemished bananas we buy in the west.

As I head south the temparature is rising. So naturally when I saw a group

of local youths swimming in a river I stopped for a dip. The locals were climbing the steep bank and walking out on an overhanging tree branch then jumping 5-10 metres into the river.

I heard sniggers of 'gringo, as I joined them. A gringo to these people is anyone with light coloured eyes. The origin of the name is said to come from "green go", telling green uniformed U.S.A. soldiers to go home.

I'm not really sure whether to be offended or not when people snigger "gringo" just within earshot - it is not clear if it is meant in a derogatory way. Health Care Bill Needs Motorcyclists' Support

Transportation and Recreational Activities Act introduced in congress by senators Russ Feingold (D-WI) and Susan Collins (R-ME), would prohibit health insurance providers from denying benefits to following along, Washington police injured motorcyclists.

In recent years, some insurance companies have refused to provide coverage for insureds involved in motorcycle accidents or other so-called "risky" activities such as skiing, horseback riding, snowmobiling, off-road biking and A.T.V. riding. Bikers and Motorcycle Rights Organizations worked hard during the mid-90's to convince congress to include language in the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 to bar insurers from denying coverage to injured riders, but a loophole in H.I.P.A.A. allows insurers to continue the discriminatory practice.

S. 423 would "promote health-care coverage parity for individuals participating in legal recreational activities or legal transportation activities," by closing the loophole and prohibiting employers from refusing to cover motorcycle related injuries in the health care coverage they provide their employees.

Washington's "Helmet is a **Helmet" Bill Passes Senate**

A helmet definition bill passed the Washington state senate on March 11 by

S. 423, the *Health Care Parity for Legal* law to state that a helmet is a hard shell with a padded liner, a chin strap, and a D.O.T. sticker affixed by the manufacturer.

Senator, you didn't get calls from a bunch of bikers. You got calls from 200 registered voters! From 200 taxpayers. What kind of elected official are you to say 'Ignore them'?!!"

This "little training fund" was created by motorcyclists, for motorcyclists and has never cost the non-motorcyclist citizens of Utah one cent in its twn years of operations, claims A.B.A.T.E. "It has trained well over 3,000 new motorcyclists in Utah and many motorcyclists attribute the declining motorcycle death rate in Utah to this program, at a time when national fatality rates are soaring," said Bojanower.

The bill also calls for the "Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs to coordinate with the criminal justice training commission to ensure that issues related to motorcycle profiling are addressed in basic law enforcement training and offered in regional training for in-service law enforcement officers at all levels."

HB 2002 defines "motorcycle profiling" as "using the fact that a person rides a motorcycle or wears motorcyclerelated paraphernalia as a factor in deciding to stop and question, take enforcement action, arrest, or search a person or vehicle with or without legal basis under the United States constitution or the Washington state constitution."

Tennessee Bikers Hope To Make Some Changes

Another state with its hands full this legislative session is Tennessee, where the Concerned Motorcyclists of Tennessee/ A.B.A.T.E. is actively supporting numerous pieces of legislation, including two companion helmet repeal bills in the House and Senate (HB0952 / SB0861), companion Stop Light Bills to allow motorcyclists to proceed through a nonfunctioning traffic signal (HB1054 / SB1200), bills to allow the use of pulsating brake lights (HB1819 / SB1765), biker anti-discrimination bills (HB1899 / SB1863), bills to create an off-highway motor vehicle program (HB1568 / SB0875), and a Senate Joint Resolution to designate May as "Motorcycle Awareness Month" (SJR0104).

"Each of these bills will afford "This bill is currently running through motorcyclists in Tennessee to practice their choice of transportation/recreation with more freedom and enhanced safety and enjoyment," said Steve Lundwall, State Director of CMT/A.B.A.T.E. and a newly elected member of the NCOM Board of Directors.

A.B.A.T.E. of South Dakota **Needs Help Getting Law** Changed

A.B.A. T.E. of South Dakota is trying to get a law changed, and could use some out of state help. This law affects all riders that travel to Sturgis, and is unfair.

The handlebar height limit in South Dakota is strictly enforced, particularly during Sturgis Bike Week, and A.B.A.T.E. of South Dakota is working to get it changed. "One argument used is that in other instances, if a vehicle is legal in its home state, it is legal for temporary use in another state," says A.B.A.T.E. "Yet, South Dakota tags out-of-state visitors for an equipment violation that could be legal in the tourist's home state. Reciprocity on legal motor vehicle equipment could help South Dakota tourism, image, and revenue."

A.B.A.T.E. of South Dakota is requesting assistance from out of state riders to help convince their legislature that this is an issue people are concerned about and it needs to be addressed.

"If any non-resident actually gets a ticket for handlebar height violations, we need to know," said Al Luze, editor of A.B.A. T.E. of South Dakota's newsletter, Freedom Flyer. "We are planning to discuss this issue with the highway patrol,





and with any luck, this coming summer we may be able to at least keep the state cops from harassing out of state riders. We will keep you updated."

E.P.A. Ignores Issue of Motorcycle Rider Safety



Washington, D.C. - According to a study commissioned by the Motorcycle Riders Foundation (M.R.F.), the Environmental Protection Agency's (E.P.A.) proposed new emissions standards regulating highway motorcycles "ignore the issue of rider safety."

"None of the major *E.P.A.* documents that discuss the proposed standards even make a single mention of either 'rider safety' or 'consumer safety,'" observed Garrett A. Vaughn, Ph.D., author of the study. "The *E.P.A.*'s analysis shows remarkable little evidence that the agency has made any serious effort to meet its obligation under the Clean Air Act to consider 'potential impacts on safety." Dr. Vaughn cites burn hazards to riders, passengers and passersby, particularly children.

In its public comment on the *E.P.A.* proposal, the *M.R.F.* expanded on the danger of heat-induced rider fatigue. "...[M]otorcycles equipped with catalytic converters...impose the threat of heat injuries (e.g., heat stress, heat stroke) and may increase injuries and fatalities due to rider fatigue and particularly the loss of faculties and impaired judgment symptomatic of heat injuries."

For example, the catalyzer aboard one particular 2003 European superbike is nested with the exhaust system beneath the saddle. After only a two-minute idle on a 70-degree day, an infrared thermometer registered 140 degrees when pointed at the top of the heat shield adjacent to the saddle, according to Cycle World Magazine's January 2003 issue. And according to some of the manufacturers the M.R.F. has consulted, the core temperatures in catalytic converters on motorcycles can exceed 1,500 degrees. Pipes and adjacent materials can remain dangerously hot for several hours after turning off the engine.

The *M.R.F.*'s public comments to the *E.P.A.* regarding these proposed rules continued to address this important lifethreatening issue, stating, "There will be a human cost to equipping motorcycles with catalyzers, and that cost will be measured in injuries and fatalities."

The Vaughn study was paid for solely with emergency contributions to the *M.R.F.* by individual motorcyclists and state motorcyclists' rights organizations nationwide, and is available in its entirety in pdf format on the *M.R.F.*'s website at

www.mrf.org. The Motorcycle Riders Foundation is the only membership-based national motorcyclists' rights organization headquartered in Washington DC devoted exclusively to the street rider.

THE E.P.A. RULES - AND YOU GET NO VOTE!

Newcomers to the nation's capitol got an unexpected introduction to democracy when two staffers with the Environmental Protection Agency (E.P.A.) explained the agency's rulemaking process this way: "You get no vote!"

These chilling remarks were made repeatedly on Monday, March 3, 2003 by E.P.A. staff attending the American Motorcyclist Association's (A.M.A.) "Introduction to Washington," an educational seminar designed to provide tools to citizens eager to make a difference in Washington. The comments were made in connection with the E.P.A.'s proposed rulemaking on highway motorcycle emissions standards. At the A.M.A.'s invitation, the M.R.F. participated in the conference with Government Relations Vice President Tom Wyld presenting the M.R.F.'s views on the E.P.A.'s proposed standards and other federal issues.

"The Clean Air Act has left us an ironclad regulatory process that lends a dull ear to the citizen's voice," said Wyld, noting that in a September 22, 2002 news release, the *M.R.F.* decried "a regulatory process where the voice of consumers and thousands of small businesses carries no weight."

In their January 2003 public comments to the *E.P.A.* on this proposed rulemaking, the *M.R.F.* stated that, "motorcycles equipped with catalytic converters impose a burn hazard to riders, passengers and passers-by. Moreover, cat-equipped motorcycles impose the threat of heat injuries (e.g., heat stress, heat stroke) and may increase injuries and fatalities due to rider fatigue and particularly the loss of faculties and impaired judgment symptomatic of heat injuries."

However, in addition to their comments at the A.M.A. seminar on the rulemaking process, E.P.A. staffers dismissed these long-standing rider safety concerns as "consumer" or "manufacturer" problems, distinctly not the E.P.A.'s problem. (Curiously, when air bags claimed the lives of children, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration admitted tacitly at least some culpability by launching an effort aimed at "air bag safety.")

These *E.P.A.* staffers also stated categorically that they had never heard from the *Motorcycle Riders Foundation* on the pending rulemaking. However, seminar attendees Cheryl Pearre of *A.B.A.T.E. of Illinois* and Kirk Willard of *A.B.A.T.E. of Wisconsin*, as well as Ed Moreland of the *A.M.A.*, corrected the record and the *M.R.F.* appreciates their willingness to do so. In fact, the *M.R.F.* has been very active in the regulatory process, as indicated below:

1. The M.R.F. filed public comments

published its advanced notice of proposed rulemaking in late 2000.

- 2. The M.R.F., accompanied by a representative of A.B.A.T.E. of Illinois, briefed the White House Office of Management and Budget with two *E.P.A.* staffers present (a member of E.P.A.'s Office of General Counsel, and the Executive Assistant to E.P.A.Administrator Christie Whitman) in October 2001.
- 3. The M.R.F., again accompanied by a representative of A.B.A. T.E. of Illinois, briefed a high-ranking E.P.A. official in January 2002.
- 4. The *M.R.F.* delivered testimony before the *E.P.A.* at its public hearing in September 2002 in Ann Arbor, Michigan, which was transcribed by the E.P.A. itself.
- 5. The M.R.F. submitted a request to extend the public comment deadline, which included further commentary on the proposed rulemaking, in September 2002.
- 6. The M.R.F., accompanied by representatives of A.B.A. T.E. of Wisconsin,

with the agency when the E.P.A. met with another E.P.A. policy official on small business concerns in December 2002.

> 7. The M.R.F. filed public comments on the proposed rulemaking in January 2003. This submission included "An Economic Analysis of the E.P.A.'s Proposed Emission Standards for On-Highway Motorcycles" prepared by Garrett A. Vaughn, Ph.D., commissioned by the M.R.F. and paid for by emergency donations by S.M.R.O.s [State Motorcycle Rights Organizations] and other concerned groups and individuals.

> E.P.A. staff did admit to reading the study, having received multiple copies.

> All of the M.R.F.'s written communication with the E.P.A. is available at www.mrf.org.

> "Motorcyclists will descend on Washington to visit 200 Congressmen and Senators in the next eight weeks," said Wyld. "Even if these citizens 'get no vote' in the iron-clad regulatory process - on a rule that squarely impacts their health, safety, lifestyle and livelihood - their members of Congress most assuredly do get a vote on this rulemaking!"

The legislation recreational activities. Essentially, the aims at promoting health care parity for regulation grants protective status to individuals participating in legal motorcyclists without any substantive transportation and recreational activities- benefits. activities like motorcycling, snowmobiling, horseback riding, running who participates in motorcycling, or walking. This legislation addresses a loophole caused by a Department of Health and Human Services' rule making it possible for health care coverage to be denied to those who are injured while participating in these activities. Feingold was joined by Senator Susan Collins (R-ME) in introducing this legislation.

"From riding Harley-Davidson motorcycles to visiting the Snowmobile Hall of Fame in St. Germain, these activities are part of Wisconsin's heritage and economy," Feingold said. "It simply doesn't make sense to exclude those participating in these activities from Activities Act. health care benefits."

As background, self-insured employers and unions have been known to deny health benefits to their motorcyclist employees and union members. These unfair measures had been adopted on the questionable advice of third party cost of insurance premiums low.

On August 21, 1996 an important opportunity arose when President Clinton signed the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (H.I.P.A.A.), prohibiting employers from denying health care coverage based on a worker's pre-existing medical conditions or participation in legal activities.

Administration released the final rules that would govern the law. The rules recognize that employers cannot refuse health care coverage to an employee on hearing is scheduled for March 27 at the basis of their participation in a 10:30A.M. on this and other related

"Because of this loophole, someone snowmobiling, running or walking could be denied health care coverage, while someone who is injured while drinking and driving a car would be protected," Feingold said. "It is time that Congress corrected this so that those who are abiding by the law are not denied coverage."

The A.M.A. urges all motorcyclists and those involved in any other type of recreational activity— to contact their members of congress and ask them to support S.423, The Health Care Parity for Legal Transportation and Recreational

Massachusetts Senate Bill 1351, sponsored by Senator Richard T. Moore (D - Worcester and Norfolk) on behalf of Paulette Zazza, should be of great concern of all riders.

This legislation, entitled *Petition To* administrators in an effort to keep the Improve Safety For Passengers Of Motorcycles, would prohibit any person 16 years of age or younger from riding as a passenger on a motorcycle on any Massachusetts roadway.

Massachusetts motorcyclists should contact their legislators immediately and let them know how such legislation would affect their family's values. Illinois companion bills HB 123 and SB21 have been positively voted out of both transportation committees. These bills are now in their respective houses for consideration. There were no dissenting votes in committee.

The language, requested by the *Illinois* Motorcyclist's Rights Association (I.M.R.A.), has to do with the "Green Light Trigger" product showcased in the new products section of the October 2002 American Motorcyclist magazine. The language specifically does not prohibit use by motorcycles of electronic or magnetic safety devices designed to allow traffic control signal systems to recognize or detect motorcycles.

Connecticut senators have introduced three bills to prevent or restrict children from riding as passengers on motorcycles. These bills assume that legislators know better than parents when a child should be allowed to ride as a passenger on a motorcycle.

Senate Bill 79, introduced by senator Catherine Cook (R-Mystic), would forbid a child from being a passenger on a motorcycle. The bill was referred to the Joint Committee on Transportation on January 15, 2003.

Senate Bill 269, introduced by senator Toni Nathaniel Harp (D-New Haven), would prohibit anyone under the age of nine from riding as a passenger on a motorcycle. This bill was referred to the Joint Committee on Transportation on January 21, 2003.

Senate Bill 614, introduced by senator Joan Hartley (D-Waterbury), would prohibit anyone under the age of ten and weighing less than eighty pounds or less than four feet six inches in height from

Tennessee House Bill 952 and Senate Bill 861, sponsored by representative Tidwell in the House and senator Burchett in the Senate, would allow adults 21 years of age or older to choose whether to wear a helmet or not.

House Bill 1054 and Senate Bill1200 would allow motorcyclists to treat "nonfunctioning" traffic-control signals as stop signs. If you come to a red light which won't change and allow you to pass through it due to your motorcycle not 'tripping' the magnetic-field sensor you could proceed with caution. These bills are sponsored by representative McCord in the House and senator Clabough in the Senate.

West Virginia House Bill 2431, introduced by Rep. Dale Manuel (D-Jefferson), would require helmet use by all A.T.V. operators under the age of 18.

Senate Bill 104, introduced by senator Michael Oliverio II (D-Monongalia), would require helmet use by minors and

16 from operating A.T.V.s of 250cc or greater displacement. Additionally, SB104 would prohibit any operator from carrying a passenger on certain machines or operating an A.T.V. on a state road or highway.

House Bill 2130, introduced by representaive Barbara Fleischauer (D-Monongalia), is similar to the Oliverio bill except that it would prohibit the sale of A.T.V.s with a displacement of more than 90cc for use by anyone under the age of 16.

Washington (state) Senate Highways and Transportation Committee chairman Jim Horn (R-Mercer Island) has introduced a bill that would require signs to be posted alerting motorcyclists of hazards caused by construction work.

Under Senate Bill 5457, if any construction, repair or maintenance work presents a special hazard to motorcycles, the work location must be posted with signs warning motorcyclists of the hazard. The proposal calls for Department of Transportation to create a uniform sign for this purpose, and such a sign must include at least the following language: "Motorcycles use extreme caution."

"For motorcyclists, it can be very dangerous to ride along a road or highway and suddenly come across a work site that has loose gravel, a grade separation or an abrupt edge," said Horn.. "These types of hazards provide minimal risk to cars but can often be fatal for motorcyclists. This bill gives motorcyclists some advance notice that these types of conditions exist within the work site."

The measure has been referred to the Senate Highways and Transportation Committee and is supported by the Washington Road Riders Association.

U.S. House Resolution 652, the National Forest Ecosystem Protection Act,



was introduced by representaive Robert Andrews (D-NI).

HR 652 would: 1) Eliminate all commercial grazing on national forests; 2) Eliminate all recreation (except primitive recreation i.e.: hiking) in areas adjacent to wilderness areas; 3) Require the Forest Service to prepare an environmental assessment; a) for study for wilderness suitability for all primitive lands extending from existing designated wilderness areas; b) to discuss ecological advantage of closing all "unimproved roads" in the study area; 4) Authorize appropriations to: a) spend \$5 million to purchase private property within designated wilderness areas in the west; b) spend \$100 million to purchase private property within primitive areas extending from existing designated wilderness areas in the east; 5) Close all unimproved, unmapped, and non-system roads in primitive areas extending from existing designated wilderness areas.

Write to the two committees considering the bill and ask them to take no action on House Resolution 652. The committees are: House Committee on Agriculture, chairman Bob Goodlatte, 1301 Longworth HOB, Washington, D.C. 20515 and House Committee on Resources, chairman Richard Pombo, 1324 Longworth HOB, Washington, DC 20515.

A Letter from Luke—1975

Well, we did it-after sitting on our duffs around here all these years, we finally got into the battle. A far cry form the past when on a couple occasions, 32 or 57 people made a strike at the mandatory helmet law: 500 motorcycles rode in one pack to the Capitol Building in Salem, Oregon, Sunday, September 21.

What a sight!

It all sort of began a few weeks ago in the Oregon State Penitentiary at a meeting of the Screaming Eagles Motorcycle Club. (Oregon being one of the few states allowing such social activities—a story by itself.) This seemed to be the one place several clubs come together.

someone—let's start doing something about adverse motorcycle legislation besides sniveling! We decided our best bet would be to coordinate with an established, wide-spread organization: *A.B.A.T.E.*

On August 22, an attorney who is helping us, Don Chambers, my lady Nancy Christopher, and myself, went to Salem and incorporated A.B.A. T.E. of Oregon—a non-profit organization to deal with bummer ride laws.

We will be meeting once a month, but have been meeting once a week flyers, got radio announcements, up till now to get the job done. We contacted everyone we could again, had our first meeting August 26th and and decided we could station some wasted little time electing a board of people at the fair-grounds with new directors and stating our aims, getting maps to hand out to those showing down to serious business: having a up there. > After a few hours of sleep, we managed to get the place cleaned up, and by word of mouth passed on the ride-to-the-Capitol plan. At 11:00, we rode out-some 500 motorcycles, 700 people. We maintained 45 mph in one nice tight pack using our own traffic controllers.

What a sight!

At one point you come down a grade into a 2-mile straightaway. Looking back, I couldn't see the end of that snake. I mean, it blew my mind!

We rode our predetermined route, arriving at the Capitol building right on schedule. Standing on the steps, I thought the scooters would never quit coming.

Well, it's not an election year, and we haven't attracted much attention yet in some areas, so there weren't any government people there and not much media coverage, so everyone sat on and around the steps and listened to me rap a few words about *A.B.A. T.E.*, where we are at and where we are going.

Everyone seemed to be pretty together.

I am pleased to tell you that we have received an unexpected degree of support from both our senators and congressmen.

At the top of our list of issues mentioned in the March newsletter was TEA-21 (03). congressman Peter DeFazio has once again proven himself to be a great friend to motorcyclists through his overwhelming support regarding this issue as will be made evident in the near future, so watch for media reports concerning the *Transportation Equity Act* of the 21st Century and *T.E.A.*-03. If you can attend his scheduled town hall meetings throughout the state, please do so and thank him for his help.

The next concern was that of *E.P.A.*'s tough new emission standards. Senator Gordon Smith is taking this agency to task and is holding their feet to the fire on your behalf. Again, while I can't be very specific, the Senator has been very accommodating to *A.B.A.T.E.*

The *H.I.P.P.A.* issue is being addressed by senator Ron Wyden, who has made clear his concern for health issues over the years. His cosponsorship of legislation correcting the faults we have noted is hoped for in this session.

These three fine gentlemen are the most powerful Oregonians in Washington, DC. Each was kind enough to meet face to face with the members of our team which also

included Tom Wyld, vice-president of governmental affairs for the Motorcycle Rider's Foundation. Tom, a full time lobbyist was overjoyed at the results we obtained and assured us that this is not at all common on capitol hill. It never ceases to amaze me how the truly great men of this world always seem to find time for the common man. These are results that we are aware of. Other congressmen and women made aides available that will carry our message to those who can only add to the support we've already received. Time will show that your money has been well spent, and that a great deal was accomplished on your behalf. Remember, also, unprecedented number of states, twenty to be more precise, will accompany Tom between now and May. If they are half as successful as we were lucky enough to be, the face of motorcycling will only change for the better.
