The name many tribes gave themselves in their own language translates into English as:

"We-The-People."

It is up to each of us individually and collectively as citizens to decide if the ideals those words represent are how we want to guide our lives together.

### A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, *A.B.A. T.E.* stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subvesive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcycists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcyclle issues.

• We are not a motorcycle club or gang.

Instead, *A.B.A.T.E.* is a not-for-profit organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.

• It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride on.

We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, on-road or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.

• You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to *A.B.A.T.E.* 

Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just *that* wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working on are important to their community.

## A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

*Easyriders* magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the *Nationa Highway Transportation Safety Administration* (*N.H.T.S.A.*) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments (*A.B.A.T.E.*).

*Easyriders* began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. *D.O.T.* (*Department of Transportation*) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce H.R.3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet laws.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California and Ed Armstrong of A.B.A. T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on Surface Transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet law mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by President Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976. Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years, first to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.


Gladys drew the 50/50 winning ticket which belonged to Paul C., who won \$58 American dollars. Right on.



## **American Motorcyclist Association NEWS and NOTES**

*Bill*), adding motorcycles to the consumer protection statute, has been signed into law due largely to the advocacy of *A.M.A*. Board of Directors Vice-president Dal Smilie. In addition, Smilie and other activists prevented proposed seatbelt requirements on A.T.V.s.

New York Assembly Bill 8095, introduced by Assemblymember Ron Canestrari (D-Albany), and Senate Bill 2178, introduced by Senator Joseph E. Robach (R-Monroe), propose increased penalties for right-of-way violations.

Based on the A.M.A. Motorcyclists Matter campaign model legislation, the added fines and driver license/privilege suspension provided for in these bills would be in addition to any other penalties imposed by the courts.

Letters in support of A-8095 should be sent to The Honorable David F. Gantt, Chairperson, Assembly Transportation Committee, Legislative Office Building, Albany, NY 12248 while letters in support of S-2178 should be sent to The Honorable John R. Kuhl, Jr., Chairperson, Senate Transportation Committee, Legislative Office Building, Albany, NY 12247.

Michigan Senate Bill 462, sponsored by Senator Valde Garcia (R-Howell) and co-sponsored by eleven other senators, proposes to move the Michigan Motorcycle Safety Education Program from the Department of Education to the Secretary of State. SB-462 was introduced on May 7, 2003 and referred to the Senate Transportation Committee.

The survival of the Michigan Motorcycle Safety Education Program was threatened in the fiscal year 2004 Department of Education budget proposal of Governor Granholm, in which she recommended the termination

Montana HB127 (The Lemon Law of this and the Off-Road Vehicle Safety Education Program. Senator Garcia's bill would save the Motorcycle Safety Education program by moving it to the Secretary of State's office and keep the current funding structure in place.

A N.A.S.A. developed infrared, heatseeking camera (originally designed to help satellites detect incoming missiles) is now being tested as an aid in preventing wildlife-vehicle collisions.

Parks Canada conducted a pilot test last year by mounting the camera on a highway outside Kootenay National Park in British Columbia. The strip of road is known for its extremely high rate of motor vehicle accidents involving deer, moose, wolves, bears and elk. The camera, which scanned for heat patterns threequarters of a mile down highway and about 80 feet on either side, was linked to software that interprets heat patterns.

When an animal was detected near the road, the computer sent a signal to roadside signs, setting off flashing lights and warning motorists to slow down and watch for wildlife. By this summer the company, **InTransTech** (www.intranstech.com), plans to market the system to transportation agencies worldwide.

Massachusetts motorcyclists, through their grassroots action, have convinced



the house of representatives to restore lineitem funding for the Massachusetts Motorcycle Safety Program. Visits, letters, e-mails, faxes and phone calls to legislators convinced House members to approve a version of the budget that included

The joint effort to get activists to contact their legislators was largely an endeavor of the Massachusetts Motorcycle Association (M.M.A.) and the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.).

Motorcyclists since have used the same technique focusing their attention on the senate ways and means committee, which submit their budget own recommendation, to save the fund in the senate as well.

Washington legislators are meeting in Olympia for a special overtime session to arrive at a budget solution that could affect O.H.V. enthusiasts. The legislature is trying to use O.H.V. gas tax funds to cover the funds normally given to the Department of Natural Resources (D.N.R.) out of the states General Fund.

The Senate's proposal is to transfer \$450,000 from the N.O.V.A. (O.H.V.) grant program to D.N.R. while the House version includes taking all of the O.H.V. money, giving \$3 million to State Parks on top of the \$450,000 to the *D.N.R.* 

The Washington state constitution states that gas tax money can only be used for motorized purposes. This proposal has prompted the Northwest Motorcyclist Association (http://www.nmaoffroad.org) to file a lawsuit to stop the theft of the funds.

Maryland House Bill 923, the parking bill to prohibit local governments from restricting the number of motorcycles that can legally be parked in a metered parking space, was signed into law by governor Robert L. Ehlich, Jr. on May 13, 2003.

In addition, O.M.B. oversees and coordinates the administration's procurement, financial management, information, and regulatory policies.

U.S. senator Susan Collins (R-ME) introduced S. 423, The Health Care Parity for Legal Transportation and Recreational Activities Act. U.S. representative Scott McInnis (R-CO-3) introduced the house companion bill, H.R. 1749. Senator Collins was joined by senator Feingold (D-WI) in introducing the senate legislation. Representative McInnis was joined by representative Ted Strickland (D-OH-6) in addition to 49 original cosponsors to the House bill.

The legislation aims at promoting Act. health care parity for individuals participating in legal transportation and

HB-923, sponsored by delegate George recreational activities-activities like riding, running or walking. This legislation addresses a loophole caused by a Department of Health and Human Services' rule making it possible for health care coverage to be denied to those who are injured while participating in these activities.

> As background, self-insured employers and unions have been known to deny health benefits to their motorcyclist employees and union members. These unfair measures had been adopted on the questionable advice of third party administrators in an effort to keep the cost of insurance premiums low.

> On August 21, 1996 an important opportunity arose when president Clinton signed the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (H.I.P.A.A.), prohibiting employers from denying health care coverage based on a worker's pre-existing medical conditions

> In 2001, the Health Care Finance would govern the law. The rules recognize that employers cannot refuse health care coverage to an employee on the basis of their participation in a recognized recreational activity. However, the benefits can be denied for injuries sustained in connection with those recreational activities. Essentially, the regulation grants protective status to motorcyclists without any substantive benefits.

> The A.M.A.is urging all motorcyclists-and those involved in any other type of recreational activity- to notify their Members of Congress and tell them to support S.423 and H.R. 1749, The Health Care Parity for Legal Transportation and Recreational Activities



Lake County, Illinois unanimously approved an anti-noise law that regulates everything from all-terrain vehicles to lawn mowers after several homeowners sought noise limits, saying neighbors were holding A.T.V. races and disturbing the peace.

The measure doesn't address boat noise, but it includes loud motorcycles, snowmobiles, live bands, stereo amplification systems and power tools. The ordinance, which applies only to unincorporated areas of the county, is modeled after a Kane County anti-noise law.

It outlaws any noise coming from private property that can be heard 100 feet away and limits the use of buzz saws, hammers and other construction tools to between 6 a.m. and 9 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays.

Violations of the ordinance, which will be primarily enforced by the county's Planning, Building and Development Department, will be punishable by fines ranging from \$25 to \$500, depending on how many violations occur.

# **Motorcyclists Flex Lobbying Muscle**

Michael Kerr's reflection in the chromeplated rearview mirror of his *Harley-Davidson Electra Glide* reveals a modern-day *Easy Rider*. Bearded and long-haired, the 52-year-old Chicagoan favors jeans or black leather when he straddles his hog, but he's just as comfortable slipping into a suit and tie to press the flesh with politicians.

"I would debate the president of the United States on motorcycle rights," Kerr recently told Rex W. Huppke, a staff reporter for the *Chicago Tribune*. Kerr has ridden motorcycles for 35 years and is head of an Illinois motorcycle group's political action committee. "We've become far more politically astute. People understand that if we don't stay aware, we could lose our rights."

"Some scowl at motorcyclists, calling them reckless, risky and noisy," states Huppke in his May 27 article, "But as summer days beckon bikers to city streets and country roads, riders like Kerr ignore the criticism, ease out the clutch and roll off smiling, knowing their numbers are growing right along with their political muscle." He goes on to write, in part?

A full-throttle charge by motorcycle activists has weakened helmet laws in 30 states, five since 1997. That's good news for riders who believe mandatory helmet use violates their personal liberty, but it's a disturbing trend for safety experts who point to a soaring increase in motorcycle fatalities.

Quick to say they don't oppose helmets, just helmet laws, activists have seen their clout with lawmakers grow steadily in recent years. Along with tackling the helmet issue, groups in Illinois and across the country have proved skilled at beating other legislation from emissions standards to rules on handlebar heights — that motorcyclists believe impedes their right to "ride free."

Based on their success with lawmakers, it's clear bikers are quick learners.

In the mid-1970s, all but three states— Illinois, California and Utah—required every motorcyclist to wear a helmet. But thanks to groups like *A.B.A.T.E.*, 27 states have amended their helmet laws so that only young people — normally 21 or younger are required to wear them. Another 20 states and the District of Columbia still have laws covering all riders, and three states — Illinois, Colorado and Iowa — have no helmet law at all.

Kerr says lawmakers in California, Pennsylvania and Michigan are edging closer to weakening their rules on helmet laws, and other states are also on the bubble.

That's in large part because advocates such as Kerr — bikers like to call them "legislative warriors" — are busy on the front lines.

While Kerr monitors political movements across the country and occasionally travels to Washington to lobby politicians, other *A.B.A.T.E.* members operate phone banks and put up election signs during campaigns, supporting politicians who agree to work with motorcyclists.

James "Doc" Reichenbach is a motorcycle activist who in 2000, with the help of 400,000 registered bikers, got Florida's law changed so that only riders 21 and younger have to don helmets. There is a reason the pendulum has swung in favor of bikers rights, he said.

"We have seminars. We exchange ideas. We work with legislatures," he said recently at a national motorcyclists' convention in Milwaukee that drew more than 1,000 bikers. "Politics is really just a game. Well, we learned the game, and now we make the rules."

Reichenbach is the President of A.B.A.T.E. of Florida, Inc., and serves as chairman of the board for the National Coalition of Motorcyclists. N.C.O.M. held it?s 18th annual Convention, May 8-10, at the Four Points Sheraton in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

So why do so many motorcyclists prefer not to wear "brain buckets," while straddling 150-horsepower bikes that can go from zero to 60 m.p.h. in a matter of seconds?

"Individual liberty is the No. 1 issue here," said H.W. "Sputnik" Strain, 63, a fiery, mohawked activist from Texas who is considered by many to be the Patrick Henry of bikers. "When the legislature tells you to wear a helmet, then they're telling you that you don't have the ability to think and reason."

Strain, who lobbied relentlessly and beat Texas' helmet law into submission, has never worn a helmet, not even in states that require them. He said he has received plenty of tickets, refuses to pay them and has warrants out for his arrest.

That might sound hard-boiled, but the hundreds of leather-clad, bearded, tattooed, coarse-talking bikers who gathered in Milwaukee — many of them lawyers and university professors — agreed with Strain, who is a respected member of their *N.C.O.M.* legislative task force.

As far as the risk, Jill McDugald of Charleston, South Carolina, said there are risks in everything. A classically trained pianist, she said she developed carpal tunnel syndrome from countless hours of playing.

"It was my choice to play the piano," she said, "and it's my choice to ride a motorcycle."

Gene Shafer, a biker and emergency-room doctor from Girard, Ill., shares McDugald's feelings. He says it's worth any risk to ride without a helmet. "Do I not put an IV into the arm of a person who's H.I.V.-positive, just because I'm afraid I might get H.I.V.?" he said. "No. That's my job, it's my duty. There are risks in all aspects of life." Shafer is also a member of *N.C.O.M.*'s legislative task force, which boasts numerous legislators as members, including U.S. senator Ben Nighthorse Campbell of Colorado, Wisconsin state senator Dave Zien, and South Dakota state senator Jim "Putt" Putnam.

Kerr, who is a maintenance mechanic for *Snap-On Tools* in Crystal Lake, Illinois, is happy to admit it's a good time to be a biker. But he's familiar enough with the changing winds of politics to know a motorcyclist can't just sit back and enjoy the ride.

"It brings a smile to my face to know that we have the attention and respect of some very important people in the country," Kerr said. "But while we're doing great, I know there's a downside to the curve. And there's just no way we can rest on our laurels."

### *N.A.A.C.P.* Files Discrimination Lawsuit Over *Black Bike Week*

On May 20th, the *N.A.A.C.P.* and a group of 25 black motorcycle riders have filed suit against the city of Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, various businesses and law enforcement, accusing them of discrimination during *Black Bike Week*, the biggest African-American biker rally in the country.

Plaintiffs say the event, held in South Carolina each Memorial Day weekend, has been marred by excessive police force, intrusive traffic laws and a hostility that flows from the shell-encrusted fringes of the Atlantic Ocean to the doors of the local *Denny's*.

"I've seen it myself," said Craig Williams, a Baltimore police detective who is a rider. "When the white bikers come to Myrtle Beach, the town rolls out the red carpet. When the black riders come, they roll it right up."

Each spring, Myrtle Beach plays host to two huge biker rallies, back to back; the predominantly white bike week, which has been going on for 63 years, is called *Harley-Davidson Week*, while the mostly black event is called the *Atlantic Beach Bike Fest*, or *Black Bike Week*, which began 20 years ago.

The gist of the legal action, filed in federal court in South Carolina, is that Myrtle Beach treats the two events differently.

The city's response: they are different. "Black Bike Week is rowdier, younger and much more crowded," said Myrtle Beach mayor Mark McBride, who has been an outspoken critic, frequently advocating the elimination of the event, but openly supporting "Harley Week."

City officials say *Black Bike Week* is nearly twice the size of *Harley Week* (375,000 people compared with 200,000 last year). That is why, they say, they change the streets to a one-way system and employ 550 police officers, compared with 300 for *Harley Week*.

Dennis Hayes, *N.A.A.C.P.* general counsel, said: "The conduct of these public and private institutions that close down or implement one-time restrictive and oppressive rules simply because most of the visitors in Myrtle Beach over the Memorial Day Weekend are

black cannot be tolerated. It is tragic and disheartening to see this type of blatant discrimination in the year 2003, nearly fifty years after the supreme court outlawed segregation in *Brown vs. Board of Education* and nearly forty years after congress outlawed race discrimination in places of public accommodations."

### Bikers Boycott Laughlin Run

Members of the Arizona *Confederation of Motorcycle Clubs*, irked at security precautions such as checkpoints and a ban on wearing colors, boycotted the *Laughlin River Run* and held a *Screw Laughlin Run* in Phoenix instead.

A year after a deadly brawl, Laughlin, Nevada, law enforcement agencies adopted extra precautions for this year's event including increased patrols, checkpoints and a ban on colors. But many Arizona motorcyclists boycotted the *River Run* to protest what they view as civil rights infringements, reported *The Arizona Republic* newspaper.

Pat "Pooh Bear" Conley, national president of *Sober Riders* and chairman of the confederation, said the boycott was organized so riders wouldn't be "subjected to the civil rights issues" in Laughlin.

Robert "Speedy" Lance, vice president of the *Glendale Limey Riders* club, said bikers from Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, Texas and California attended the *Screw Laughlin* ride, sponsored by *Limey Riders*, *Sober Brothers*, *Sober Riders*, *Rough Riders* and *Desert Thunder* motorcycle clubs, and the *Modified Motorcycle Association of Arizona*.

### Swiss Bikers Protest Speed Limits

Thousands of bikers converged on the Swiss capital, Bern, to protest plans to limit bike speeds to 80kmh on the motorways. The country's biggest motorcyclist association, *Pro Moto*, organized the mass demonstration outside the government building.

Although the demonstration took place without bikes, the procession of bikers, making their way into Bern - at 80kmh [50 mph] - brought traffic around the city to a standstill. It was reported that over 35,000



motorcyclists came from all over the country to protest proposals from the *Swiss Council for Accident Prevention* (*B.F.U.*) to reduce the number of deaths on the country's roads.

But the bikers argue than the plan would introduce technical alterations making it impossible to go any faster than 80kmh, would be discriminatory and make them the laughing stock abroad. They say they are not against moves to reduce the number of deaths on the road, which number 600 a year, 100 of which are motorcyclists, but *Pro Moto* says the country's 500,000 bikers just want to be granted the same treatment as other road users.

## Weird News Of The Month

A naked motorcyclist wearing just a scarf, sunglasses and a pair of sandals crashed his bike after he was stung on the inner thigh by a bee. The 36-year-old, who had been driving to the swimming area at a German nudist colony, lost control of the bike as he swatted the insect away.

He fell on to the road, but escaped with just a shoulder injury and minor cuts and bruises. Police said they are considering pressing charges after the incident — as the man was not wearing a crash helmet.

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## **Millenium Ride**

26 May 2003 Medellin, Colombia

Medellin, the industrial heart of Colombia, as he commences the South American leg of his motorcycle ride around the world. He recounts his journey across the Carribean Sea on a pirate ship from Panama, his initial impressions of the genuine and friendly Colombian people and motorcycling. These are the subjects occupying his mind and time along with the stunning beauty of the Colombian women and how to introduce health by motorcycle in Mexico. in Colon Panama to becoming legal in Colombia was US\$280 for me and the bike. Not too bad by most license or who simply prefer to avoid standards but I still think I was overcharged. I've been here now for two weeks, arriving on the 30meter loaded into a launch to reach the Flor Islena on Isla Fuerte just off Colombia's Carribean coast. The crossing, at 7mph with two break country on my trip, it has might as downs, took three days and four nights. My bike was buried beneath the contraband consisting of truck tyres, textiles, electric ceiling fans and videos. There were cabin beds only for a few, most of the five passengers and crew had to sleep under the scorching sun and lashing rain. My sleeping bag and mat have little grip together, a discovery made half asleep at 4am when a large wave rocked the boat. I

saved by a sleeping crew member.

Our route followed Panama's coast and I could see the Darien jungle to Simon Milward e-mails from starboard. We stopped at various San Blas islands daily at 5pm for rest and sleep before continuing at 3am. Panama's indigenous San Blas indians govern themselves and are such a gentle and peaceful people with their straw huts, colourful clothing and motorised but patched dugout canoes used for fishing.

> I saw dolphins, a wonderfully gracious sight, in groups of two and three they swam, making a bit of a display for us. The shoal of flying fish (flying) were even more amazing. About sardine size with rapidly flapping silver wings or the mini symbols of a tamborine in butterfly mode.

The Colombian welcome on Isla Total costs from entering the port Fuerte, home to a number of contrabandistas, presumably whose ships are in too bad condition to taxes, was an all night beach bar and music and dancing. My bike was mainland.

Well, if I am to be illegal in any well be Colombia right? I had no passport stamp and no bike documents. Officials at the three police and army checkpoints on the road to Cartagena regarded my illegal status as quite normal. They even stepped aside for an interruption by pretty 17 year old Sorneyda on her bicycle "I want to come with you, pick me up on your way south." Well, by that time she had changed her mind. was sliding towards the edge but was But, generally speaking, Colombian

women are stunningly beautiful, outside and inside too.

The lovely colonial Carribean port of Cartagena is a fortress built around natural bays to keep out British and French pirates. It was a staging post for 40 million African slaves arriving for their Spanish masters.

The process of becoming legal here took about three hours and after a few days I headed south here to Medellin. Soon I was riding through the mountains, and how glorious they are. I needed several odd things along the way and people are very surprised to see me, helping me in all sorts of ways. I was told that the roadside mango trees were planted by the government so that travellers can eat.

I am enjoying Medellin, elevation 1,500m and about 1,500 km north of the equator. The red brick buildings are superbly set off against the green mountainsides surrounding the city, often bathed in an evocative mist. It rained so hard two days ago the lower floor of El Colombiano newspaper flooded out. I was amazed at how laid back everybody was about moving the equipment and newspapers out of the water bubbling up through the floor. Perhaps because, in Colombia, people put things in perspective. 12 June 2003 Tulcan, Ecuador

#### Dear everyone,

Just a quick note to say "Hi" to you all from Tulcán in Ecuador before I head south to find somewhere nice to camp on the way to Quito. For the last two days I have been riding through what are regarded as the most dangerous areas of Colombia (south from Cali) due to guerrilla activity. I didn't see any F.A.R.C. or other guerrillas, but I was keeping my eye out for army trousers not tucked in boots, beards and general lack of order. This is how you recognize guerrillas from the genuine army. I should think you could make out these features from 20 metres but I had no plans to stop should they appear. I armor plated my bike yesterday in Popoyan, using my bash plate (metal plate to protect the engine's

underside in rocky pistes) to cover the rear tyre. I figured that guerrillas wouldn't shoot to kill since then I'd be worthless. Because I had no intention of stopping for them, the rear tyre was vulnerable. Odd bits of metal and wood covered the rear of my bag and hence back, which departed after about 50km. My arrow helmet has been through a lot. I'm sure it would have dealt with a few bullets. People had been asking if I had fear, and a good friend in Cali said I should be shing myself. So I gave in and spent yesterday doing that. Ha ha. The scenery this morning was breathtaking, a Switzerland on the Equator.

Colombia has been truly amazin.g I shall remember it with affection always. There are so many people who helped in various ways and a contingent of the *Medellin Bikers* rode halfway to Cali with me. It was an escort, but they will do anything to get out and ride together in a group (singly is considered a bit too dangerous), and they sure can ride too, on those twisty mountain roads. Many thanks to Miguel at *Miguel Motos*, a *B.M.W.* aficionado, who put me up for a week at a moment's notice, and who let me ride his 1955 twin on last Sunday's ride to Lake Calima.

My bike was not up to that ride because my shock absorber broke, the left side. The *Millennium Ride* suspension question is becoming a bit of a joke. Anyway, now with my seventh pair, one handmade in Medellin (thanks *Servi Amortiguadores Palace*), the other handmade in Cali (thanks *Panamericana Amortiguadores*).

The *Harley-Davidson* culture in Colombia deserves a mention. Harlistas are not liked by other riders because most of them work for the drug cartels. Seven years ago, when the country was safer and the drugs business was run by one or two big groups, the plaything of the drug

barons were race horses. Since those groups were smashed, the drug business passed to smaller groups, and their mode of expression is to ride *Harleys*. It is just how it is.

On one ride out to the mountains I was with a couple of colourful characters (not to mention international bank robbers or anything of course). We sat not 100 yards from a point where nearly 20 ricos, were attacked and kidnapped or killed, on the road to Buenaventura on the coast. Many riders won't go up the mountains anymore. I had the feeling that Cali was more dangerous than Medellin.

Colombia's sole corporate sponsor is *Auto Andromeda S.A.*, the *Hyundai* dealer. Colombia goes on the Hall of Fame with pride.

#### **Riders for Health**

I think it is time to clarify who Riders for Health (www.riders.org) are, since it appears that I did not tell you how important they were for the Flores Project (Health for All). Riders for Health pioneered the concept of zero breakdown for fleets of vehicles, often motorcycles, used by health ministries in poor countries to reach out to rural areas. They have been working in Africa for many years, have won many awards, and are very much the leaders in this field. Back in 2001 they trained Wili Bala, who is the director of our Flores Project, for free, at their Academy of Transport Management in Zimbabwe. This training, along with the expertise of Wili, is the key to our success in Indonesia.

I have no intention of encouraging new projects outside Africa without the proper training, which presently is only available in Africa. I cannot wish new projects into being, and I do not support projects which are unsustainable. If I created the impression that we could start a project in Mexico just like that it is untrue. It takes commitment and money. That is why we need \$40,000. Notwithstanding, I don't see why we cannot bring the *Riders for Health* idea to other needy parts of the world. Indeed, let's get our hands on some of those wasted *billions of dollars* that is part of the *international development aid racket* and use them to change the lives of millions with motorcycles. Are you with us or what?

I have to go the light is going. For the last month at this time of day I have been safe and snug in a city. No danger here, freedom to camp wherever I want. I'm only 10km into Ecuador, but it is visibly poorer than Colombia.

Oh yes, in Colombia they don't generally appear to have a problem with rural health deliveries because most of the people live in the valleys where roads are good. However in Cali the health department may go back to motorcycles in the future because they are cheaper to run. But on the Pacific coast there is an urgent need for boats. I don't see why we can't launch some boats in the future.

Lastly, I have to say that Colombia made me feel really great. I don't know exactly why. But I have been feeling really free lately.
