A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A. T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

- A.B.A. T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as BikePAC.
- It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, onroad or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.
- You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to A.B.A. T.E. Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just that wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

So scan through our newsmagazine. If you like what you read, check out the chapter meeting listing on the back cover. Drop in on a meeting and see what we're about. You just might find a new family in A.B.A.T.E. And as Melinda says: "Bikers give great hugs."

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments (A.B.A.T.E.).

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the Huns Motorcycle Club in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce H.R.3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet laws.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California and Ed Armstrong of A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet law mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years, first to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for

bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through

So, there you have it.

The roots of A.B.A. T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

Last year there were 58 motorcyclists fatalities in Oregon.

Three people died on motorcycles in Oregon and southwest Washington during the Memorial Day weekend.

- A 64 year old man died after losing control of his motorcycle on Oregon 31.
- A 35 year old man died on U.S. 30 after being struck by a pickup.
- A 27 year old man died after slamming his bike into a pole on state route 14.

We need to stop the carnage.

Here are some of my ideas what you can do to stay alive on your motorcycle. Some of you will not like some of my ideas, but what the hell, here they are:

1. Take a *Team Oregon* **class**. We are blessed to have such a great program in our state. Take the basic class, take the intermediate class, or take the experienced rider class. I do not care how long you have been riding, you will learn techniques to make you a better and safer rider.

- 2. When washing your bike, (and I know you do this often especially if you are Bob Eck) do a thorough safety check. If you really clean your bike, your hands and eyes are going to touch and observe almost every square inch of it. If there is a small fluid leak, you are going to see it. If a bolt or wire is loose you are going to find it. If one of your tires is low, or showing uneven tire wear, you are going to find it.
- **3. Be seen**. If you are riding a black bike with black leathers and a black helmet, then you are counting on the cage drivers to only see your six inch headlight. Paint your bike orange, wear bright clothing, and remember to keep your headlight, taillight and turn signals clean! Speaking of turn signals, if they are only one half of one inch around, then you are asking for trouble.
- **4. Spread the word** about motorcycle awareness. Put a "*Look Twice Be Aware Motorcycles Are Everywhere*" bumper sticker on your car. Put one on your neighbor's car. (You might want to ask first.) Put a

"Share the Road" sign in your lawn. (We are currently ordering more of both.)

I cannot begin to tell you how proud I am of *Hub City Chapter's* billboards. (Although it is kind of scary seeing Al Sims with a four foot head.) What a fantastic way to spend chapter funds.

Become a motorcycle awareness Instructor. Our education director, Geoff White (can't say enough about this fantastic man) will help you get started.

5. Wear appropriate apparel. Please – no tennis shoes and shorts. (Note to c.o.e.: no riding naked.*)

We have to wear helmets in Oregon It is the regulation. (I did not say it was a good regulation.) Since we have to wear a helmet, why not wear one that might actually do some good if you go down. Myself and some of my friends wear carbon fiber helmets that look and feel like a beanie.

- I also recently bought a mesh jacket to wear when it is hot out. Road rash is no fun. (Just ask M'liss.)
- **6. Ride smart**. Do not ride impaired. Be aware of what's going on around you. Keep tabs on

yourself. If you are getting surprised by what's going on around you, that's a sign to stop and rest. Eat or drink something non-alcoholic.

7. **Be informed**. There many fine magazine articles and many fine books on the subject of riding safely. One of the best is *Proficient Motorcycling* by David Hough.

You are all my friends. I want us all to be friends for a long time. Please do all you can to ride safe.

From The ...

GUNNY'S SACK

Lots of info this month for the *Sack*, so I'll skip my introductory stuff and get right to it:

Myrtle Beach, South Carolina: Victory! Kudos to *A.I.M.*/ N.C.O.M. attorney Tom McGrath. The South Carolina supreme court agreed with Tom's arguments, and ruled unanimously that the cityonly helmet ordinance in Myrtle Beach was not valid because state legislation supersedes city regulations. The city enacted the helmet requirement to discourage bikers from attending events there. The repeal takes place immediately and the city was ordered to expunge any convictions and pay back any fines. Way to go, Tom.

Antilock Brakes: The Insurance Institute for Highway Safety has asked the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to require antilock brakes on all motorcycles. An insurance study reveals bikes with antilock brakes appear to be about 38 percent less likely to be involved in fatal crashes.

The Motorcycle Industry Council said there wasn't enough research to prove that antilock brakes were so valuable that they should be mandatory. I don't know which way to lean here. My own experience says they are a good thing. You make up your own mind. I think the N.H.T.S.A. needs to stop meddling with motorcycle safety because more often than not they are in the wrong, in my mind.

Southern Alliance: The Florida department of transportation safety office announced this week a partnership with the Georgia governor's office of highway safety and the Alabama office of highway safety to conduct "*Ride Straight, State to State*," a public outreach program designed to urge motorcycle riders to never drink and ride.

It's long been known that alcohol is a huge factor in motorcycle crashes. A whopping 41% of fatal crashes have alcohol involvement.

Please folks, if ya gotta have a snort or two, *park the scoot*. A little alcohol goes a long way on a bike, and even legal amounts affect your judgment, and you can't afford to

lose any at all when y'ride. The same goes for drugs of any kind.

Arizona: Governor Jan Brewer vetoed a bill that would have allowed motorcycles in stopped traffic to "lane-split." The bill was sponsored by republican Jerry Weiers of Glendale. Weiers said his bill was a safety measure designed to reduce the danger of bikes being hit from behind, and to relieve some congestion on the road. Their governor, also a republican, apparently thought otherwise.

Payette, Idaho: This small town now has it's very own gang ordinance that says colors are illegal at public events. Looks like motorcycle clubs are in the soup again. Police chief Mark Clark said an anti-gang ordinance is necessary for the safety of residents attending public events, like the Apple Blossom Festival. Once this ordinance becomes effective, violate it and you can be fined up to \$1,000 and spend a year as the guest of the state. Motorcyclists need to keep a weather eye out for this sort of draconian nonsense.

New York Checkpoint Suit: New York's A.I.M. attorney Mitch Proner is representing A.B.A.T.E. of New York, suing the state over motorcycle-only roadblocks. Since 2007, the state police and other local police departments have been running these police checkpoints. They claim the purpose of these stops, at which they issue a lot of tickets for helmet and exhaust pipe violations, is to advance motorcycle safety.

Proner's first move was to write the state police and municipal authorities, advising he was New attorney representative of the National Coalition of Motorcyclists (N.C.O.M.), and that if they continued to conduct the motorcycle-only checkpoints, his office would file suit. The letter was ignored, so with the help of thenpresident of A.B.A.T.E., Robert "Prospector" Boellner, found representatives to bring his action against the state police and the other municipal agencies involved in these stops.

Although the lawsuit is still in

the discovery stage, the police have already been required to turn over internal documents which contain information that every rider should know. It turns out that the New York state police originally got federal funding for the motorcycleonly roadblocks by pointing to an increase in motorcycle fatalities. In actuality, in 2007, the perrider fatalities went down. More importantly, their own research shows that the major causes of motorcycle deaths are speed and failure of other motorists on the roadway to keep a proper lookout for the rider. And what's any of that got to do with your pipes? We will keep y'all updated on this lawsuit as we get more information from *N.C.O.M.*

Rhode Island: Small state and a big idea: A bill introduced to the Rhode Island senate recently would require state, city, and town buildings to provide designated parking spaces for motorcycles only. There would be one motorcycle space for every 30 auto spaces. Not a bad start. Now, what about the rest of the state, besides public buildings? And wouldn't it be great if this kind of requirement snowballed around the country?

Queens, New York: The hundred year-old Queensboro Motorcycle Club may have to move. Again. The club was first uprooted from its original clubhouse in central Queens in 1939, to make way for the Flushing Meadows Park, used in the 1939 world's fair, according to Bill Goldstein, the club's president. The club was never compensated for its property, but time and the inattention of city officials took its toll on their new digs, and the neighborhood turned from bad to worse as the years passed. Now, it looks like the Queensboro riders may be rolling into the sunset once again. The city never installed sewers, running water, sidewalks

or other urban amenities in the clubhouse's Willets Point area, and the 62-acre section of land is in a new administration's sights. The city claims it has bought or is in agreements to buy 64 percent of the land and it recently began to relocate businesses to other sites.

The club pays \$4,000 a year in taxes and they ask only that the city tell them what will become of them in coming years. I wonder why it is such a problem for the city to at least acknowledge the existence of this problem and do something about it.

The group's members said they do not want to fight city hall; they only want to know what lies ahead. The club is willing to take a fair relocation deal or to stay if the city makes improvements. Maybe they should talk to New York's *A.I.M.* attorney, Mitch Proner.

Gunny Again: Our *A.I.M.* attorney's go way beyond the normal realm of effort to support us as we find ourselves in legal binds or worse yet in accidents. That's where these hardworking attorneys come into play. Call your nearest *A.I.M.* attorney when you're in a jam or a wreck. Don't try and outsmart the insurance companies. They use attorneys.

Call *A.I.M.* 24/7 at **1-(800)-531-2424**, or **1-(800)-On-A-Bike** if ya don't know the *A.I.M.* attorney in your area, and they will put you in touch.



HOW CRYPTOGRAMS WORK: The idea here is that each letter in the cryptogram represents a letter of the alphabet. ("Y" might equal "L" fer instance.) Look fer word patterns to help establish which word is what. (Single letters will be "I" or "A"; "the" and "and" are common three-letter words; the most widely used English letter is "E".) Spies used to send messages using cryptograms because they kept their opponents busy trying to crack the code while the spies went about their skulldrudgery.







Forest Service Announces Fee Waiver Dates

Forest Service chief Tom Tidwell announced today that the Forest Service would offer two fee-waiver weekends during the summer of 2010, in addition to other annual fee-waiver events at standard amenity fee sites.

These fee waivers will be offered in cooperation with other federal agencies under the *Federal Lands Recreation Enhancement Act.* (R.E.A.)

"The Forest Service is working to ensure as many visitors as possible have the opportunity to experience the great outdoors and take advantage of the many recreational activities national forests have to offer," said Tidwell. "By waiving fees, everyone will have the opportunity to enjoy the wonder and rejuvenation of recreation on national forests."

The fee-waiver dates for 2010 are as follows:

- National Trails Day: June 5-6.
 Fees were waived for Saturday and Sunday.
- Back-to-School Season: August 14-15. Fees will be waived for Saturday and Sunday.
- National Public Lands Day: Saturday, September 25, 2010. This fee waiver is offered every year.
- Veterans' Day: Thursday, November 11, 2010. This fee waiver is offered every year.

The *Forest Service* operates about 17,000 recreation sites. Of those sites, approximately 6,000 require a fee at recreation sites, which provide visitor services, needed maintenance and repairs, and recreational facilities and services.

The mission of the *U.S.D.A. Forest Service* is to sustain the health, diversity, and productivity of the nation's forests and grasslands to meet the needs of present and future generations. The agency manages 193 million acres of public land and is the largest forestry research organization in the world.

Around The States

Arizona: House bill 2475, sponsored by representative Jerry Weiers (R-Glendale), would permit motorcyclists in Maricopa county to lane split during 2011. Unanimously passed by the house and with a large majority in the senate, the bill was sent to

governor Jan Brewer for consideration. Brewer vetoed the bill on May 11 Her veto letter is at:

Maine (Correction): The previous edition of *News & Notes* reported that house paper 1170 was signed by governor John Baldacci and prohibits a motor vehicle exhaust system from exceeding 62 Db(A) at a distance of 50 feet or greater in an area designated as a quiet zone. This information was based on the introduced version of the bill.

Joshua Herndon, of the *United Bikers of Maine* and state representative for the *Motorcycle Riders Foundation*, pointed out the bill was amended and enacted as LD–1642. Signed into effect April 12 by governor Baldacci, the legislation requires all vehicles operated in Maine to have a muffler but modifications to amplify the exhaust sound are prohibited. A study group is mandated to research the noise issue and make further recommendations to the legislature.

The governor also signed LD–1675 which requires inspection stickers to be placed on the rear of a motorcycle registered in the state as of January 1, 2012. A study group is also mandated and must report to the legislature no later than January 1, 2011.

Maryland: House bill 676, sponsored by delegates James Malone, Jr., (D-Arbutus) and Benjamin Kramer (D-Montgomery county), authorizes the use of certain auxiliary lighting on motorcycles.

Senate bill 189, sponsored by senator Bryan Simonaire (R-Anne Arundel County), authorizes the motor vehicle administration to suspend for up 180 days the license of a person who is convicted of a moving violation that contributed to a crash that resulted in death.

Both bills were signed May 20 by governor Martin O'Malley.

Massachusetts: In a vote of 141-12, the Massachusetts house voted to increase the minimum age to operate an all-terrain vehicle (A.T.V.) to 14-years old. This raises the minimum from

the previous age of 10. After previously passing through the senate, the bill will now head to governor Deval Patrick for possible signature.

Ohio: House bill 537, sponsored by representative Cheryl Grossman (R-Grove City), would require all driver license applicants under 18 years of age to provide evidence of successful completion of a first-aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation training course within one year preceding their application.

Ohio: Following devastating tornados in northwest Ohio on June 5, members of the *Toledo Trail Riders* (http://www.toledotrailriders.com) are calling for volunteers to assist in the cleanup of the Maumee state forest A.P.V. area.

Oklahoma: Five bills requested and supported by *A.B.A.T.E. of Oklahoma* have been signed by governor Brad Henry. Sponsored by representative Mike Christian (R-Oklahoma City), house bill 2264 adds a \$3 fee for each registered motorcycle for deposit in the motorcycle safety and education program revolving fund.

House bill 2322, sponsored by representative Paul D. Roan (D-Tishomingo), clarifies state regulation with regard to yielding the right-of-way for left-turning vehicles.

Two bills were sponsored by senator Randy Bass (D-Lawton): Senate bill 1329 permits a motorcycle operator to proceed with caution through a 'stuck on red traffic-actuated signal after coming to a complete stop and determining the signal did not detect the motorcycle, and senate bill 1670 changes the makeup of the *Advisory Committee for Motorcycle Safety and Education*.

Lastly, senate bill 1917, sponsored by senator Cliff Aldridge (R-Choctaw), provides for special license plates in support of the *Downed Bikers Association* and for armed forces veterans motorcycle license plates.

South Carolina: In a victory against motorcycle discrimination, the South Carolina supreme court has struck down a Myrtle Beach, South Carolina ordinance that required riders to wear helmets within the city limits. The measure was one of more than a dozen

designed to keep motorcyclists out of Myrtle Beach.

The city passed the regulation in 2008 despite a state regulation that allows motorcyclists 21 or older to choose to ride with or without a helmet. The city council had passed 15 ordinances and amendments at that time targeting motorcyclists who attended week-long bike rallies in the Myrtle Beach area, ranging from the helmet requirement to a ban on loitering in parking lots, in an attempt to keep riders out of the city.

The state supreme court, in a decision issued on June 8, said the Myrtle Beach helmet ordinance was pre-empted by state law.

"We find that the city helmet ordinance fails under implied field preemption due to the need for statewide uniformity and therefore issue a declaratory judgment invalidating the ordinance," the high court ruled.

"It is regrettable that the city of Myrtle Beach felt the need to alienate motorcyclists with the [ordinance], especially since motorcyclists had supported businesses in Myrtle Beach for years during rallies," said Ed Moreland, A.M.A. senior vice president for government relations. "But we're pleased that the South Carolina supreme court struck down the Myrtle Beach [ordinance], sending a clear message to all jurisdictions that discriminatory laws against motorcyclists are unacceptable."

The high court issued the ruling in response to a lawsuit filed on behalf of about 50 riders who were ticketed for riding without helmets shortly after the new regulation went into effect.

Utah: On May 30, starting around 3 p.m., the Utah highway patrol conducted a motorcycle-only checkpoint on Interstate 80 near the *Miller Motorsports Park*. The date and time were such that the checkpoint stopped fan traffic leaving the facility following a U.S. round of the Hannspree F.I.M. superbike world championship.

The timing of the checkpoint and discriminatory nature of the action (only motorcyclists were stopped) were troubling. Indeed, an already difficult traffic situation was made far worse by the checkpoint.

Although cooler heads prevailed, and the checkpoint was called off after approximately two hours, a number of motorcyclists contacted the *A.M.A.* with questions, and the *A.M.A.* contacted the Utah highway patrol to get answers.

Motorcycle Riders Foundation

F.H.W.A. Motorcycle Advisory Council

The Federal Highway Administration (F.H. W.A.) recently convened its Motorcycle Advisory Council (M.A.C.) to discuss motorcycles and how they relate to the country's transportation infrastructure, and make recommendations to the U.S. secretary of transportation.

The *Motorcycle Riders Foundation* (*M.R.F.*) is a member of the *M.A.C.* and attends all council meetings.

In addition to council members, the *M.A.C.* invites specialists from the government, industry, and universities, with the goal of reducing motorcycle crashes and injuries to motorcyclists. They carefully consider the small road signature of motorcycles and the how they interact with the roads, bridges, and barriers of this country. This was the eighth time the council has met over four years.

The federal government announced that they will be doing two "scans" of motorcycle safety to observe best practices and identify alternative solutions for smooth interaction between motorcycles and infrastructure.

They will conduct a domestic scan to study programs throughout the U.S., and will also travel to Europe and Australia for an international scan. The *M.R.F.* was invited to participate in the international scan, as well as to help craft amplifying questions for international partners in that scan. The sole focus of the scans is improving U.S. infrastructure for motorcyclists.

Much of the discussion at the latest meeting was focused on how to get the message of the *M.A.C.* into the right hands across the states.

Motorcycle Vehicle Miles Traveled Numbers Improve

For years and for good reason, the *M.R.F.* has been crying foul regarding the motorcycle vehicle miles traveled (V.M.T.) numbers collected and published by the federal government.

One of many glaring examples was that for several years, it was reported that the state of South Dakota, home of the Sturgis motorcycle rally, had zero annual motorcycle V.M.T.

In fact, before the *M.R.F.* got involved in this issue, motorcycle V.M.T. numbers were optional for the states to report.

We at the *M.R.F.* realize the need for solid V.M.T. numbers to get an accurate view of the country's safety situation. The motorcycle industry gathers its own V.M.T. numbers, and they are always at least double what the federal government bring to the table.

It's refreshing to see the federal representatives act on the *M.R.F.*'s demands and at least attempt to improve the accuracy of the motorcycle V.M.T. numbers gathered. They are now going to code the numbers using geographic information system mapping software that will compare travel on types of roads (from highways to rural roads), as well as breaking out the numbers by vehicle types. This



does not mean the numbers will be completely trustworthy, but they are headed in the right direction.

Traveler Opinion And Participation Survey

The federal government announced that they will be doing a traveler opinion and participation survey (T.O.P.S.) during the summer of 2012. They will survey a random sampling of adult Americans over the phone to gage how the general public feels about the roads they use, the traffic they sit in, the purpose of travel, and so on. As a direct result of the *M.A.C.*'s recommendation to the U.S. secretary of transportation, the survey will, for the first time, include questions about motorcycles.

This was the last official meeting of the *M.A.C.* under its current charter.

The *M.R.F.* is working with U.S. secretary of transportation Ray LaHood, a past recipient of the *M.R.F.* champion award, to extend the *M.A.C.*'s charter for another two years. This would be the second extension of the original congressionally-mandated charter.

We all know education is a key component of motorcycle safety. Advocacy is an important part of spreading the message and educating others who may know very little about motorcycles and what it is to ride. A crash avoided is the ultimate goal."

Anyone who has attended will tell you about the powerful impact this event has on congress, and on the attendees themselves.

Thanks to everyone who rode out;. You are the lifeblood of this event. Look forward to next year's *Bikers Inside the Beltway*, which promises to be even bigger and badder.

Motorcyclist Fatalities Inexplicably Plummet

Following more than a decade of steady increases, motorcycle rider fatalities unaccountably dipped by double-digit proportions last year. Motorcyclist deaths dropped by 16% nationwide through the first three quarters of 2009, compared to the same period in 2008 when fatalities reached their highest level of 5,290.

The study, sponsored by the Governors' Highway Safety Association, which represents state traffic safety agencies, is drawn from preliminary fatality data from all 50 states and the District of Columbia. While there is nothing in the data to indicate the cause of the sudden decline, the G.H.S.A. asked state safety agencies to speculate on reasons for the decline, and several respondents pointed to the economy and underscored that a significant portion of motorcycling is for recreation rather than transportation.

Other reasons cited in the study for the decline:

- Fewer beginning motorcyclists.
- An increase in priority given to state motorcycle safety programs
- An increased awareness of motorcycles by other drivers.
- Colder, wetter weather in some states during the riding season.

It doesn't appear helmet regula-tions played a significant role in the decline.

The popularity of motorcycles has surged in the past decade, particularly among aging baby boomers and women, nearly doubling to more than 10 million.

Aging Riders At Higher Risk

Motorcycle riders across the country are growing older, and the impact of this trend is evident in emergency rooms nationwide as doctors are finding that senior citizens who ride motorcycles are more likely to be involved in crashes and also more likely to be injured or die than their younger counterparts.

Researchers at the *University of Rochester* medical center found that half of all motorcyclists needing emergency treatment in 2005 were over 40, nearly double the number in 1996, which is consistent with demographic data indicating that the average age of motorcycle ownership has risen from 33 years in 1998 to 40 years in 2003. Injury severity, length of stay in the hospital or intensive care unit, and

mortality were higher for riders over the age of 40.

In the study, which was published in the March issue of the *American Surgeon*, researchers using the national trauma databank reviewed the records of 61,689 motorcyclists aged 17 to 89 years involved in a motorcycle crash between 1996 and 2005.

Those ages 50-59 were the fastest growing group involved with crashes, and crashes involving riders in that age group were almost twice as likely to be fatal as those involving younger bikers.

Naturalistic Motorcycle Safety Study

The Motorcycle Safety Foundation (M.S.F.) has announced that it will partner with the Virginia Tech Transportation Institute (V.T.T.I.) on the world's first motorcycle safety study that will use small video recorders and instrumentation mounted on numerous bikes for 6-18 months to gather data about the riders and events that occur.

Termed a "naturalistic" study, *V.T.T.I.* has developed this technology and used it successfully to conduct a 100-car study in 2005 that included 69 crashes and more than 750 near-crashes.

V.T.T.I. director Tom Dingus stated that "We expect the study to be very valuable to the Motorcycle Safety Foundation's work, since we also will examine where and how crash avoidance is successful. With so much information bandwidth coming from the cameras and instrumentation on each bike, we'll be able to examine details for years, and the findings will be relevant for decades."

Legal Challenges To Michigan Helmet Requirement

Several members of *A.B.A.T.E. of Michigan* rode to the Lenawee county judicial building on Tuesday, April 20th to show support for a fellow motorcyclist who is challenging a noncompliant helmet ticket.

Ryan Hildebrand, 26, is one of nearly a dozen riders ticketed this spring by Adrian police sergeant Lynn Courington for wearing helmets that the state claims do not meet federal department of transportation standards.

Representing the group of ticketed riders was Aid to Injured Motorcyclists



(A.I.M.) attorney Lawrence "Katman" Katkowsky, who filed an appearance for the helmet defendant. A formal hearing was set for June 29 in district court, and Katkowsky said he will try to consolidate all the helmet infraction cases that are being challenged for the June 29 hearing. "The issues are all the same," he said.

He is taking on the helmet enforcement issue in Lenawee county on behalf of *A.B.A.T.E. of Michigan*, which also has a lawsuit pending in United State district court in Grand Rapids, challenging the state's D.O.T. helmet rule.

One of the enforcement issues Katkowsky will raise is regarding probable cause to justify a traffic stop on a civil infraction. *A.B.A. T.E.* claims in the lawsuit that police have to look inside a helmet to determine if it meets D.O.T. standards, and therefore cannot claim plain sight evidence to justify a traffic stop and request to inspect a helmet.

Angry French Motorcyclists Snarl Traffic In Protest

Forty thousand motorcyclists demonstrated all over France in protest of a recent government announcement to fine any bikers caught filtering through traffic ("lane splitting"), and more than 60 cities saw their roads blocked by hordes of angry riders who said *non* to French authorities who propose to treat motorbikes, scooters, and mopeds like cars and require them to stay in their lane one behind another.

So they behaved like cars.

On March 13th the La Fédération Française Des Motards en Colère (F.F.M.C. = the French Federation of Angry Bikers) urged all motorcyclists to occupy the space of one car in each lane. Within minutes an enormous traffic jam was created that gridlocked the whole of Paris on a busy Saturday afternoon as car drivers were stuck in traffic until late in the evening.

While bikers blocked the roadways above ground, other protesters went underground bringing the subway system to a grinding halt in response to a statement made by French transport secretary Jean-Marc Belotti, who said "If they [bikers] are not happy, they can take the metro like everyone else."

"They inconvenience us, we will inconvenience them", responded the F.F.M.C., which set a fine example of



civil obedience to demonstrate the impact of motorcycles on traffic flow, good or bad.

Weird News Easy Writers Text While Riding

People knows that texting while driving can be dangerous.

Now consider this: Texting while riding a motorcycle, in heavy traffic.

It's not uncommon in Vietnam, where 29 million motorcycles are the primary source of transportation.

Pham Thi Thuy Linh is 21, a college student and, according to a recent contest sponsored by a mobile phone company, has the fastest fingers in Vietnam. She can text 160 characters in 25 seconds, though she admits she is "about 20 or 30 percent slower texting on my bike." She doesn't much care that texting while driving is both illegal and not too smart.

Tran Van Thanh is a senior official in the government's office of traffic safety. He told national public radio that understands the concerns about texting while driving, but says peoples' bad habits will take time to change, and with limited resources it's impossible to crack down on everyone for everything.

Meanwhile, contest-winner Pham says she can't wait to get one of the new *iPhone* packages. She says it will enable her to text even faster than she does now, from everywhere, including her bike.


