What We're About

A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A. T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

• *A.B.A.T.E.* is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as *BikePAC*.

It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, onroad or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.
You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to A.B.A. T.E. Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just *that* wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

So scan through our newspaper. If you like what you read, check out the chapter meeting listing on the back cover. Drop in on a meeting and see what we're about. You just might find a new family in *A.B.A.T.E.* And as Melinda says: "Bikers give great hugs." -- Rot Path, crusty ol' editor A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!" ``

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the *National Highway Transportation Safety Administration* (*N.H.T.S.A.*) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the *National Custom Cycle Association*. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to *A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments.* (*A.B.A.T.E.*)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. *D.O.T.* (*Department of Transportation*) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the *Huns Motorcycle Club* in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the *American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.*), Ron Roloff of the *M.M.A.* of California, and Ed Armstrong from *A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago* presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the *D.O.T.* because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the *1975 Federal Highway Act*, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it.

The roots of *A.B.A.T.E.* and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road. (reprinted with permission)

simple, right ? Pretty As members of A.B.A.T.E., we are sometimes referred to as freedom fighters. But are we really ? Are we really doing all that we can to protect our rights and freedoms? How many of us know who our representatives are in Salem and Washington D.C.?

A.B.A.T.E. was started in the belief that all motorcyclists should be treated as equals to other citizens. That we, as riders, share the same respect and recognition as any other citizen in America. We have never wanted any special treatment or to be viewed as better than any other group.

Functioning as a team, A.B.A. T.E. was able to work with other groups to keep legislators in Salem from dictating what we could and couldn't do.

We have fought hard and have won some very significant battles, but the tide is changing. We have become complacent and divided. It has become more important to concentrate on what is best for our chapters rather then what is best for the organization. We are losing focus and, just as important, we are losing members.

People, this is exactly what the politicians want to happen.

Our own representatives, the people you and I have put into office, don't like to make waves. They are no different than you or I and want to keep their jobs.

So when we go to Salem and ask for their support, most of them will smile and nod and get us out of there as quickly as possible, then vote against us every chance they get. Why? Because it is easier to go with the flow. There are no repercussions for making a few bikers mad. They know that we are so divided that we cannot even agree to show up in Salem for our own Motorcycle Awareness Rally in May!

We can sit in meetings and tell each other how important it is to us, but each of you knows as well as I do that action speaks louder then words. The politicians in Salem are no longer afraid of what we think because we refuse to take action as a united group.

I think it's time to change that.

I believe that the opportunity to make a difference is upon us again.

It's time to unite and remind those in office that they work for us as constituents who just happen to ride a motorcycle.

We need to put aside all of our differences and think as a unified organization who will not only work in our communities, but will do whatever it takes to get back the respect we deserve in Salem.

It is time to become freedom fighters again and start making a difference.

We have been passed the torch by those who have preceded us, so it is our job . . . no, it is our *duty* . . . to make sure that the torch is not dropped. That the light of freedom, the idea of motorcyclists rights, does not get put out by neglect.

It is time that we get back on board so that our representatives in Salem will feel that making " waves " will be better





A.B.A.T.E. chapter reports -- Hub City

Wow! What about the spring weather we've had? Hopefully by the time you are reading this mother nature has brought some good riding weather.

It has been a very busy year so far for *Hub City Chapter*. There have been two biker nights which have contributed greatly to the posting of four billboard safety messages. In keeping with our mission statement, *Hub City* has again paid for billboards educating the public to be more aware of motorcyclists.

This being an election year, we are receiving a barrage of information about candidates. We have learned that it is very important to know what a candidate believes **before** casting your vote. Candidate evaluation isn't the easiest task to complete, but critical. Becoming a county commissioner candidate myself has brought the process into fine focus.

Looking eye-to-eye with a candidate is my preferred method. Rehearsed, canned formula candidates never really master the art of deception. Even if you're a novice poker player you can spot a fabrication from across the room. The average candidate has at least one topic that they don't want to talk about.

Seminars don't train candidates to handle questions from a biker, especially an *A.B.A.T.E.* member. After three different training seminars on the subtle points of candidacy, I'm certain the average candidate is completely unprepared for the straightforward cross examination delivered by a leather-clad voter. It's not just our fashion statements that get a candidate off balance, it's direct eye contact and getting right to the point with questions that leave no room for squishy answers.

If a candidate needs to draw in a breath of hesitation before starting to answer, the answer is either a canned deflection or something short of what we expect. Trust your instincts.

By doing opposition research, I learned to look deep for the specifics in endorsements of an incumbent.

Endorsements are like diary products: there should be dates. Look for dates on endorsements. If it's not there, contact the campaign to ask for confirmation of the endorsement or go to the endorser directly. Sometimes the person listed as an endorser isn't aware their reputations are on loan. A candidate willing to mislead a voter to stay in office needs to be replaced immediately.

Another 'trick' unscrupulous candidates employ on their web sites is using multiple small graphics as buttons placed close to one logo or graphic to give the impression that there is an endorsement. For instance, one graphic says "See who has endorsed" and it is right next to the name of a well known talk show host on a local radio station. It's not an technically an endorsement, but the intent is to deceive the average web site viewer or voter. The problem with a half truth is that it is still half lie.

Any local candidate lucky enough to



have an *A.B.A.T.E.* member as part of their campaign organization or corps of volunteers will be a more effective candidate. Any candidate who intends to mislead the public by falsely claiming old endorsements or the support of a media figure should be held publicly accountable.

I'm looking forward to seeing more *A.B.A.T.E.* members going to candidate forums, meet and greet events, then helping others see the value of our approach.

We've always been the stepchildren down here anyway (except for Rot Path) and if





I am disappointed.

Josephine County Chapter acknowledges the importance of the rally in Salem and the significance it holds to A.B.A. T.E. and to all motorcyclists. However our backs were up against the wall when it came to choosing a date for the Southern Oregon Swap Meet this year and we didn't have much choice.

Several years ago *Josephine County Chapter* sponsored a rally on the footsteps of the courthouse in Grants Pass which turned out to be quite a success. In the last year we have been concentrating on adding members to our chapter and getting the support of other motorcycle groups and organizations so that we could once again hold such a rally in southern Oregon in order to raise awareness in our area.

I am very disappointed that a topic this important wasn't given more time to be discussed and evaluated. That's the reason we have a planning session in the fall.


Yes, it was put to a vote. Yes, this is a democratic organization and I sound like sour grapes.



Call to order, welcome: The meeting was called to order by Allan Nichols, (state coordinator) at 12:03 p.m. with twelve of twelve chapters represented. All chapters present were eligible to vote.

Pledge of allegiance.

Moment of silence: For downed brothers/sisters and service men/women.

After the moment of silence, Allan recognized Mel Yeager for attending and today being his 73rd Birthday. Mel thanked everyone and said that he is just going to be doing things for himself for a while. He will still be around and helping out, just not as often. Mel received a standing ovation as he left the meeting.

Guests and first time attendees: Lonnie Bishop (*Salem Chapter*), Dave Ezell (*Hub City Chapter*), and Paula Leslie (*Hub City Chapter*). Nic also introduced Paula as *Oregon BikePAC*s new legislative director, in training.

Reading, approval of minutes: Motion made by Bob (*Douglas County Chapter*) to accept minutes as printed in the state newspaper. Seconded by *Washington County Chapter*. Motion passed.

Coordinator's comments: Allan Nichols opened by telling us that the *Gold Wing Road Riders* (*G.W.R.R.*) have invited us to attend their regional conference in Pendleton during August and offered us a booth. This is a good way to get more interest from other groups. It was noted that the *G.W.R.R.* used to come to the *May Motorcycle Awareness Rally* in Salem.

Allan spoke on information provided by Quiet Mike (*G.J.M.C.*) on 2010 crash data which showed that 70% of motorcycle wrecks were single vehicle crashes. This means no other vehicle was involved. Matt stated that there is no uniform method of crash reporting and this is part of the problem. No information on the cause of the crash.

Allan also stated that back east, it is becoming a practice for events to provide van service/rides to help out downed riders.

Secretary report and correspondence: Nic Oliver reported that we have some newspapers from other state M.R.O.s Welcome back Randy

••• Officers' Reports •••

Vice-coordinator (north): Al Simms excused. He is down in Grants Pass showing support for the *Confederation of Clubs* and *Josephine County Chapter* of *A.B.A.T.E.* in the protest against the growing harassment by the local sheriff's department.

Vice-coordinator (south): Pat "Spanky" Allen spoke on the rally at the Josephine county courthouse in response to the continued profiling by local enforcement and the harassment issues that are included in the profiling. *Josephine County Chapter* now has about 300 members and Spanky is hoping for 400 by summer.

Vice-coordinator (east): Robert Terrill – No report at this time.

Treasurer: Kay Sipple reported that her printer would not cooperate with her and she does not have a printed report.

Our balances are: checking - \$5,138.85 savings - \$20,012.50

PayPal - \$300.15.

Membership secretary: Linda Henderson reported that we currently have 1,792 members.

If anyone needs membership supplies, they need to call her first and she will bring them to the next meeting.

Linda stated that this is the last year she will be serving in this position. Someone should really step up as soon as possible because this job has a lot of work involved and it will take time to train a replacement. (This is a repeat of her last month's statement.)

[**c.o.e. note**: Someone already volunteered at the April state board meeting to understudy Linda for the remainder of the year.]

Sanctioning officer: Matt Price reported that everything is current except for September's state swap meet. State auditor: Connie Ceccacci's report handed in.

Reported that all chapters are green except for two blues and those are being worked on. Everything is current.

Newspaper editor: Rot Path thanked everyone for attending.

Reports still needed from *Salem*, *Douglas County*, and *Indian Creek* chapters.

Mentioned that our May issue goes to the printer on Friday, so everyone needs their submissions in well before that.

Received pile of *Douglas County Chapter* biker night fliers covering until October.

Legislative director: Don Mason reported that we need to present a unified front at the *May Motorcycle Awareness Rally* on May 5th. Please make May 5th a priority.

Don emphasized that it is divided we fall and we must not be divided within our own organization.

He is currently working with the *Confederation of Clubs, Gold Wing Road Riders*, and others.

Also reported that the officer replacement problem within *BikePAC* has been resolved. Ruth Godinez has stepped up to fill the secretary/treasurer position and Paula Leslie has taken the legislative director position. Also, Nic has agreed to stay on as long as needed in the position of executive director.

May 15th is the primary elections here in Oregon. Some samples of what we are focused upon include house district 36 territory with the nearest chapter being *Washington County Chapter*.

Representative Nolan is not running again. She is a red. (Not favorable to our issues.) She is running for Portland city council, so her seat is open. There are three democrat candidates running in this primary and one of them is red also. (Barber.) We do not have information on the other two in terms of their positions on motorcyclist issues as yet.

In Southeast Portland Chapter's area, Smith (house district 47) is a red but he has decided to run for Portland's mayor position. This is very significant for A.B.A. T.E. because the current representative (Jefferson) is a transportation committee member who has not been favorable to our issues and that makes the seat now open for change.

One of the candidates, Jessica Peterson, is pro-helmet repeal and that is sticking her neck out this early in the election process. She will probably support other issues of ours.

Jackson County Chapter has Gerard as the incumbent and he is green. (Supporting our issues.)

Benton county house district 16 has as the incumbent (already seated) Sarah Gelser and she is a red. Her opponent is Andrew Decker and he is a green. Gelser will be hard to unseat though. She has been in office too long for this to be easy for Decker.

To steal a bit of Allan's thunder, Michigan is now freedom of choice. No

mandatory helmet requirement.

Oregon is poised to be in the running for repeal.

The Michigan freedom-of-choice bill was passed with provisions made for age (over 21), insurance (minimum of \$20,000 in personal health), and training (a formal class or at least two years of riding experience.

Michigan A.B.A.T.E. was very instrumental in getting this done.

Another issue of ours that we are working on is some type of uniform reporting for enforcement agencies when it comes to crashes. Andy Olson is looking into different ways to handle this.

The *N.H.T.S.A.* report is out and it is a massive document.

Sergeant-at-arms (north): Randy Phipps said it has been a rough three months. But he is back now and ready to work.

Stated that he needs help with security at the state spring swap meet and at *Fossil*.

Sergeant-at-arms (south): Bob "One-Eyed" Nichols had no report at this time.

Sergeant-at-arms (east): < Vacant >

Products director: Dave Meeker reported that he is gearing up for the state spring swap meet and for *Fossil*. T-shirt designs are ready for voting on for *Fossil*. Will hold voting at the end of today's meeting.

Education director: Geoff White reported that the Fossil high school will be having the *Motorcycle Awareness Program* presented to them just before *Fossil*. Anyone interested should come a bit early for the *Fossil Run* and attend the class.

Confederation of Clubs representative (north): David Hickerson reported that bicycles get what they want and it is about time we did. Dave posed the question, "Why do the bicyclists get what they want?" Because they speak out and are loud and involved.

•• Unfinished Business ••

• Allan Nichols reported that the executive board has been working on changes to the operations manual regarding out-of-compliance chapters. There is a rough draft for every chapter representative to take back to their respective chapter for review, changes, and input. Bring back chapter input to the next meeting. (12 May 2012) This action is to give the rules some teeth, if needed.

• Sergeant-at-arms (east) position. No nominations.

• Motion made by Brian Stovall (*River City Chapter*), seconded by Nic Oliver, (*Hub City Chapter*):

"Deny Sanctioning for any other event at the same time as the May rally."

Vote: To table for chapter input.

Discussion at this month's meeting focused primarily around two topics that came back from the chapters:

1. The need to emphasize *BikePAC's* request for as much a unified presence at the *May Motorcycle Awareness Rally* as possible, which was the motivation and original intent of the motion.

2. How to still accommodate for state sanctioning requests for events that may take place outside of the normal defined sanctioning radius on this day.

The representatives of *Douglas County* and *Central Oregon* chapters presented their chapters' positions against the proposal as an example of two chapters who are geographically distant and therefore more affected in the event of loss of state sanctioning during this event.

Further discussion also occurred on the genesis of the original *A.B.A.T.E.*/ *BikePAC May Rally* by multiple chapter representatives.

Trace Ceccacci (*A.B.A.T.E.* and *BikePAC* web master) submitted the

following statement in support of the proposal:

"This is a state event, not a chapter nor an area event. It is held where it is because that's where our common legislators are. This is not a fund raiser or a party. It is, in my opinion, the single most important event we promote each year. The one event that directly relates to our mission statement. It's our one chance to show our legislators that we are united in our common interest. If we don't all support this one day, we risk losing our common rights as motorcyclists for the entire state and fighting for our rights is our whole reason for being here."

Matt Price (state sanctioning officer) offered a different motion to replace this one wherein each chapter would enter into a gentlemen's agreement to keep this day open.

Nic Oliver (*BikePAC* executive director) countered that he has asked for this day to be kept open for years and yet there are still *A.B.A. T.E.* chapter events who potentially pull attendance from the once-per-year legislative rally.

Allan (state coordinator) asked Brian and Nic if they would withdraw their motion in place of this one and both declined.

Chapter representative voting resulted in six yeas and four nays.

Motion passed.

The alternative motion was withdrawn.

It was then briefly offered, in subsequent discussion, that a proposal for a more universally agreeable policy be considered during the next annual *A.B.A. T.E.* planning session.

••• New Business •••

• Motion submitted by Nic Oliver (*Hub City Chapter*), seconded by Bob Nichols (*Douglas County Chapter*):

"We send Confederation of Clubs representative. Dave Hickerson to N.C.O.M. in Indianapolis."

Amended to include money limit of \$550.

Discussion included that we already have two people going. It was pointed out that one of those to be sent is our representative but is going in support of her husband, Gene, who is receiving the *Silver Spoke Award* at the *N.C.O.M.* conference this year. This means we are only actually sending one representative.

Gene said that he needs the support as he has never flown before and he needs his wife to get him from plane to plane.

Voting took place and resulted in: Eight yeas, two nays.

Motion passed.

* [c.o.e. note: Further research indicates that the U.S. supreme court, rather than ruling on a constitutional matter, deferred the decision to local correctional facilities for strip-searching arrested individuals, figuring that they would have a better feel for whether circumstances favored such a search. The ruling does not require strip-searches. Strip-search procedures may be forbidden by local statutes and are not allowed in at least ten states. The American Bar Association fought against the strip-search ruling passed by the supreme court.]

More States Banning Motorcycle-Only Checkpoints

While congress continues to consider passing a prohibition on motorcycleonly roadside "safety checkpoints" by halting federal funding, several states are moving forward with their own regulations to ban the practice.

New Hampshire and North Carolina have both passed such legislation, and Virginia has become the latest state to pass a bill to bar enforcement agencies from setting up safety checks that only stop motorcycles for inspection.

Following a motorcycle-only checkpoint set up during last year's *Rolling Thunder POW/MIA Rally en route* to Washington, D.C. over *Memorial Day* weekend, delegate C. Todd Gilbert (R-Shenandoah) introduced HB–187, which passed and was signed into effect on February 28 by governor Bob McDonnell.

Most recently, New Jersey introduced companion bills in the senate (S-1685) and the assembly (A-508) to prohibit police from establishing checkpoints limited to certain types of vehicles. Any such program would require that all checkpoints include all types of vehicles.

Calling motorcycle-only checkpoints discriminatory and unconstitutional, *A.B.A.T.E. of California* is likewise pushing a bill (AB-1047) that would ban state and federal funding of biker barricades. According to *A.B.A.T.E.* lobbyist Jim Lombardo, "We passed out of the assembly and are awaiting a hearing in the senate transportation committee, probably next month, and then on to governor Brown."

Meanwhile on the legal front, New York A.I.M. (Aid to Injured Motorcyclists) attorney Mitch Proner told the Associated Press that he is preparing to appeal a federal court decision upholding the constitutionality of motorcycle roadblocks in New York. The issue may eventually be heard before the U.S. supreme court.

Colorado Biker Anti-Discrimination Bill

Colorado legislation to ban discrimination against people wearing motorcyclist gear failed to pass its first committee hearing, but the bill's sponsor told the *Associated Press* that he was glad he proposed the bill because it raised awareness. He said bikers are unfairly judged to be criminals.

State representative Joe Miklosi

(D-Denver) says he didn't propose the measure to get attention but to help constituents who belong to motorcycle clubs and say they are being singled out unfairly. "*I'm motivated by doing the right thing*," Miklosi said. "*They're being discriminated against.*"

Bikers say they're unfairly refused service at hotels, restaurants, and stores because of how they dress. Miklosi's bill (HB-1128) would have banned businesses from discriminating against motorcyclists based on their style of dress.

But his bid to add "unconventional attire" to the state regulation that bars discrimination in public accommodations would have put biker attire alongside such protected classes as race, gender, and religious affiliation, but fell short in the G.O.P.-controlled house state, veterans, and military affairs committee which is known for rejecting democratic proposals.

Distracted Driving

Guidelines For Automakers

U.S. department of transportation chief Ray LaHood has announced a new set of proposed distracted driving guidelines for automakers that would limit the use of in-car tech solutions that are "not directly relevant to safely operating the vehicle, or cause undue distraction by engaging the driver's eyes or hands for more than a very limited duration while driving."

From cell phones to G.P.S. screens, distracted driving is an ever-present road hazard in today's techo-centric world, especially for vulnerable travelers like motorcyclists. But soon video games and *Facebook* friends could be within arm's reach as drivers hurtle down the highway in the next generation of cars from Detroit.

Coming dashboard devices would deliver a whole new level of eye candy and brain entrapment, as more than 90% of cars debuting in the next five years are expected to be equipped with internet-connected screens and other cutting-edge wonders. Automakers are responding to surveys that show 75% of young adults want touch-screen technology in their cars.

But, not if the *National Highway Traffic Safety Administration* can hit the "hold" button.

The agency's proposed guidelines



(which do not carry the weight of law) call for automobile manufacturers to make some dashboard electronic devices automatically shut down once a car starts moving, unless they're for passengers and cannot be seen by the driver.

The guidelines cite six activities that should not occur while driving: text messaging, internet browsing, using social media, entering addresses in navigation systems, dialing phones, and reading display screens with more than 30 characters of text.

Studies show that drivers double the risk of a crash if they take their eyes off the road for more than two seconds, yet 41 states still allow using a cellphone handset while driving and fifteen allow texting behind the wheel.





On February 28, governor Bob McDonnell signed into effect HB-187, which was introduced by delegate C. Todd Gilbert (R-Shenandoah). The new regulation, which takes effect July 1, prohibits enforcement agencies from establishing checkpoints where the only vehicles subject to inspection are motorcycles.

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards.


