A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the *National Highway Transportation Safety Administration* (*N.H.T.S.A.*) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the *National Custom Cycle Association*. But because of a conflict with the acronym the name was changed in February 1972 to *A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments* (*A.B.A.T.E.*).

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. *D.O.T.* (*Department of Transportation*) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce H.R.3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet laws.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California and Ed Armstrong of A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the *D.O.T.* because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet law mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976. Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years, first to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

• *A.B.A.T.E.* is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.

• It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, onroad or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.

• You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to *A.B.A.T.E.* Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just *that* wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

Keeping it short and sweet this month.



Education Al has been working with the Astoria high school to do *M.A.P.* classes. Sounds like a fall time frame for this, since school's almost out. But the communications have been started.



Our Officers at Work A.B.A.T.E. State Board Minutes

10 May 2008 – Albany Eagles

Meeting was called to order by Gene Mortimore, vice-coordinatoreast, at 12:20 p.m. with 11 of 12 chapters represented. All chapters were eligible to vote with the exception of *Twin Rivers* due to a treasurer report problem. This problem is being worked on.

Pledge of allegiance.

Moment of silence for downed brothers/sisters and service men/ women.

Guests and first time attendees: Jim Wagner (*Douglas County Chapter* coordinator). Welcome.

Also, Ron August from Team Ron was given an Oregon. opportunity to speak before the board of directors as this time regarding A.B.A. T.E.'s assistance with the container. He brought pictures of the container and signage used acknowledging A.B.A.T.E.'s contribution to Team Oregon. Ron mentioned that the average age for training is now at 44 years. He also spoke on the various sites for the courses. Has entered into a new two year contract at Klamath Falls. The Medford site has moved. One site in Portland will need a new site due to a change at the school. Asked that we please keep an eye out for sites approximately 160 feet by 260 feet in a level area for new sites.

Ron spoke briefly on the Vickie Walker training bill and he stated that *Team Oregon* could handle up to 3,000 in the I.R.T. class but not the B.R.T. class. The biggest problem would be in combining of the numbers for the training sites. Training has grown in the double digits each of the last two years.

Team Oregon and Ron August received our support and he left with a round of applause for *Team Oregon* and their commitment and work towards safety in Oregon.

Motion made by Bob Highfill of *Lincoln County* to accept minutes from April 12th state board meeting as printed in the newsmagazine with the following corrections:

• It was overlooked in the minutes, that the secretary, upon continued disruptions, walked out of the meeting for a few minutes and then returned to keeping notes. The amount of disruption caused a lot of problems and made getting the work of *A.B.A.T.E.* done very difficult. There was too much drama and not enough listening.

• Also, in the sergeant at armsnorth report, Oregon is not the only state that the bikers have funded programs. Randy stated that he when he reported this from his e-mails, he was not aware of others.

Brain Stovall, *River City Chapter*, seconded the motion to pass with corrections and the motion passed

Coordinator comments: Matt Price (Excused – prior commitment.)

Correspondence: Nic read two pieces of e-mail correspondence.

One was regarding a service now available for providing emergency information called *Medicfile*. This service provides a way to get your medical profile to emergency services when needed. More information can be found at

The second was from a member of *Native American Issues and Causes* regarding keeping a buffer zone around Bear Butte near Sturgis, South Dakota. This has to do with all the noise and destruction of sacred grounds at Bear Butte. This area is important to the native plains tribes for spiritual ceremonies and guidance. Material was made available for reading or you can go to their blog at:

Nic also read the resignation of Art Schultz, sergeant at arms–east, due to work reasons. Nic had spoke with Art just prior to the meeting and Art stated that he felt that he could not do the job adequately now that he had to go back to long-haul trucking. Art will be missed.

Vice coordinator–north: Heidi Disrud reported that she is visiting chapters and trying to get ideas for legislative work in the manner of the top three priorities for our attention. She asked that any ideas from the chapters could be addressed by the chapter representatives and forwarded to her via e-mail.

Vice coordinator–south: Annette Murray (Excused – medical.) Gene read report on her visit to *Willamette Valley Chapter* and on how nice they were. Get well soon, please!

Vice coordinator-east: (Gene Mortimore) Not much to report on. Has been overwhelmed with the

Fossil Run. Bear Hollow is really shaping up. Would appreciate some bodies to help with getting firewood cut.

Treasurer: (Joye "Grace" Howell) Report handed in. Checking account \$23,603.00; savings \$20,199.17 for a total of \$43,802.88.

Said that she would keep is short and sweet this time.

Need a contact for *Central Oregon* as soon as possible. Do not have a report for the spring swap meet yet. Reported that our storage was broken into and so far, all that is missing are some old, broken radios. Robert Hale reported on the break-in. A container has been found, a forty footer, for \$2,500 that we could purchase and save money in rental fees and be more secure. Discussion on this ensued.

Grace reported that *Langlitz Leather* wanted us to purchase a \$350 gift certificate as part of their compensation for being a vendor.

Brian Stovall presented a check for \$200 from their [*River City*] poker run. They netted \$1,200 and paid more because it is the chapters that keep the state solvent.

Robert Hale stated that the chapter representatives take back to their chapters a request for ideas for *A.B.A.T.E.* to make some money. We are spending it faster than we have it coming in. We made about \$10,000 at the swap meet but final figures are not in yet. *Lincoln County* then stated that it is now the start of the riding season and this is now the time that we make our money.

Grace also reported that there is still money due the state from a January function that has not been turned in. Stated that the chapters need to get things done.

Membership secretary: Linda Henderson (Excused – attending charity event.)

Report turned in shows 1,831 members. Down from last month.

Sanctioning officer: Matt Price and committee. Robert Hale reported that there is nothing to report at this time.

State auditor: (Vacant)

Newsmagazine editor: Rot Path stated that the monthly reports are due today. After all, today is the 10th. Stated that he has been having e-mail problems. The Salem provider was discontinued so he has had to try and find a new one.

Spoke on the format change in the newsmagazine and that it will probably not be used until the July issue.

Asked that run flyers *not* be sent to the newsmagazine. They must come from the sanctioning officer after they have been sanctioned.

Also reminded everyone to not use copyrighted materials such as maps. Do not send in copies from maps as they are too detailed and need to be made simpler.

The current postage is \$400-\$500 per month and the new format will cost less.

There needs to be some discussion on ad rates and sizes due to the format change. The rates and sizes will have to change to be more in accord with how newspapers do theirs. (Not as to expenses but in the manner of sizes.)

Suggested that chapter elections maybe could be staggered to help with people learning their jobs so that everyone is not new at the same time. **Legislative director**: Quiet Mike reported that the legislature is not in session so there is nothing to report in that area.

Reminded everyone to vote in the primary, May 20th. Stated that we need to remember who our friends are and vote out those who are not. As Oregon is a vote-by-mail state, Mike reminded everyone that Monday, May 12th, the postage rates are going up to 42 cents.

Regarding the *Awareness Rally*, Quiet Mike asked, "Where the hell are the people?" Quiet Mike stated that instead of talking, we need action. The preparation for next year's legislative session starts today.

Guest speaker Ian King from the *Washington Road Riders Association* (our co-sponsor for the *Best of the West*) spoke on the *Best of the West* conference being held in June. This is one of the best conferences out there and a lot of fun. It is also a money making event for the *M.R.F.* (*Motorcycle Riders Foundation*).

There is a banquet dinner that has an auction following where donated items are auctioned off with the proceeds going to the *M.R.F.*

The cost of running the *M.R.F.* is high but indispensable. There are only two paid people with the rest being volunteers. The *M.R.F.* is virtually our only and the best source for information in Washington D.C. regarding motorcycling issues.

Ian also stated that we can affect other states elections by writing or emailing or even calling people in other states. After all, it is our tourism dollars that they want as well. For

example, in New Jersey, Frank Lautenberg must go as he has always been a thorn in our side. His challenger, Ron Anders, is promotorcycle and a friend.

Money is always an issue and it is money that is very well spent. There are usually twenty different states represented at a *Best of the West* conference. Guest speakers include "Texas Larry" Walker, our own Brian Stovall and, (let us not forget}, Ken Ray. Also Ian King will be speaking.

A mere \$100 covers your entire organization for attending the conference. The banquet/auction is not included.)

Ian closed to a round of applause and had to leave for Seattle. Safe Riding.

Brian Stovall is running for county commissioner. We must get involved at every level that we can.

Brian reported that he had spoken directly with Vickie Walker about her bill. He explained our position of supporting new rider training but that renewals, it is felt it, would overload *Team Oregon* and we could not support having renewals included in the mandatory training.

Brain also reported on the democratic party convention and

about the attempt to get a helmet law modification on the ballot/platform. He was the "lone wolf" there for motorcyclists and was able to accomplish nothing. We need more P.C.P.'s (precinct committee persons) in both parties. Get involved, we need a voice in the party at every level that we can get one.

Sergeant at arms-north: Randy Phipps reported that he still needs people to work different jobs and shifts at *Fossil*. There will be a signup sheet at the information booth. Everyone needs to contribute, as this is how *A.B.A.T.E.* makes its money. You will earn one *A.B.A.T.E.* buck for every hour worked.

Sergeant at arms-south: Bill Foster reported that Randy gave his *Fossil* report so he will just speak on the *Awareness Rally*. He was very disappointed in the turnout. We need to have more people if we expect them to really notice us.

Sergeant at arms-east: (Vacant)

Products director: Dave Meeker reported that he has chapter packets available.

He turned in a report on the numbers of available shirts and pins for *Fossil*. We are fairly well stocked and ready for *Fossil*.

The artwork for the T-shirts was available for viewing in its final form.

Reported that he will be attending the *Best of the West* conference next month.

There are now available *Fossil* hats for \$25 a piece. There are also available, the windshield banners for bikes at \$20 each, from *River City Chapter*.

Education director: (Patricia Carner) Report turned in and read:

"I would like to give the state board of directors the report which I gave Matt prior to the March meeting.

The committee did not have authority to authorize anything – just gathered the following information by contacting various chapters.

Several *A.B.A.T.E.* members expressed interest in working the state fair booth on the weekends provided they would be able to ride and display their bikes in the booth. They asked about reimbursement of parking or entrance fees if working the booth.

As an education booth, a small display only would be better – perhaps tied to a law enforcement agency display (no cost involved).

A.B.A.T.E. would not be able to recover the cost of the booth through membership sales. If the decision is made to go ahead with this, it should be paid for by corporate sponsorship, perhaps by the vendors who Matt Price had already contacted to donate display bikes.

The state fair is not a target market. It would be a great day to sell ten memberships. Very hard to justify such a large outlay of funds.

The suggestion by Matt that tickets for the *Shriner* bike be sold at the booth as the bike would be displayed is generally accepted by other chapters but if other chapters are manning the booth, they would like to sell their own drawing tickets for upcoming events. The *Shriner Toy Run* is a great event but it is multichapter event, not a state event. Also, all chapters would want to distribute flyers for any upcoming events.

If a drawing was held daily, it should be limited to \$25 *A.B.A.T.E.* bucks that can be cased at either *Fossil*

or a swap meet. That gives us a means of recouping some funds."

Patricia also pointed out that allergies are a problem now so be prepared.

She has *Team Oregon* mobile schedules available. Contributions to *Team Oregon* are still being accepted to get needed equipment and supplies for the new containers.

Education director II: Geoff White reported on two new instructors, Steve Boston and Rod Runyon. Congratulations.

Public relations director: Debra Lutje reported that the *O.N.P.A.* ads went out on the first of May. She brought a copy to show everyone.

She spoke on an article in the *Ruralite* magazine that featured Deb and was favorable to bikers.

There was also a front-page article in the Fossil paper, the *Times-Journal*. She will have a report on the number of hits the ads have generated on our web site at the next meeting.

State run coordinator (*Fossil***)**: Howie Long reported that ticket sales are doing okay. The site is doing good.

Reported that Gene Mortimore, our vice-coordinator–east and today's chair, is the superman at Fossil. He has done so much to make this run work and it would not be what it is without his work. Thank you. Gene!

From The ...

GUNNY'S SACK

N.C.O.M. 2008

This months pearls will summarize just a little of the 2008 *National Coalition of Motorcyclists* (*N.C.O.M.*) convention just held in Houston, Texas. I gotta tell ya folks, this year was the biggest and best ever. I'm told there were nearly 300 patch clubs represented, plus a slug of M.R.O.'s (motorcycle rights organizations) and just plain individuals.

The seminars and workshops pointed out to me that even though we as biker activists are doing a lot of talking, we are still not motivating our people to *act* on the information we are providing to them.

It seems harder to get people to our state capitols during the work week to talk with our elected officials when they're there. I think people feel like "the other guy" will do it.

Our freedoms are being devoured by politicians who act as if they believe our constitution should be abolished.

Our forefathers sacrificed everything they had, including their families, property and their very lives, all so we could live in a country that was free from tyranny and oppression.

Our freedoms are eroded daily.

We need to wake up folks.

That isn't roses we smell, it's black mold and that stuff will make you sick.

Agenda

The *N.C.O.M.* conference covered a lot.

The legislative task force met under the new leadership of Sputnik of Texas. Oregon *A.I.M.* lawyer Sam Hochberg spoke on insurance issues and the need to buy coverage that will protect you. It's very likely the clown that runs over you will not have sufficient coverage to take care of you and your injuries. The short nugget of Sam's talk: Buy high-high limits of uninsured/underinsured coverage, which is usually surprisingly cheap, and talk to a lawyer *before* you say word one to an adjuster.

There was also an *A.I.M.* attorney conference that was open to all bikers, a discrimination workshop, a personal injury case study, and a seminar on freedom of the road and the use of the court system. We had workshops and seminars on women in motorcycling, a clean and sober roundtable, black clubs and minority outreach, a christian biker unity conference, and how-to workshops on successful lobbying, and federal grants and how to get them.

• Sliding to safety: Iowa's emergency medical tech "Slider Gilmore" did his presentation at *N.C.O.M.* on crash scene management and what we can do to help before emergency folks arrive. We're usually first at the scene, and we can save lives. We all should get busy and take a first responder course, but Slider's program is priceless.

Among Slider's tips: Make sure the injured folks do *not* move around in case of neck or spinal injuries. Make sure helmets remain on their heads, unless they're suffocating from dirt. Cut chin straps if they're choking. Immobilize their heads and make them comfortable but without

moving them. Take their pulse and respiration every few minutes and log it for the E.M.T.'s. Isolate the crash scene and protect the injured from traffic. We don't have to be trained in first aid to do this. Use common sense.

Most of all, Slider says, stay calm and think.

Slider is part of the *N.C.O.M.* speaker program and is available to come to your area.

Sam and I can't speaking highly enough of Slider's presentation. His workshop for your folks just might save a life. Maybe yours. Talk to your *A.I.M.* attorney about it. I'm sure he will help you get it done. Or, call Richard M. Lester at *A.I.M.*, at 1-(800)-On-A-Bike.

• Defending Texas: A new program was unveiled by the *Texas Confederations of Clubs* (there are nine *C.O.C.'s* in Texas), and it's called the *Texas Defenders*. In short, it's designed to be an efficient way to organize and rally a rapid response when needed on legislative issues of concern to bikers. More on them later.

• Next Year: The 2009 *N.C.O.M.* convention will be in Reno, Nevada at the *Nugget*! Hope to see you there.

News Bits-N-Pieces

Undoing Florida's Freedom: The safetycrats are at it again in Florida, doing their best to reinstall the helmet requirement there. The truth of the matter is that this free state's crash death toll has fallen dramatically since the repeal of that

insidious mandate. Motorcycling has increased and income to the state through sales taxes and licensing for riders has increased by billions of dollars to the economy of that state. When will the legislatures wake up to the economics of the thing? We are **not** against the wearing of helmets. We just want to be able to make the intelligent choice.

Women's Riding Grows. Everyone, especially women riders, check out this address on the web: http:// www.womenridersnow.com

According to a recent survey by *J.D. Power and Associates*, twelve out of every 100 motorcycles today are sold to women. That's a 20% increase since 2003. Today's woman rider is college-educated, earns \$50,000 or more, and is a role model in her community.

Bad news for the macho man, women are better riders because they tend to be more detail-minded and believe they can learn from taking riding courses. They have fewer crashes too.

Salem, Oregon: Good news for Oregon. In 2006, Oregon's motorcycle fatality rate was 3.9 deaths for every 10,000 registered bikes, compared to the national rate of 7.3 deaths.

The national rate has risen steadily as more bikes are registered.

In Oregon, the number of bike registrations has increased by 43 percent since 2001. Safety officials say training is a major reason for Oregon's low death rate. About 70 percent of the state's riders receive training through *Team Oregon*, sponsored by the *Oregon Department* *of Transportation.* The training is mandatory for riders under 21.

We have the most comprehensive program in the nation today. The federal highway administration, *N.H.T.S.A.*, last year named *Team Oregon* the best rider program in the country and we are proud of it. The program was started by Oregon bikers and eventually turned over to the state

Omaha, Nebraska: Don't take my helmet, please. Watch out if you're riding through here anytime soon.

According to a story in the *Omaha World Herald*, the local police here just issued their own little "fatwah" about so-called novelty helmets. Through October, they claim, they're going to crack down on riders wearing them and fine them just as if they had no helmet at all.

Worse yet, they say they'll confiscate your helmet and won't let you ride away after you're stopped until you're wearing a "*D*. *O*. *T*.-approved" helmet.

Hey, isn't there any real crime going on in Omaha that the police should be dealing with instead?



Redefining Ourselves

Goodbye Newsmag, Hello Newsrag c.o.e. - 77

For all that we do, one of the primary functions of Oregon A.B.A.T.E. is that of legislative watchdog.

A primary election has just been completed which narrowed the field of political candidates seeking to obtain or retain office in the November elections.

This next six months is prime time for A.B.A.T.E. and BikePAC.

Although the Oregon legislature is not in session this year, the people seeking office are rabid for support and will not forget which groups help them get elected. If we aid them now, then when the legislature convenes next January we will already have elected friends in place familiar with our issues and willing to listen, then act on our concerns.

Sure candidates need well-heeled donors for the big money now required for election campaigns. But the folks they really appreciate are the people who help by working in their offices doing such things as mailings, phone services. canvassing neighborhoods, putting up lawn signs, and talking with other voters about the candidate's merits.

A little effort now will open doors to us for several years.

So begin looking at the candidates left after the primary.

Flip back from the sports, business, or collegiate (comics) section of the newspaper to the front page, start paying attention to television debates after your favorite programs, ride your bike down to town hall meetings

when potential legislators are visiting. Find office-seekers who have views and concerns similar to your own, people who seem to have the integrity to work for the folks who elect them and not for their own personal gain.

Now here is the most important part.

Once you've settled on one or more candidates who you feel you can work with, ACT.

Take that all important first step and contact their staff to offer to help.

All the words we speak and write are meaningless without action.

For the next six months we can redefine A.B.A.T.E. as:

Action By Aiding The **E**lections

> later this month we achieve balance between light and dark, yet good riding will continue well into autumn

Next month will see a change in the state newsmagazine format.

In order to save our organization \$300 to \$400 per month (that's \$3,600 to \$4,800 per year), we are going to try a small newspaper-style format. It will be bigger than our present publication, but smaller than the newspapers you buy out of street boxes. (Roughly the size of the M.R.F. *Reports* newspaper.)

By changing the size and quality of the paper as well as reducing the number of pages, we intend to save A.B.A.T.E. money that can then be used for legislative matters and awareness training.

We can thank Sue Mills (former state treasurer) for doing the background work that will make this than ge possible, the fine folks at Oregon Lithoprint who print this wonderful rag for putting together numerous estimates, and Rotten Roger for gently goading yer crusty ol' editor into action.

And the new format will be softer and more absorbent.

Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month Officially Launched

Washington, D.C. – Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month was officially launched with a news conference on Thursday, May 1, 2008 on the grounds of the nation's capitol in Washington, D.C.

Speaking at the event were the cochairs of the bipartisan Congressional Motorcycle Caucus, representative Michael C. Burgess M.D. (R-Texas) and representative Gabrielle Giffords (D-Arizona), along with secretary of transportation Mary E. Peters, Motorcycle Industry Council (M.I.C.) president Tim Buche, and American Motorcyclist Association president and C.E.O. Rob Dingman. The gathering of national leaders was organized by the M.I.C. and called attention to the annual spring surge of motorcyclists on America's highways and encouraged responsible riding and driving by all roadway users.

"As a doctor, I've been in plenty of emergency rooms and trauma centers," said representative Burgess, who is a motorcyclist himself. "Take it from me, you don't want to be involved in a crash of any kind, especially one involving a motorcycle. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. For riders, that means ride responsibly. For everyone else on the road, stay alert and don't let dangerous distractions divert your attention from the road."

Burgess added that he has introduced a bipartisan bill to fix a loophole in the *H.I.P.A.A.* regulation that allows insurers to deny payment for injuries sustained while engaged in recreational activities like motorcycling.

"There are many other reasons why motorcycles are so popular, but one explanation is simple economics: the rising cost of gas," said representative Giffords. "Motorcycles offer a more fuel efficient and cheaper way of getting around. I am proud that, as a motorcyclist, I am leaving a smaller footprint on our earth by just riding my bike."

Burgess and Giffords have sponsored a house resolution (H. R. 339) that highlights *Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month*.

Secretary Peters said, "As a biker myself, I know motorcycle safety begins and ends with riders taking personal responsibility. That means proper training, proper gear, and a DOT-certified helmet every time you ride."

Speaking on behalf of the *A.M.A.*'s 290,000 members, Dingman said, "I strongly encourage motorcyclists everywhere to re-familiarize themselves with the basics of safe and responsible riding to get the most out of every trip and arrive at their destinations safely. But it is not only motorcyclists who need to hear our safety message today. Far too many

motorcycle crashes are caused by inattentive car drivers who pull into oncoming traffic, often turning into the right-of-way of approaching motorcyclists. With the popularity of motorcycling at an all-time high in America, these crashes often injure or take the life of a friend, family member, or co-worker. We urge everyone, no matter what you ride or drive, to focus on the task at hand and be aware of traffic around you, in particular motorcyclists."

Dingman also encouraged secretary Peters and the D.O.T. to urge state highway safety offices to do more with federal 402 funds to educate motorists regarding the importance of watching out for motorcycles.

Prior to making their remarks, the leaders shrugged off raindrops from a passing shower to view a motorcycle riding simulator, several late model bikes, and the latest protective riding gear. Flanking the assembled group was a detachment of the U.S. capitol police department's motorcycle corps.

Motorcycle Awareness Month Extends To Our Armed Forces



Washington, D.C. -- Motorcycle safety issues have aroused the armed forces to take a proactive approach in educating their men and women in uniform. In honor of motorcycle awareness month, the Motorcycle Riders Foundation attended the second annual National Capital Region Joint Service Motorcycle Safety Event this past Friday at the pentagon.

The two-day educational event is a measure by the D.O.D. to address the number of fatalities that have occurred in the past year. All branches of the military are facing a challenge with the increase of motorcyclists gearing up and hitting the roads. Major general James Nutall, deputy director of the *Army* National Guard, stated that the military is facing an issue that they are working to contain to help keep riders safe stating they are dealing with men and women returning from combat, some of whom have come home with an invincibility complex. The armed forces require all active military personnel to take a rider education course and wear more personal protective equipment then most state laws require, yet they are still experiencing an increasing trend of fatalities, some of which is accounted for by the sharp increase of readership.

Ceremonies were kicked off with hundreds of military and civilian motorcyclists gathered to increase rider education and awareness. Transportation secretary, Mary Peters, was on hand to speak at the event.

Though legislation did not go unmentioned in her speech (see 08LR09), we commend the secretary for addressing the military's motorcycle fatality increase. We hope she can put some substantial resources into the country's servicemen and women by working with the D.O.D. to reverse this trend.

After opening remarks were concluded by the speakers, the event moved onto a ribbon cutting ceremony on the *Army*'s new mobile motorcycle simulator trailer that will be used to visit military bases across the country as an additional resource to the motorcycle training program. The pentagon parking lots was stocked with vendors set up displaying different types of safety equipment as well as different organizations promoting rider education courses.

The highlight of the day's activities were the opportunity for riders to participate in a motorcycle rodeo as well as a skills demonstration by the *Pentagon Motorcycle Police*. The twoday event was wrapped on Saturday with a few morning activities as well as a rally ride. Overall, the joint services presented a variety of outlets and activities to help celebrate with the men and women of the armed forces the different aspects of motorcycle safety.

Washington Update — April 11, 2008

Washington D.C. has seen some more bikers from all over the country the past few weeks. Accompanied by the *Motorcycle Riders Foundation* (*M.R.F.*), *A.B.A.T.E.s* of Ohio, Colorado, and Illinois have all recently been to D.C. to visit with their legislators. All of the groups have been highly effective briefing members of the house and senate on all of the current issues pertaining to motorcycling such as *H.I.P.A.A.* (HR–1076 and S–616), Mary Peters, and *Right to Repair* (HR –2694).

The legislation to close the *H.I.P.A.A.* loophole is still moving along.

Passage of the bills this congress is unlikely at this point, but it's still important to gather cosponsors for the bills to better their chances in the future. Currently the house bill has 111 cosponsors and the senate companion bill has just seven. Those numbers are both higher than they have been all year, but much work remains. Keep asking your federal elected officials to cosponsor these important bills.

One of the highlights in every congressional meeting is the response received when U.S. D.O.T. secretary Mary Peters' proposed change to the 2010 funds is brought up. One hundred percent of the responses from members of the house and senate were in favor leaving the 2010

funds unaltered. The negative response to Ms. Peters' proposal is a solid indicator that her agenda for the 2010 funds will not advance any further.

The cherry blossoms near the *Motorcycle Riders Foundation* (*M.R.F.*) office in Washington D.C. aren't the only tell-tale signs that riding season is upon us.

Springtime is also when the media begins to report on motorcycling, and more often than not they don't report on the vast number of positive aspects of motorcycling. Instead they choose to attempt to sour the image of motorcycling by painting a picture that motorcyclists are a social burden on the backs of the American taxpayer.

Critics and the uninformed believe that motorcyclists, helmeted or not, account for a super majority of health care costs from trauma rooms to long-term care.

The problem is that it's just not true.

Not a lot of study has been done on the subject, but there is more than enough research out there to soundly and logically deflate the social burden myth.

The *Journal of American Medicine*, one of the most respected of all medical publications, published the findings of a 1988 study on the subject of the public costs of motorcycle-related injuries at a specific Seattle hospital. The results clearly showed that, on average for motorcycle-injured patients, 63.4 percent of their medical bills was paid out with taxpayer dollars. Admittedly that's an astoundingly high cost, but what the study goes on to say is that the average public cost of *any* injury at that same Seattle treatment center was 67 percent, 3.6 percent higher. A statistical dead heat.

There is also a little more to that story because generally the public cost of health care is about 45 percent currently, and it was significantly less than that in the mid eighties when the study was conducted. The facility used for the study was Harborview, a division of the *University of Washington*, and one of the largest and most state of the art facilities in the Seattle region that sees most of the area's worst case scenarios routinely.

A similar study done by the *University of North Carolina* also found that there was no statistical difference in public cost to treat motorcycle-related injuries over any other type of injury.

Also important to keep things in perspective, last year the public share of motorcycle-related injuries was 0.001 percent of the entire public health care cost.

Then why are they making motorcyclists look like leeches on society?

Usually it's an attempt to advance helmet requirements or other restrictions on motorcycling. Those on that mission would be wrong to say that helmeted riders are much less of a financial burden than unhelmeted riders.

According to a 1996 *National Highway Traffic Safety Administration* (*N.H.T.S.A.*) study, the unhelmeted riders generated a cost difference of 8 cents on the dollar more than helmeted riders, and most of that was paid for by private insurance.

So what have we learned?

That the next time someone argues for the social burden theory, we can let him or her know that it's pure bunk.

N.C.O.M. COAST TO COAST BIKER NEWS Compiled and Edited by Bill Bish, National Coalition Of Motorcyclists Today's Motorcycle Owners Happier



Overall satisfaction with the motorcycle ownership experience has increased in the past five years, according to the J.D. Power and Associates 2007 Motorcycle Competitive Information Study released today.

The study finds that improvements made in product satisfaction and dealership service have helped drive the increase in overall ownership satisfaction across the industry. Service, build quality, and product performance primarily drive the overall motorcycle ownership experience.

Overall satisfaction with the cost of ownership has increased among motorcycle owners for a second consecutive year, with owners being most satisfied with the initial price and resale value of their bike. Satisfaction with maintenance/repair costs, cost of accessories, and insurance has also increased.

Now in its tenth year, the study measures owner satisfaction with new motorcycles by examining five major components of the overall ownership experience: product; quality; cost of ownership; sales; and service. The 2007 Motorcycle Competitive Information Study includes responses from 8,796 owners who purchased new on-road motorcycles between September 2006 and May 2007.

Unfamiliar Bikes Invite Problems

Experienced riders drastically increase their chances of crashing simply by riding a different motorcycle, an insurance study has found.

Even experienced riders can be pretty wobbly when they hop on an unfamiliar bike, according to data from the country's largest motorcycle insurer, *Progressive*. "Most people already know that riding can be especially dangerous for new bikers," said Rick Stern, a *Progressive* motorcycle product manager who is also a rider. "But our data shows that the less familiar you are with your bike, the more likely you are to be involved in a collision, regardless of your experience."

The study also found cruiser riders who switch to sport bikes are threeand-a-half times more likely to crash. That's more than double the risk they'd have than if they just switched to another cruiser.

Sport bikers, on the other hand, can reduce their risk by more than a third just by switching to a cruiser, according to *Progressive*'s research.

"We want experienced riders to know their risks so they can take extra precautions when they replace their bikes," said Stern. "It's a good idea for riders to take their new bike out for a couple of shake down cruises in a parking lot before hitting the open road."

Even people who have been riding for years can benefit from practicing the basics on their new bike, Stern said, including low-speed riding, turning, shifting and swerving, and higher-speed panic stopping.

Push Helmet Regulations, Lose Your Job!

The former executive director of the Louisiana safety commission, who has pushed helmet requirements throughout three gubernatorial administrations, said he was fired because he disagrees with nowgovernor Bobby Jindal's efforts to rerepeal their state's helmet mandate for adult riders.

Louisiana state police colonel James Champagne, who has held his post for twelve years throughout their onagain-off-again helmet requirement, was abruptly terminated March 25th, saying his dismissal followed a meeting with the governor's chief of staff because "I refused to compromise my views on the helmet issue."

Enter newly-elected governor Jindal, who favors repeal of the mandatory helmet requirement as a freedom of choice issue and looks to fulfill one of his few specific campaign promises. At least two bills are pending in the legislature that would repeal the helmet requirements for adults.

Jindal replaced Champagne with the former head of Big Daddy's security detail during his terms as governor, 26-year veteran of the state police colonel John LeBlanc, who has said that will not take a position in the legislature on the helmet issue.

"The legislative session is in full swing and now is the time for the members of the motorcycling communityto start voicing their

opinions and let thepoliticians of this state know that we are voting, tax paying, constituents of theirs," said Poet, state executive president of A.B.A. T.E. of Louisiana. "Remember: One voice is but a whisper, but a thousand voices are a roar!"

Unemployment Line, Part II

New Jersey senator Frank Lautenberg is the biggest helmet-pusher in congress, but he may be facing stiff competition for his job in the upcoming election. *A.B.A.T.E. of the Golden State* is backing U.S. representative Robert Andrews in his bid to replace the 84-year-old fourterm nannycrat. As a nine-term veteran of the U.S. house, Andrews has worked with motorcyclists and sponsored the *H.I.P.P.A.* bill to protect motorcyclists' health care coverage and has also pledged to vote against any helmet legislation.

A.B.A.T.E. is asking concerned riders to help spread the word to flood the voting booths with motorcyclists for the primary election. Due to historically light voter turnout, bikers could easily swing the election.

The National Coalition of Motorcyclists would also like to take this opportunity to welcome A.B.A. T.E. of the Garden State as one of our newest N.C.O.M. member groups.

Weird News Angry Bikes Can Save Lives

Honda Motor Company scientists studying the way the brain reacts to different imagery found that motorcycles that resemble a human face, especially an angry one evoked with diagonal headlights and abbreviated nose, are "significantly" more visible to other drivers.

Measurements taken with functional magnetic resonance imaging confirm that a more lifelike front-end design "elicits a response similar to that when a human face is seen," suggesting that other drivers will more quickly recognize the motorcycle's presence and react accordingly.

"People in four-wheeled vehicles will see not just motorcycles coming at them but motorcycles with human characteristics and faces," says Charles Kenny, president of *Right Brain People*, a consumer psychology firm specializing in motor vehicles. "It connects to something very basic in the psyche that goes back to when they were little children."

By way of example, Kenny points to the *Disney* movie *Cars*, and to kids' toys such as *Thomas and Friends* trains, both of which cause youngsters to emotionally identify with inanimate objects.

"The human brain," *Honda*'s 2005 study explains, "exhibits a strong response to facial patterns, especially to the eyes and mouth." The observation led to the extrapolation that human-looking bikes are more quickly recognized by motorists, making them more easily avoided. Major manufacturers such as Suzuki, Kawasaki, Honda, Yamaha, Buell, Triumph, and Ducati all feature 2008 sportbikes fitted with menacing cat's eye headlights, and according to Money. CNN.com the new Honda DN-01 deliberately incorporates a human look into its front view.

"The sportbike community really wants an aggressive, hard-edged design," says John Paolo Canton, spokesman for *Ducati North America*. "Nobody wants to buy a 300-km/h motorcycle that looks cute."

With motorcycle use worldwide near an all-time high, "conspicuity enhancement" as researchers call it, can help promote awareness and avoidance of motorcycles sharing the road.

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

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


