In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

 A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.

• It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride.

We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, on-road or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.

• You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to *A.B.A.T.E.*

Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just *that* wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

MISSION STATEMENT

A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon, Inc. promotes motorcycle awareness, education, safety and liberty through community involvement and legislative action.

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments (A.B.A.T.E.).

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. *D.O.T.* (*Department of Transportation*) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce H.R.3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet laws.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California and Ed Armstrong of A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the *D.O.T.* because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet law mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the *1975 Federal Highway Act*, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976. Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years, first to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.



A.B.A.T.E. chapter reports Washington County



As some of you may know, *Washington County Chapter* has been working on a membership drive. It will continue until August, with the winner being awarded tickets to *End Of Summer Run (E.O.S.)* So far, we have over 320 members in the chapter. The numbers are great, but what do they mean?

For the money that you pay in dues, you get this wonderful publication, you have the opportunity to be reimbursed for your *Team Oregon* continuing education, and you get reduced rates into state events. In the event of your untimely and accidental injury or death, you or your family gets a small pay out from the insurance company.

But what do you give?

The money you pay when you attend chapter events helps support that chapter. It helps to raise money for the chapter portion of the *Team Oregon* reimbursement, if your chapter has elected to do so. It helps put on the events sponsored by the chapter as well as pay the bills the chapter incurs, such as the insurance premiums each chapter pays, as well as flowers sent to bereaving families.

The financial benefits of being a member are greater than the yearly

dues.

It is my understanding that the yearly dues membership do not cover the cost of sending the newsmagazine out every month. Therefore, attendance at state events helps to assure adequate funds in the state's coffers to keep the state afloat.

The reason that I bring this up is that for the last year I have watched members struggle to find a seat in our meeting location. The room barely holds 45 people. We have been averaging over 50 at each meeting. People have to come an hour or so before the meeting to reserve a chair.

Several new members have not returned to meetings because there was not enough room to accommodate the number of people attending.

We have been searching for a location that will hold at least 70 people and be family friendly.

I have tried to count the number of moves I have made with this chapter over the last eight or nine years and I believe the *Prime Time Sports Bar* is the fifth location we have been in since I joined. While they have been wonderful to work with, the room simply is not large enough and there is no way the room can be expanded.

No move can be made without a vote of the members, so please come to a meeting (even if it means standing) to listen to the proposals and submit your own. Any submissions will be considered as long as they meet the criteria for room size, accessibility for not only minors but handicapped person, and that there is ample parking for all who wish to attend.

We have always tried to stay away from dollar minimums because that puts the requirement on the membership to spend their eating and drinking dollars at that establishment. We cannot afford to do that anymore because our need is so great.



Springtime In Oregon

Just the other day I saw a young couple riding down Tuallitan Valley highway here just west of Portland. The gal on the back wore some really short shorts, and flip-flops on her feet. The guy riding the bike had his full leathers. Kinda oddly, I thought, they both were wearing full face helmets.

The sight made me cringe. What would have happened to that gorgeous girl if they had even a little spill? At the very least she would have had some nasty road rash. That's if she was lucky. I have no idea who they were but if they were on a bike they were a brother and sister of mine and I don't wanna see them hurt! Education is the answer. That, and a little hollering.

That Old Fossil?

Not yer Gunny I'm talking about. No, *A.B.A.T.E. of Orego*n's spring opener is in this great little town of about 600 souls, called Fossil, in central Oregon.

I was there again this year with the *A.I.M.* booth and saw plenty of friends, but this year it was only intermittently nice. But real often, it was just pretty damned wet, muddy, and cold. Nevertheless, Oregon bikers have to honor our traditions, even in central Oregon's erratic springtime weather.

This year was the 29th year. Lots of vendors, though, and the food was great. And this year the bands were great and you could hear the music. The food vendors could even hear the customers order!



Newsbits-N-Pieces

Chicago, Illinois – I hear through the biker grapevine (and these days, that's also the internet and the *A.M.A.* press releases) that the city of Chicago finally let up. Chicago rescinded its recent ban on correctly in parades.

Chicago's office of special events, out of mayor Richard Daley's administration, had originally sent a letter to various parade organizers, claiming "effective immediately, the city parade regulations have been amended to include a ban on machinery potentially dangerous to spectators and staff working parades." That machinery included "motorcycles, pocket mini motorcycles, mini motor bikes, motor scooters and three and fourwheeled all-terrain vehicles."

Chicago has tried before to place all kinds of bans on bikes, from noise levels to outright banning bikes altogether on certain highways. Most of us bikers love to ride in parades, and this royally pissed them off when Chicago said "no" to parades. One year later and still no ban. I guess they can stick that in their pipe and smoke it!

Louisville, Kentucky – Federal equal access for bikers. A concept overdue. A very important announcement was made in May, 2006, at the 21st annual convention of the National Coalition of Motorcyclists (N.C.O.M.) to try to address the ongoing, nagging problem of discrimination against bikers in places of public accommodation. This sort of discrimination in lodging, taverns and bars, restaurants and other similar places that serve the public, laws were passed to stop this back beginning with the 1964 Civil Rights Act. The act and others like it, both federal and state, have over the years had a positive effect and they work to stop discrimination.

But it is, so far, only as to race, religion, handicap, sex, and such. State laws vary in that regard, but only Minnesota has a law that forbids the operators of public accommodations from discriminating against bikers. Other states have tried and failed, and it's a nationwide problem.

So, a new initiative was announced at the convention: The National Coalition of Motorcyclists is going to work with biker groups and, with the help of the A.I.M. attorneys, try to get federal legislation to fix the problem – and it's a very real problem.

Richard M. Lester, that lawyer who, I'm happy to say, is the founder of *N.C.O.M.* and *A.I.M.*, is spearheading this self-imposed mandate. *A.I.M.* is the *Aid to Injured Motorcyclists* organization, which is, along with Richard Lester, the sole financial support of *N.C.O.M.*.

Richard and *N.C.O.M.* have once again taken the lead, by announcing, at this convention, what I sure hope is, once and for all, the beginning of the end of discrimination against bikers in the U.S.A..

Bikers as a group are the biggest bunch of patriots, the most politically involved in their own futures, and work harder than anybody for their families and country. Has your health care insurance been denied? If so, then let the *A.M.A.* know.

Earlier this year hundreds of workers at the *American Coal Company* mine in Galatia, Illinois were denied healthcare coverage for motorcycle-related injuries.

At American Coal, if a worker is injured riding a legally licensed motorcycle on the street, there's no medical coverage. Even if the injury is caused by another driver, the rider could lose. He'd be entirely dependent on the other driver's insurance coverage. And these days, medical bills can quickly overwhelm minimum-coverage policies – if the other driver even has insurance.

The *A.M.A.* is backing measures in congress to bar employers from discriminating against motorcyclists and A.T.V. riders in the healthcare arena. We need your help in this fight.

We need to know if your employerprovided health insurance refuses to cover A.T.V.-related injuries. You don't know? Now is the time to find out, before you get in a crash. Check your policies for "exclusions" that may say motorcycle-related injuries aren't covered. Or ask your plan administrator.

And if you find that you are not covered on your machine by your medical plan, let us know. We need to know the name and address of the company, the name of the health plan. And if you were hurt and the medical plan wouldn't cover the costs, we need to know the details. We need concrete examples to take to congress to show lawmakers that health discrimination against motorcyclists is happening, is crippling financially, and is intolerable. Louisiana governor Kathleen Blanco has signed into law a bill that increases penalties for drivers who injure or kill others by committing right-of-way violations. The new law, which was passed quickly due to the grassroots work of *A.B.A.T.E. of Louisiana, A.M.A.* members, other motorcyclists, and government officials, is consistent with the goals of the *A.M.A.*'s *Justice for All* campaign, which seeks to address inadequate sentencing of drivers who injure or kill others.

The new law allows courts to impose additional penalties on drivers when they commit a right-of-way violation and cause injury or death. The additional fines can range from \$250 for an injury to \$1,000 for death. Previously, the statewide minimum fine for a right-of-way violation was \$50, even if injury or death resulted.

The Bureau of Land Management (B.L.M.) will close nearly half of the Clear Creek Management Area in southern San Benito county, California this summer citing concerns about off-highway vehicle (O.H.V.) enthusiasts and others being exposed to potentially hazardous asbestos.

The closure of 30,000 acres at the Clear Creek is prompted each year by the onset of dry weather and the dust that results, according to the *B.L.M.* Hollister field office. Much of the earth in the 75,000-acre area is laced with naturally occurring asbestos.

O.H.V. riders, campers, and hunters of wild pigs recreate at Clear Creek, which is located about an hour south of Hollister. The closed areas will be identified with large signs and information available at a kiosk in Clear Creek. The restrictions will be in effect from June 1 to October 15.

In addition to asbestos and good O.H.V. trails, Clear Creek is known for the endangered San Benito evening primrose,. a rare flower that has spurred more than a year of litigation between anti-access environmentalists and the *B.L.M.*

In November, 2004, the California Native Plant Society and the Center for Biological Diversity filed suit against B.L.M. claiming that the agency's management plan for Clear Creek, which cut the 400 miles of O.H.V. trails by nearly half, did not go far enough to protect the primrose. The flower was declared endangered in 1985.

Several hearings last year produced no conclusion to the suit. The *B.L.M.* is slated to file a report with the federal court in San Jose about how rights.

the primrose is being protected at the end of June. The suit will proceed based on the report.

The Federation of European Motorcyclists Associations (F.E.M.A.), for each of the past ten years, organizes an event presenting the European Union (E.U.) legislators with a message about the role of motorcycles and scooters in the transportation system. This social event also seeks to raise the awareness about the needs of citizens in areas related to mobility and safety, by providing the E.U. legislators with a "hands on" experience of motorcycling.

The *E.U.* is currently addressing the mid-term review of the white paper on transport policy, which enunciates the high-level political objectives in transport from 2006 to 2010. To mark the 10th anniversary of the *M.E.P. Motorcycle Ride*, *FE.M.A.* is contributing to the debate by promoting the socio-cultural image of motorcycles and scooters, focusing on mobility and leisure, safety and accessibility.

The event will take place on the June 19, 2006 at the prestigious *Autoworld Museum* in the Parc du Cinquantenaire, Brussels. A buffet dinner will be accompanied by the display of motorcycles

To show the effects of the third directive on driving licenses and accessibility to the vehicles, qualified instructors of the *Motorcycle Council Belgium* will perform the new driving license practical test maneuvers. The U.S. house of representatives passed legislation officially recognizing the right to ride pack and saddle stock animals on federal public lands.

HR-586, the *Right-to-Ride Livestock on Federal Lands Act* of 2005 preserves the use and access of pack and saddle stock animals on public lands, including wilderness areas, national monuments, and other areas administered by the *National Park Service*, the *Bureau of Land Management*, the *United States Fish and Wildlife Service*, or the *Forest Service* where there is a historical tradition of such use.

"The American public has a right to utilize the lands they own for multiple uses," said representative Barbara Cubin, R-WY. "Passing this bill makes it clear that horseback riders have a right to enjoy pack and saddle use in America's backcountry."

Wisconsin governor Jim Doyle signed the *Roadway Users Responsibility Act* designated SB-528 on May 26, 2006. It will now become Wisconsin act 464 when published by the secretary of state in the *Wisconsin State Journal* and will take effect on the first day of the 4th month beginning after publication. That will be October 1st.

This new law will: allow motorcyclists to proceed through a vehicle actuated red light after 45 seconds of the signal failing to recognize a motorcycle; increase the penalties for right-of-way violations; require that a motorcycle awareness class be taught in all driver education classes in the state; require that a person who violates the right-of-way of a motorcyclist and causes a crash to attend a *Share the Road* class and; and allow a graduate of the basic rider course obtain a motorcycle endorsement without holding an instruction (learners) permit.

Many components of this new law are consistent with the A.M.A.'s Justice for All campaign and championed by A.B.A.T.E. of Wisconsin, concerned motorcyclists, and A.M.A. members.

The American Motorcyclist Association encourages all off-highway motorcycle and A.T.V. riders to fill out the 2006 Off-Highway Issue Survey. The survey is located in the government relations section of American Motorcyclist's July 2006 issue.

This survey, coupled with the upcoming road rider issue survey (in the August issue) is extremely helpful in allowing the *A.M.A.* government relations department know where to focus our efforts and what issues are effecting you as a rider. Every two years the *A.M.A.* government relations department surveys the association's members to assist in establishing government relations policies and priorities.

Motorcycle Riders Foundation **Federal Motorcycle Safety Grant Program Announced**



The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) announced it is ready to begin rolling out the federal motorcycle safety grant program championed by the Motorcycle Riders Foundation and included as part of the most recent highway bill (PL 109-59).

This first step allows the public to comment on N.H.T.S.A.'s ideas on how the program should operate and what it should accomplish. Once this mandatory comment period is closed on June 23rd, 2006 there is no way to influence how the program is administered.

"This program has the potential to save lives across the country, the sooner the federal government brings the grant program online, the sooner we can start to see the benefits" said Jeff Hennie, vice president of government relations, Motorcycle Riders Foundation.

Right to Repair Passes House Subcommittee

The house energy and commerce subcommittee on commerce, trade and consumer protections passed HR-2048, the motor vehicle Right to Repair Act of 2005.

HR-2048 was amended during the markup process to address concerns that this bill would indirectly encourage the sending jobs and U.S. dollars to China and other foreign countries.

The committee overwhelmingly agreed to the amendments. The final version of the bill will still provide all of the consumer rights protections intended in the original legislation.

While the vote was nearly party line, there were several of the democrat cosponsors who voted against the legislation for unknown reasons. The final tally was 14 yeas versus 13 nay votes.

"Now that we have cleared the subcommittee hurdle we must focus on the full energy and committee," said Jeff Hennie, vice president of government relations for the Motorcycle Riders Foundation (M.R.F.). "This is a great victory, but we are not nearly finished yet."

The Motor Vehicle Right to Repair Act of 2005 was introduced in May of last year by congressman Joe Barton (R-Texas) and Edolphus Towns (D-New York). One year later the bill has more than 100 bipartisan supporters. The legislative intent of this measure is to offer protections for the American motor vehicle owner by making it illegal for the manufacturer of the motor vehicle to withhold information necessary to diagnose, service, or repair the motor vehicle.

The M.R.F. has formally committed to support HR-2048 believing safeguarding individual ownership rights is an absolute must. Access to accurate information when related to the repair or upkeep of a vehicle is essential to the safety and well-being of the entire American motoring public. The goal of HR-2048 is to guarantee individual owners and repair shops have access to after market parts and the same tools and training offered to individuals within the dealership network.

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation will continue to update you with the most current information available about this issue.

Well, I usually try to get a little info on our need to support *A.B.A.T.E.*, *BikePAC*, and *M.M.A.* in our newsmagazine because we all know how important that is to protecting our rights as riders.

But I thought I'd take some space and pass along some info I've found on recalls of motorcycles of all brands.

I had been told a while back that Harley is recalling 1996/97 bikes with vacuum operated petcocks, due to a defective vacuum operated fuel diaphragms. It can cause vapor lock, among other things. Not very much fun on a long trip. This recall only affects 1994 through 1997 models. Well, that piqued my curiosity and I wondered how many riders know about all the recalls for the different makes of bikes. I found a web site that gives you that information. Could come in handy for some of you:

Of course, there's always a few things the manufacturers don't tell you. On the 1994 through 1997 recall I spoke of, a service manager at Harley-Davidson in west Texas adds this info: "Under certain circumstances the diaphragm located in the vacuum operated fuel valve becomes dislodged within the valve body. This primarily happens when the motorcycle has been started with the valve in the off position and is left that way until the motorcycle dies, or, the motorcycle is run until it dies before switching to reserve. It may also happen when the motorcycle has been running on poor quality fuel. This fuel causes a reaction with the material the diaphram is made of. This recall affects '94 dresser models (FLT family) and all other '95, '96 and '97 models produced before October 1996. The repair is quite simple. It simply involves the replacement of the diaphragm with one of better quality. It only take about 20 minutes and doesn't require the replacement of the entire valve. Our dealership has only encountered about 12 bikes that actually had the diaphragm fail. It is still recommended that anyone

owning a motorcycle that is affected with this recall return to their servicing dealer for repair. The valve itself is a good idea, simply it prevents the flow of fuel while the motorcycle is not running, which if you know what happens to a motor that that has had an excessive amount of gas poured into it, it is cheap insurance, seeing how any motorcycle with a carb is subject to this hidden danger. It is still recommended that even after the recall has been performed you still leave the valve in the *on* position, just in case."

So now you have "the rest of the story" on that particular recall. Hope this info doesn't have to be useful to many folks, but it's nice to know.

I have to end this with some sad news. A very special lady, Margi O'Brien, died at her home of asthma problems this past month. She was 51 years old. Margi was both an *A.B.A.T.E.* member and treasurer for *United Bikers of Southern Oregon* (*U.B.S.O.*). A memorial ride was held on May 21 from Gold Hill to Applegate Lake. One of her dearest lifetime friends, Rick Goodwin, preceded her in death this past year in a motorcycle crash. Our heartfelt condolences to her family, companion and friends.

Barry's Banter

Hey Everyone!

Time once again for Barry to take a shot at entertaining the masses with a story from the early years of my riding career.

This story comes from the first year or so on a street bike. I was still riding a 1980 *Yamaha 650 Special* as my sole mode of transport.

The year was '81 or '82, the bike was still new and beautiful, and I was young and invincible.

I also had a lot to learn, but I didn't know that yet. (Of course.)

I was in the U.S. Army and stationed at the *Defense Language Institute* at the presidio in Monterey, California. It was the beginning of my second hitch in the military. I had plenty of money and my only responsibility was learning Russian. Life was sweeter than I knew.

This story centers around a group of bikers I was riding with at the time, all guys in the military, and quite an interesting group. We had members from every branch of service and from all over the country and many walks of life. We were rich in our diversity of races, creeds, and colors, but were united in our youth and headstrong love of our bikes and the open road.

Many of the names are a little hazy, but there is one I do remember clearly. Michael Saunders was an ordinary kind of guy with an easy smile and a quick wit that made him a popular part of our group. He and I hit it off immediately and we would become close friends, spending most weekends headed somewhere on our bikes. As I recall, there was a three day weekend coming up and there were big plans afoot. We had all been hearing throughout the winter months about this ultra-cool camping area way up in the mountains that had a killer swimmin' hole with diving cliffs and everything! It was even rumored that chicks up there often went topless! The best part was that it could only be reached by following a very long and very curvy yet well maintained country road!

We had all been champing at the bit to check it out and were ecstatic when the weather forecast was favorable for our expedition.

We were planning a full three days of camping and had packed our various bikes accordingly, which is to say loaded to gunwales and beyond! I had so much gear strapped to my tall sissy bar that I had to adjust my riding position forward to make room!

Mike rode a *Suzuki GS1000* and was similarly loaded as was everyone else. Mike also used a tank bag for everyday travel. It had a cool seethrough map pocket right on top which was very useful on many of our adventures. It was also maxed out, sticking up a full 12 inches or more above the *Suzuki*'s fuel tank.

As we headed out of town on that sunny Friday afternoon with several hours of riding ahead of us, life was nothing but a big adventure and we were determined to embrace it.

This was the first time that I had

ridden the *Yamaha* in such an overloaded state and my eyes got pretty big as I made the turn out of our barracks parking lot and the suspension bottomed, nearly pitching me onto the pavement before I'd gone fifty feet!

Now, you might think that such an experience would have convinced us to turn around and off-load a little crap before heading out on our trip, but the truth is that we never even slowed down as we headed off-base and down the road. (Did I mention that we were young and stupid?)

My eyes got big again the first time I came charging up to a stop sign and at first nearly couldn't get stopped. Then nearly slipped and fell over on some sand when I did get my foot down!

So it was that we headed out of town, fueled up and loaded down. Mike was often our leader on the *Suzuki* with his cool map pocket to aid in navigation. It was just as well too, because he just loved to race off into the distance on that damned *GS 1000*, which was a pretty bad-ass bike back in those days. My little *650 Special* couldn't begin to hang and he was always blowing me into the weeds.

The further we went the more accustomed we became to our compromised riding positions and overloaded bikes. Full stops were studies in balance and corners were taken wide, slow, and shallow.

Report From 2006 Democratic Convention Eugene, Oregon

Iris and I arrived at the Hilton about 1:30 p.m. on Friday, June 2, 2006. One of the first people we ran into was Sam Sappington, who is running for the legislature from the Albany/Corvallis area. He and we discussed the merits of what we motorcyclists were trying to accomplish with the helmet law modification bill this upcoming session. I believe we were able to convince him that we had a valid reason for asking his support.

From 3:00 to 6:00 p.m. a program called *Faith Outreach Training* was presented by Eric Sapp and Maria Vanderslice. *Common Good Strategies* was the theme of the presentation. This program centered around getting mainline church members to support the democratic party.

From 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. following the welcome to the convention by Jim Edwards, Howard Dean was the keynote speaker to kick off the convention. Also speaking were U.S. congressman Peter DeFazio, and U.S. senator Ron Wyden, along with secretary of state, Bill Bradbury. There were several other local dignitaries as well.

Brian and Teresa had arrived earlier and asked for a caucus of *A.B.A.T.E.* members in their room at 9:30 p.m.

At the meeting of the *A.B.A.T.E.* members in Brian and Teresa,s room, the discussion revolved around the recent happenings in the *Oregon Motorcycle Democratic Caucus*. Suggestions and plans were made to help the caucus become more effective and to live up to its rules and bylaws. Brian also had printed out a number of fact sheets explaining our stand on the right to choose issue concerning motorcyclists to be handed out to conventioneers in the morning.

Saturday June 3rd

Those with breakfast tickets got to dine with senator Kate Brown and representative Jeff Merkley.

Following breakfast, Iris and I went to the main floor and began to hand out the fact sheets. In just a few minutes all of our information was given to the delegates. In the process, we received mostly good comments from people and only two who stated they were against removing the helmet from our heads.

One of the people we found was a pilot of a small plane. We asked him if we believed non-flying people should have a right to dictate what equipment he should wear when he flew his airplane. Especially when they had never been in the cockpit of a plane. He agreed that our point was a valid one and said he had changed his mind.

From 8:00 to 9:45 a.m. there was a state central committee meeting and a ballot on several initiatives, none of which fit our interests.

The next session started at 1:30 p.m. and was one of the most important ones for our interests. The committee on energy and transportation discussed several democratic principles. Of those, five of them related in some way to the

use of more efficient vehicles. By the time we worked our way through the legislative action items, (there were ten), a motion was made to delete our request that the democrats adopt the idea that adults have a "right to choose" from consideration by the attendees.

Since time was short, only Brian Stovall and I were able to speak in behalf of keeping the issue on the agenda to become a party plank. Representative Witt was given an opportunity to give his opinion and he spoke strongly in favor of deleting the issue. A vote was taken and the result was a twelve to twelve tie. In case of a tie vote, the motion to delete fails.

We need more bikers to attend these conventions.

At 4:00 to 5:30 p.m. there was a meeting of the *Democratic Motorcycle Caucus*. Several items were discussed and solutions to problems worked out. A main topic of discussion was how to get bikers interested in becoming precinct committee persons.

It is obvious that no amount of talking and pleading is getting involvement in the political process, even at a basic level. The *Democratic Motorcycle Caucus* and motorcycle organizations must keep encouraging members to become involved in grassroots politics.

We talked about our only issue to be introduced next legislative session. Brian Clem, a candidate from Salem area came to the caucus meeting to

offer his support and ideas. He is running a vigorous campaign and stands a good chance to beat his opponent. Brian promised to support our ideas and will work with us if elected in November. (Salem area members take note.) We established the next meeting of the caucus at Brian Stovall's home in The Dalles on Sunday, June 25th at 4:00 p.m.

Sunday, June 4th

We gathered together at 10:30 a.m.to discuss and vote on the platform planks that were hammered out in yesterday's breakout sessions. With some language changes, the planks (as well as our right-to-choose issue) were adopted. The morning session went smoothly and finished ahead of schedule. We all hoped for similar results in the afternoon session.

Following lunch, we entered the final phase of the convention. With little problem, the business of the session was conducted rapidly and again we finished within the time allotted.

Due to time constraints, the results of the balloting on democratic issues would not be available by closing time. The results would be posted on

Even as the margin of error crept steadily toward zero and little patches of sand or gravel began showing up on the road, we knew that our destination was near and we wouldn't back down.

As luck would have it we came on a comparatively long and straight stretch of road and Mike just couldn't resist doing one of his "rocket-into-thedistance" tricks.

The corner that followed this little straight stretch was neither too sharp nor too narrow, nor was it wet or scattered with sand or gravel. There was no oncoming traffic (thank God), and also no guard rail or curb.

What we did see when we got there was Mike's *Suzuki* laying just off the side of the road, rear wheel still turning, and Mike himself a little further off the road, having done the flip and roll thing. His bags and gear were strewn artfully across the pavement in a kind of biker/ camper collage.

As we screeched to a shaky stop and piled carefully off the bikes Mike was already trying to pick himself up off the ground.

The reality of the emergency situation quickly settled in and our military training took control. Mike was made to lie still while the extent of his injuries was assessed and sleeping bags were produced to combat shock.

Back in those days we hadn't even heard of cell phones, and the campground, only another eight miles away, didn't have phone service either.

As it turned out, Mike had gone down at a fairly low speed (we didn't actually see it) and the only apparent injury was a badly twisted ankle. He said that he just couldn't slow down and when he tried to turn that the bike just jumped out from under him.

Little did the casino know that there were registered and unregistered Native Americans in our group.

We obliged, moved to the back lot and parked next to the police motorcycles.

Got to talking with the pickup driver and she turned out to be a good ol' gal from Roseburg. Her brother made the rack for her *Sportster* and is going to go into


