A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A. T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

- A.B.A. T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as BikePAC.
- It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, onroad or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.
- You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to A.B.A. T.E. Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just that wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments (A.B.A.T.E.).

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the Huns Motorcycle Club in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce H.R.3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet laws.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California and Ed Armstrong of A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet law mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years, first to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for

bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through

So, there you have it.

The roots of A.B.A. T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted and, in turn, passed on the torch of freedom of the road.

Just when you thought the harassment was over, the police state arrives again. A member of *Salem A.B.A.T.E.* received a citation from a Portland police officer on I-405 for refusing to remove his helmet. He was cited for not wearing a helmet although he had one on.

The Department of Transportation [D.O.T.] does not approve helmets. The helmet manufacturer must meet the criteria set by the F.M. V.S.S.-218. (Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standard) The manufacturer then is responsible to meet the standards.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) has a list of helmets that have been recalled. Did you get a notice that your helmet was recalled?

Of course not.

Your purchase was not sent into any agency. So it is up to as the consumer to make sure you are in compliance.

There is no list of approved helmets by the D.O.T. They cannot make a list because then they would also assume a degree of liability.

So how on earth can you make an informed decision on your purchase?

Better check to see if that helmet is

on the recall list. There are top brand names on that list. If you get a *Snell*—certified helmet , you are getting a product that's about as good as it gets.

Washington state has changed their helmet regulation (*F.M.V.S.S.-218*) and are out in force to make sure you comply.

If you are planning a trip there, make sure the helmet meets their new requirement. The Tacoma area has a police officer named Piggot and he is on a mission to give you, as a motorcyclist, a ticket at the very least. He really loves motorcycles. He would love to see you and your motorcycle go to jail. He would like to see that tag sewn into your helmet, the one that says: "Warning. No helmet can protect you against all foreseeable impacts." He

may threaten you with arrest if you do not comply. Never talk to the police in a traffic stop because anything you say will be used against you.

Am I under arrest?

Am I free to go?

They will tow your bike for no endorsement just like they do here.

That fine here increased to \$720.

Know your rights and be prepared to defend them.

Meeting was called to order by Jordan Kelley, coordinator, at 12:12 p.m. with 9 of 13 chapters represented. All chapters present were eligible to vote. Missing chapters included *Douglas County*, *Josephine County* (called in – having their toy run), *Willamette Valley*, *Lower Columbia* (e-mail received on Friday while state secretary was at *Beaver Creek*. New state board representative, Duane Sterba, and coordinator, Dave Bridges, are attending a funeral.)

Pledge of allegiance

Moment of silence for downed brothers/sisters and service men/ women.

Guests and first time attendees: Washington County members: Nick,

Troy, Connie, Jay Jackson, and Glennis (also from Washington state).

Previous minutes approval: Motion made by Randy Phipps (*Twin Rivers Chapter*) to accept minutes from July 11th state board meeting as printed in the newspaper. Matt Price (*Salem Chapter*) seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Coordinator comments: Jordan Kelley stated that he hoped that everyone was enjoying the riding. He also reminded everyone to be safe out there. He said that he has kept a watch on the crashes that were occurring and he noticed that the phrase "speed was involved" was used a lot in reporting motorcycle

wrecks. The statement from the board that unless someone is not moving at all, speed will be involved. It was noted, however, that the media is playing along with the new focus on helmets again, following the change in Washington state's helmet requirement. Speed issues are ones that will be utilized to push the need for helmets. Jordan stated that we need to be very careful because we are vulnerable. Asked everyone to keep their reports short if possible so that we could all get back in time for the bike games at the *Beaver Creek Run*.

Membership secretary: Linda Henderson – Report handed in. Current membership is 1,740. She

The company is giving us twice as many for the same price, basically two for one. So the order is for 200 patches for the price of 100 patches. Also ordering patches in memorial of Pat Williams. They will be turquoise on black, Pat's favorite color.

Education director: Patricia Carner reported that she has three Share the

Road presentations to give this month and four more in September. There are more being scheduled for later this year. She also reported that the Motorcycle Awareness Program classes are focusing on assemblies in the schools so that more schools could benefit from this program.

Education director II: Geoff White reported that the summer is a slow time for the classes. He also asked Patricia about the key fobs that are handed to the students in the classes. She stated that we are keeping the key fobs and possibly adding pencils.

Public relations director: Debra Lutje - No report.

State run coordinator (Fossil): Howie Long apologized for being a bit brash at the last meeting. The final head count for Fossil Run is an approximation of 600. The Fossil Run made a profit of about \$10,000.

She stated that Debra Lutje got the flyer done and profusely thanked Debra for her work. Patricia also apologized for not being "totally there lately" as she just had a daughter get married and she is still a bit "scatterbrained". Congratulations to Pat's daughter.

Historian: Tonia Mosier - Absent. Web page editor: Trace Ceccacci -

Quartermaster: Ted Tracy reported that the water trailer is at Birkenfeld and will be staying there unless needed elsewhere. He has been rebuilding parts of the stage trailer and it now has a new tailgate, a bit heavier than before. The stage trailer will be staying at Birkenfeld also. There is no charge for this. The stage will go back to storage after the summer usage is done.

So if there is a change needed, then it needs to be in the new manual before it is done or a lot of work will have to be immediately updated and extra work for a lot of people.

Unfinished Business

That A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon sponsor up to four people to attend the A.C.T.S. safety conference on October 27,28,29 in detailed information."

Attachment reads as follows:

"Proposal to the board.

Ever since 1995, we, *A.B.A.T.E.*, have sent people to attend the A.C.T.S. Oregon traffic safety conference. Last year was the only one in which we did not have people attend, due to our financial problems. This year, we are little more flush and, I believe, can afford to send some of our folks to this conference.

We have returned over the years with much information that the general public didn't get until months later. We have brought back word about increased surveillance, assorted helmet legislation that affect us, graduated licenses for our young folks, etc.

A.B.A.T.E. has also purchased a lifetime corporate membership in A.C.T.S.

Cost of the conference is:

Before September 25 = \$95 times four people = \$380.

After September 25 = \$125 times four people = \$500.

Room rates for a single is \$152.60 for two nights or double \$185.30 for two nights times two rooms = \$366.60

Total possible cost for four people, assuming the room is shared. \$746.60 based on the early rates.

If we register late, total = \$866.60

I would ask for approval of this expenditure at this meeting. would authorize up to a certain level and allow us time to find folks willing to attend. Note this would be a maximum expenditure, less [plus?] travel.

Thanks for considering this item."

Randy then made a very impassioned plea about the need to attend this conference and the amount of good that has come of it, that this conference has been one of our greatest tools and should not be ignored for another year when we have the money available to do this. This is part of our work and we need to continue involvement in this vital information source. This conference is the tool that was used to really give our Motorcycle Awareness Program a very large boost in reaching students.

A motion was made to table this motion until next meeting and to take this to the chapters for discussion and vote at the September board of directors meeting. Motion passed unanimously.

• Motion 2: Made by Allan Nichols (Washington County Chapter), seconded by Howie Long (North Coast Chapter):

'To replace cargo trailer with a new Interstate Loadrunner with decals. Approximate cost \$3,000."

Allan asked Ted Tracy to speak on this item. Ted stated that the current trailer is needing repair and it is very old. He has a potential buyer for the trailer, which would defray the cost. The old trailer is a double axle, load limit 1,500 lbs. The new one would be a single axle, but will hold everything we need. The new trailer would display decals, cost of about \$275 (included in the price of the trailer) which would be the A.B.A.T.E. logo, a great advertising item. Nic reported that Dave Meeker asked him to state that the repairs needed amount to about \$250 and he believes that this is an expense that we don't need at this

I don't know how much more I can piss and moan to get our folks to take riding courses, but wish I would do more.

These courses take a little money out of your pocket and involve some amount of effort, but please brothers and sisters, take the time because they will make you better riders and more aware of your surroundings on the highway. Nowadays we have people driving tons of lethal machinery down the road that have no idea how dangerous they are when they talk or text on the phone or just plain pay no attention to what they are doing.

All the class will do is maybe save your life or the sweetie on the back of your scoot. I know we care about those things. Lets do something to give us a little advantage.

Glassphalt Danger — I've never seen the stuff here on the west coast, but that doesn't mean it isn't around. I'd think the roadrash would be something else. Glassphalt is just finely ground up old glass mixed with asphalt.

If mixed properly, glassphalt is supposed to provide adequate traction.

As an automobile driver, I never paid too much attention to glassphalt. I've seen various roads throughout Baltimore sparkle in my headlights, but beyond that, I

hadn't given glassphalt a thought.

My indifference changed when a fellow rider and a good friend went down in the *Ocean City Convention Center* parking lot.

The fall happened when a careless car driver came into my friends' path of travel. He made a quick stop, at parking lot speeds, and went down when his front wheel locked unexpectedly. His motorcycle was undamaged, but he fractured a bone in his foot and bruised his ego.

My friend is a life-long rider, having logged over 70,000 miles on his current motorcycle. He's highly trained and an extremely conscientious rider. Stopping quickly is something that he practices regularly.

To me, his fall just didn't add up, until he told me about the glassphalt. Unknown to him prior to his fall, the *Ocean City Convention Center* parking lot is paved with glassphalt. According to him, making a quick-stop on the glassphalt parking lot was like "riding on a rain slick surface." Nasty stuff. Keep a weather eye out for it wherever you ride.

We aren't saying that all glassphalt paved surfaces are dangerous for two-wheelers. I am saying that it pays to be careful, since there appears to be a level of risk involving motorcycles and glassphalt. The lesson is to recognize your riding surface, and tailor your riding accordingly!

Minnesota — Motorcycle deaths keep climbing in Minnesota. While overall traffic deaths are down in Minnesota, including alcohol-related crashes and teen deaths, motorcycle-related deaths continue to rise. A new report highlights 72 motorcyclist deaths, accounting for 16 percent of all traffic deaths and the biggest rider death count since 1985.

The most common factors in all 2008 crashes are: driver inattention or distraction, failure to yield right-of-way, and speeding.

California — Drunk driving deaths are down, but motorcycles buck the trend. Drunk driving deaths in California dropped for a

third straight year in 2008, the state *Office of Traffic Safety* said Thursday, but motorcycle fatalities continued a decade-long rise that mirrors national trends.

State officials expressed concern, however, over the increase in motorcycle fatalities, which rose 8.1% to 560. They have more than doubled since beginning to rise in 1998. The increase has been driven by a roughly similar rise in motorcycle ridership, although state officials also attribute the problem to a new generation of bigger, faster, more powerful bikes.

Every other category of vehicle deaths is going down, but motorcycles are going up. The rise in fatalities was especially noticeable among young men, who have "a lot of testosterone" and the bikes to match, and among men in their 50s and older who are returning to motorcycles after decades of not riding and are often choosing much larger bikes than they rode in their youth.

Upshur county, Texas — A man was sentenced to eight years in prison for second degree felony intoxication manslaughter for his part in a motorcycle crash that killed his girlfriend. The crash happened in September of 2006 in Diana, Texas. Phillip Earl Joiner, 42, of Gilmer took five different drugs before getting on a motorcycle with his girlfriend and soon after crashed into another vehicle, killing the girlfriend.

I've said a lot in these pages over the years about putting your keys in your pocket when ya party.

New Zealand — The Hell's Angels have launched a last-ditch bid to block a law that bans them from wearing their patches on the streets of Wanganui, arguing they are a club, not a gang. The club, which has a fortified headquarters in the city, said the move would breach their New Zealand bill of rights. In submissions to the council, the bikers wrote: "Hell's Angels Motorcycle Club is not a gang but a motorcycle club and patch not worn

to intimidate but show membership of a club with common interest brotherhood and motorcycling."

Offenders could be fined up to \$2,000 and have their patches confiscated if they ignore the rule. Hell's Angels members usually wear patches only when riding their motorcycles, at their headquarters, or at events, and do not use them to intimidate the public. The right to wear anything, should apply to everyone. The bylaw's inconsistency with the bill of rights meant the Hell's Angels could potentially argue their case in the supreme court.

Gunny Again

As I always try and remind ya, if ya have a legal problem or find yourself involved in a wreck, get in touch with your nearest *A.I.M.* attorney. These folks fight for us all the time, and in more ways than in crashes.

They all ride and live in our world so they are far better equipped to help us when we are in trouble than attorneys who don't ride.

When you attend a motorcycle event, get to the *A.I.M.* booth and get your *A.I.M.* card in your pocket. We give them to you free so medical people have a means of helping you when you can't talk for yourself. The program is free so take advantage of it. The *A.I.M.* guys in the booths will explain the program in full for ya. Our *A.I.M.* attorneys all over the country are here to help you.





25,000 Marines Learn From Semper Ride Premiere Events

New youthful approach captivates Marines' attention to motorcycling the right way as America's top professional motorcycle riders team up with action sports filmmakers in efforts to save Marines' lives.

Camp Lejeune, North Carolina – On June 25th the United States Marine Corps' motorcycle safety orientation film, Semper Ride, premiered to 22,500 Marines stationed at M.C.B. Camp Lejeune, M.C.A.S. Cherry Point, and M.C.A.S. New River. On May 19th, the film also premiered to 3,000 Marines at M.C.A.S. Miramar near San Diego, California.

Along with the film premiere, Marines were provided the opportunity to interactively learn more about motorcycles, safety gear, and educational programs with more than 30 on-site exhibitor booths, supervised test rides, and live professional demonstrations by *X-Games* medalists.

Semper Ride and its premiere events are part of a broader effort to save the lives of Marines when riding motorcycles. The events have proven very successful to date with large attendance and great reviews. The Marine Corps' strong support for the events has been a key element in impacting each Marine with the intended safety oriented message.

"The Semper Ride movie premiere and event was a huge success. The movie is nothing short of first class and the demos and displays were equally impressive. Every Marine I spoke to thoroughly enjoyed today's event, describing Semper Ride as the best safety film ever produced by the Marine Corps," says Stan Dutko, director of safety, M.C.I.E.A.S.T. and safety manager, M.C.B. Camp Lejeune. "This film and event have clearly made a significant impact on the attendees, and will likely resonate for some time."

Unfortunately, 25 U.S. Marines died in motorcycle crashes last year. By comparison, fewer (22) lost their

lives in *Operation Iraqi Freedom*. In an effort to save lives at home, the assistant commandant of the Marine Corps, the executive safety board, and the Marine safety office have begun focusing on motorcycle safety with a new approach in an effort to grab the attention of young Marines.

Semper Ride is one of the new initiatives started in attempt to curb the loss of Marine's lives on motorcycles. To accomplish this, the Marine Corps took a new direction, looking to the professional action sports world for the solution. In doing so they called upon One Eyed Bird Entertainment, who created FUEL TV's Great Ride Open series to produce Semper Ride. One Eyed Bird's production team of Dirk Collins, Jeff Tilton, and Jim Conway pulled together worldrenowned motorcycle athletes and the action sports industries top cinematographers, such as Curt Morgan (director of photography), to make the film.

Semper Ride was produced to deliver high definition big screen action combined with a responsible riding theme. The film's content strategically combines instructional materials with rider-to-rider style messaging from the pro athletes. Riders included James Stewart, Ben Bostrom, Ronnie Renner, Myles Richmond, Tommy Clowers, Jeremy McGrath, Keith Code, Chris "Teach" McNeil, Jason Britton, Sara Price, Josh Herrin, and many more to offer Marines straight forward advice for staying safe, while enjoying motorcycling.

The film and the events supplement existing Marine Corps motorcycle educational materials; but even more, *Semper Ride* is meant to inspire Marines to make the right choices allowing them to enjoy their motorcycles in a more responsible manner.

The film's executive producer and creator Jim Conway says, "Semper Ride has been very well received by

the 25,000 plus Marines who have seen the film at the east and west coast premiers. The Marine riders are taking away the important and targeted messages about riding responsibly no matter what their experience level."

Conway continued, "The production team is honored to be a part of this effort and have worked tirelessly to create a new and different type of film. The result is an engaging educational piece that holds the audiences interest throughout the film, and most importantly delivers the intended safety messages."

Bruce Rossmeyer Killed In Motorcycle Crash

Bruce Rossmeyer, founder of *Destination Daytona*, is dead. He died from injuries sustained in a motorcycling crash that occurred 30 July 2009. (*Destination Daytona* is the massive multi-line dealership complex that draws tens of thousands of motorcyclists during *Daytona Beach Bike Week* every year.)

According to *News Journal Online*, the 66-year-old Rossmeyer was riding with a group of five other

motorcyclists in the western part of Wyoming on highway 28. At about 11 a.m., the group attempted to pass a pickup truck pulling a camping trailer.

The News Journal Online quoted Lt. Shawn Dickerson of the Wyoming Highway Patrol saying: "The pickup slowed and activated his left signal. Four of the motorcycles passed to the left... When Mr. Rossmeyer attempted to pass, the truck made its left turn and he hit the driver's side door. The sixth motorcycle swerved to the right and avoided collision."

Rossmeyer was best known as the owner of *Daytona Beach Harley-Davidson*. He also owned additional *Harley-Davidson* dealerships around the country. He was in Colorado for *Harley-Davidson*'s annual dealer meeting. He was riding to the *Sturgis Motorcycle Rally* in Sturgis, South Dakota, at the time of the crash.

Rossmeyer also was co-owner of two Daytona Beach area car dealerships.

He was a father of five, and the grandfather to seven children.

Rossmeyer was a longtime supporter of numerous charitable causes that benefited children. According to the *News Journal Online*, he helped found and served on the board for *Camp Boggy Creek* in Cassia, a division of *The Hole in the Wall* camps; sponsored *Ride for Children* (the camp's annual charity motorcycle ride); served on the executive committee of *Boys and Girls Clubs* of Volusia/Flagler counties.

Right To Repair Legislation Introduced

Congressman Edolphus "Ed" Towns (D-NY), along with Anna Eshoo (D-CA) and George Miller (D-CA), has reintroduced legislation that would make it illegal for vehicle manufacturers to withhold information necessary to diagnose, service, or repair motor vehicles. Currently vehicle owners are forced to return to the dealership network to have problems diagnosed that the over-the-counter after market code readers cannot read. HR-2057, the Motor Vehicle Owners' Right to Repair Act (Right to Repair), has 31 cosponsors to date.

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation (M.R.F.) strongly supports Right to Repair, and urges congress to swiftly pass this legislation in order to safeguard individual vehicle ownership rights today and in the future.

"We have formally committed our support to Right to Repair because we believe that consumers are entitled to choose how their motorcycles, cars, and other type of vehicles are maintained or upgraded. The point of Right to Repair is to protect the freedom of American consumers to choose how they take care of their vehicles, be it in their driveways or at trusted repair facilities, and to ensure that they have access to all the information required to complete necessary service and repairs," said Jeff Hennie, M.R.F. vice president of government relations.

A recent letter to the editor from the *M.R.F.* generated hundreds of articles in publications across the country signaling a resounding level of support from the vehicle operating public. "As the economy continues to be sluggish, people are looking at cost cutting, and getting vehicle maintenance at a premium dealership is high on their list of cuts. Also consider the recent forced government closure of dealerships, not to mention the desire to support small business. All these factors point to the need for this legislation," Hennie added.

Vehicles, including motorcycles, are becoming increasingly complex with the addition of more and more computer technology, which will become more and more sophisticated and complex in the future. Ready access to accurate service and repair information from the manufacturers is essential to the safety and well being of the entire American motoring public.

August Recess Prep

With the house adjourned and the senate set to do so any day now, your elected officials will be coming home to politic, vacation, and interact with voters. The *Motorcycle Riders Foundation* (*M.R.F.*) recognizes this as a convenient, relaxed, and productive way to meet with your legislators in their home districts.

One way that they interact with a lot of voters at once is the traditional

town hall meeting.

However, becoming more and more popular is the so-called "teletown hall meeting" where you get a robo call asking you if you want to listen in on the actual meeting that usually took place a few hours earlier. While this new form of communicating can be very informative, it simply does not replace face-to-face interaction with the person you pay to represent you in Washington D.C.

At this time Washington D.C. is urgently working on overhauling our health care system. You may have seen some footage of congress members holding town hall meetings and getting skewered by their constituents. It is up to the will of the elected official to hold or not hold traditional town hall meetings.

This is about you being able to go to a town hall meeting and tell your elected official how you feel on any issue face-to-face. It's about looking people in the eye and getting an answer, not just merely leaving a voice mail with your concerns.

Contact your two senators and one representative, who you pay to go to Washington D.C. and find out when and where the real town hall meeting is, then plan to attend. They may hold more than one, but that's not likely.

The *M.R.F.* is concerned with a few issues that you should bring up.

• The first issue is the upcoming highway bill. The house transportation committee will be working on the bill at the full committee level in September. The



current bill expires 30 September 2009. Ask your elected officials to focus on the bill and pass it. We haven't seen the entire bill yet, but house chairman Oberstar has some very promising motorcycle-specific language on the table.

• The other issue is health care reform. At this time there are no anti-motorcycle provisions or suggestions.



U.S. Motorcycle Crash Study Stalls:

European M.A.I.D.S. 2.0 Study Released

The bikes crashed. The data was collected. And the information from the 53 crashes investigated in the southern California pilot phase of the U.S. motorcycle crash causation study are now sitting, waiting for an assessment of its efficacy and, more importantly, a huge infusion of cash. According to an article in the Los Angeles Times newspaper, "The long-awaited follow-up to the 1981 Hurt Study is short at least \$2 million, and it's unclear whether that funding will come through any time soon. Or ever."

So while the first nationwide motorcycle-crash study to be conducted in the United States in almost 30 years languishes in limbo due to differences in focus and funding between government entities and advocacy groups, filling the void is M.A.I.D.S. 2.0: An update of the Motorcycle Accident In-Depth Study of 921 crashes investigated from 1999-2000 in five sampling areas located in France, Germany, Italy, Netherlands, and Spain. Among other things, the European study found that just over 50% of the motorcycle crashes in the subject cities were caused by drivers, with 69% of those resulting from "perception failure" which can include not seeing the rider, misjudging distances and space on the road.

M.A.I.D.S. 2.0 focuses on the 100 crashes out of those 921 wrecks that resulted in death, 25 of which occurred on bikes under 50 cc and 75 of which happened on motorcycles 50 cc and larger.

Of the under-50 cc bikes, the rider, not another vehicle, was responsible for his or her own death in 64% of the fatal crashes. Most often, the rider failed to perceive a road hazard and, as a result, failed to react to avoid that hazard. Most of the fatalities occurred in urban areas.

For motorcycles 50 cc and up, the most fatality-prone class was sport bikes. A bike's displacement and maximum velocity were not significant factors in predicting a rider's death. As with bikes under 50 cc, the rider, not another vehicle, was at fault in most crashes that ended in death. The most common rider error for motorcyclists was making the wrong decision in reaction to a road hazard. 44% of motorcyclists also lost control in their avoidance maneuver. Most of these fatalities occurred in rural areas.

"How applicable the M.A.I.D.S. 2.0 data is to the American market is a subject of debate, not only because the study is dated, but also because the European market is so different," wrote Susan Carpenter in the LA Times article. "Its riders are more commuter-oriented than those in the leisure-minded U.S. and the bikes are, on average, smaller. Still, the M.A.I.D.S. update points to some intriguing findings that, at the very least, could serve as cautionary advice as the U.S. motorcycle market becomes more transportation-oriented."

Some of the more relevant takeaway messages for riders of bikes both big and small:

- Nighttime riding can be deadly. While most crashes in the *M.A.I.D.S.* report happened during the day, fatal crashes were significantly higher at night.
- Major roads are hazardous. The majority of fatalities occurred on straight roadways and "major arterials."
- Get a license. Riders who weren't properly licensed were more likely to crash.
- Wear protective gear. The 921 crashes in the study resulted in 3,417 injuries, 31.8% of which were to the lower extremities, 24.3% to the upper extremities, and 18.4% to the head.





High Court To Hear Case

Against Myrtle Beach

Tom McGrath, the Virginia-based A.I.M. attorney (Aid to Injured Motorcyclists) who is personally representing Myrtle Beach, South Carolina residents William and Carol O'Day and 47 other motorcyclists who received tickets for not wearing helmets in protest of the city's new helmet law, told The Sun News that he is awaiting a decision from the state's high court involving their case.

McGrath, on behalf of the O'Days, filed the first constitutional challenge against Myrtle Beach seeking a court order to stop the city from enforcing two of the myriad new ordinances it passed last fall to dissuade bikers from attending the spring and fall rallies held there for decades, including the mandatory helmet requirement and noise law.

But the O'Days were also among 47 others who received tickets during a February 28 protest ride when the new regulation took effect, so they are now part of the helmet lawsuits the supreme court has agreed to hear. McGrath said there might be little point in moving forward with the circuit court lawsuit now that the high court is going to issue a ruling.

The South Carolina supreme court became involved after attorney Thad Viers, representing his brother Bart in a helmet lawsuit, and the group *Business Owners Organized to Support Tourism* appealed directly to the state's highest court for a ruling.

The two cases have been combined for the sake of oral arguments before the supreme court, and McGrath's and Viers' helmet arguments will be heard at the same time. So far, no court date has been set, but McGrath speculated about a hearing in November.

Another case involving business owners suing the city to stop it from enforcing some rally ordinances, including the helmet requirement, is still pending in federal court. The lawsuit claims some of the 15 new municipal ordinances are unconstitutional because they are vague, chill freedom of speech, or

infringe on interstate business rights.

Government May Make Anti-Lock Brakes

Mandatory On Motorcycles

Citing spiraling motorcycle crash statistics, the *National Highway Traffic Safety Administration* may require new safety features on bikes. For example, the federal agency plans to decide by next year whether or not anti-lock brakes should be mandatory equipment on motorcycles.

The government report also mentions an insurance industry study that shows that the rate of fatal crashes are 28% lower for bikes equipped with optional A.B.S. braking systems than for those same motorcycles without them.

Though *N.H.T.S.A.* frequently enforces the implementation of safety technology into automobiles. Their involvement in motorcycling tends to focus more on helmet usage and the prevention of drunk riding.

Anti-lock brakes are now standard on some *Harley-Davidsons* and optional across a variety of manufacturers on everything from dual purpose bikes to scooters. In many cases, they can be disabled if the rider chooses.

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
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
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
