In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

- A.B.A. T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.
- It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, onroad or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.
- You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to *A.B.A.T.E.* Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just *that* wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments (A.B.A.T.E.).

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce H.R.3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet laws.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California and Ed Armstrong of A.B.A. T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the *D.O.T.* because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet law mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the *1975 Federal Highway Act*, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years, first to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.



Reminder once again: Don't forget to mark your calendars for our big chapter fund raiser and really good time when we hold our Fourth Annual Run-To-The-Coast poker ride on August 4th. Sign in will take place at the Wilderville Store on highway 199 in Wilderville at 9 a.m. Last rider out will be at 11 a.m. and last hand in at 2 p.m. The entry fee is \$10 for the first hand and \$5 for each additional hand. The high hand will win \$200 sponsored by KLDR/KAJO radio station in Grants Pass. Second highest hand will receive \$100 sponsored by Full Throttle Custom Cycle in Grants Pass. Low hand will receive \$50 sponsored by Kate's Redwood Tavern on highway 199 in Grants Pass. There will be a spaghetti feed at end of run put on by the Sons of God MC for only \$5. You can purchase tickets for the feed ahead of time at Full Throttle Custom Cycle, 849 Rogue River highway. In addition, the Del Norte county fair will also be open in Crescent City at end of run with a lot of great entertainment, rodeo, and a good time. This is going to be a lot of fun.

Then on August 12, go on the Oregon Veterans Motorcycle Association Ride Around the Valley to support the appreciation BBQ at the White City Veteran's Administration domiciliary on September 9th. Sign-in will be at J.D.'s Sport Pub at 10 a.m., last bike out at 12. End of run will be Kate's Redwood Bar and Grill by 4 p.m. \$150 high hand and \$75 low hand. Entry fee is \$10 for the first hand and \$5 for each additional hand. This will be an enjoyable run up to Shady Cove and through the valley.

A new addition to the list is the *Git* 'Er Done Run which will be held August 17–19th at *Meadow Wood RV Park and Campground* just off I-5 at exit 83 if you're going north, exit 86 if going south. Planning session: The newsmagazine billing questions are still being worked on. This is a work in progress and many improvements have been made and more are coming.

Iris reported on the Governor's Advisory Committee meeting. Team Oregon/M.S.F. problems: reported a short history on issue. Currently, a judge has ruled that the case will be heard in California. The Denver, Colorado city council passed a new law that essentially requires all riders in the city to use only stock exhaust systems on their motorcycles. It's a law that addresses sound issues by unfairly targeting only motorcyclists, and the *A.M.A.* is seeking a dialogue with Denver city officials to try to find a solution.

On June 4, Denver officials approved changes to the city's vehicle noise ordinance that allow police to issue tickets to riders if their bikes don't have a federal *Environmental Protection Agency* sound-certification label on the exhaust systems. The new ordinance, which takes effect July 1, would apply to all motorcycles made since 1982, which was the first year that federal law required motorcycles sold in the U.S. to comply with *E.P.A.* sound regulations.

In practical terms, that means the bike would be required to have the original exhaust system installed by the manufacturer. Violators would have two weeks to prove to a judge that they have fixed the problem or would be forced to pay a \$500 fine.

Previously, the Denver ordinance required all motor vehicles to pass a sound test that set a limit of 80 decibels at 25 feet. That type of performance standard remains in effect for cars and trucks, except that the allowable limits have been raised. Under the new ordinance, vehicles with a gross weight rating under 10,000 pounds couldn't exceed 82 db(A) at 25 feet, and trucks over 10,000 pounds couldn't exceed 90

db(A) at 50 feet. Only motorcycles would be subject to the *E.P.A.* sound certification labeling requirement.

Tennessee HB–1335 (*Right of Way Violations*) passed the Tennessee house today by a margin of 93-3. State representative Rob Briley did a fine job of carrying the bill to success in the house while senator Tim Burchett carried the companion senate bill, SB–794, to success.

The bill will go to the governor after the senate signs off on a minor amendment that removes unnecessary language that was left in by mistake.

Representative Briley will ask the governor to schedule a ceremonial bill signing event at his earliest convenience.

It will be up to the motorcyclists of Tennessee to educate those who will enforce and prosecute under this new law. Talking with your local police, prosecutors and judges is the best way to make sure the authorities use the new law where applicable.

The U.S. Federal Highway Administration has released a fact sheet that explores alternative methodological approaches for determining the relative risk of alcohol-impaired motorcycle riders being involved in a crash, and rider

The European commission's proposal for a directive on infrastructure management (directive) was rejected by the European parliament. Parliament voted against a proposal aiming to save hundreds of lives per year on Europe's main road network.

The directive, warmly welcomed by road users including the Federation of European Motorcyclists Associations (F.E.M.A.), was aimed at providing Member States safety management procedures and guidance to ensure that safety is integrated in all phases planning, design, road construction, operation and maintenance, and could indeed drastically reduce the number of road fatalities as well as helping meet the road safety targets set in 2001. (50% reduction of road casualties by 2010.)

During the last voting session of 5 June, the transport committee however rejected the directive on road infrastructure safety management as a whole. Being described as "too bureaucratic" and "too costly", the directive was eventually judged "unnecessary"!

Proposed cuts in the *U.S. Forest Service* recreation and trails programs have been on the pages of *News & Notes* and other publications many times asking for your help. Well, some of our collective hard work is

beginning to pay off.

On May 23rd, the house appropriations subcommittee on interior, environment, and related agencies, the subcommittee with jurisdiction over the *Forest Service* budget, recommended to the full committee a budget of \$272 million for the recreation program and \$78.8 million for the trails program. The president's budget submission called for a recreation budget of only \$231 million and a trails budget of \$66.4 million.

This is a significant turn of events for our issues and riders should be pleased with this progress to date. However, we can't celebrate yet because the appropriations process if far from over so keep those calls and letters coming. We need to gain the approval of the full appropriations committee, the house of representatives and the U.S. senate before the process is complete.

Nevada AB-396 prohibits a homeowner's association ("commoninterest community") from banning motorcycles from the community. However, the homeowner's association may still place "reasonable" restrictions on parking and storage of motorcycles. The legislation, which passed 42-0 in the assembly and 19-2 in the senate, became a state law that takes effect October 1.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (C.P.S.C.) is warning consumers who own a Kazuma Meerkat 50 youth all-terrain vehicle (A.T.V.) that children are at severe risk of injury or death due to multiple safety defects with this off-road vehicle.

The unusual warning, which carries no legal weight, was apparently issued because the *C.P.S.C.* lacks a quorum and currently has no authority to require companies to provide accident or injury information. The *C.P.S.C.* said *Kazuma* has refused to cooperate with its inquiry.

The A.T.V.s, which were imported by *Kazuma Pacific Inc.*, of Stafford, Texas, were found to have several serious defects. The *C.P.S.C.* staff determined that the *Meerkat* 50 lacks front brakes, has no parking brake, is missing a neutral indicator light, and can be started in gear. Additionally, the owner's manual does not contain complete information on safe operation and maintenance of the A.T.V.

The risk with these A.T.V.s is severe because these vehicles are intended for children age 6 to 11. In many cases, youth riders are just learning how to operate an A.T.V. and may not have the experience necessary to help them avoid hazards associated with this product's defects.

Transport for London (T.f.L.) have been conducting monitored motorcycle access to bus lanes trials on three trial sites since 2002, but a draft version of an executive summary for their report suggested that the final conclusion might be that the results of the trial would be inconclusive.

In trials carried out by Kingston and Westminster, Kingston had little negative feedback whereas Westminster had positive indications of casualty reductions, despite the trial only been operative for nine months.

One Maryland lawmaker, speaking about sport bikes, claims they are "wreaking a tremendous amount of havoc on our roadways," and says the state should consider banning the motorcycles from street use.

"They are potential death machines in the wrong hands," says delegate Bill Bronrott of Montgomery County. "I think we should look at the possibility of saying, 'these are only intended for recreational use and should be used on race courses rather than on public highways."

Delegate Bronrott says Maryland state police are contacting jurisdictions around the country to see how they handle the motorcycles. He says Maryland needs to investigate whether higher penalties would reduce problems associated with the motorcycles and/or whether laws need to be changed.

Tommy Thompson And The "Sturgis Factor"

His campaign has very little money, his polling numbers are... well, let's just say they are sub-par, and he is not exactly the darling of national media. Yet there is an almost religious like fervor among his supporters that makes former Wisconsin governor Tommy Thompson's presidential candidacy hard to dismiss.

Governor Thompson is a motorcycle rider. Not a photo op or Saturday afternoon parade rider, but a real motorcyclist who takes thousand mile plus trips. He has won much respect from Wisconsin bikers for his time in the saddle and they regard him as one of their own.

Despite a lack of special interest cash, governor Thompson feels that his campaign of commonsense conservatism will resonate in the heartland. His campaign strategy is that a win or a very strong showing in the Iowa presidential straw poll this August would act as a springboard to his moving into contention for the republican nomination. He is asking his friends in the motorcycle community for help.

In writing about governor Thompson's campaign strategy in the Washington Post, columnist George Will described something called the "Sturgis Factor." The "Sturgis Factor", as defined by Mr. Will, is the possibility of a large number of motorcyclists returning home from the annual motorcycle rally and participating in the straw poll. Could this politically hard to define voting block turn from the current front running juggernauts and cast their lot with a fellow rider such as Mr. Thompson? In a small sampling such as the straw poll a solid block vote would have an impact. A strong showing by

the governor could change the dynamic of the G.O.P. race as it heads into the primary season.

Before one snickers and turns away, it may be worth a moment to recall some early presidential frontrunners who purportedly couldn't lose (anyone remember Gary Hart?) and a once obscure governor from a small southern state who stunned the political world in 1992 by beating an incumbent president who had a double digit lead early on in the race.

Picking whom will be the next president of the United States sixteen months before election day is akin to playing the horses on a muddy race track. It's not usual for the frontrunner to fade in the stretch.

The *Motorcycle Riders Foundation* (more specifically *M.R.F.PAC*) is not endorsing a candidate in the Iowa straw poll. We are encouraging involvement however.

A group of riders has formed *Team Tommy* to support the governor's campaign. *Team Tommy* counts among its members the founder of *A.B.A.T.E. of Wisconsin*. They are planning a ride on August 10 in Ames to support the governor's efforts which will coincide with the Iowa straw poll. Non-Iowa residents will be welcome to participate in the parade. Check out *Team Tommy*'s web site at

http://www.teamtommy.org and consider supporting a fellow rider.

No matter which presidential candidate you support, whether you are a democrat, republican, or independent, you have to admit that seeing terms such as the "Sturgis Factor" used by such a prestigious journalist as George Will means that we are doing something



right. Perhaps a new term has been coined here. Let's hope the "Sturgis Factor" is something that will blossom into increased political involvement and activism by motorcyclists and play a part in many congressional and local races throughout the country in 2008.

Immigration Reform And Motorcycling?

After six intense weeks of negotiations, parliamentary maneuvering and white house entreaties, the senate rejected president Bush's vision of an immigration overhaul last Thursday, likely killing the legislation until after the 2008 elections.

On a crucial procedural move requiring the support of 60 senators to advance the bill to a final vote, backers of the bill failed to get even a majority. The 46-53 vote against ending debate on the bill (S 1639) all but ended Bush's chances of winning the sweeping domestic policy achievement he campaigned on as far back as 2000.

Supporters said determining exactly when and why the momentum slipped away could be difficult, but they began to sense trouble early Thursday when senate switchboards lit up.

Hours before the demise of the complex and highly contentious bill, a deluge of phone calls from constituents, mostly clamoring for the measure's defeat, tied up the lines to several senate offices.

The vote came down to a group of 18 senators (12 republicans and six democrats) who voted to resume debate June 26 but switched Thursday when pushed to move toward finishing up. The senate parliamentary procedure requires a "cloture" (or motion to end

all debate and vote on the measure) vote to pass with a super majority (60 votes out of possible 100). When that failed to happen the immigration reform package was all but dead on the table.

So what does this have to do with motorcycles you ask? Well nothing, and everything. This immigration package has been a serious issue for almost ten years and arguably longer. There are millions of people who want something to change and millions more who need something to change. We are hemorrhaging money through our borders on the backs of illegal aliens. You would think that at this point any immigration policy is better then what we have now and therefore an easy legislative lift for the congress.

No matter what side of the fence you are on, when it comes to immigration policy you must admire one thing: the grassroots efforts of those impacted by the proposed reform. Considering just how desperately we need some sort of reliable, workable immigration policy, the grassroots efforts stopped what would have changed the lives of millions of people.

My point is this, if a small group of Americans decide that the congress is going in the wrong direction, pull them back and change the direction of the United States government. We as active motorcyclists can forget this from time to time so remember, it is all about staying educated and motivated in order to agitate.

Grant Deadline Approaching

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation (M.R.F.) alerts you to the approaching deadline for this year's federal motorcycle safety grants. The official deadline for any state to apply for funds in 2008 is August 1, 2007.

Thanks in large part to the efforts of the M.R.F. and numerous state motorcyclists' rights organizations (S.M.R.O.), as well as concerned motorcyclists nationwide, S.A.F.E. T.E.A.-L. U. or Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient, Transportation Equity Act: a Legacy for Users (PL-109-59) directed the U.S. Department of Transportation (U.S.D.O.T.) through its National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (N.H. T.S.A.) to set aside \$25 million to be spent through fiscal year 2009 for motorcycle safety initiatives. The same procedure as last year stands for states to apply for the

The governor's highway safety representative in your state must sign the official application before it can be sent to Washington D.C. for approval.

Once approved, the money will be dispersed from D.C. back to your governor's highway safety representative. It's then up the state to determine how the money is best spent and, if appropriate, to turn some of it over to a non-profit or not-for-profit organization in that state.

Last year 44 states received grants of at least \$100 thousand each, totaling almost \$6 million in grant money across the country, with no matching funds required. This marks the first time in history that the federal government has made funds available specifically for motorcycle rider education and awareness campaigns. According to the law any state that qualifies will receive at least \$100 thousand. This is largely, if not entirely, the result of years of lobbying by the *M.R.F.* and the S.M.R.O.s.

In order to be eligible for the funds, states must meet one of six criteria the first year and two criteria the second and subsequent years.

The six criteria are as follows:

- 1. The state must have a motorcycle rider training program.
- 2. The state must have a motorcycle awareness program.
- 3. The state must have a reduction in fatalities involving motorcycles.
- 4. The state must have an effective impaired driving program.
- 5. The state must have a reduction in fatalities and crashes involving impaired motorcyclists.
- 6. Use of fees collected by the state from motorcyclists for motorcycle programs must be used for motorcycle programs.

Many states had a large amount of success with this program this year. The *M.R.F.* encourages you to stay in contact your state officials overseeing the administration of this important grant program in order to ensure the best use of these limited funds. Naturally, if you have any questions regarding the grant program or the application process, you can call the *M.R.F.* office and we'll be happy to help guide you.

Congress Considers Motorcycle Awareness Month

For many years the *National Coalition of Motorcyclists* (*N.C.O.M.*) has worked toward getting May officially designated by congress as *Motorcycle Awareness Month* nationwide. Although virtually every state and major municipality now issues motorcycle awareness proclamations, no such congressional proclamation has ever been passed to bring national awareness to motorcycle safety.

During the mid-90's the house of representatives banned such resolutions primarily due to the costs incurred by the public to work hundreds of these special days, weeks and months through the legislative process.

The federal government did officially recognize May 2004 as National Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month, thanks to the efforts of retiring U.S. senator Ben Nighthorse Campbell, a member of the N.C.O.M. legislative task force whose senate resolution 168 was passed by unanimous consent of the U.S. senate, but this did not provide a permanent solution.

Now, congressman Michael Burgess of Texas has introduced house resolution 339, a non-binding "sense of congress" measure that supports the goals of a *Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month* in perpetuity. Though barred from setting aside periods on the calendar for a specific purpose or cause, HR–339 "supports the goals of a motorcycle safety

awareness month" without officially designating such a month.

Your help is needed to get the measure enacted. Please contact your congressional representatives and request that they support house resolution 339, and make our federal legislators aware of motorcyclists' overwhelming support for this effort.

Helmet-Free For A Fee

Following on the heals of governor Jennifer Granholm's veto of a helmet law repeal bill passed by the Michigan legislature last year, a new piece of legislation has been introduced that puts a price on freedom by allowing riders to opt out of the state's helmet requirement by paying a fee.

House bill 4749 was recently introduced by state representative Barbarah Farrah (D-Southgate), and sponsored by no fewer than 60 representatives, that would allow motorcyclists the opportunity to buy their freedom for \$100 per year or \$200 for a three-year no-helmet permit. Supporters argue that the measure could ring up more than \$25 million for the cash strapped state.

Motorcyclists could circumvent the mandatory helmet law, under the new bill, if they are 21 or older, have been licensed to operate a motorcycle for at least two years, complete a motorcycle safety course, have insurance or security of \$20,000 for first-party medical benefits in the event of a crash, and purchase an endorsement for their license plate





and license.

Tennessee Enacts R-O-W Legislation

"I am proud to announce that HB–1335 (*Right of Way Violations*) passed the Tennessee house today by a margin of 93-3," exclaimed a jubilant Mike Hays, legislative director for *C.M.T./A.B.A.T.E.*, *Inc.*

The bill will go to the governor after the senate signs off on a minor amendment, and state representative Rob Briley who sponsored the house bill will ask the governor to schedule a ceremonial bill signing event at his earliest convenience. Senator Tim Burchett sponsored the companion senate bill, SB–794.

"It will be up to the motorcyclists of Tennessee to educate those who will enforce and prosecute under this new law," added Hays. "Talking with your local police, prosecutors and judges is the best way to make sure the authorities use the new law where applicable."

Meanwhile, the Tennessee general assembly is wrapping up for the year and HB–1283/SB–1511, Tennessee's helmet law modification bills, will be rolled into the 2008 legislative session. The helmet law repealer has passed the senate and has passed the house transportation committee.

"When we launched the house bill, Dr. Joey Hensley, representative from Hohenwald, Tennessee, lifetime rider and *C.M. T./A. B.A. T.E.* member was the prime sponsor," explained Hays. "But Dr. Hensley decided that there was entirely too much emphasis on

the helmet and no attention paid to reducing the crashes, so he withdrew as the prime sponsor and long time supporter representative Curry Todd of Collierville took the lead."

Dr. Hensley has challenged the medical community to join with the motorcycling community to address issues that will lead to safer riding.

Pointing out that Tennessee's fatality and injury rates are consistently higher than most of the 30 states that allow responsible adults the option of wearing a helmet, representative Todd said, "I stand strong on the rights of adults to have freedom of choice. Helmets are sold in the apparel department of dealerships, not the safety department. There is ample evidence to show that as states have repealed helmet laws, injury and fatality rates have declined. I look forward to working with my colleagues in the Tennessee legislature and the freedom loving motorcyclists of Tennessee to allow responsible adults the right to choose their riding apparel."

Denver Tells Bikers To Pipe Down

The Denver city council has passed an ordinance aimed at muffling motorcycles that have been modified to make them louder, over thundering opposition from local bikers and motorcycle businesses. City councilman Rick Garcia said he sponsored council bill 242 in response to mounting complaints from residents about thunderous hogs rolling through his northwest Denver districts at all hours. But

bikers call the new law discriminatory.

The municipal ordinance, which passed 8-2, is the toughest noise law in the nation and will allow officers to ticket motorcyclists if a bike made after 1982 has a muffler lacking a mandatory factory U.S. Environmental Protection Agency noise certification stamp certifying that the exhaust system is in compliance, instead of testing the decibel level with a noise meter as previously required.

That means police will be able to pull over motorcycles they consider too loud, citing riders whose muffler isn't *E.P.A.*-certified, though noisy cars and trucks are still subject only to a sound-meter test, which motorcyclists say is more fair because it's more objective.

As motorcycles soar in popularity, so do laws that restrict their sound levels. The city of Albuquerque, New Mexico enacted a similar noise ordinance in 2002, but an uproar from the riding community convinced the city to switch to sound-meter testing.

Weird News Terror Scare Entraps Motorcyclists

Six motorcyclists, including five students, were on a fun ride after dinner in Calcutta, India, when they were hauled off to the police station and interrogated overnight as suspected terrorists.

Their crime: stopping their motorcycles in front of the *American Center* as one of them received a call

on his cellphone. The sight of the six, on three motorcycles, was enough for the cops manning the "high-security" address to suspect them to be terrorists. Fearing an attack (with memories of the January 2002 strike at the site and other recent terror bombings fresh in their minds) the guards called a police patrol team that rushed to the spot.

It took a whole night's grilling for the police to realize that the six were anything but terrorists, and they were released the next morning.

c.o.e. fell off his bike. In front of hundreds of people. Twice.

And he was stopped both times.

For the last dozen or so years, yer crusty ol' editor has been riding in an Independence Day parade as part of *Western Days* in the aptly-named community of Independence/ Monmouth, Oregon.

It was just Rot Path that first time. Over the years more and more riders have joined, riding lidless and having a good ol' time.

This year we had three and a half two-wheelers, a couple of hacks, and over half a dozen trikes. All of us were making room to circle around, going forth and back in front of the crowds. (Most of whom absolutely love us.)

The meeting opened at 12:15 p.m. chaired by executive director, Ken Ray. Attending were ten people with Randy Phipps absent due to a mechanical breakdown. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented. The financial report showed the traffic of both accounts since January 1, 2007, with the balances of both as of June 30, 2007.

Ken noted that Randy Comer was doing a great job in keeping our membership numbers on track and helping with e-mail addresses as needed. Quiet Mike was recognized as being instrumental in our legislative efforts by organizing an e-mail effort and getting members to participate. Also discussed was the future legislative process of the next session. We all need to keep in contact with our legislators so they can be aware of our views of motorcycling issues. We talked about our involvement in our two bills and what to do differently.

Ken Ray turned over the *BikePAC* products money bag to the treasurer for later use of buying and selling *BikePAC* products. Ken will store the products in his shop until needed in the future.

The May Awareness Rally generated a lot of interest in the motorcycling communities and by the media. Two or three television stations aired the rally although the local papers had no mention of the event. Ken had sent press releases to media from Portland to Grants Pass three weeks prior to the event. It got some results that we would not have seen without that effort.

Brian Stovall reported on the legislative activities now and planned for the future. The next session is to start in February 2008 and plan to consider issues that had a hearing, but had not

reached a conclusion during the 2007 session.

Brian was contacted by news media about the motorcycle wrecks that happened over the weekend of *Fossil*. He suggested that they contact *O.D.O.T.* safety division and *Team Oregon* for the information as we don't keep statistics.

Iris Yeager, member of the Governor's Committee on Motorcycle Safety, was asked to check on the plans for a cable barrier between the opposing traffic lanes on highway 26 near Boring, Oregon. She also reported that the next meeting of the G.C.M.S was moved up one week to the second Friday in July. Iris also noted that of the 45 deaths of motorcyclists in Oregon, that only three were endorsed and had formal rider training. Iris told about the water closet media efforts by O.D.O.T. safety division. Also, that Team Oregon was geared up to train 2,000 more students than normal at this time.

Development director Nic Oliver has been driving around Oregon making contact with businesses, riding groups, and shops wherever he can find them in an effort to generate interest in becoming a corporate sponsor of *BikePAC*. Mel and Randy will share email addresses of good contact people so that they can send Nic a list of business, groups, and shops.

Old Business

Our web site director has quit and we now have no web master. Randy Comer will work with Ken Ray to obtain the necessary information to restart the web site and keep it up to date. Brian commended Randy's work in creating the list of e-mails from the A.B.A. T.E. of Oregon membership list. He will

receive help from *A.B.A. T.E.* to keep the information current.

New Business

- The *Democratic Motorcycle Caucus* (*D.M.C.*)has had election of officers. Chairperson is Brian Stovall, vice-chair is Ted Tracy, membership secretary is Randy Phipps, and communication secretary is Teresa Hepker. Brian will send information and invitation to attend the next meeting of the *D.M.C.*
- Prior to the next meeting of *BikePAC* there will be a formal announcement thirty days prior to the meeting as it will be a full board meeting. All members of the advisory board should plan to attend.

The next meeting for *BikePAC of Oregon* will be held on 06 October 2007 at noon. It is planned that we will meet at the Salem public library, although arrangements have not yet been made.

GUNNY'S SACK Reflections On 15 Years Of The Sack

The *Gunny's Sack* has been around now for nearly fifteen years.

As I reflect on those years I realize the motorcycle world has changed, mostly for the good. We nevertheless have a long way to go.

We still drink and get on our bikes and then can't understand why we get ourselves killed.

We still ride these wonderful machines and never think to sharpen our skills and take rider courses, and then wonder why we're targets on the highways.

Naturally, I'm talking in generalities. Many of us do not drink and ride and do take rider ed courses.

My point is, we are not getting the word out to everyone strongly enough to get the rest of us involved in our own safety.

Helmet Laws Or The Constitution?

We are still all hung up on helmet laws when there are so many other things out there that effect our lives much more than wearing headgear. Not that we can't fight on more than one front, but I'm especially worried about the *N.A.F.T.A.* highway that's proposed to run from the Mexican border up through Texas, Kansas City and on to Canada. This beast is planned to be built and maintained by a foreign contractor and paid for by tolls to that company. This country would have little or no say in how or why it exists, yet we are expected

to bear the burden of much of the costs involved, to include the loss of property and of some small towns, just to provide ease of building the thing. It's planned to be straight as an arrow, without regard as to who or what might be displaced. Read up on it!

Dental Reflections

Your Gunny saw this article in the dentist's office recently. It's too good for me to try and paraphrase, so all of it follows:

A Declaration Of Dependence

We, the undersigned, having grown weary of the burden of freedom and responsibility, do hereby foreswear, forfeit, and waive our following rights:

- 1) Our right to protect our physical persons. We pay the government (and quite well) to do this for us, through the police, the military, and far too many other government agencies to count. We have chosen to disregard numerous court decisions that they have no responsibilities to us individually, and still place our fate entirely in their hands. And when they fail us, we will blame our excessive freedoms and surrender more rights in the name of physical safety.
- 2) Our right to tally and pay our own taxes. (And if one presidential candidate has his way, he will relieve us of even this onerous task.)

3) Our right to make decisions for our own safety. Every one of us knows, or ought to know, that certain things are safe and unsafe, healthy and unhealthy. Trans fats are terrible for our bodies. Seatbelts, in nearly every circumstance, improve our chances of surviving a car crash almost logarithmically. Motorcycle helmets, even more so.

In these and in countless other ways, we know what the smart thing to do is. But we do not wish to be burdened with the responsibility of caring for ourselves, so we call upon the government to make certain we make the right choices, and accept whatever punishment, fine, or sanction they see fit if we put ourselves at risk.

In the name of our own safety, our own security, and our own peace of mind, we, the undersigned, do hereby pledge our lives, our fortunes, our liberty, our judgment, and our own common sense.

Signed, far too many Americans.

This sort of apathy feeds the daily erosion of our constitution and bill of rights, perpetrated by those we elect to make our laws. It's time to stop the process and look to our welfare. If we don't, this nation will collapse on itself, and we'll have no one to blame but ourselves. Our constitution is under attack by those who think these documents are outdated. In Europe,

whole countries have lost some of their national identities through the European Parliament, a non-elected group. Those countries don't even have their own currency anymore. They all use the "euro." No more British pounds or German marks. We are likewise losing our freedoms here almost daily, a little piece at a time, and usually in the name of security.

I didn't even mention the evils of the U.S.A.P.A.T.R.I.O.T. Act [Uniting and Strengthening America by Providing Appropriate Tools Required to Intercept and Obstruct Terrorism], the lives we are sacrificing in corporate warfare all over the planet that seems to have no end. I can't believe that this country, with all it's strength and wisdom, can't devise strategy to win these conflicts and get this carnage brought to an end, or to have won without bullets in the first place, if and when winning is in the interests of the American people.

smacked into the rear of the cage. Not badly hurt, but didn't get the job done.

Huntsville, Alabama – A man here was accused of speeding when he struck and killed a motorcyclist, and then drove away. He was taken into custody only after a group at a nearby *Sonic* restaurant saw him get out of his wrecked car and these good citizens chased him back to the accident scene!

Believe me, if you have an injury wreck, car or cycle, you need an A.I.M.

lawyer on your side. You can bet the other guy has an insurance company looking out for his interests.



Deadly Summer? -- Rot Pat, c.o.e.

Did yer crusty ol' editor read more newspapers than usual or has this summer been unusually deadly for Oregon motorcyclists?

In a one week period there was a young Salem man who was killed while showing off his new bike to friends one Sunday morning in a big-box parking lot. (Yes, he was wearing a helmet. No, it didn't prevent a broken neck.) An older gentleman bounced off the driver door of an RV he was passing when it turned left. (Witnesses said the RV was signaling the turn. Yer c.o.e. wonders how far in advance of the turn that signaling began.) Then a young woman fell off the back of a bike whose rider lost control attempting to pop a wheelie

after illegally passing another vehicle.

All three of these crashes appear to be the responsibility of the riders.

Higher fuel prices have driven many summer time road users to motorcycles as an economical form of transportation.

But are they qualified to operate the two-wheeled machines?

Are they even endorsed for motorcycles?

Have they taken any kind of rider safety program?

Having experience riding bicycles makes the transition to motorcycles easier, but is no substitute for a basic rider course and road experience. How about you?

Do you have a motorcycle endorsement on your driver's license?

It's far easier to get that endorsement now than when yer crusty ol' editor got his.

Just take a *Team Oregon* rider class. Most *Oregon A.B.A.T.E.* chapters will pay half the cost of the class and often the state will pay the other half, so it costs you nothing other than some time and a small D.M.V. fee. And you will be a better rider for having taken a class. (If you're embarrassed to be seen taking such a class, sign up for it at a *Team Oregon* site where you aren't known.

Don't let pride get in the way of livin' well.)


