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## **Showing Respect**

At many A.B.A.T.E. meetings or functions, the U.S. pledge of allegiance is recited while facing the stars and stripes flag of our nation.

Reverence for the country's symbol is stated, yet look how that symbol is allowed to be treated during the year.

During fourth of July celebrations, the U.S. flag is reproduced on paper plates, covered with food, then thrown in the trash after use.

People wipe their mouths on flagthemed paper napkins which often end up blowing around and getting trampled into the dirt.

People drape flags on vehicles.

Advertisers use flags to promote sales without any deference to what the flag or holiday stands for.

Is this any way to treat the symbol of our nation?

Title 4 of the U.S. code has specific instructions on how the flag of our nation is to be respected and displayed.

The flag of our nation is not to be draped on objects (except caskets) but is to be mounted on a staff or hang free.


Further,


 "The flag should never be used for advertising purposes in any manner whatsoever.

It should not be embroidered on such articles as cushions or handkerchiefs and the like, printed or otherwise impressed on paper napkins or boxes or anything that is designed for temporary use and discard."

- "No part of the flag should ever be used as a costume or athletic uniform."
- "The flag should never have placed upon it, nor on any part of it, nor attached to it any mark, insignia, letter, word, figure, design, picture, or drawing of any nature."

(title 4, section 8 of the U.S. code)





Title 4 is meaningless without voluntary compliance or public pressure for acquiescence.

What can each of us do to ensure our nation's flag is accorded respect?

Many citizens simply do not know or have forgotten how to show respect for our flag.

Here's what we can do:

- We can gently remind people that many have died defending our nation's freedoms and that the flag is a symbol of their sacrifice for the ideals of liberty. (Even drunks have a tough time arguing against that.)
- Stores selling disposable flag-themed eating materials need to have their managers contacted or a customer comment card filled out explaining that such merchandise is disrespectful of our nation and its flag.

- We can avoid purchasing flag-themed clothing. (We don't have to wear flag shirts or skullchiefs to be patriotic.) We can tell store managers or merchants why we are not buying from them while encouraging them to not carry such merchandise in the future.
- Help people in a positive manner understand how to display our nation's flag respectfully and why it is important.

#### A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A. T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

- A.B.A. T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as BikePAC.
- It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, onroad or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.
- You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to A.B.A. T.E. Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just that wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

So scan through our newspaper. If you like what you read, check out the chapter meeting listing on the back cover. Drop in on a meeting and see what we're about. You just might find a new family in A.B.A. T.E. And as Melinda says: "Bikers give great hugs."

## A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

by Bill Bish (A.B.A. T.E. of California; executive coordinator, National Coalition of Motorcyclists)

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. (A.B.A. T.E.)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the Huns Motorcycle Club in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California, and Ed Armstrong from A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for

bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through

So, there you have it.

The roots of A.B.A. T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

A.B.A.T.E. of Washington is extremely proud of the anti-profiling bill that was passed last month.

He attempted to flag down a passing car, but was hit and killed by the car while standing by the road. Also included in the statistics are moped riders, even though many states do not require a motorcycle endorsement to operate a moped. And a man killed when his riding lawnmower overturned.

We then broke into separate seminars.

I went to one that talked about getting motorcyclists-rights friendly candidates elected. (I feel we should do all we can do in Oregon to get every member of the Oregon house transportation committee booted out of office.)

Other seminars included:

*Five Steps to Freedom* by Rick Boland

Texas Confederation of Clubs. Share the Road - A.B.A.T.E. of Utah

Get to Know your Highway Safety Office by David Beach (director Utah Highway Safety Office)

Planning your Lobbying Trip to D.C. by Jeff Hennie.

From The ...

The National Coalition of Motorcyclists (N.C.O.M.) convention held each year is one of the premier national events held for the sole purpose of expanding the rights and knowledge of the plight of the American motorcyclist.

Make no mistake folks, we as riders are in peril. The motorcycle industry is under attack by insurance companies and in some ways by the motorcycle industry itself. We're now dealing with police enforcement that is egged on by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.). They provide grant money to pay police for so-called "safety inspection stops" for motorcycles only. These "checkpoints" seem to appear in the routes to major motorcycle gatherings and are really just police fishing expeditions.

In New York, A.I.M. attorney Mitch Proner has initiated a federal suit to stop these checkpoints. In the meantime, N.H.T.S.A. continues to play the game in other areas. Congress banned them from lobbying state legislatures for helmet requirements, so they get around that now with this "safety inspection" game.

Every year we are faced with more and more losses of our right to ride our machines, and the industry has to comply with ever more restrictive directives that control the manufacture of our rides. The small shop owners have to deal with regulations sometimes promoted by big companies that restrict what kind and how many machines they can put on the road.

We sit by and watch these things happening and see our economy going down the sewer each day.

Yet when we go to our capitols and lobby for change, we get short changed by do-gooder folks we have put in office to protect our rights.

I don't understand why we as a group don't get up off our collective hindquarters and at least vote. It's the only way we are going to change things.

These are the reasons national organizations like the *National Coalition of Motorcyclists* 

## **GUNNY'S SACK**

(*N.C.O.M.*) exist. They give us the tools we can use to make some changes of our own. All the more reason for our S.M.R.O.s and M.R.O.s to make certain they send representatives to these conventions to pick up the tools needed, bring them back home, and put them to work.

## N.C.O.M.'s DVD For The Asking

*N.C.O.M.* has a new professionally produced DVD available for bikers. It features information about the conventions, the various groups and committees within *N.C.O.M.*, bike insurance and crash information, and more.

And they are free for the asking. Get with your home *A.I.M.* chief of staff or your *A.I.M.* representative and they will make sure you get your free copy to view with your own groups.

Watch for *A.I.M./N.C.O.M.* booths at the biker runs. They should have some available there.

The DVD is nicely done and very informative.

My hope is it will encourage your group to send at least one and preferably two representatives to every national *N.C.O.M.* convention. They are held every year in a different city, so more can attend. It's always in the three or four days prior to mother's day, so folks can get back home to celebrate with mom.

Next year's *N.C.O.M.* convention will be in Indianapolis.

There are also smaller regional *N.C.O.M.* conferences held around the country. Attend these conventions and put these tools to work or we will forever be fighting battles we can't win without ammunition available to us through these events.

Zero Motorcycles — 2009-2010, subject: front brake caliper bracket. The recall affects only certain models, so talk to your dealer, or call Zero motorcycles at 1–(888)–786–9376, extension 45.

#### **B.M.W.** Testing Auto Warning Device For Left-Turn Traffic

*B.M.W.* is in the testing phases with its left turn assistant, which aims to reduce left-turn crashes.

This device detects cars, trucks, and motorcycles in nearby lanes of traffic.

Wow. This could save lives if it really works and can be put on all vehicles.

If it really works, that is.

If the car is moving slowly it will be automatically braked, a warning sound will be emitted, and a headsup display will show the reason for the braking.

Maybe this device can prevent some bike crashes.

**Michigan** — There are two helmet bill choices being offered here and just maybe it will work this time. A similar bill made it to the governor's office twice before and the then-governor vetoed it both times.

Senate bill 291 was approved by a margin of five to one. It would allow riders 21 years of age or older to ride without a helmet if they have had their motorcycle endorsement for two or more years, or passed a motorcycle safety course.

A similar bill under consideration, house bill 4008, would allow individuals who are 21 years of age or older to ride without a helmet if they have a \$20,000 medical policy in place.

We'll keep a weather eye on the progress of these bills.

**Portland, Oregon** — Ryno Motors here in Portland is about to introduce a one-wheeled motorized unicycle that will stay balanced in a manner similar to the Segway.

## **Revolutionary Thinking**

Yer crusty ol' editor recently finished reading a slender book called 1776 And All That about fictional heavenly events that could have occurred during our nation's bicentennial celebration. Within the story are insights into how some of our nation's founders and others may have viewed our revolution of independence.

Settled comfortably into the future, we may not realize how much the American revolution rocked the established order in european nations, particularly in monarchies where it was taken as granted that bloodlines had been divinely appointed to govern the lower masses.

Our revolution was more than freeing ourselves of odorous overseas governance — it became a revolution of spirit that swept aside long-established living patterns and opened the minds of "common people" to the possibilities of taking control of their lives. That made entrenched governments very uncomfortable and their officials extremely nervous. What if such ideas were to be taken up by their own common people?

Once the seed of possibility is planted in the minds of people, their imaginations become fired at the thought of change. It is much like we've seen happening recently in Egypt and Libya. It's what it felt like when the Soviet Union crumpled and former block nations became independent countries again.

There is a mindset in many well-established european regimes that government is best left to those who have been trained from birth to govern. It is felt that it is their given destiny and right to govern the masses, and that only they are fully qualified to perform such duties. (Sadly, we've begun seeing that way of thinking beginning to take hold here where many officials have served more than two terms of elected office.)

Many european leaders dismissed our revolution as a temporary lapse of order that was doomed to failure. Such talk, they hoped, would quell any ideas of revolution in their own subjects.

Within the English upper classes, the united colonies were expected to fail as a nation, then be reabsorbed into the fold of British government. That attitude continued for some time and may have helped foster the *War of 1812*, less than two decades after winning our freedom.

These days, our own government is becoming well-established along with its own ruling elite.

Has the rebelling child become like their parent?

By the way, Leonard Wibberley also wrote *The Mouse That Roared*. (Perhaps you've seen the movie with Peter Sellers in three different acting rolls.)

What's important about Wibberley's *Mouse* books is that they show a small country sticking up for itself in the arena of super power nations . . . and winning.

Does that premise sound familiar? Sounds like what motorcyclists are doing in state and federal legislatures.


We can take heart from reading the delightful *Mouse* series of books, and perhaps gain some insight into the thinking process of government officials. Even though the books are entertaining to read, it's obvious that the author is knowledgeable about how governments operate in the real world.

Wibberley's books are getting harder to find these days, but try checking the fiction section of your local library first. If that doesn't work, try local used book stores or *Powel's Books* in Portland. On-line book sellers such as *Alibris* often carry multiple copies of Wibberley's work, so you can find a price and condition that suits your needs.



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

## A.M.A. Family Capitol Hill Climb Comes Out On Top

Hundreds of young motorcyclists, their parents, and concerned riders from twenty states gathered in Washington, D.C. with several U.S. representatives, including representative Denny Rehberg (R-Montana), author of the *Kids Just Want to Ride Act*, on Thursday, May 26, at the *A.M.A. Family Capitol Hill Climb*. The event was a strong demonstration of public opposition to a ban on the sale of youth-model motorcycles and all-terrain vehicles.

Families from as far away as Washington state, Arizona, and Colorado delivered their message at a gathering in the Rayburn house office building. The parents and children then met with their individual legislators to personally urge support for HR–412, the *Kids Just Want To Ride Act*.

"It's been clear from the start that motorcycles should never have been part of this ban, and nobody delivers that message better than A.M.A. members. Young riders and their parents for whom off-road riding is an important family activity," said Rob Dingman (A.M.A. president and C.E.O.) "We helped bring them together, but it is their voices, and the voices of thousands of other motorcyclists from across the country, that are crucial to ending the ban."

#### Early American Motorcycle Pioneer Headed For Motorcycle Hall of Fame

The *Motorcycle Hall of Fame* announced the fourth and fifth members of the class of 2011:

Norbert Schickel, an innovative designer and builder in the early years of American motorcycle manufacturing, and Stu Peters, one of the most prolific and enduring motocross promoters in the history of the sport in America.

As the founder of Schickel Motor Company, Schickel was part of the motorcycle design boom that occurred in the United States between 1905 and 1915. His career will be honored at the 2011 Motorcycle Hall of Fame induction ceremony as part of the A.M.A. Legends and Champions Weekend at the Red Rock Resort in Las Vegas, Nevada, November 18-20.

Peters, whose group, the *Continental Motosport Club* (C.M.C.), has been promoting motocross races since 1968, will be honored at the 2011 hall of fame induction ceremony on November 18.

#### Americade Report

June 7 marked the kickoff of *Americade*, an annual five-day rally

and *A.M.A.* national convention, in Lake George, New York Attracting motorcyclists on all types of bikes, especially tourers, sport-tourers and cruisers, *Americade* offers some of the best riding in the country in addition to a full slate of events and entertainment.

"Americade is a gathering of true motorcycle enthusiasts, fun-loving folks who simply enjoy having a great time on two wheels," said Dan Stedman. (A.M.A. vice president of membership and marketing) "The A.M.A. is looking forward to being on location, supporting our members, signing up new members and enjoying ourselves at one of the premier events on the riding calendar every year."

#### U.S. Interior Department Reverses Wild Lands Policy

In an announcement made June 1, U.S. interior secretary Ken Salazar said the federal *Bureau of Land Management* (*B.L.M.*) wouldn't designate any wild lands, which would have been managed as if they had received the restrictive wilderness land-use designation from congress.

Instead, Salazar said the *B.L.M.*, which is a part of the interior department, will work in collaboration with members of congress and others to identify

public land that may be appropriate candidates for congressional protection under the *Wilderness Act*.

#### Virginia Motorcycle-Only Checkpoints

The *A.M.A.* has expressed concern to governor. Bob McDonnell over a recent motorcycle-only checkpoint in northern Virginia, calling the stop "discriminatory."

The Arlington county police department conducted a motorcycle-only checkpoint on May 28 during the annual *Rolling Thunder* gathering in Washington, D.C. The *Rolling Thunder* event, held May 27-29, involved tens of thousands of motorcyclists riding to the nation's capital to seek accountability for prisoners of war and service personnel missing in action.

# Washington State Enacts Nation's First Anti-Profiling Legislation

Motorcycle riders routinely report being profiled by enforcement agencies, but a new regulation in Washington state is intended to prohibit police from singling out bikers for stops without clear and legitimate reason.

Modeled after a 2002 state requirement outlawing racial profiling by police, the nation's first "anti-profiling" bill passed unanimously through both the house and senate, and was signed by governor. Chris Gregoire on April 13. Sponsored by representative Steve Kirby (D-Tacoma), the new regulation will force local enforcement agencies to adopt a written policy designed to condemn and prevent the profiling of motorcyclists, and it institutes training to address the problem.

Motorcycle enthusiasts presented compelling evidence to legislators, including a video of a state trooper crawling through bushes near the legislative building in Olympia two years ago and writing down motorcycle license plates while bikers were holding their annual *Black Thursday* legislative rally and lobby day.

Outsiders motorcycle club member David "Double D' Devereaux (spokesperson for the Washington Confederation of Clubs and U.S. Defenders of Washington state) testified in Olympia that almost every member of every club, and even motorcyclists who aren't in clubs, has been profiled. He said many legislators were unaware of the problem until they saw the video of police gathering information on the bikers as they were inside the capitol building ironically seeking sponsorship for a bill that would stop motorcycle profiling.

Also lobbying on behalf of the bill was Donnie "Mr. Breeze" Landsman, (legislative affairs officer for A.B.A.T.E. of Washington) who told *The News Tribune* that he's been denied service at restaurants for wearing a bandana and a leather vest; "Motorcyclists aren't looking

for special rights," Landsman told the newspaper. "We want the same rights that are afforded to every other section of the population as American citizens."

Double D and his club brother Jeff "Twitch" Burns, who produced an 86-minute video that chronicles the growth of the emerging anti-profiling movement within the motorcycling community, reported their success at the Patch Holder Meeting during the recent N.C.O.M. convention in Albuquerque, New Mexico, to the resounding approval of bikers rights activists and Confederation of Clubs representatives attending from all across America. "This is something that could be done in every state," Double D told the enthusiastic crowd.

#### States Combat Motorcycle-Only Checkpoints

Calling motorcycle-only roadblocks discriminatory and unconstitutional, *A.B.A.T.E. of California* is pushing a bill that would ban state and federal funding of such so-called "safety checkpoints".

New York and Georgia have initiated roadside barricades under the auspices and guidance of *N.H.T.S.A.* to coral motorcycle riders en route to major motorcycle events to check paperwork and equipment for violations, and for other illegal activity.

AB–1047, authored by Kevin Jeffries (vice chairman of the assembly transportation committee) would prohibit the California *Office of Traffic Safety (O. T.S.)* from issuing grants to enforcement agencies to stage motorcycle-only checkpoints and also require the *O. T.S.* to conduct audits of the safety checkpoint grants to insure that enforcement agencies are complying.

Similarly, North Carolina is currently considering two bills (H–375 and H–381) aimed at preventing enforcement agencies from establishing patterns for vehicle stops at checking stations based on a



particular type of vehicle.

In congress, representative Tom Petri (R-WI) and some of his colleagues have authored legislation to de-fund the checkpoints. U.S. house resolution 904 would prevent the *U.S.-D.O.T.* from providing funds to states which would be used for motorcycle roadblocks.

Motorcyclists across the country are also awaiting a court ruling on the constitutionality of the New York checkpoints, being challenged by New York *Aid to Injured Motorcyclists* (A.I.M.) attorney Mitch Proner, which could wind up on the docket of the U.S. supreme court.

## **Motorcycle Fatalities Continue Decline**

Motorcycle fatalities declined in 2010 by at least 2%, according to a new state-by-state report released on April 19 by the *Governors Highway Safety Association* .(G.H.S.A.)

Based on preliminary data, *G.H.S.A.*'s motorcycle fatality report projects that deaths declined from 4,465 in 2009 to 4,376 or less in 2010. The projection is based upon data from fifty states and the District of Columbia for the first nine months of 2010. The decline comes on the heels of a 16% drop in 2009, which followed eleven straight years of steady increases in motorcycle deaths which mirrored annual increases in motorcycle sales and registrations.

*G.H.S.A.* is projecting declines in approximately half of the states, with notable declines in many. In Texas, for example, based upon data for the first nine months of 2010, motorcycle deaths are expected to be down 16%, while Oregon and Oklahoma are down 27% and 30%, respectively.

But fatalities had started to climb back up during the last three months in the study, prompting fears that the improving economy and surging gas prices will lead to



increased motorcycle travel and thus increasing exposure to risk.

# N.H.T.S.A. Updates Motorcycle Helmet Standards

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has updated the federal motorcycle helmet standards (FMVSS 218) in an attempt to stop riders from wearing non-D.O.T. approved "novelty" helmets. The new standard does not affect the construction of helmets directly, but changes the way they're labeled to make it more difficult to mimic D.O.T. compliance certifications.

Effective immediately under the final rule issued May 13, helmets that conform to federal motor vehicle safety standard number 218 will carry a sticker with the manufacturer's name, the helmet model, and the words "D.O.T. FMVSS No. 218 Certified." The move to make non-compliant helmets harder to sell comes after the number of riders sporting novelty helmets increased dramatically in 2010 over 2009.

According to *N.H.T.S.A.* statistics, in 2010, only 54% of motorcyclists wore a *D.O.T.*-approved helmet. Around 14% wore a novelty helmet, and 32% rode without a helmet.

In 2009, those numbers were 67%, 9% and 24%, respectively.

In 2010, 75% of riders who did elect to wear a helmet wore a *D.O.T.*-compliant one.

In 2009, that number was 86%.

*N.H.T.S.A.* says 5.2 million helmets are sold annually. Twenty states require all motorcycle riders to wear helmets, but only 13 states specify that the helmets must meet federal standards.

#### "Dead Red" Reg Allows Kansas Riders To Proceed

Motorcyclists in several states have been given a green light to proceed past stuck red lights, and now riders in Kansas can proceed with caution

through a stuck signal if it has failed to change green within a reasonable amount of time because the signal has malfunctioned or failed to detect the cycle.

HB-2192, the "Dead Red" legislation, has been signed by governor Sam Brownback and goes into effect June 1 for intersections across the state with sensors. Traffic sensors imbedded in the roadway normally tell the light to change when a vehicle approaches, but motorcycles often aren't metallic or heavy enough to trigger it, argued A.B.A.T.E. of Kansas in support of the legislation.

The measure was packaged with a series of road-related measures, including provisions raising the state's maximum highway speed to 75 mph.

Nine other states currently allow motorcyclists to proceed through a signal that fails to detect their presence, and similar legislation is being considered in Illinois where HB-2860 passed the House 104-0 and is awaiting further action in the

#### **Motorcycle Sales Stoked By Gas Prices**

Motorcycle sales in the U.S. rose 7.2% during the first quarter of 2011, compared with the same period a year earlier, says the Motorcycle Industry Council. (M.I.C.)

In its retail sales report, which tracks sales among the 18 leading brands sold in the U.S., the industry trade group said scooters posted the biggest sales increase of nearly 50%. Sales of dual-purpose motorcycles, which are designed for highway and off-road use rose almost 25%, attributed in part to the segment's overall fuel efficiency.

In a separate but related report, a recent survey of Harley-Davidson dealerships suggests that retail sales improved in the first three months of the year. According to an analysis by Raymond James & Associates, 55% of the dealerships surveyed said they had a year-over-year sales increase in the quarter, and nearly all reported that inventories were "ideal" or "light".

The M.I.C. also reported that tire

motorcycle use, also rose in the first three months of the year. Motorcycle and scooter tire sales increased 29%, while sales of tires for on-highway bikes rose 28% and scooter tires jumped 49%.

The industry council's owner survey estimates the number of motorcycle miles traveled rose 5% to 27.6 billion miles from 2008-09. The percentage of U.S. households with at least one motorcycle grew to 6.8% in 2009 from 5.4% in 2003.

#### **E-Cycle Growth Forecast**

More and more motorcycles and scooters powered by electricity are hitting the road, and some experts predict that the number of electric two-wheel vehicles could swell to more than 100 million worldwide within the next five years.

Currently, there are about 17 million electric motorcycles and scooters on the road, but a new study by Pike Research shows that that the global market could expand to more than 138 million by 2017.

"Electric motorcycles and scooters have strong appeal for many consumers," says senior analyst Dave Hurst. "They are relatively low cost to own, do not take a lot of space, and are easy to maintain."

Electric motorcycles are becoming more capable every day. Chip Yates recently set a land speed record with his electric motorcycle, reaching nearly 200 mph, and the TTXGP racing series was just officially sanctioned by the F.I.M.

#### **Victory For Indian**

America's oldest motorcycle brand now has a new owner. Polaris Industries Incorporated has announced the acquisition of Indian Motorcycle, adding one of motorcycling's legendary brands to its stable of Victory cruiser and touring bikes.

Polaris, which has manufacturing plants in Roseau, Minnesota, and Spirit Lake, Iowa, will close down the *Indian Motorcycle* production facility in Kings Point, North Carolina, moving all production to Spirit Lake.

Polaris said it hopes to capture

sales, which it says are an indicator of a bigger share of the \$11 billion heavyweight cruiser market by operating Indian as an independent business unit, combining Polaris' "engineering acumen and innovative technology" with indian's "premium brand, iconic design and rich American history."

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


