A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A. T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

- We are not a motorcycle club or gang. Instead, *A.B.A.T.E.* is a not-for-profit organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.
- It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride on.

We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, on-road or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.

• You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to *A.B.A.T.E.*

Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just *that* wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working on are important to their community.

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the Nationa Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H. T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments (A.B.A. T.E.).

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce H.R.3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet laws.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the *American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.)*, Ron Roloff of the *M.M.A.* of California and Ed Armstrong of *A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago* presented the house sub-committee on Surface Transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the *D.O.T.* because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet law mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by President Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years, first to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.




I will see you at the January state board meeting.

Newsbits -N-Pieces

Panama City, Florida — Timothy Pilgreen of Texarkana, Arkansas was charged with assaulting a law enforcement officer he allegedly scuffled with as he tried to flee, on top of the two counts of murder and four counts of attempted murder for driving the stolen pick-up into a group of "outlaw bikers" from Bay City, Michigan.

He killed two after having argued with them earlier. It looks like he will at least get a life sentence out of it. He may really get some "justice" after he is found out behind bars. I don't need to elaborate on that.

Pilgreen apologized and said he would ask for the death penalty because of that. He said he didn't want to face retribution in prison, when interviewed by *The News Herald* of Panama City.

Flandreau, South. Dakota — I gotta tell ya this guy representative Bill Janklow needs to feel the teeth of the law, which as you probably now know, he will. Janklow was convicted of manslaughter for killing a biker while speeding. He had been trying to claim he was passing just to avoid a speeding ticket, and speeding is part of the case against him. Along with raising awareness of this situation, this is one way fellow bikers can support a fallen brother. Here again is senseless loss of life. We need stronger laws on the books for this sort of thing. The people who do this need to have serious consequences to pay for negligent homicide. Make no mistake, this is *murder* on our roadways. It's time we put a stop to it with severe penalties.

Safety Alert!

I said something about this last month too. I say it again because it is so important: Metzeler has recalled motorcycle tires. The tire is: Metzeler model: SPORTEC M-1 P Build dates : January 26 - February 08, 2003.

If you wear Metzler tires on your scoot and have any doubt about this get to your tire dealer *now* and get the record set straight. Don't ride on dangerous rubber. Metzeler will replace those tires that are recalled free of charge to you. This is the first time N.H.T.S.A. has done anything worthwhile in my mind about oughta know that the Aid to Injured motorcycle safety. I'll give them thanks for the heads up.

(all-terrain vehicle) safety shows a 5% decline in the A.T.V. injury rate from 2001 to 2002; 31% decline in the A.T.V. injury rate from 1988 to 2002; 14% decline in the fatality rate for the period of 1999 to 2001; 15% decline since 1997 in the proportion of total ATV-related injuries that involve children under

The *C.P.S. C.* report states that its latest findings are based on "New risk estimates (for injuries and deaths) that make use of improved estimates of the C.P.S.C. prefaced its report with the observation that, "This year we made several changes to the report to bring it more in line with the current A.T.V. market and to aid in its readability."

More than 15 million Americans ride A.T.V.s in a safe and appropriate manner every year. A.T.V.s have become an essential tool for ranchers, law enforcement, the armed forces, recreational riders, handicap accessibility to remote locations, and others according to the Specialty Vehicle Institute of America (S. V.I.A.).

In the United States, sales of new 1991. Sales figures for 2002 were 5.6% over those of 2001. Even with this increasing popularity, the

C.P.S. C.'s data shows that the number of injuries is growing at a lesser rate in proportion to the A.T.V. population itself — in fact, the A.T.V. injury rate actually declined 5% from 2001 to 2002, the same year the A.T.V. industry saw over 5% growth in new unit sales. (S. V.I.A.)

Five other Southern California counties - Imperial, Inyo, Kern, Riverside and San Diego - have passed resolutions asserting similar rights. To date, only San Bernardino has petitioned the federal government to obtain ownership of public land under the jurisdiction of the U.S. Bureau of division Land Management.



In order to help chapter secretaries and anyone else who may be sending reports to the newsletter for publication, here's some guidelines that will make your job a bit easier and prevent the crusty ol' editor from becoming cranky and loud at state board meetings:

1. Reports are due by midnight (2400) on the tenth (10th) day of the month preceding publication.

If that makes you say "Huh?", then an example is in order — if you want something published in the February newsletter, then it must be submitted by 10 January.

As always, if life interferes with submitting your material on time, call the newsletter at (503)-838-6893 to make arrangements for submitting it later.

The main exception is that material will be accepted at state board meetings, particularly if notification has been given by the 10th.

2. Material may mailed, e-mailed, FAXed, delivered on 3-1/2" floppy disk, ZIP disk, or CD in "text" mode (".TXT") or JPEG for graphic material.

Electronic submissions (e-mail) are preferred, but are not mandatory. If e-mail is not an option for the originator, then the material may be delivered by alternative means.

Most chapters have members (or children of members) who have some computer savvy. Let them help with emailing material to the newsletter. It helps other members feel involved with the chapter.

Please do *not* get fancy with electronic submissions. Not everyone has the same software or computer system that you may have. Send material in the lowest form of formatting possible so that it is universally recognizable by most software. (And definitely do *not* send material in HTML format unless you enjoy being ignored.)

3. Do not FAX graphic materials.

The quality of even high quality FAX tends to very poor for publishing purposes. Use e-mail or send a printed copy of your graphic material.

Often what chapters and officers present in the newsletter forms the first impression for someone who is curious about *A.B.A. T.E.* and wants to find more information. Let's try to make the newsletter easy to read and as informative as possible.

I tell them the best way they can help us is by getting organized, promoting their own rights locally and nationally, and participating in our global movement. They pamper us but ignore the big and legitimate needs of their own!

I hope to meet the local *U.N.I.C.E.F.* boss here next week to talk about health services for children in Argentina's rural northern provinces. We have a motorcycle solution to a big problem, as shown by a letter (on my web page) from the secretary of health in Jujuy Province that needs 50 small motorcycles. Bolivia does more for their poor rural population's health than does Argentina. U.N.I.C.E.F. was I'm sure that the bikers can carve out instrumental in the establishment of Riders for Health in Africa many years ago, an organization unequaled in giving more "bangs for bucks" in terms

Brazil

Rio is one of the most beautiful cities in the world. The different suburbs being separated by dramatic solid rock mountains, the bays, beaches and boats. The curved Copacabana beach is impressively lined with white high rise apartment blocks. At the first hint of sun, Rio people head straight to the beaches that are usually packed by 10 am. There is a lot of gaiety (old sense of the word) in Rio, with their yearround preparations for the famous anything-goes carnival in February.

In Sao Paulo, a massive city, I found some of the people to be arrogant and selfish. I stayed enough time to change my tyres (many thanks eventually to Metzeler for the Pirellis, along with

Further south in Brazil the people room set aside for motorcycle travelers by Cicera Paes, and made my presentation to the riders. Many

The best organized and most you can look west and see Christ's effective bikers rights group I have met

A.M.O.-R.S., the state rights group in Rio Grand do Sul, Brazil's most southern state. I visited the president Leandro Balardin in Cachoeira do Sul and made my presentation there. This group successfully stopped a state wide rule mandating number plate number on helmets and clothing a la Colombia. They then went on to defeat the same proposal on a national basis.

(Incidentally the head of the A.M.O. Oh let's ignore it. Suffocation can't of Rio de Janeiro office twice refused to meet me, even once when I was in the room next door in his own offices. I think he will be gone soon.)

Uruguay

Sandwiched between Brazil and Argentina on the Atlantic coast. There is one thing the Uruguayans would like you to know: they are peace lovers. What with just a 3-4 million population, everyone in Uruguay knows each other. They are extremely friendly. I stopped to ask some policemen for directions. Within a few minutes they had me sat at their desk in their kiosk tucking into a big plate of pasta and sauce whilst they were on the phone making contact and getting directions for something called the Motorcyclist Center in Montevideo.

The country inland is flat and windy. Cattle rearing is the main activity. The grass is so good it grows right up to the sea. It was wonderful to see hundreds of thousands of newly planted trees, hardly enough to compensate the continuing destruction of the Amazon rainforest in Brazil but nevertheless a heartening sight.

I stayed with Pocho for a few nights, the most famous Uruguayan

motorcyclist who had traveled the Americas on his 500cc Honda and founded the motorcycle center, sort of an information point and cafeteria. Pocho's bike has an oven. He fits a home made exhaust for his trips, one that has a second chamber wrapped round the silencer, in which chunks of meat are cooked on a spit, during 160 km.

Fortunately there was a meeting of club representatives that I was able to address about motorcycle rights. I am hopeful that they will participate in a Latin American initiative, though there are few national or local issues right now. I apologize for not staying longer in this happy and friendly country.

Motos x Salud

Lastly, concerning health deliveries in poor rural Latin America, there are three categories of health ministries:

- 1. Those that do not use motorcycles but have a great need including southern Mexico, Ecuador, Paraguay and northern Argentina.
- 2. Those that use motorcycles extensively but have a big need for maintenance and training: Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Peru and Bolivia.
- 3. Those that use motorcycles but the money for maintenance is stolen: Brazil, Colombia and Costa Rica.

Lastly please let me know if you would like to receive Spanish updates. They are on my web page. They are not straight translations of these [reports]. They are even less frequent

but a little more focused. And shorter.
