#### A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A. T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

- A.B.A. T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as BikePAC.
- It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, onroad or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.
- You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to A.B.A. T.E. Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just that wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

## A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

by Bill Bish (A.B.A. T.E. of California; executive coordinator, National Coalition of Motorcyclists)

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. (A.B.A. T.E.)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the Huns Motorcycle Club in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California, and Ed Armstrong from A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for

bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through

So, there you have it.

The roots of A.B.A. T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

He also pointed out that only issues that impact the budget are even being heard during the 2012 short Oregon legislative session. Therefore our plans are covering a larger area than ever before and getting involved in the elections process will go much further to seeing us meet our goal. There are plans of attack being discussed and methods to deal with other problems considered.

The helmet reform bill will be introduced in the 2013 Oregon legislative session.

Another new year, and another time to take stock of where we are and where we're going, as motorcyclists and as Americans.

As the political season heats up toward the upcoming presidential and congressional elections, we should be asking ourselves and our candidates where we stand on our issues of freedom, and that's not just freedom of the road. Keep your eyes, ears, and minds open!

#### Newsbits-N-Pieces Federal Judge Upholds New York Motorcycle

#### **Checkpoints**

Albany, New York – Here's some news we didn't need. Federal judge Sharpe has rejected motorcyclists' claims that their constitutional rights were violated by New York state police highway checkpoints that stopped thousands of riders and ticketed many of them.

These stops looked like they were timed to disrupt folks riding to rallies in New York state. They were stopped supposedly for motorcycle safety checks. Cars were not stopped.

Four motorcyclists sued troopers, claiming safety was a mere pretext in looking for criminals and that the practice was intrusive and unfair to riders as a group.

Our A.I.M./N.C.O.M. attorney for New York and Connecticut, Mitch Proner, said many motorcyclists are interested in the case, the only such federal suit nationally, though some other states have similar checkpoint programs. Mitch says he will appeal the case. Mitch came to our N.C.O.M. regional meeting a few months ago, talking about this case.

According to the judge's ruling, 5,342 vehicles passed through 17 motorcycle-only checkpoints in 2008. Authorities inspected 2,278 bikes and made four criminal arrests in addition to issuing 1,064 tickets, including 365 for helmet violations, 99 for other safety violations, and 600 for non-safety violations.

The ruling cited state data

claiming an increase in motorcycle fatalities the preceding nine years, and an increase in tickets issued for illegal helmets from 35 in 2007 to 796 in 2008, almost half at the checkpoints. The judge also cited a 17 percent decrease in motorcycle fatalities from 2008 to 2009.

Lt. James Halvorsen, the detail commander of the state police motorcycle unit, claims the ongoing program, similar to seatbelt enforcement, succeeded in raising safety awareness. Most riders with approved helmets are waved through the checkpoints, where they slow but don't stop, he said.

"The intrusion on civil liberties is something that shouldn't be countenanced," Proner said. The New York checkpoints have continued, even though in New York, all cars and motorcycles are already subject to annual safety inspections, he said.

"It's obvious just from their own internal documents they're looking for criminal activity," Proner said. A checkpoint near Buffalo's Peace Bridge included border patrol agents, and one in central New York near a rally sponsored by a motorcycle club included gang task force officers, he said.

"The fact they didn't find crime doesn't mean that wasn't what they're fishing for," he said. "That just shows you've got [regulation] abiding citizens on motorcycles primarily being inconvenienced."

Recall – Here's a big one for Honda motorcycle owners from N.H.T.S.A. This Honda recall covers 126,000 GL-1800 motorcycles from the 2001 to 2012 model years. A problem with a secondary brake master cylinder can cause the rear brake to drag, possibly causing a crash or fire. In documents sent to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, Honda said that 26 complaints have been received, including two about fires.

**A.I.M.** and **N.C.O.M.** DVD – There's a new DVD from A.I.M. and N.C.O.M. I'll be dropping them off for you at bike shops and at biker events. Check it out. Lots of

information about what *N.C.O.M.* does, rights issues, and even a clip from our own *A.I.M.* lawyer, Sam Hochberg. They're free.

Portland, Oregon Toy Time -Thousands of bikers made their way to the Shriners Children's Hospital for the 32nd Annual Toy Run. Every year A.B.A.T.E. delivers toys and games to the kids at the Portland hospital. Several streets closed down while the group rode across the city to the hospital. They said it also used the proceeds from a raffle to donate \$30,000 worth of equipment to the hospital. They expected 2,000 riders, but estimated that 6,500 riders actually took part. (A sunny day in Oregon will bring out the bikes.)

Shriners Hospitals for Children provides care and services regardless of any patient's ability to pay.

Buffalo, New York: The Un-Chosen Few — When the government announced its case against the Chosen Few Motorcycle Club, 2-1/2 years ago, the charges sounded like something out of a crime movie. It said the Chosen Few were in a "war" against the Lonely Ones Motorcycle Club. All told, nineteen current and former members were arrested, some being held for several years.

The government dropped all of the charges against the *Chosen Few*. Seems their informant was unreliable and some of the information the informant obtained was "not factual." (Sounds like a polite way of saying their informant lied a lot.)


The prosecutor put out a one sentence statement: "Our office moved to dismiss the presently pending indictment in light of information that recently came to light."

Uh-huh.


> Interestingly enough, many people take Rot Path's name far too literally. (When they aren't calling him "Rod".)





## Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner Receives Motorcycling Award

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation (M.R.F.) reports that A.B.A.T.E. of Wisconsin awarded congressman Jim Sensenbrenner with its certificate of appreciation. The award goes to individuals who go above and beyond when it comes to protecting motorcyclists' rights. In years past, the award was reserved for A.B.A.T.E. members only. This is the first time it has ever been awarded to anyone outside the organization.

Sensenbrenner has redefined what it means to go "above and beyond." He has worked tirelessly to protect motorcyclists' rights on every front at the federal level for over 35 years.

"Not only are the motorcyclists of Wisconsin in Mr. Sensenbrenner's debt, every motorcyclist in this country has benefitted from his steadfast support," said Jeff Hennie, M.R.F. vice president government relations and public affairs.

Representative Sensenbrenner has been the lead advocate for stopping motorcycle-only roadside checkpoints, supporting crash avoidance over safer crashing, and lately the ethanol fuel issue.

The *M.R.F.* also commends *A.B.A.T.E. of Wisconsin* for fostering a model relationship with an elected official. This should be an example to everyone for developing a good working relationship with an elected official.

Congressman Sensenbrenner, upon receiving the award, said, "I want to thank A.B.A.T.E. of

Wisconsin for their tireless work to raise awareness on issues that affect motorcyclists. I am honored to work with them to make their voices heard in Washington [D.C.], and I look forward to continuing our efforts to reduce unnecessary and burdensome federal government regulations."

John Reblin, who presented the award, pointed out that, "Representative Sensenbrenner was chosen because of the support he has given motorcyclists throughout the years with his common sense approach with such things as HR-748 to prohibit the E.P.A. from authorizing the use of gasoline greater than 10 percent ethanol in certain vehicles, and HR-904 which would prohibit the federal D.O.T. from providing grants or any other funds to another unit of government for motorcycle-only checkpoints."

The *M.R.F.* joins *A.B.A.T.E.* of *Wisconsin* in recognizing the leadership and dedication of the honorable F. James Sensenbrenner.

#### N.H.T.S.A. Motorcycle Study Proposal

The M.R.F. reports that the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) has requested comments on a proposed motorcycle safety study.

The study they are proposing copycats one that the *Motorcycle Safety Foundation* (*M.S.F.*) is currently conducting, known as the "naturalistic study." The *M.S.F.* 

study has instrumented a hundred motorcycles with computers, cameras and all sorts of meters. Those specially-equipped one hundred motorcycles are being ridden by volunteers across the country as their personal bikes. After one year, the instruments are taken off and the analysis begins. *N.H.T.S.A.* is proposing the exact same study, only with 160 motorcycles.

This proposal does come as a bit of a shock, considering the federal government has been struggling to conduct another motorcycle study that tracks actual crashes. That "crash causation study" has been languishing since 2006 and has yet to complete data collection, analysis, or final reporting.

"I do like the idea of the study," said Jeff Hennie, M.R.F. vice president of government relations and public affairs. "Tracking volunteer riders and collecting some best practices for countermeasures is a great idea, but as with every study there will be some technical and logistical bugs to work out over the course of the study. It seems to me that it would be wise to wait on the M.S.F. results and use them to craft a better, sturdier study."

*N.H.T.S.A.* is already predicting that out of the 160 participants in their proposed new naturalistic study, 20 will have a crash and sustain injuries so severe that they must be reported. So far there has been no mention of the cost for the new study.



Federal officials are asking for comments on the proposal. The comment period runs through January 17, 2012.



## Court Allows Raid On Rider Ed Funds

The Illinois supreme court may have opened the door for states to reallocate hundreds of millions of dollars from dedicated funding to balance their budgets.

In a recent 6-to-1 decision, the state's high court upheld a prior circuit court ruling that backed the governor and legislature's ability to take money from hundreds of special state funds to offset budgetary deficits, a practice commonly referred to as "sweeping".

Motorcycle riders sued former governor Rod Blagojevich after he swept \$1.2 million from the *Cycle Riders Safety Training Fund* (*C.R.S. T.F.*) to pay general state bills after a 2004 bill passed by legislators allowed him to do so. A portion of the fee for an Illinois motorcycle license goes into the *C.R.S. T.F.*, which *A.B.A. T.E. of Illinois* argued was only to be spent on motorcycle safety education.

"Clearly, the fee charged by the state for motorcycle registration and licensing is state revenue, and therefore the portion of this state revenue which the general assembly has allocated to the C.R.S.T.F. is also public money," wrote justice Anne Burke in the majority opinion. Burke rejected the A.B.A.T.E. lawyers' argument that the special fund was tantamount to a special trust fund.

The state supreme court concluded that the legislature cannot create an irrevocable trust with public money because this would place an unconstitutional restraint upon the legislature's plenary power.

Sweeping special funds was a controversial way to deal with budget deficits during the Blagojevich administration, and although the court's ruling opens the door to more such sweeps, current Illinois governor Pat Quinn opposes fund sweeps and has worked to end the practice.

#### Michigan Requests Support For Helmet Freedom

Michigan may be on the verge of repealing their mandatory helmet regulation as senate bill 291 appears destined for the governor's desk. *A.B.A.T.E. of Michigan* has issued a "call to action" requesting the help of all motorcyclists in their freedom of choice efforts.

SB–291 passed the Michigan senate 24-14 in late June, and is now back for a "concurrence vote" after passing the house 69-39 on November 2nd, so a favorable vote will put *A.B.A. T.E.*'s hopes in the hands of governor Rick Snyder who has not indicated whether he will sign or veto the measure. Two previous repeal bills were vetoed by then-governor Jennifer Granholm.

"Governor Snyder prides himself on being all about business and helping business," said Vince Consiglio, president for A.B.A.T.E. of Michigan, adding; "A letter from a 'free' state may help him realize Michigan loses motorcycle money every day of the summer with a mandatory helmet [requirement]."

Under the bill, motorcyclists 21 and older would have the option of riding helmet-free if they have two years of experience or have taken a safety course, and if they buy at least \$20,000 in medical insurance.

#### Bikers Rally To Rescind Unfair Policy

"The state fair of Louisiana, for a minute, mind you, adopted a discriminatory position toward bikers by posting signs that would not allow them to attend the fair in their traditional biker gear, some of which is protective gear," said Mary Baker in an article in the *Examiner* newspaper, adding that "...bikers everywhere contribute to charity in a way that not many other segments of the population do... And, they definitely make an impact on the local community, spending hundreds of thousands of dollars at local establishments including restaurants, theaters, bars, parks, and small businesses. That is why it is disheartening to hear of discrimination based solely on appearance."

Upon being alerted of the fair's new anti-biker policy, *Facebook* exploded with messages like this:

"Alert/Info: The State Fair of La. has adopted the policy: No colors... Signs are now being posted at all gates. No biker colors of any kind. Please pass this on to all biker friends and family. MC's are being discriminated against. To complain:::: Call state fair of La. Let your voices be heard.... Repost!!! Don't support the fair..."

You can imagine that bikers, their friends, and family were livid. They began to complain about the discrimination with phone calls to the director of the state fair, and his offices.

The result: Before the end of the day, this message by the representative for *Independent Riders, Northwest Louisiana*, was posted on *Facebook*:

"Update...Update...Update... We have won !!!!! Just received a call... And the State Fair of Louisiana has now changed their policy. The signs have been removed and all bikers are welcome at the fair !!!!!!! Never, never, never underestimate the power of a close knit family !!! Thanks to all who made calls and helped !!!"

Louisiana state *C.O.I.R.* (*Coalition Of Independent Riders*) commander Lionel "Nite Train" Bailey reported that the *U.S. Defenders* and *C.O.I.R.* conducted a phone campaign and



not only have the Louisiana state fair officials rescinded their no colors policy, but even offered to organize a biker night for a *Blue Oyster Cult* concert.

#### Legislators Override Governor's Veto Of Red Light Bill

The Illinois house voted 94-21 and the senate voted 45-6 to override governor Pat Quinn's veto of the "Dead Red" bill supported by *A.B.A.T.E. of Illinois* that would allow motorcyclists to proceed through malfunctioning red lights.

As written, house bill 2860 sponsored by senator Gary Forby (D-Benton) and representative Daniel Beiser (D-Alton), specifies that a motorcyclist would be permitted to legally [proceed through] a red light "after a reasonable period of time," but Quinn vetoed the legislation with the request that a two minute wait time be amended to it.

The legislation will now go into effect on January 1, 2012, and according to senator Forby; "A measure I sponsored (HB–2860) will now become [effective] after I was successful in overriding the governor's amendatory veto. The bill allows motorcyclists to go through a red light if it fails to change to green because the switch hasn't been tripped, or didn't recognize the motorcycle. To alleviate a few of the concerns some of my colleagues raised, I introduced a "trailer bill" that requires motorcyclists to wait 120 seconds before proceeding through the red light. For those of us who have been stuck at a light without it ever changing to green, we know how reasonable this legislation is. This situation happens more than many people think and is a growing concern for bikers at outdated intersections. In fact, 360 rear end collisions occurred with motorcycles that were slowed or stopped in traffic in 2010. If bikers are trapped at a light, this bill gives them an opportunity to safely proceed through that signal, because otherwise they don't really have much of a choice. 11 other states already have

#### **International Motorcycle Safety Reports Released**

Headlight configurations that make motorcycles more noticeable, why drivers fail to give way to motorcycles at T-intersections, and how mirror use influences carmotorcycle conflicts are among the topics researched and reported on in the new January issue of Accident Analysis and Prevention (A.A.&P.), a journal primarily focused on causes and impacts of transportation crashes.

The themed A.A.&P. edition is titled Safety and Mobility of Vulnerable Road Users: Pedestrians, Bicyclists, and Motorcyclists and consists of a selection of papers presented at an international conference organized by Israel's National Road Safety Authority.

In a report entitled Recognizability Of Different Configurations Of Front Lights On Motorcycles, the researchers say that "Results of a laboratory experiment have shown that motorcycles with a T-shaped light configuration are more quickly identified, particularly when the motorcycles are in visual competition with other motorized road users."

In Why Do Car Drivers Fail To Give Way To Motorcycles At T-junctions?, researchers studied differences between novice drivers, experienced drivers, and "dual drivers," i.e., drivers who also ride motorcycles. They found that dual drivers were better at recognizing motorcycles than either of the other two groups. While the results are inconclusive, the researchers state that "We argue that this is potential evidence for an oculomotor basis for 'look-but-fail-tosee' errors."

The report Attention And Search Conspicuity Of Motorcycles As A Function Of Their Visual Context says that multi-colored, reflective, and white rider outfits consistently made the riders more noticeable than a black outfit.

Cars changing lanes without recognizing that a motorcycle is in that lane is a common experience for motorcyclists, and that topic is addressed in Attending Overtaking Mirrors Before Changing Lanes. Not surprisingly, the researchers found that "Risky maneuvers were less likely to occur in those cases where more time was spent gazing at the mirrors."

#### **Motorcyclists Beware: States With The Worst Drivers**

You might believe that your state has the worst drivers in the country, but a newly released report from http:// www.Carinsurancecomparison. com ranked states according to their safety record to determine where the bad drivers live.

Five factors were considered when determining the rankings: fatalities per million miles traveled, drunken driving, the number of tickets issued, failure to obey traffic signals, and carelessness.

Data was compiled from the National Highway and Transportation Safety Administration (driving fatalities), the National Motorist's Association (traffic tickets), and M.A.D.D. (drunk drivers).

Here is their list of the ten states with the worst drivers:

- #10 South Carolina Ranked 48th for fatalities and 45th for obeying road signs.
- #9 Alabama 46th for tickets. 42nd for fatalities. 41st for obeying road signs.
- #8 Montana Highest ticket rate in the country. Also ranked 40th for carelessness.
- Kentucky 42nd for carelessness and 48th for drunk driving.
- #6 Arizona Ranked poorly across the board.
- #5 Oklahoma Lots of D.U.I.s, fatal crashes, and traffic tickets.
- #4 Florida Not as many drunk drivers, but Florida has more tickets than any other state.
- #3 Texas Ranked pretty poor in all categories.
- #2 Missouri Ranked in the

bottom 10 for carelessness and D.U.I.s.

#1 – Louisiana - In the bottom 10 in all categories except failure to obey signs.

The safest driving states were Rhode Island, followed by Connecticut, Massachusetts, Virginia, and New Hampshire.

#### **Weird News Spain Fines Over** Helmetless **Tom Hanks Poster**

The Spanish distributor for the movie Larry Crowne was fined for a poster showing stars Tom Hanks and Julia Roberts riding a motorcycle without a helmet.

Tripictures was given a traffic fine of 30,000 euros (\$41,500) for using the film's U.S. poster to promote the movie's overseas premiere because the government claimed it promoted reckless driving.

The distributor initially thought the ticket was a joke, but in 1985 instituted a regulation

that banned advertisements from promoting reckless driving.

Fines are also given to celebrities if they promote the image of poor driving.

One example came last year, when singer Shakira rode through Barcelona on a motorcycle without a helmet in one of her music videos.

## **Want Some Money?**

Saving bucks by doing their own repairs is an activity that a lot of riders are familiar with.

But when winter lays its icy grip on the land and box-ends slip out of yer cold-numbed hands, maybe it's time to take a break from wrenching on yer bike and find an indoor activity that can save or earn some coins for yer riding fund.

Here's a quick fix that can endear you home movie watchers, music listeners, and computer geeks alike — repairing their erratic CD/DVD drives.

A truth of our times is that many folks know how to use fancy equipment, but few know how to perform even rudimentary simple repairs. Those with disposable incomes (whatever those are) find it easier to buy a new product rather than make the effort of having a malfunctioning unit repaired. Their fiscal laziness is our gain.

Normally the world of electronic gizmos is considered "clean" because it doesn't use a lot of dirty ol' liquids like engine oil, hydraulic fluid, antifreeze, or grease. But the fact of the matter is that dust and dirt can cause just as much havoc in electromechanical devices as it does in engines.

In the case of CD/DVD drives, dust and dirt can build up on a rubber

ring of the hub that holds the spinning plastic CD/DVD disk, causing it to slip thereby making it difficult for the L.A.S.E.R. to read data accurately. The lens for the L.A.S.E.R. can also become obscured by dirt, making it read data erratically.

Experiment on a spare unit first. (And a reasonable degree of sobriety will be a big plus until finished.)

Materials normally needed are:

- Phillips screwdriver.
- Q-Tips.
- Cleaning fluid that can be used on rubber and plastic.
- Plastic ice cube tray.
- Needle nose pliers.

(For retrieving dropped screws.)

To clean the hub ring and L.A.S.E.R. lens, first turn off the unit needing repair, then unplug the power cord.


WARNING: L.A.S.E.R.s create intense energy not visible to mere mortals that can permanently damage eyesight, so never, ever work on any L.A.S.E.R. device that has power connected to it.

In the case of stand alone entertainment DVD players, there are usually four to six screws on the sides and back holding on the main cover of the unit. Remove the screws and put them into one of the ice cube tray compartments. Carefully lift off the main cover.

Computer CD/DVD drives require that the computer case be opened up and the drive removed. (Or get the computer user to remove it.) If you know the handle from the blade of a screwdriver, you can figure out which screws need to be removed in order to get the drive out. Draw pictures and use the ice cube tray to hold small parts removed. There will be two cables on the back of the drive unit that can be disconnected by gently but firmly pulling them out. (Grasp the plugs, not the wires.)

Once you have direct access to the CD/DVD unit, there will normally be four to six screws holding on the top cover of the device. After removing those screws (and putting them in the ice cube tray, of course), the top can be gently lifted off and set aside on a clean surface.

Most likely what you can now see in the drive will look something like the photo below:




( Dirty ol' DVD unit needing cleaning.)

Use dry *Q-Tips* to wipe off built up dirt from the L.A.S.E.R. lens and rubber hub ring. Wipe dust off the disk tray and other exposed components. Make sure there is no hair or dirt buildup on the ends of the silver arms along which the L.A.S.E.R. holder slides.

Now use liquid cleaner sparingly on a *Q-Tip* to clean the L.A.S.E.R. lens. Use dry Q-Tips to wipe off and dry the lens. Make sure there is no residue on it.

Next use some liquid cleaner on a *Q-Tip* to clean off the rubber hub ring. Thoroughly dry it off using fresh *Q-Tip*s.

It should gleam like this:



Now it's just a matter of putting everything back together in reverse order that it was taken apart. (You *did* make drawings, right?)

Plug in the power cord, turn the unit on, insert a disk, enjoy the fruits of yer labors.

(Have a fire extinguisher standing by.)






