A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments (A.B.A.T.E.).

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce H.R.3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet laws.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California and Ed Armstrong of A.B.A. T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the *D.O.T.* because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet law mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the *1975 Federal Highway Act*, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years, first to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

10 March 2007 - Eagles - Albany, Oregon

Meeting was called to order by Ed Vaughn, state coordinator, at 12:13 p.m. with 13 of 13 chapters represented, all eligible to vote.

Pledge of allegiance.

Guests and first time attendees were Mike Durkee from *Central Oregon*, Bill Foster, Hilda from *Lincoln County*.

Motion was made by Randy and seconded by Mel to adopt the previous month's minutes as printed in the newsmagazine. Motion passed unanimously.

Coordinator's comments: Ed Vaughn reported that *South Coast* has turned in their charter. We are down one chapter to 13. The chapter's funds were distributed as follows: 1/3 to *BikePAC*, 1/3 to the *M.R.F.* and 1/3 to *A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon* state coffers.

Correspondence: There are newsletters from out of state for anyone to look at, if they want.

Vice-coordinator—north: Excused due to having to work.

Vice-coordinator-south: No report.

Vice-coordinator-east: Vacant.

Membership secretary: We currently have 2,179 members. Special thanks to Trace Ceccacci for his help with the *Paradox* program.

Treasurer: Reported a total of \$11,951.05 in checking and savings. Stated that we are spending far more than we are making.

State auditor: Given by Margo Virchow. The chapter treasurers need to continue to report to Margo while Deb get things set up. This will be

accomplished very soon. All files have been turned over to the accountant for 2006. Everyone needs to keep up with their reporting. Many are late. See the handout for needed information and to see how your chapter is doing in keeping up their reports. State representatives need to get this information to the chapter treasurer. Each chapter's treasurer report needs to be sent in by the 20th of each month.

Newsmagazine editor: Rot Path stated that her will be absent next month's meeting.

He has all of the chapter reports except for eight chapters are late.

Reported that he received a request for an advertisement from Mike [Friend] (Shriners' toy run) for the newsmagazine and wanted to know if we could run it for free. It was [requested] by the *Musicians Toy Run Benefit* which is hosted by Francine West who is performing at *Fossil*. [Can it] be run, full page, for free for the next nine months? Tobias Read is the swing vote needed to get this out of committee and on to the floor of the house. Sam Hochberg and other will be visiting him very soon. Representative Read's philosophy has been the right to choose but it seems that his philosophy does not include helmet

There is a representative on the floor who is still "on the fence" and can't decide which way to go. He is Greg McPhereson.

The situation with HB-2399 [helmet amendment] is that it is still stuck in committee.

The hearing on the insurance bill, S-356, had only four attending. There should have been more. Presentations were given by Sam Hochberg and others. More would have been better. Sam, Mel, Wayne,

and Brian will be following up on getting information requested by the chair of the committee regarding refusals of insurance coverage by group insurance companies in regards to motorcycling. They need any and all information they can get, not only from Oregon but from other states as well. If you have any information or if you know of anyone hurt and refused benefits from an insurance company, let Mel, Wayne, Sam, or Brian know right away. It was noted that the federal government had noted a flaw and corrected it at their level until the insurance companies made a mess of that good effort. They made it so that they can carry on with business as usual, collect premiums but can refuse to pay benefits for an injury incurred while riding a motorcycle.

The question was raised about Oregon going to an annual legislative session. It was noted that this would change things a lot in getting through all the proposed bills (about 7,000–8,000 this session.) No vote has been taken on this issue, as yet.

For your information: The A.T.V. bill has been defeated already.

Sergeant at arms—north: There are 2 events coming up, the Swap Meet and Fossil. Randy will be contacting each chapter regarding them providing people to serve on Security and other needs. It is each chapter's responsibility to provide this help for State events.

Sergeant at arms—south: Vacant. Sergeant at arms—east: Vacant.

Products director: Excused. Ed said that if anyone has *Fossil* art that they should give it to him.

Education director: (Patricia) Thanks to all the people that attended and helped out at S.T.E.A.M.

Discussion ensued regarding possibly moving S.T.E.A.M. next year due to problems with *Chemeketa College*.

Regarding the lawsuit against *Team Oregon*: check out the web site "Moon Rider" as this is a very reliable source for information. Moon Rider can be found by a *Google* search or through *Yahoo*. Do not ask *Team Oregon* about the lawsuit as they are not allowed to talk about it.

GUNNY'S SACK

Spring is on the way, even if it isn't in the air just yet where you are. I'm starting to look forward to the start of runs and get-to-gathers around the state of Oregon. The beginning is the *National Coalition of Motorcyclists* (*N.C.O.M.*) convention in Charlotte, North Carolina. Takes place the 10th through the 13th of May 2007.

I'm telling ya folks, this conference is going to be the best ever. In all the years I've attended these gatherings, they just get bigger and better every year. We learn more and thereby enable our home organizations to function at ever higher levels. If you ever needed a reason to get fired up to work on the behalf of your brothers and sisters in preserving our freedoms in this country, these N.C.O.M. conventions are an absolute must for you to attend. I'll tell ya up front: When you go, be ready to put in a few days of intensive work, soaking up the information provided at the many seminars.

Every state motorcyclist rights organization (S.M.R.O.) across this country should send at least two people to represent their interests and many already do. The various Confederations of Clubs (C.O.C.) will each have two or more representatives there. If you bring two, you can cover most of the sessions during the busy days. You will meet and talk with people from all over the country, all in the same struggle as the rest of us, for the right to make our own decisions on the many issues we face, and struggling for laws to forbid discrimination against riders in health insurance and public accommodations.

I won't say we don't party some at these gatherings. Sometimes, that's where you get the most information for your folks at home, by just hanging with some of the masters. Just be able to get up the next day for the daily activities. The types of discrimination we face are several. There's the problem when we travel and are refused ordinary courtesies in public accommodations. And the law still allows it in Oregon.

We face issues on medical insurance discrimination (see below), and we've had seminars on how the *U.S.A.P.A.T.R.I.O.T. Act** can and has been used against bikers. Come to the *N.C.O.M.* convention, and get some ammunition to bring home to fight with.

Make your reservations now so you don't miss out on a single part of this important aspect of our fight for freedom. The convention will be at the Hilton Charlotte University Place Hotel in Charlotte, North Carolina, but the hotel is already full. Representative Barbara Marumoto, R-Waialae, has decided Hawaii riders need to be protected from themselves. She introduced HB–57, a new mandatory helmet law for that state.

This is just one of the attempts all over the U.S.A. to take freedom of choice away from people that have the God-given intelligence to make their own safety and clothing decisions.

Now, big kudos to Oklahoma's bikers, who got busy and stopped the attempt to put a mandatory helmet law on 'em there!

This from *N.C.O.M.*'s own Tiger Mike, reporting in to the *Sack* for his state.

Harrisburg, Pennsylvania: Harley-Davidson's workers approved a deal and ended the strike at the York, Pennsylvania bike factory. They've been shut down for three weeks now. Maybe the wait won't be too long now to take delivery on a new ride!

Washington, D.C: The American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.) says that bipartisan bills have been reintroduced in both the house and senate that would end healthcare discrimination against motorcyclists and anyone else in any other legal recreational activity, at least in federally-controlled health plans, like most union plans, for example. Like some predecessor bills, this would prevent health insurance discrimination against citizens who take part in legal, recreational

activities, like riding our bikes; at least to the extent the fed controls your type of insurance. Well, things are getting better, folks, with all these people in the new congress on our side. But the battle is not won yet! All riders should send letters of support on this bill to your members of congress, or call their offices in Washington D.C. or locally, but let 'em know.

The same fight is playing out here in Oregon: BikePAC of Oregon supports SB-356, which would prevent Oregon-authorized general health carriers (that's those health plans not governed by federal laws, such as "ERISA"), from excluding health benefits for injuries while riding. Our Oregon A.I.M. lawyer, m'boss Sam Hochberg, has jumped into the fray, along with a lot of other dedicated bikers at the capitol. Sam drove down to Salem and testified at a committee hearing on SB-356. He came at it a little differently this time, and appeared officially on behalf of our state's Trial Lawyers' Association, O. T.L.A., which supports this bill. He also made sure the committee knew he was also testifying as a rider, and as a lawyer who does motorcycle law.

So, Oregon bikers: join us in Salem and help out on this bill and on all the other biker bills.

To coordinate your effort most effectively, contact *BikePAC* of *Oregon*. They're online at http://www.bikepac.com Get advice on the particulars before you go. If you're not online, Call *BikePAC*'s legislative director and longtime Oregon biker activist, Brian Stovall, at (541)-340-9442. Talk to them and get yourself dialed in to help, up front and in person.

Massachusetts: New motorcycle

awareness signs are available by way of a \$15,000 grant from Plymouth Rock Insurance Company, according to the Massachusetts Motorcycle Association. (M.M.A.) They're trying to bring motorcycle awareness to the forefront, before the springtime rush of riders, and has decided to use their grant money to create and put up signs all around the state, to remind drivers to keep motorcyclists in mind. I can't believe there's any opposition to placing these signs around the state but there is just that from some officials. They say they're afraid other groups will want the same privileges.

I think I've mentioned in the past in one of these *Sacks*, something about the use of frontal lobotomies by some folks, once they're elected.

More Oregon: [c.o.e. note – The bill mentioned in this section was withdrawn after massive protests from the A.T.V. community. This Sack was written and sent before the bill was defeated.]

Riders take heed of SB-49, which would outlaw A.T.V. and motorcycle riding for all kids under age 12, even on your private property, and limit riders under 16 to vehicles 90 cc's or less. The full text is at http:// www.leg.state.or.us This bill for a new law was proposed without any consultation with the Oregon riding community. We have to weigh in on this legislation. Go see your legislators, and contact BikePAC of Oregon first, to get a bead on what you're doing, on any biker-related bill. If you can't take the time to visit, next best thing is your phone call to your own legislator. Be sure to let other riders know about this important issue. I'm gettin' real tired of big brother.

New Jersey: Assembly bill 3701 was introduced by assemblywoman Alison Littell McHose (R-Sparta), and it would establish a lane splitting task force to focus on whether to allow motorcycles to ride between lanes of vehicle traffic during times of congestion.

American Motorcyclist Association

The American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.) announced that bipartisan bills have been introduced in both the U.S. house of representatives and U.S. senate that would end healthcare discrimination against motorcyclists, A.T.V. enthusiasts, and participants in other legal recreational activities.

U.S. representatives Michael C. Burgess (R-Texas) and Bart Stupak (D-Michigan) introduced HR–1076, the *H.I.P.A.A. Recreational Injury Technical Correction Act*. On the same day, senators Susan Collins (R-Maine) and Russ Feingold (D-Wisconsin) introduced identical companion legislation, S–616.

The bills seek to bar employers from discriminating against those who take part in activities such as motorcycling, A.T.V. riding, skiing, snowmobiling or horseback riding in the health-insurance programs they offer their workers.

H.I.P.A.A. originally prohibited employers from denying healthcare coverage based on a worker's pre-existing medical conditions or participation in legal activities, such as motorcycling. But later federal bureaucrats reversed the law, writing rules to allow health-insurance discrimination against motorcyclists and others who engage in legal activities like A.T.V. riding, or horseback riding. Employees were guaranteed the right to healthcare coverage, but not guaranteed any benefits under those plans.

Motorcyclists were outraged when federal bureaucrats went against the

will of congress, and the A.M.A. immediately lobbied legislators to right this wrong. Others involved in the effort include the All-Terrain Vehicle Association, the American Council of Snowmobile Associations, the American Horse Council, the Blue Ribbon Coalition, the Motorcycle Industry Council, Motorcycle Riders Foundation, and the National Ski Areas Association.

Bakersfield A.M.A. life member Steve Montgomery is working toward getting more motorcycle parking spots marked off around this California town. Montgomery discussed the proposal with city officials during a regular session of the planning and development committee.

Montgomery's request for designated motorcycle parking is apparently the first such formal one the city has received, officials said.

While the idea was greeted with relatively positive comments, two roadblocks popped up.

- First, the parking spots would require sign, something that likely won't be popular with downtown business owners.
- Second, the signs would cost roughly \$150 to \$200 a piece, planning staffers estimated.

The three-member committee voted unanimously to postpone a

vote until the next committee meeting April 5. In the meantime, Montgomery will meet with downtown business owners. City staffers will draw up a more precise inventory of possible spots.

Arizona house bill HB–2051 to remove the \$150,000 cap from the *Motorcycle Safety Fund (M.S.F.)* passed the appropriations committee about three weeks ago and the rules committee on 27 February 2007. It was immediately put on the schedule for *Committee of the Whole (C.O.W.)* during house floor session, where amendments could be voted on. As soon as it passes *C.O.W.*, it will go for a floor vote of all house members and then on to the senate for the same process.

A Colorado bill that would require kids under 18 to wear helmets is working its way through the legislature. House bill HB–1117 passed on an initial vote through the house. Proposed penalties would be steep with fines of \$125, including \$10 for the *Colorado Traumatic Brain Injury Trust Fund*, plus three points on a driver's license.

A.M.A. community council – treasure coast (Florida) president Frank Walsh has personally been ensuring that all stop lights in his area will recognize motorcycles.

Like anyone who has sat in the piezoelectrically operated box of a stop light on a motorcycle, for seemingly endless amounts of time, Walsh got fed up with going no where, decided to work with the surrounding municipalities and the county to re-calibrate all stoplights to recognize motorcycles. Walsh, who is a retired municipal worker from New York, spent countless hours volunteering his motorcycle for the calibration work.

Several states have recently enacted legislation that would provide for a positive defense should a motorcycle run these lights, as long as certain conditions are met. For more information on this type of legislation contact A.M.A. legislative affairs specialist Imre Szauter at isauter@ama-cycle.org For information on recalibrating the nuisance stoplight on your regular route contact the traffic authority in your area.

Several Massachusetts communities including Plymouth, Duxbury, Rochester, Mattapoisett, Pembroke, and now Carver are working to keep motorcycle drivers safe on the roads in their communities thanks to efforts from the Massachusetts Motorcycle Association. (M.M.A.)

M.M.A. has been instrumental in raising awareness of motorcyclists through its Motorcycle Safety Project. The group was able to help enact a bill in 2002, which led to governor Mitt Romney signing a proclamation in 2005 annually declaring the last

week of March through the last week of April as *Motorcycle Safety Awareness Period*.

In November of 2006 M.M.A. requested a grant from the Auto Insurer's Bureau to help fund the erection of motorcycle awareness signs in Massachusetts communities. Plymouth Rock Assurance Corporation awarded a \$15,000 grant to the M.M.A. to purchase and install 500 2-by-8-foot signs, which read Check twice - Save a life, MOTORCYCLES ARE EVERYWHERE!!!!!

The signs are constructed of *Coroplast*, a strong plastic material, in highly visible yellow with black lettering.

Representatives of *M.M.A.*, and now assisted by the *A.M.A.*, are seeking permission to install at least one sign per community. Massachusetts is one of the few states where motorcycle registrations have gone up and deaths have gone down. Traffic deaths dropped substantially in 16 states last year, in many cases reflecting stepped-up enforcement and education campaigns, according to a *U.S.A. Today* analysis of statistics reported by the states. Highway fatalities fell by at least 5% in those 16 states. In nine other states, deaths rose by at least that much. Texas and Georgia reported preliminary declines of more than 5%, but traffic safety

agencies in those states expect the final totals to rise significantly.

While the fatality numbers are preliminary and unofficial, they show startling drops in some states. Safety officials attribute the declines in part to coordinated programs aimed at careless or reckless driving.

Among other factors cited in states that had drops in traffic fatalities: stiffer drunken-driving laws, police checkpoints aimed at aggressive driving, improved highway design, and graduated license programs and other safety efforts targeting young drivers.

Several states are still collecting data from county and local law enforcement agencies and say their 2006 fatality figures could rise.

States report their highway death numbers to the *National Highway Traffic Safety Administration* (*N.H.T.S.A.*), which analyzes the figures before issuing a preliminary national fatality total. The 2006 total is not likely to show major changes from 2005. Since 1995, the annual total has ranged between 41,000 and 43,000.

In states where fatalities rose substantially, agencies cited increases in pedestrian deaths, aggressive driving, drunken driving and speeding as factors.

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Legislative Officer report March 2007



Mel Yeager state legislative director A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon

Several things have happened during the last month. *BikePAC* has issued three alerts to our list of riders willing to respond to a call to write letters, call legislators, or to visit the capitol in behalf of our biker issues. We depend on those contacts to spread the word to their fellows.

When the call went out, the response was overwhelming to our legislators. We have been asked to pass on a message to our members to hold up the mailings and contacts until we again need the response. The delay is to give us a chance to meet personally with legislators who are reluctant to vote in our behalf.

Everybody who took the time to write e-mails, make phone calls, or to write letters are to be thanked for their efforts. Brian Stovall, legislative director of *BikePAC* has been keeping track of the many, many contacts that were made.

There was a hearing on S–356 (our insurance issue) wherein Wayne Schumacher and Sam Hochberg presented testimony is behalf of motorcyclists. Representatives from the insurance industry also testified and stated that there are no instances of any person involved in a motorcycle wreck in Oregon being denied the benefits that were due.

Following the testimony, chair Monnes-Anderson then stated she would hold the bill until *BikePAC* could provide names and states where actual instances have occurred.

A call was immediately sent out to everybody on our mailing list, and

nationally as well, asking for that information. Sam Hochberg was asked to contact *N.C.O.M.*, Wayne was asked to contact *A.M.A.* and Mel Yeager was asked to contact *M.R.F.* to find out if there are instances of denial of benefits, anywhere. Lets all keep our eyes and ears open for any mention of injured riders having benefits denied. Lets also take a close look at the fine print of your personal health insurance to see if there is such a clause.

I note that in Washington D.C. The movement is afoot to correct the previous ruling that insurance companies providing group health coverage to businesses, etc. would also have to pay benefits as appropriate if someone is injured while operating a motorcycle. Previous language required that insurance companies would have to provide coverage but would not have to pay benefits.

All riders in Oregon must have the cooperation and mutual support of each other to accomplish our efforts this session. Let's all respond when the call is made and get done what we set out to do this time.

HB-2399 (our right to choose issue) is still being held in limbo. First we were told that we had to have a majority of yes votes from all legislators before HB-2399 would be brought up for consideration in committee. After the e-mail and letter writing blitz, along with the personal visits from bikers we feel we have a good chance to pass the issue of the house floor.

Now another problem has reared its biased head. One member of the committee has taken a stand that although he is in favor of the right to choose, it doesn't apply to bikers and their right to choose their gear or apparel. This is the main reason the halt on contacting legislators has been issued. It is to give our leaders a chance to meet with and brainstorm with our legislators who are reluctant to see things our way. We hope to convince them that a biker's right to choose is as important as any other choice people have to make in their lives.

I would ask for everyone check their e-mail twice daily. Once in the morning and again late at night. When the call goes our for response, there will be a very limited time to do so. Be ready to ride, make that couple of phone calls, or write that e-mail as needed. *BikePAC* is there to set the table, but we need everyone to come to the banquet.

Sprocket Holes

a motorcycle film review series by Rot Path (c.o.f.r.)

There's been a dearth of motorcycle flicks lately. Now we suddenly have two. Yer crusty ol' film reviewer (c.o.f.r.) just got back from viewin' *Wild Hogs*.

With Tim Allen as one of the main characters, c.o.f.r. was expectin' this flick to be to motorcyclists what *Galaxy Quest* was to the science fiction community. Unlike *Galaxy Quest*, this was an enjoyable one-watch-wonder, in this reviewer's not-so-humble opinion. In other words, Rot Path enjoyed the movie fer what it was but won't be buying it when it comes out on DVD because it's not the caliber of film to be viewed repeatedly.

That said, *Wild Hogs* is still worth seeing once, especially if you have any riding experience.

Without giving away the entire story, the basic premise of this movie is about finding what it means to be a biker by getting out on the road.

Four older school buddies of various successes are in the weekly habit of riding their *Harley*s down to the local.

Apparently they've been doing this fer almost twenty years.

Mid-life crises time.

The answer is a motorcycle road trip to the west coast. (Hollywood just can't get over its addiction to stereotypes.) Of course, when any scriptwriter types "west coast", they mean sunny Los Angeles, not anything cold and cloudy and rainy to the north.

There's a fair amount of slapstick, some of it involving bikes getting out of control, that lacks the aplomb of earlier masters of visual humor. And every time a riderless bike went tumbling to a crashing halt, yer c.o.f.r. cringed.

One character quotes unhelmeted injury statistics just before they set out. Nothing was offered up in the way of balance such as the fact that helmets don't prevent crashes. (Or how their statistical data was derived.) The supreme irony is

that for the remainder of the flick, the group was filmed riding with and without helmets as they crossed various southwest states. (It's that thousand word thing.)

Perhaps the high point of the movie is where a rider (recognizable from a classic biker film) appears briefly to make the point that real bikers aren't found on shiny new bikes in new leathers at a latte house or with old bikes and leathers in a club house. Real bikers are found out on the road. That's where the real freedom lies.

The road belongs to them what rides it. Some words of caution: Don't leave the theater before the credits start to roll. There is a wonderful parody of what happens to the movie's motorcycle gang clubhouse site.

Ghost Rider is based on an earlier Marvel comics series which in turn was derived from an old west legend. (Perhaps you remember the Johnny Cash song, Ghost Riders In The Sky?)

This movie is diversion and entertainment, pure and simple. Don't expect an insightful story line or deep probings of the human condition. This film is about visual impact and assaulting yer senses. (So don't sit too close to the front of the theater because a lot of the action fills the screen and you won't be able to take it all in.)

That said, should you go see it? You betcha.

Even anti-satanists can enjoy this flick because the devil looses. (Oops, there goes the ending. Ah well, it's more about *how* he looses anyway.)

The price of the matinee alone is worth seeing an already sweet Panhead chopper morph into a flaming bone bike. (Was the logging chain front fork design inspired by Indian Larry's last bike?)

And there is some fancy trick riding and incredible jumps that would awe even Evil.

Our life long biker buddy, Peter Fonda



of *Easy Rider* fame is there, though he doesn't get any ridin' time this time.

Yer crusty ol' film reviewer was surprised to find Nicolas Cage cast as lead in a motorcycle movie. He does a credible job and it's a harsh reviewer indeed who claims the flaming skull exhibited more character and acting skill.

Normally Rot Path would classify a movie like *Ghost Rider* as a one shot wonder: "Seen it once, know how it ends, don't need to see it again." But there are so many incredible visual effects that yer c.o.f.r. is going to have to go see it again and sit further back so it can all be taken in.

The image of two ghost riders, one on flaming horse, the other on flaming bike, are going to become favorite icons of bikers worldwide.

Will there be sequels?

The film makers definitely left that option open.

Trouble is, so much was put into this film that the question becomes, how can they top it with a sequel? Is there anywhere to go with another film?

And where's the closest store that sells *Marvel* comics?

With two movies out just now involving motorcycles, putting together a ride to go see them both would be a great weekend activity for any group of bikers. They may still be playing in places by the time this issue plops through yer letter box. If you decide you want to see it, go as a group and ride yer bikes to the movie house.

You'll all enjoy the experience and if you can park yer scoots in front of the the theater, you might be able to recruit more folks to *A.B.A. T.E.* and *BikePAC* when you start talkin' with folks who show an interest in yer bikes. (They'll be especially interested to talk and get a closer look after the movie, so don't leave right away.)

What could they possibly have in common?

Air-cooled engines.

With warmer weather easing its way back into our lives, it's a good idea to familiarize ourselves with the unique properties of the air-cooled engine, particularly as it applies to motorcycles.

Air-cooled engines don't have a lot of what could be called "thermal inertia" the way liquid-cooled do. That means that their temperature can vary quickly and widely depending on load, air circulation, and air temperature/ humidity. (Internal combustion engines are continually exploding a very flammable liquid that generates a lot of heat which has to go somewhere.)

When an engine has a radiator and a gallon or two of antifreeze/water circulating through the engine block, the overall engine temperature tends to stay more even because it takes a lot more energy to raise or lower the temperature of the liquid than it does of air. (Oceans do the same sort of thing for the earth's temperature, keeping it from fluctuating widely between night and day, summer and winter. The moon and mars have wildly varying temperatures simply because they have no liquid mass to regulate temperature.)

To see how this works, find two mugs that are as close to identical as your household allows. Fill them both with hot water and let them sit for about thirty seconds, them empty one of them out.

Now go away for five minutes. (If yer in a serious long-term relationship you can have intimate relations and a 4-1/2 minute nap.)

When you feel the mugs a few minutes later, the empty one (representing an air-cooled engine) will most likely be very close to room temperature while the one with water in it (yer smart enough to figure out which engine that represents) is still going to be pretty warm to the touch.


Of course yer air-cooled engine does have some liquid mass in it, doesn't it?

"Black gold."

"Texas T" and all that other BH

Part of the cooling that takes place in an air-cooled engine is due to the circulation of oil. The cooler the oil, the cooler-running the engine. (Better lubrication, less friction, more heat dissipation.) Which is why you see little radiators hooked up to so many aircooled bike's oil supplies - they are external oil coolers and they work a treat.

A really good source of information and outright laughter about keeping aircooled engines running cool is a book by John Muir (the VW mechanic, not the nature photographer) called *How To* Keep Your Volkswagen Alive – A Manual Of Step-By-Step- Procedures For The Complete Idiot. (ISBN 1-56691-310-1)



This book predates all the "dummy" books out there and is miles ahead of them in wit and wisdom.

Although it is written for owners, it's pretty

obvious to yer c.o.e. that many of the ideas and principles can be applied to air-cooled bike engines. (See the Rap On *Oil* piece in the maintenance section.)

Most public libraries and many used

book stores have well-thumbed copies in their automotive repair sections. It's still in print and fresh copies have been found in major book stores. (But as always, check out yer local independent books stores first so yer hard-earned money stays in your community.)

One problem pilots with air-cooled engines have is when letting down from higher altitudes. They pull the engine power back towards idle in order to descend. (As it is in aircraft, so it is with bikes - power equals altitude.) The engine cools quickly and if they are descending through air with higher humidity, the engine intake manifold can actually begin to form layers of frost or ice, starving the engine for air or actually making it shut off.

Motorcyclists (and air-cooled VW drivers) can experience similar symptoms when coasting down mountains or hills.

Pilots get around the problem by periodically revving the engine up a bit to warm it up and melt any frost that might be forming in the intake area.

That's a trick that bikers can use as well if an idling engine starts sounding a little rough.

Another problem that can crop up with carbonated air-cooled engines is when they are being run at a constant speed under certain conditions of temperature and humidity for an extended amount of time. Air speeding up through the throat of the carb cools down and gives up its moisture. If the carb gets cold enough, ice begins building up in the carb throat and get thick enough to choke off air to the engine. This can happen even when the air temperature is well above freezing.

This is called "carburetor icing" and is deadly to aircraft. It's an interesting inconvenience to bikers and VW cage drivers.

Aircraft get around the problem by

varying their throttle settings periodically or using what's called "carburetor heat". (Ducting around the hot exhaust manifold collects warm air and can be routed into the carburetor.) Carb heat reduces milage but it's far better than an "unintentional off-field landing". (*i.e.* Crashing.)

Yer crusty ol' editor has experienced carb ice with both his carbed motorcycle in the Willamette Valley and his over-carbed *VW* bus in California.

Telltale evidence of carb icing is frost on the body of the carburetor and a rough-running engine. (Because the air is so lean.)

Cures include varying throttle settings or pulling over and shutting down the engine long enough to let

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

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
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

the carbs warm up. (No doubt some clever rider is already figuring out how to produce carb heat for bike engines.)

One last note on cooling:

One way any engine gets rid of heat is by radiating it into the surrounding air. (Too much heat in an engine can turn it into a lump of scrap metal.)

Many engines have cooling fins on the cylinders and heads.

And what do a lot of folks do when they're trying to make their bike look more showy? They polish or chrome the engine cooling fins.

Guess what?

Chrome traps and reflects heat back into the engine.

This is mechanical murder on air-cooled engines.

So what's the best way to dissipate

engine heat into the air?

The same way big ol' hot multitube radios used to do it – flat black crinkle paint.

Black paint absorbs heat, then radiates it. And when the paint has that three-dimensional crinkle as well, the area radiating heat can be increased by nearly 50 %. That much cooling just

has to be good for yer engine. And more engine manufacturers are catching on to this fact. Even *Harley* has been having black crinkle paint on its engines recently.

Okay, there were two last notes on engine cooling.

If you can get a chance to get to one of the various aviation museums around the state, take a close look at how aircraft air-cooled engines are set up for routing cooling air around the cylinders, especially where cylinders are stacked behind each other. Note the metal shrouds that deflect air through the engine so that all parts have a pretty equal chance of staying cooling. (Yer crusty ol' editor has been concerned with how much hotter the rear cylinder of a "V-twin" must run because its access to the air stream is blocked by the front cylinder.)

There's a lot we can learn from other modes of transportation that can make our riding experience even better. We just have to stay open to the possibilities.

Be cool.
