In Oregon, A.B.A. T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

• *A.B.A. T.E.* is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.

It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, onroad or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.
You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to A.B.A. T.E. Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just *that* wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the *National Highway Transportation Safety Administration* (*N.H.T.S.A.*) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the *National Custom Cycle Association*. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to *A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments.* (*A.B.A.T.E.*)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. *D.O.T.* (*Department of Transportation*) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the *American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.*), Ron Roloff of the *M.M.A.* of California, and Ed Armstrong from *A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago* presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the *D.O.T.* because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the *1975 Federal Highway Act*, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road. (reprinted with permission)

Are you ready for this riding season? I am sure most of you said yes, but are *really* ready?

I am no expert, but here are some of my thoughts on the subject:

Get your motorcycle ready: Check tire tread. I can't tell you the number of times I have left town on a major trip only to have to put a new tire on at some shop in Podunk City. They were all very nice places, and usually were very helpful, but it usually cost more than my shop in town, not to mention the time spent sitting when I could have been "putting miles on".

Be sure your tires are inflated to manufacturer's specifications. Get out your owners manual and make sure all your maintenance items are up to date.

Get yourself ready:

to have one of the nation's top motorcycle training programs-TEAM Oregon. I know...you've been riding for 83 years, so why should you take a training class? After riding for over 20 years, I thought I was a pretty darn good rider, even if some of my friends might disagree. One cold, wet morning a few years back, my wife dragged me out of bed, kicking and screaming for mercy, plopped me on my new E-Glide, and forced me to take an experienced rider course on the back range at P.C.C. Sylvania. I was afraid of making a fool of myself, or of dropping my new bike. It turns out, the Instructors were great, I had a great time, and what do you know.....I even learned a few new things, and left a much better rider.

TEAM Oregon classes will freshen up your old skills and teach you some new ones. If you pass the training, We are ABATE of Oregon will reimburse extremely lucky here in Oregon you for up to \$75, and many

chapters will also help defray the costs of the class. A recent regulation passed in Oregon requires Insurance companies to offer a discount to customers who have completed a recognized training program.

Check your gear: Has your helmet seen better days, or is it time for a new one? There have been many advances in helmets, making them lighter, and with more vents or other features. What about your jacket and chaps or pants? Are your gloves in good condition? How about those boots? (No, tennis shoes are not for riding, they are for playing tennis!) Have you checked out your rain gear? (Yes, this is Oregon. If you don't ride in the rain, you don't ride!)

Remember, if your bike has been parked even for a short time, your skills may have gotten a bit rusty. Take it easy on that first ride or two, until you have a chance to knock the dust off. Don't let the first ride of the year be a group ride, and when you do go on a group ride, be sure to "ride your own ride". Stay in the

"zone", stay alert and do not ride impaired.

Have fun, stay safe, and remember, "you never see a motorcycle parked in front of a psychiatrist's office".







NEWS-BITS-N-PIECES:

STEAMED UP in OR: ABATE of Oregon held their annual STEAM (Seminars to Educate and Motivate) session last month with very good success. There was one program especially good concerning construction zones and flaggers. Here in Oregon we lose some flaggers every year, killed by careless drivers. Many times bikers are caught up in this unfortunate mess, because cagers run over them while stopped by traffic controls. The seminar pointed out various ways to avoid problems in these areas. Anyone that can attend one of these sessions, do it. U.S. CONGRESS: The Congressional Motorcycle Caucus has a new member: Rep. Allen West (R-Fla.), the American Motorcyclist Association (AMA) reports. West, a new member of Congress, joins others in the bipartisan group that works to promote safety for motorcyclists. Reps. Michael Burgess (R-Texas) and Gabrielle Giffords (D-Ariz.) are the caucus co-chairs.

CHECKPOINT NEW YORK: Most of the following is verbatim from reliable sources, including the NY Freedom Riders, and AIM lawyer Mitch Proner. The emphases are mine.

As we all are mostly aware the state of New York is under suit for their motorcycle-only "Safety stop" programs now in use in that area. It's hoped the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of New York will declare New York's roadway checkpoints to be unconstitutional. The case of Wagner et al. v. The County of Schenectady, et al. could end up in the United States Supreme Court. The checkpoints target well-known motorcycle events, and force motorcyclists traveling to and from those events to leave the roadway, regardless of any wrongdoing, and have their vehicles and equipment inspected for safety and non-safety equipment violations and stolen VIN numbers.

Motorcyclists have been detained as long as 45 minutes in makeshift stockades while undergoing the inspections. The National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (NHTSA) recently began Federal funding for motorcycle checkpoints nationwide in order to assess their effectiveness, despite objections raised by members of Congress. The New



York lawsuit is the first to challenge the constitutionality of motorcycle checkpoints.

The plaintiffs are being represented by Proner & Proner, led by Mitch Proner, the NY AIM/NCOM lawyer. His firm is a plaintiffs personal injury law firm with a long history of doing "pro bono" legal work on behalf of motorcyclists. Proner commenced the lawsuit on behalf of four bikers who were detained at two separate checkpoints. The checkpoints are funded by a grant from the New York Governor's Traffic Safety Committee and the troopers who work them are paid overtime.

Although the stated purpose of the checkpoints is to promote safety, the majority of the more than a thousand tickets which were issued during the first year of the checkpoints had nothing to do with safety and instead focused on non-safety violations such as loud pipes. The written guidelines for the checkpoints specifically state that one of the purposes of the checkpoints is to look for stolen and forged VINs and the police readily admit that they often have undercover members of their gang and auto theft units working the checkpoints looking for signs of criminal activity.

The Supreme Court of the United States has repeatedly made it clear that any roadway checkpoint whose primary purpose is general crime control constitutes an unreasonable search and seizure under the Fourth Amendment and is presumptively unconstitutional. Notwithstanding that, the progress reports which the police prepared on the checkpoints state that the grant funds are used "for overtime for intelligence gathering and the subsequent criminal and traffic enforcement." The police admit that these checkpoints, focusing only on equipment violations and forged and stolen VINs, do not address the major causes of bike accidents such as reckless driving, driver inattentiveness and alcohol impairment. Lawyers for the Plaintiff riders and Defendant State Police are both seeking summary judgment on the Fourth Amendment claims. The future of motorcyclists'

Yer crusty ol' editor is of an age where he can cast what's left of his mind back fifty years to when he was eleven, trying to recall what the world was like then and what we hoped the future would bring us.

Motorcycles were big and beefy as were most U.S. cars. Gas was a bit more than two bits a gallon and plentiful. Freeway systems were being built around the nation. Printing was expensive and timeconsuming because typesetting was only beginning to edged out by printing plates. The country's politicians was beginning to get our military involved in another

Individualized motorcycles and automobiles relegated to museums and modularized people movers take to the smart roads. Electricity used as primary power source. Implants deliver information and graphics directly to the brain causing people to be even more distracted and disconnected from each other. Wars continue to impede forward progress but we still plan to get back to the moon or replace the space station. Nano tech causes as many problems as it was supposed to cure. And we still won't have our

damned Jetsonmobiles.

Many of the past's visions for our future were delayed or altered by warfare. In many cases, progress was impeded by attention, materials, and funding being diverted to military development. 



New "Wild Lands" Policy Blasted At Congressional Hearing

The U.S. interior department's new "wild lands" land-use policy was sharply criticized during a congressional hearing on March 1. The policy could close millions of acres of federal land to responsible motorized recreation.

Idaho governor C.L. "Butch" Otter argued that, with the new policy, the Interior Department "has circumvented the sovereignty of states and the will of the public."

Utah governor Gary Herbert said that "by bureaucratic fiat, one branch of government has overstepped and overreached and has devalued the rights of the states and the citizens."

And Dennis Smith, commissioner in Jackson County, Oregon, said the wild lands policy "should be reversed in its entirety."

Robert Abbey, director of the federal Bureau of Land Management (B.L.M.), defended the wild lands policy, testifying that it "restores balance to the B.L.M.'s multipleuse management of the public lands accordance with applicable in [regulation]."

Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner, Standout Supporter of Motorcyclists

United States congressman Jim Sensenbrenner, Jr. (R-WI) has always been a staunch supporter of motorcyclists and this week, he once again went above and beyond the average member of congress.

Sensenbrenner penned a letter to the U.S.D.O.T. last year asking for some clarification on the agency's plan to fund motorcycle-only roadside checkpoints. When the U.S.D.O.T. funded a program in Georgia to the tune of \$70,000 before responding to Mr. Sensenbrenner's letter, it ruffled his feathers, so to speak.

The republican from Wisconsin took another tack and decided to try to defund the program entirely. Sensenbrenner introduced an amendment that would strip all funding for the controversial program. The amendment would make it illegal for the U.S.D.O.T. to use any money to conduct checkpoints or any program to check for helmet usage.

However, the amendment is one of 600 introduced to this particular bill and may not see the light of day. We commend Mr. Sensenbrenner for his defense of motorcyclists and fully understand that the amendment may not receive a vote. We at the Motorcycle Riders Foundation stand by, ready to assist Mr. Sensenbrenner in any way we can.

The M.R.F. will keep you informed on this issue as details develop.

One day after the house overwhelmingly passed the Surface Transportation Extension Act of 2011 by a final vote of 421 to 4, the senate approved by voice vote today vital legislation to extend highway, transit, and highway safety programs through September 30th. The measure now goes to the president's desk, where it is expected to be signed into effect soon.

"With unemployment in the construction industry at an all-time high, it is imperative that we extend the surface transportation programs through the end of the fiscal year," said highways and transit subcommittee chairman John J. Duncan, Jr. (R-TN).

United States House of Representatives Bill to Prohibit Funding for Motorcycle Checkpoints

In Washington D.C. recently, representative Jim Sensenbrenner (R-WI) introduced legislation, H.R.– 904, a bill to prohibit the United States Department Of Transportation funding for motorcycle-only roadside checkpoints. Representatives Tom Petri (R-W) and Paul Ryan (R-W) are original co-sponsors.

Last year, the U.S.D.O.T. set aside a pool of federal moneys to fund motorcycle-only roadside checkpoints. One grant was awarded to the state of Georgia in the amount of \$70,000. The Georgia department of public safety, through the Georgia State Patrol, plan to begin the motorcycle-only checkpoints this spring, targeting motorcyclists heading to Daytona, Florida for Bike Week.

The grant was supplied by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) whose goal is supposed to be crash avoidance, not injury reduction.

Clearly motorcycle checkpoints do not promote crash avoidance.

H.R.-904 will not stop the Georgia



checkpoints, only future funding of motorcycle checkpoints.

"We introduced this important piece of legislation because secretary LaHood and N.H.T.S.A. remain adamant that mandating helmet use will prevent motorcycle crashes," Sensenbrenner said. "The first step in motorcycle crash prevention should be rider education and increased awareness. Taxpayer money should not be spent on helmet checkpoints that do not prevent crashes."

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation thanks congressmen Sensenbrenner, Petri, and Ryan for their support and defense of the motorcyclists of this country.

Kids Just Want To Ride Act

Two years ago the Consumer Product Safety Commission (C.P.S.C.) implemented the Consumer Product Safety Improvement Act (C.P.S.I.A.) of 2008 to regulate the lead content in children's toys, inadvertently banning the sale of youth model all-terrain vehicles and off-highway motorcycles due to trace levels of lead in some inaccessible components.

On January 25, representative Denny Rehberg (R-MT) introduced H.R.–412, the *Kids Just Want to Ride Act* of 2011, which would exempt child-sized dirt bikes and A.T.V.s from the "lead law" and provide a legislative fix to the misapplied restrictions.

The *Kids Just Want to Ride Act* aims to clarify the previous federal regulation, which the consumer agency claims they must strictly interpret as written despite having twice postponed enforcement.

Representative Rehberg joined 22 fellow legislators from both parties in the house to introduce the new bipartisan act, calling the legislation "... the *best way to clarify congressional intent and ensure that children have access to the youth-sized vehicles that will keep them safe.*"

Senator Jon Tester (D-MT) has announced plans to introduce similar legislation in the senate.

Congress conducted initial hearings on the *C.P.S.I.A.* on February 17 in the house subcommittee on commerce, manufacturing and trade, and reviewed *C.P.S.C.* resources for implementing the lead legislation.

Taking Aim At Child Passengers

A Virginia Beach lawmaker has tried and failed to prohibit children under eight from riding on motorcycles, but despite the defeat of HB–1850, the issue is recurring in states across the country.

In opposing the measure, Matt Danielson, legal counsel for the Virginia Coalition of Motorcyclists (V.C.O.M.), said that there have been no fatalities among children under eight riding on motorcycles in the past ten years. "I don't look at this as a governmental issue. I look at this as a parental issue," said Danielson on behalf of V.C.O.M., a political action committee that represents motorcyclists' interests in the general assembly. "I think the parent can make a better decision about whether their child is ready to ride than can some legislator in Richmond."

Such reasoning hasn't deterred other state legislation, such as HB–2232 in Oregon that would ban kids under seven from riding as a passenger, despite existing state regulation that requires a motorcycle passenger's feet must reach the footpegs.

Furthermore, in a bid to ban children from riding motorcycles in the Philippines, a ranking senator has cited the state's power to invoke *parens patriae*, or the constitutional mandate to "assume and act as a natural parent or guardian in order to safeguard the welfare of any child or individual or an incapacitated and dependent minor who is in need of protection against danger, risk of lives and limbs."

With the growing number of motorcycle users worldwide, and with economic influences making motorbikes the most affordable mode of transportation, the matter of children riding and who is ultimately responsible for their safety and welfare will be a mounting concern.

Automotive Safety Devices Coming Soon To Motorcycles

Within the next two years, motorcycles could be sporting collision detection and other safety features more typically found installed in cars.

The new safety systems being tested for motorcycles include speed limit warnings, information about neighboring vehicles and changing lanes, and information of the tightness of road bends and the speed in which to turn.

According to a report from the *B.B.C.* (*British Broadcasting Corporation*), tests are being completed to bring the latest technologies found on cars to twowheels. And the rise in motorcyclist fatalities has prompted researchers to adapt the first bike-based safety systems by late 2012.



Motorcycle Checkpoints In Georgia During Bike Week

The state of Georgia has received a \$70,000 federal grant to launch motorcycle-only checkpoints in early March, just as *Daytona Bike Week* is getting underway. For most travelers, their route will take them through Georgia and likely into awaiting roadblocks to check for such things as proper license and current registration, insurance, *D.O.T.*-approved helmets, *E.P.A.*approved mufflers, working horn, and lights, etc.

"We were informed by unnamed sources that the check points would start in early March to coincide with the Daytona Bike Week event," said Dan Forrest, state director of A.B.A.T.E. of Georgia. "Most points of entry to Florida will be involved, so anyone traveling through Georgia to Daytona might want to rethink their route."

The U.S. Defenders have issued a call to action regarding the proliferation of these motorcycleonly roadblocks being funded by N.H.T.S.A. grants, and are urging the motorcycle community to voice their opposition to these socalled "safety checks" by contacting N.H.T.S.A., the U.S. D.O.T., and most importantly by asking your own federal legislators to support H.R.-1498 by representative Jim Sensenbrenner (R-WI) to retain a ban on N.H.T.S.A.'s ability to lobby state legislators using our federal dollars through the Motorcycle Law Enforcement Demonstration grant program (DTNH22-10-R-00386).

Washington State Bill Would Prohibit Motorcycle Profiling

The Confederation of Clubs, U.S. Defenders, and A.B.A.T.E. of Washington are seeking support for legislation that would condemn and prevent the widespread regulation enforcement practice of motorcycle profiling.

The Washington courts have confirmed that the *Washington State Patrol* is guilty of unlawful profiling and discrimination against motorcyclists.



In 2002 the court granted a permanent injunction against the state patrol's use of a training pamphlet titled *BIKER 101* (*Wulfekuhle* versus *Washington State Patrol*).

However, on November 23, 2009 the *W.S.P.*, under oath, explicitly admitted that they profile members of motorcycle clubs and continue to use *BIKER 101* as a training manual.

This gross violation of a Washington state superior court injunction proves that the pattern of motorcycle profiling continues and that the *W.S.P.* brazenly violates the liberties of motorcyclists, even in the face of judicial reprimand.

То curb such injustices, representative Steve Kirby (D-Tacoma) introduced HB-1333 on January 19 to require police enforcement agencies to adopt a written policy that condemns and prevents motorcycle profiling, review existing procedures, and institute training to address the issue of motorcycle profiling, which means using the fact that a person rides a motorcycle or wears motorcyclerelated clothes as a factor in deciding to stop and question, arrest, or search a person or a vehicle without legal basis. (Companion: SB-5242).

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
