

A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, *A.B.A. T.E.* stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

• We are not a motorcycle club or gang.

Instead, A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.

• It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride on.

We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, on-road or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.

• You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to *A.B.A.T.E.*

Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just *that* wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working on are important to their community.

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the *Nationa Highway Transportation Safety Administration* (*N.H.T.S.A.*) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments (*A.B.A.T.E.*).

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. *D.O.T.* (*Department of Transportation*) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce H.R.3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet laws.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California and Ed Armstrong of A.B.A. T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on Surface Transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet law mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by President Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976. Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years, first to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.



A.B.A.T.E. Chapter Reports Columbia River Chapter

We held our November meeting in the lounge area of *Jubitz* and the consensus was that it is a great location. Thanks to the *Jubitz* management for its generosity. I hope that we can stay there a long time.

The chapter had two guest speakers at our meeting who wanted to make statements on behalf of the local clubs: Wookie and Longview Tom. They spoke concerning the controversy involving a group of riders who have been wearing the "Ride Free" patches. Scottie B from our chapter also spoke about the controversy.

One of the things that Wookie mentioned was that he hoped that *A.B.A.T.E.* members would not patronize those businesses that barred bikers who wore colors. That has been my personal position and I hope that other *A.B.A.T.E.* members will also take that position not support businesses that discriminate.

Longview Tom also questioned the some serious reservations about some of propriety of my reporting in the newsletter the statements made by Scottie and want to know what someone who B without investigating the facts first and contacting the club involved. However, I and I alone decide what is to be written in this report each month and decline to let anyone tell me what to report. Due to heavy-handedness at the local post office where the chapter has maintained its box for ten ears or more, I have closed that box. I had gone to the post office and the key would not open the box. I went to the service desk and asked what the problem was. The post official demanded that I show them two pieces of personal identification. When I questioned them on why I had to do so, they only would say that they were "upgrading" the box and refused to provide me with any legal authority for their demand. So I closed our account there and mail to the chapter for now should be sent to:

I will look into a private postal box. By the way, one of our chapter members, Wade Lewis, who works for the post office told me that there was no such requirement and that providing such information was voluntary. It was just a bureaucrat throwing his weight around.

Larry reported that the state board had voted to accept his motion that there be no withholding of a chapter's vote due to alleged non-compliance with reporting duties for a period of two months while we try to get a lawyer's opinion about what is necessary to comply with I.R.S. and state of Oregon tax exempt status regulations. Our chapter lost its ability to vote on one or more occasions, not because we had done anything wrong, but because the state organization had somehow lost our bank reports. I have some serious reservations about some of the proposals for changes to the bylaws and want to know what someone who knows what he is talking about, that is, a lawyer who represents tax-exempt organizations, has to say.

There was also some discussion about the proposed requirement that the chapter treasurers make their reports electronically. Our treasurer, DC, has looked at the issue and does not want to do it that way. We write fewer than 50 checks a year, often not even one a month. DC believes that electronic reporting is unduly burdensome. My personal problem with it is that such a requirement limits who can be treasurer, a position that is hard enough to fill as it is.

Duane Calkins reported on the *Democratic Oregon Summit* held in Sunriver. He attended on behalf of the chapter and brought back the message that we need to stay visible with the political parties in order to protect our rights. This is especially true with the Democrats who have been less supportive

of our issues than the Republicans even though a majority of our membership votes Democratic. Kudos to Duane for spending his time at this important event.

We voted to have the *Sweet Heart Dance* at the *Blue Eyes Café and Lounge*, 10845 NE Halsey. We will be verifying that location as soon as possible. Thanks to Kathy Sanchez of the *Northeast Chapter* for bringing this venue to us. Rhonda has agreed to locate a band for the event. I will contact the lounge and make sure that we have it booked to us.

Janet reminded everyone about the toy run and collected most of the outstanding raffle tickets.

I hope everyone has a great holiday season and that we survive into the new year. I also want to thank everyone for all of their work this year. Let's keep working for freedom. Ride Free.

What follows is proof of the puddin' as to what our own A.I.M. attorneys do for us all over the country. They really deserve our support and gratitude. Don't forget too, that they're nationwide 24/7, at 1-800-On-A-Bike, for biker discrimination issues and injury wrecks. So take a look at what's up in Eugene now:

Eugene, Oregon — Civil rights isn't just for racial minorities, it's for us

vehicular minorities, too. Or more to the point, it protects our right to display our freedom of speech and association, as bikers. I'm proud to announce that our Oregon Aid to Injured Motorcyclists (A.I.M.) attorney, Sam Hochberg, just settled a civil rights claim on behalf of a member of the Free Souls Motorcycle Club, in Eugene. We'd talked about it here in the Sack before. This was the case with Free Soul Ray Fowler. He was at the Lane County Fair in Eugene with his wife, and the local police threw him out of the county fair, solely on the basis of his motorcycle club patch. A big no-no, particularly if there is no history of any problems with the club! Ray was whistle-clean, and our favorite police agency, Eugene police department, decided that this was a "gang-free" event.

When will they learn? Absent prior problems or some reasonable basis, a government agency can't discriminate on the basis of the writing on your back! Sam was involved in the same damned lovely sort of case twice before in this state in other municipalities. Next issue of the Sack, we'll print the *letter of apology* that the *Lane County* Fair Board agreed to sign, as part of the settlement. Oh yeah — there's also that \$10,000 they're going to pay. Like I said, when will they learn? Sam is very happy about it, but he says he'd still rather spend his time helping his injured clients than having to stop idiotic police and government policies. Well, if somebody's gotta do it, I'm glad we have Sam. Thanks for your ongoing efforts in our behalf Sam, from all of us.



N.H.T.S.A. is at it again — Whenever they can they will distort facts in order to forward the notion that if you don't wear a helmet you're gonna die on a motorcycle. The Associated Press ran a story recently about "facts" put out by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. They studied deaths caused by accidents in which helmets were not worn in several states that had modified their helmet laws recently. It would seem that indeed deaths have gone up some but so has the number of riders and the number of miles! They are saying there was up to 100% ridership increase in some states. It looks to me like they are manipulating figures for some states to distort the real facts

Pennsylvania house bill 2133, introduced by representative Kerry A. Benninghoff (R-Bellefonte), proposes to amend Title 75 of the Pennsylvania consolidated statutes by adding a section 4310 to read, "Auxiliary lighting may be added to a motorcycle to protect the driver, including blue dot illumination, standard bulb running lights and various colors of valve stem caps, light-emitting diode (L.E.D.) pods and strips, light wire, neon tubes and strobe lights." The bill was referred to the house transportation committee on October 27, 2003.

Motorcyclists and safety experts know that additional lighting increases visibility of motorcycles to other motor vehicle operators. Many enthusiasts have decided that stock lighting on their motorcycles is not enough. The addition of after-market lighting boosts conspicuity, especially at night. Even during daylight hours, adding more lights may help other drivers more clearly identify motorcycles.

The Money Issue

The difficulty at present surrounds our "motorcycle safety incentive grant" - \$100,000 to any state that maintains its rider training/motorist awareness commitment from one year to the next during the life of T.E.A. (through 2009). (See www.mrf.org and click on "NHTSA/TEA.") We have learned that this element of our joint M.R.F.-S.M.R.O. agenda enjoys solid support by many senators on the committee. Some, however, are critical, simply because it may involve "new" money. Just emphasize this: First, training works. Second, states are cutting. Third, fatalities have risen for five straight years. Fourth, it is high time to reverse this tragic trend!

No New Tax On House Bill?

When the next issue of M.R.F. Reports finds its way to your door, you will see an article by U.S. representative Don Young (R-Alaska), house transportation and infrastructure committee chairman, on the issue of indexing the gas tax to inflation which would boost the current 18.4 cents-a-gallon tax by about 8 cents over 6 years. Word on the hill is that the house T&I T.E.A. bill may include the spending (up to \$300 billion for road-related programs), but without the gas tax. The house bill is said to be more than the Bush administration bill (\$201 billion for surface transportation) and the senate version (a draft version calls for \$255 billion for surface programs).

Pushing Safety In The Press

An influential news organization in Washington, the Bureau of National Affairs (B.N.A.), called M.R.F. for our reaction to the "Kentucky/Louisiana study." In this interview, we emphasized the personal liberty issue and also drew attention to our *T.E.A.-*21 effort. B.N.A. wrote, "The M.R.F. is hoping to launch the first-ever motorcycle incentive safety grant program as part of the *Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century (T.E.A.-*21). He said that the need for a grant program has arisen as states have cut programs that educate motorcyclists and drivers of passenger vehicles to drive safely and be aware of motorcycles on the road."

M.R.F. -- Who We Are

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation, incorporated in 1987, is a membership based national motorcyclists' rights organization headquartered in Washington D.C. The MRF is involved in federal and state legislation and regulations, motorcycling safety education, training, licensing and public awareness. The MRF provides members and state motorcyclists' rights organizations with direction and information to protect motorcyclists' rights and motorcycling. The MRF sponsors annual regional and national educational seminars for motorcyclists' rights activists and publishes a bimonthly newsletter, THE MRF REPORTS.

E.P.A. Rule Still "Under Review"

While the administration is still reviewing the *E.P.A.* rule, one friendly member of congress has written to newly appointed *E.P.A.* administrator Mike Leavitt at *M.R.F.*'s urging. The member's letter to Mr. Leavitt raised the issue of the agency excluding independent shops from the process designed to protect small businesses. Because this is a pending rule, Mr. Leavitt may be precluded from responding specifically. Nevertheless,

raising the issue was an important step in sensitizing the new administrator to the stakes involved. When might the proposed rule on street bikes be finalized? Any day now . . .

Congress Acts To Protect Medical Benefits For Bikers

An important step toward protecting medical benefits for motorcyclists was achieved on October 29, 2003, when the senate health, education, labor and voted committee pensions unanimously to approve S-423, The Health Care Parity for Legal Transportation and Recreational Activities Act, co-authored by U.S. senators Russ Feingold (D-WI) and Susan Collins (R-ME). The bipartisan act would eliminate a loophole that allows insurance companies to deny medical benefits to persons injured while participating in so-called "risky activities," including riding a motorcycle or A.T.V..

The measure will now move to the senate floor for consideration, while a similar bill in the house of representatives, HR-1749, awaits committee action.

Motorcyclists across the country successfully lobbied congress in 1996 to enact the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (H.I.P.A.A.), which prohibited insurers from denying health care coverage to insureds based on their participation in activities such as motorcycling, skiing and horseback riding, but the legislation was later misinterpreted to require insurance companies to provide coverage, but still allowing them to deny benefits if a person was hurt as a result of such involvement.

Help close this discriminatory loophole by contacting your U.S. senators and congressman today and urge their support of S-423 and HR-1749!

Louisiana Governor Lambasts N.H.T.S.A.

Just hours after the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration released a report to the national press indicating that fatalities had increased dramatically in Arkansas and Louisiana following the repeal of those states' mandatory helmet laws, Louisiana governor Mike Foster called N.H.T.S.A.'s numbers into question and accused the federal agency of misleading the public regarding the facts.

"You can make statistics say anything you want," lectured Foster in a press release issued October 30, 2003 to counteract the N.H.T.S.A. disinformation campaign. "The N.H.T.S.A. wanted to hear that fatal crashes have doubled, and they looked for statistics that supported that. It's true that the number of accidents has increased, but the report leaves a lot out of the picture, like the increasing number of motorcycle riders."

Foster pointed out that N.H.T.S.A. looked merely at raw numbers and not at the circumstances of the crashes.

The number of registered motorcycles rose by over 12,000 in the years covered by the N.H.T.S.A. study, according to the governor's press release. In 1998, there were 60,000 registered motorbike operators in Atlanta. Louisiana; two years later, 72,445 were registered with the Louisiana office of estate development for the project, is motor vehicles.

According to a 2001 report by the Louisiana highway safety commission,

Traffic Crashes Involving Bicycles or Motorcycles, fatalities per 100 crashes only rose by 0.2 percent from 1998 to 2000, and in 2001 that percentage actually went down to 3.8 percent. In 1998, 3.9 percent of every 100 crashes resulted in deaths. During that time, the number of crashes in general rose from 889 to 1,410, a fact that cannot be attributed to helmet usage rates.

"Bottom line, it's a matter of personal choice. No one is forcing or encouraging motorcycle riders to ride without helmets," said Foster. "But the N.H.T.S.A. says that there were twice as many fatal crashes, but doesn't want us to know how many of those riders were wearing helmets. There are times where helmets are protective and times when they actually can do harm."

Internet Scams Use Motorcycles As Bait

If you're shopping for a new motorcycle, beware of a new internet scam that may take your wallet for a ride. In an October 21 Problem Solvers report on Local 6 News in central Florida, commentator Mike Holfeld uncovered internet scam artists who A recent print advertisement by are pirating legitimate e-Bay accounts and are reportedly using Harley-Davidson motorcycles as bait to rip off users.

In his report, Holfeld interviews a woman who wired \$4,600 to a man "Oh, the leather on Clyde is in Berlin, Germany to purchase a Harley Fatboy in an on-line auction. And not paying him back is painful! The money was picked up 24 hours later, but then the bike and the impostor disappeared.


She forced herself to relax, to breathe, to let tension ebb from her ridged body.

A.B.A.T.E. State Officer Guidelines

Revised 13 April 2002

State Officer Descriptions

A. Coordinator

The coordinator shall:

- 1. Preside at board of director and executive board meetings.
- 2. Exercise the general supervision and administration of *A.B.A.T.E.* organizational affairs.
- 3. Follow and comply with the directives of the board of directors and executive board.
- 4. See that the *A.B.A. T.E.* Bylaws and all other *A.B.A. T.E.* documents that are relevant to A.*B.A. T.E.*'s operations are maintained and followed.
- 5. Oversee all state level committees and all chapter operations.
- 6. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* bylaws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.*'s operations.
- 7. Be the official spokesperson for A.B.A.T.E..
- 8. Be one of the 3 (three) authorized signers for state funds.
- 9. Perform such duties as assigned by the board of directors or executive board.
- 10. Exercise any and all duties, powers and functions, for or incident to the office of the coordinator.

B. Vice-coordinator (1 - 3 people)

The vice-coordinators shall:

- 1. Work under the direction of the coordinator and perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator or executive board.
- 2. In the absence of the coordinator exercise the duties of the coordinator.
- 3. Be responsible for smooth continuous operations of the state board.
- 4. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* bylaws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.*'s operations.
- 5. Assist the run coordinator in the operation and planning of state fund raisers, with the assistance of the state sergeant of arms.
- 6. Supervise and oversee all entry/exit gates at state runs. (amended 8/8/97).
- 7. One of the vice-coordinators may be designated by the coordinator to be in charge of the *A.B.A.T.E.* inventory list and the inventory locations.
- 8. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or board of directors.

C. State secretary

The state secretary shall:

- 1. Take accurate minutes of all regular and special meetings of the the state board of directors or the state executive board.
 - a. Date and sign all minutes taken to verify authenticity.
- 2. Make all minutes available for use at state board or executive board meetings.
- 3. Read minutes from prior state board meetings.
- 4. Forward a copy of any meeting minutes to all board member and officers within one week (7 days) of the meeting.
- 5. Submit a copy the state board meeting minutes to the newsletter editor for publishing in the state newsletter.
- 6. Verify the proper writing of motions and keep a running record of all motions made in a motion logbook.

- a. The motion logbook is to be available for viewing at all state board meetings.
- 7. Keep a record of all correspondence received by A.B.A. T.E..
- 8. Write all correspondence letters, notes, cards and etc.
- 9. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* bylaws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.*'s operations.
- 10. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or board of directors.

D. Membership secretary

The membership secretary shall:

- 1. Maintain and keep an accurate list of names and addresses of all members.
- 2. Process all new/renewal memberships and changes of address.
- 3. Send an updated monthly membership list to all chapter membership secretaries and provide membership forms and packets to the chapter membership secretaries.
- 4. Assist the treasurer in maintaining an accurate account of all dues and fees collected.
- 5. Make all possible efforts to assist the chapter membership secretaries in the recruitment of new/renewal members.
- 6. On a monthly basis, send renewal notices to members whose membership is due for renewal.
- 7. Provide updated mailing lists and labels as required for monthly Newsletter mailing or other A.B.A.T.E. business.
- 8. Obtain and maintain legislative district information for each member.
- 9. Operate in accordance with the A.B.A. T.E. bylaws and all other A.B.A. T.E. documents that are relevant to A.B.A. T.E.'s operations.
- 10. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or board of directors.

E. Treasurer

The treasurer shall:

- 1. Be responsible for all A.B.A. T.E. financial transactions and keeping accurate records of all A.B.A. T.E. financial transactions.
- 2. Be responsible for all accounting and record keeping at state fund raising events.
- 3. Oversee all chapter treasures and chapter bank accounts in accordance with the *A.B.A. T.E.* financial policies and procedures.
- 4. Cause to happen, all tax filings, records, etc. and any tax payments required by law.
- 5. Be one of the 3 (three) authorized signers for state funds.
- 6. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A. T.E.* bylaws and all other *A.B.A. T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A. T.E.*'s operations.
- 7. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or board of directors.

F. State auditor

The state auditor shall:

- 1. Receive all chapter bank and financial statements on a monthly basis. This can be in the form of *Quicken*, general ledger or hand written, if necessary. Refer to the current financial policies and procedures.
- 2. If a chapter does not submit their monthly financial report on time, the state auditor must make contact with the chapter treasurer in a timely manner. If the chapter treasurer is unresponsive, the state auditor must then make contact with the chapter coordinator. If neither the chapter treasurer, nor the chapter coordinator are responsive, then the state auditor will report non-compliance to the state treasurer and/or the state board of directors.

- 3. Print and review all chapter reports and compare with bank statements. The state auditor is responsible for filing and maintaining a hard copy of all transactions.
- 4. Create a reconciliation summary.
- 5. Import chapter transactions into state accounting package.
- 6. Generate a status of chapter financial reports statement for the monthly state board meeting and send to the state treasurer. The state treasurer will then present the statement to the board of directors at the state board meeting.
- 7. The statement must be received by the state treasurer at least one full week prior to the state board meeting.
- 8. At the end of the calender year, all information acquired should be transmitted to the person responsible for doing the state tax report.
- 9. Should have both fax and full time online (computer) services to receive and deliver reports.
- 10. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* bylaws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.*'s operations.
- 11. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or board of directors.

G. Newsletter editor (media officer)

The newsletter editor shall:

- 1. Produce a monthly newsletter which shall include at a minimum.
 - a. Minutes from the state board meetings and chapter reports as submitted.
 - b. A list of the state officers which shows their phone numbers, fax numbers and e-mail addresses, as applicable.
 - c. A list of chapter contacts, chapter meeting place addresses and meeting times.
 - d. Appropriate correspondence or information of interest to the membership.
- 2. Report all advertising income to the treasurer for records with a list of advertisers
- 3. Monitor chapter newsletters and report inappropriate literature to the state board.
- 4. Have the authority to edit, approve or reject material submitted for publication.
- 5. Have the authority to "speak" publicly on behalf of the organization, for the good of the organization.
- 6. Involve other media officers when making a potentially controversial decision. An opinion must be sought from at least one other media officer or the coordinator when making these decisions. In accordance with the media guidelines, these decisions should be brought to the attention of the state board, through the coordinator, if there are liability concerns.
- 7. Recommend any additions or changes to the *A.B.A.T.E.* bylaws, guidelines, policies, and/or procedures as it relates to the media operations of *A.B.A.T.E.*.
- 8. Recommend organizational media priorities.
- 9. Assist other media officers in their efforts to acquire materials for publication.
- 10. Assist chapter officers in their media efforts.
- 11. Receive cooperation and support from individuals members. Media officers shall also have the authority to establish a committee with the purpose of getting assistance with establishing priorities, projects and other work tasks.
- 12. Recommend vendors, electronic services and etc. to the state board for approval.
 - a. Be responsible for contracting for services as needed.
- 13. Meet publishing deadlines.
- 14. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A. T.E.* bylaws and all other *A.B.A. T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A. T.E.*'s operations.
- 15. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or state board of directors.

H. Web site editor (media officer)

The web site editor shall:

1. Have overall responsibility and authority for construction and maintenance of

- a. A list of the state officers which shows their phone numbers, fax numbers and e-mail addresses as applicable.
- b. A list of chapter contacts, chapter meeting place addresses and meeting times.

- d. Distinctive "Recommended motorcycle links" and individual member "links".
- e. A list of state and chapter runs, events, fund raisers and etc
- 2. Be responsible for editorial content of the web site.
- 3. Establish general guidelines for material to be published, subject to approval bythe state board of directors.
- 4. Have the authority to edit, approve or reject material submitted for publication.
- 5. Have the authority to "speak" publicly on behalf of the organization, for the goodof the organization.
- 6. Involve other media officers when making a potentially controversial decision. An opinion must be sought from at least one other media officer or the coordinator when making these decisions. In accordance with the media guidelines, these decisions should be brought to the attention of the state board, through the coordinator, if there are liability concerns.

I. Public relations director (media officer)

The public relations director shall:

- 1. Provide and coordinate public relations on behalf of *A.B.A.T.E.*. Which includes, but is not limited to: public speaking, multi-media productions, press releases and other means of communications.
- 2. Coordinate the education of non-members and the general public about the existence, policies and objectives of *A.B.A. T.E.* with the assistance of the chapter public relations officers.
- 3. Arrange and communicate information to non-A.B.A. T.E. organizations.
- 4. Responsible for actively promoting *A.B.A. T.E.* and individual contributions by *A.B.A. T.E.* members internally, as well as to the general public, media sources and other motorcycle organizations.
- 5. Maintain and provide advertising for *A.B.A.T.E.* with multi-media, tri-folds, press releases and other means of communication.
 - a. Responsible for the tracking, handling, distribution and return of public relation materials, such as tri-folds, flyers, psa tapes and etc.
- 6. Clear any advanced promotion materials with the coordinator, or if unavailable, a vice-coordinator or another media officer. All official press releases for chapters must be cleared through the public relations director or coordinator before release.
- 7. Have the authority to edit, approve or reject material submitted for publication.
- 8. Have the authority to "speak" publicly on behalf of the organization, for the good of the organization.

- 10. Recommend any additions or changes to the *A.B.A.T.E.* bylaws, guidelines, policies, and/or procedures as it relates to the media operations of *A.B.A.T.E.*.
- 11. Recommend organizational media priorities.
- 12. Assist other media officers in their efforts to acquire materials for publication.
- 13. Assist chapter officers in their media efforts.
- 14. Receive cooperation and support from individuals members. Media officers shall also have the authority to establish a committee with the purpose of getting assistance with establishing priorities, projects and other work tasks.
- 15. Recommend vendors, electronic services and etc. to the state board for approval. a. Be responsible for contracting for services as needed.
- 16. Operate in accordance with the A.B.A. T.E. bylaws and all other A.B.A. T.E. documents that are relevant to A.B.A. T.E.'s operations.
- 17. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or state board of directors.

J. Legislative director

The legislative director shall:

- 1. Keep the executive board and board of directors informed about legislative developments which could or will affect the aims of *A.B.A.T.E.* as per the *A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon* bylaws (article III purpose).
- 2. Be responsible for disseminating legislative information to the membership by any means available.
- 3. Submit legislative information to the newsletter editor for publication when appropriate.
- 4. Make recommendations regarding
- A.B.A.T.E. legislative activities to the executive board and board of directors.
- 5. Chair the P.I.T. (Political Involvement Team) committee.
 - a. The *P.I.T.* committee will be comprised of the chapter legislative directors or the chapters designated person(s) as members.
- 6. Be responsible for preparing/presenting a class on legislative activities/information at the A.B.A.T.E. S.T.E.A.M. (Seminar to Educate and Motivate) event.
- 7. Promote member involvement in legislative activities through education, training and assistance.
- 8. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* bylaws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.*'s operations.
- 9. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or state board of directors.

K. Education director (2 people)

The education directors shall:

- 1. Coordinate and administer the efforts to educate the motorcycling public and public road users at large, on the positive aspects of motorcycles as transportation.
- 2. Be responsible for the continuance of the Motorcycle Awareness Program (M.A.P.)
 - a. Monitor teaching techniques, program content and outreach efforts.
 - b. Update the program materials and information as available.
 - c. Responsible for training M.A.P. instructors.
 - d. Keep records of classes given
- 3. Be responsible for the logistics, organization, scheduling and presentation of the Seminar to Educate and Motivate.

(S.T.E.A.M.)

- a. Monitor teaching techniques, program content and outreach efforts.
- b. Update the program materials and information as required.
- c. Works with the media officers to promote S. T.E.A.M. to the membership.
- d. Keep records of classes given.
- 4. Work to find new avenues of educating the public and meeting the education needs of the motorcycling community.
- 5. Administer any education programs established and/or operated by A.B.A. T.E..
- 6. Operate in accordance with the A.B.A. T.E. bylaws and all other A.B.A. T.E. documents that are relevant to A.B.A. T.E.'s operations.
- 7. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or state board of directors.

L. Run coordinator (2 people)

The run coordinators shall:

- 1. Make all arrangements and contracts to provide any properties or permits required to have an *A.B.A.T.E.* run, event, fund raiser or etc.
- 2. Coordinate all functions related to staging a state run, event, fund raiser or etc.
- 3. Coordinate with the vice-coordinators and sergeant at arms to provide gate and security functions at state runs, events, fund raisers and etc.
- 4. Operate the state runs, events, fund raisers and etc. in accordance with the relevant *A.B.A.T.E.* policies and procedures.
- 5. Assist all chapter efforts to have chapter runs, events, fund raisers and etc.
- 6. Work with the media officers in promoting the state runs, events, fund raisers and etc.
- 7. Operate in accordance with the A.B.A.T.E. bylaws and all other A.B.A.T.E. documents that are relevant to A.B.A.T.E.'s operations.
- 8. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or state board of directors.

M. Sergeant at arms (3 people)

The sergeant at arms shall:

- 1. Be responsible for security at state board meetings, state runs, events, fund raisers and any other state functions requiring security.
- 2. Be responsible for the orderly operation of state board meetings, and shall carry out their duties with the assistance of the vice-coordinators for proper parliamentary procedures.
- 3. Be responsible for the proper handling of the A.B.A. T.E. banner and U.S. flag.
- 4. One of the sergeant at arms may be designated by the coordinator to be in charge or the *A.B.A.T.E.* inventory list and the inventory locations.
- 5. Operate in accordance with the A.B.A.T.E. bylaws and all other A.B.A.T.E. documents that are relevant to A.B.A.T.E.'s operations.
- 6. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or state board of directors.

N. Products director

The products director shall:

- 1. Be responsible for the purchase, storage, distribution, display and selling of A.B.A.T.E. products at state runs, events, fund raisers and etc.
- 2. Be responsible for the ordering and distribution of *A.B.A.T.E.* products to the chapter product directors and keep records of the transactions.

- 3. Keep accurate records of orders, purchases and funds received; and report these transactions to the state treasurer.
- 4. Cooperate with the treasurer in maintaining a working capital account for the purchase of *A.B.A.T.E.* products.
- 5. Work with the media officers in promoting the A.B.A. T.E. products to the membership.
- 6. Conduct the raffle drawings and/or 50/50 drawings at state runs, events, fund raisers and etc.
- 7. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* bylaws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.*'s operations.
- 8. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or state board of directors.

O. Historian

The historian shall:

- 1. Have the responsibility of maintaining a running record of the *A.B.A.T.E.* activities that occur throughout the year.
 - a. Keep an album/albums of appropriate photos, articles, flyers, newspaper clippings and other items of interest or information about State runs, events, fund raisers and activities.
 - b. Insure that all albums or records are preserved as well as possible and that they are made accessible for events or fund raisers upon request.
- 2. Be responsible for the recording of events by means of a camera, video equipment or sound equipment as applicable.
- 3. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* bylaws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.*'s operations.
- 4. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or state board of directors.

P. Sanctioning officer

The sanctioning officer shall:

- 1. Be responsible for the proper sanctioning of all A.B.A. T.E. events that require sanctioning.
- a. Have an exact understanding of, and act in accordance with the *A.B.A. T.E. of Oregon* sanctioning guidelines. 2. Be responsible for maintaining records of the sanctioned *A.B.A. T.E.* events.
- 3. Transmit/deliver the flyers of sanctioned events to the newsletter editor and the webpage editor prior to or by the 10th of the month.
- 4. Be responsible for obtaining event insurance coverage for A.B.A. T.E.
- 5. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* bylaws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.*'s operations.
- 6. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or state board of directors.

Q. Quartermaster

The quartermaster shall:

- 1. Be responsible for the procurement, purchase, maintenance, storage, inventory, distribution, disposition and record keeping of the entirety of *A.B.A. T.E.*'s properties.
- a. Keep accurate records of orders, purchases, work orders, incurred costs, monies handled and etc. and report these to the state treasurer.
- b. Cooperate with the state treasurer in maintaining a working capital account for the management of *A.B.A. T.E.* properties.
- 2. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* bylaws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.*'s operations.
- 3. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or state board of directors.

R. A.B.A.T.E. BikePAC representative

- The A.B.A.T.E. BikePAC representative shall:
- 1. Be resposible for attending all *BikePAC* meetings.
 - a. Make a report of the meeting events to the
 - A.B.A. T.E. state board of directors at the next regularly scheduled state board meeting.
 - b. Be responsible for the transfer / relay of communications between A.B.A. T.E. and BikePAC.
 - c. Operate in accordance with the A.B.A.T.E. bylaws and all other A.B.A.T.E. documents that are relevant to A.B.A.T.E.'s operations.
 - d. Perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator, executive board or state board of directors.

S. A.B.A.T.E. Confederation of Clubs representative (2)

The A.B.A. T.E. Confederation of Clubs representative shall:

- 1. Be responsible for attending all Confederation of Clubs meetings.
 - a. Make a report of the meeting events to the *A.B.A. T.E.* state board of directors at the next regularly scheduled state board meeting.
 - b. Be responsible for the transfer/relay of communications between

Ted and I had planned a ride to Denver, to attend the *Motorcycle Rider's Foundation's Best of the West* conference. Several others were interested in riding along, so a dinner was organized to pick the route that excited the participants.

What I did on my Summer Vacation (*The Southwest Geology Tour*)

part 1

Since Ted and I both participate in the *Rose City Motorcycle Club's Grand Tour*, we looked for a route that allowed us to pick up a couple checkpoints. We settled on heading out from Hillsboro to highway 22, taking the Santiam highway to central Oregon. That route features some great tree-shaded miles, and a nice view of Detroit Lake. 




