A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit organization

In Oregon, A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments, which isn't nearly as subversive as it sounds. It means that we act as legislative watchdogs to help ensure that any legislation affecting motorcyclists is fair and that elected officials are fully informed regarding motorcycle issues.

We also do business as (DBA) American Bikers Aimed Toward Education.

• A.B.A.T.E. is a not-for-profit motorcycle organization devoted to raising member and public awareness about motorcycle issues and safety through education and community involvement. We also raise money for organizations that represent motorcyclist's concerns such as BikePAC.

• It doesn't matter what brand of bike you ride. We are not a manufacturer-specific organization. All are welcome: bikes, trikes, on-road or off, riders, passengers, or non-riders.

• You don't have to ride a motorcycle to belong to A.B.A.T.E. Many of our members just enjoy being around motorcyclists. (We're just that wonderful.) And they feel that the social and legislative issues we're working with are important to their community.

So scan through our newspaper. If you like what you read, check out the chapter meeting listing on the back cover. Drop in on a meeting and see what we're about. You just might find a new family in A.B.A.T.E. And as Melinda says: "Bikers give great hugs."

A Brief History of A.B.A.T.E.

"You have to know where you've been to know where you're going!"

Easyriders magazine editor Lou Kimzey issued a plea in issue #3, October 1971, for bikers to come together to fight impending restrictions from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (N.H.T.S.A.) by joining a new national biker's rights organization called the National Custom Cycle Association. But because of a conflict with the acronym, the name was changed in February 1972 to A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. (A.B.A.T.E.)

Easyriders began granting state charters around 1974, and Keith Ball was the original national coordinator. The biggest threat was that the U.S. D.O.T. (Department of Transportation) was investigating ways to restrict modified or customized "choppers" which they deemed unsafe, especially extended forks.

As the rights movement grew, Don Pittsley, a member of the Huns Motorcycle Club in Connecticut convinced his congressman, representative Stewart Mckinney, to introduce HR-3869 to end the federal authority to withhold highway funds from states without helmet requirements.

In July of 1975, Rob Rasor of the American Motorcyclist Association (A.M.A.), Ron Roloff of the M.M.A. of California, and Ed Armstrong from A.B.A.T.E. of Chicago presented the house sub-committee on surface transportation with convincing testimony to repeal the helmet mandates.

Later that year, with California being sued by the D.O.T. because governor Ronald Reagan refused to comply with the federal helmet requirement mandate, Roloff helped convince California senator Alan Cranston to offer the language of the bill as an amendment to the 1975 Federal Highway Act, which passed with overwhelming support from the California delegation because of the impending lawsuit, and was signed by president Gerald Ford on May 5, 1976.

Not bad for a rag tag bunch of bikers with little or no previous political ambitions.

As a result of our newfound political clout, motorcyclists have successfully approached congress twice over the past few years.

First to grant federal protections against insurance discrimination based on mode of transportation because many companies were denying medical benefits to employees injured in motorcycle accidents.

Then, [in the 1998] session, motorcyclists united to put together a pro-active agenda for bikers, and succeeded in lobbying it through congress.

So, there you have it. The roots of A.B.A.T.E. and biker's rights run deep in the hearts of those of us who have accepted

State Coordinator -- farewell --

Hello all,

We are coming to the end of another year. Winter is upon us, which translates into cold wet riding in Oregon, particularly where I live on the coast.

Brilliant man that he is, Rot Path has pointed out this will be my last letter as coordinator for our organization, as next month we have a new state coordinator for *A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon*. I have met and talked with Troy a couple times now and he seems like a good fit for our organization. He has some good ideas. I am sure that our organization will help him make it work as you all have helped me. He has been the coordinator for *Hub City Chapter* recently

In my two years as state coordinator, I have had some learning experiences and we have had some ups and downs.

The biggest down has been, in my opinion, communication and it is a big one, as without it nothing gets done on the state or chapter levels. I am pleased to say that is starting to improve. In fact, in the last month or so I would say it has improved greatly.

When you get e-mails, send back at the very least a "got it" or "in process", etc., particularly when you can see they are trying to get things done. Just that small amount can be a great comfort to the sender, particularly when they have time constraints. Or maybe could do it a little different.

Another area little mentioned but with certain value is the copy of chapter reports or meeting minutes that are supposed to go the state coordinator after ever chapter meeting. This helps state coordinators figure out changes or things to address at a state level.

I get between three to five reports a month. I should get nine to ten.

There is a certain amount of "us and them" between chapter and state. For the record, The state is not going to come and change your chapter. That is up to you.

The state is not going to take your money or bank accounts. That is also up to the chapters to spend as appropriate. (Which is covered by our bylaws.)

The only reason the state treasurer needs your bank information is so we can stay legal with federal and state tax reporting stuff via our auditor. So make sure she gets your chapter financial reports.

Members and participation: This is the body of our strength and both are needed to make the organization float. What I see is that we have a plan, event, or run idea that we bring up at the chapter meetings.

The 5% to 10% (to 20%) of the chapter members who show up at meetings (if we're lucky) vote on whatever.

3% to 5% (to 10%, if we're lucky) show up to make it happen.

Then, if it isn't the way they would have done, it we get lots of opinions back about what was not as good as it could have been.

These ideas are always better up front.

Here is the kicker — You have to show up to have an opinion expressed in the beginning of the process. After the fact does not help make anything better. Then it is just applying bandages to the wound.

My opinion is that if you don't make it to at least 50% of the meetings, you are not actually getting your two bits in. (We don't do proxy voting in *A.B.A.T.E.*) I am not talking about those who live away or out of state or county. Or those who work or are sick.

Every member in this organization is important and every voice should be heard at the chapter meetings, and then in the state meetings

Recently I have been hearing murmurs that we are a dying organization or some semblance of that. For the record, we are not. We are an older organization and like almost all of the organizations I belong to, we are struggling with age, frustration, and apathy. That is directly related to *participation*.

Hours: 11 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.



The last week of the year is a null time – property taxes have been paid, holiday bills are arriving, looming income taxes are next year's problem. The craziness of the holidays is winding down.



U.S. Senate Reintroduces R.P.M. Act

The Recognizing the Protection of Motorsports (R.P.M.) Act, S-2602, was reintroduced in the 116th congress on 18 October 2019 by senators Richard Burr (R-NC) and Joe Manchin (D-WV) along with twenty-four original co-sponsors. The bipartisan bill clarifies that it is legal under federal statutes to modify the emissions system of a motor vehicle that is converted for race-use-only. The bill protects U.S. citizens' right to convert street cars and motorcycles for motorsports competition.

The R.P.M. Act confirms that transforming motor vehicles into race cars used exclusively for competition does not violate the Clean Air Act, according to the Specialty Equipment Manufacturers Association (S.E.M.A.), adding, "This [U.S.] tradition was unquestioned for nearly fifty years until 2015 when the E.P.A. took the position that converted street vehicles that compete on the track must remain emissions-compliant, even though they are not driven on public streets or highways."

The E.P.A. also maintains that the equipment used to transform a street vehicle into a race car is prohibited and is to be addressed in the bill.

"[U.S.] racing runs on traditions," said senator Burr. "For more than fifty years, motorsports enthusiasts have purchased cars and modified them to race, off of public roads. However, this tradition was threatened when the E.P.A. attempted to make these modifications illegal. This [pending] legislation upholds congress intent of the Clean Air Act and protects motorsports, for professionals and amateurs alike, for years to come."

Motorsports competition involves tens of thousands of participants and vehicle owners each year, both amateur and professional. Retail sales of racing products make up a nearly \$2 billion market annually. A majority of the estimated 1,300 race tracks operating across the U.S., including oval, road, dirt, and off-road tracks, feature converted race vehicles that the E.P.A. now considers to be illegal.

European Motorcycle Tariffs Avoided

This past summer, representatives from K.T.M., Indian Motorcycle, and the Motorcycle Industry Council (M.I.C.) testified before the office of the United States trade representative (U.S.T.R.) in Washington, D.C. to oppose the proposed tariffs of up to 100% on motorcycles, parts, and accessories arriving from European Union countries. This would have had a devastating effect on motorcycle manufacturers especially the O.E.M.s from Italy (Ducati, Aprilia, Moto Guzzi), Austria (K.T.M.), Germany (B.M.W.) and the United Kingdom (Triumph), among others.

Fortunately for the motorcycle industry, on a global scale, these proposed tariffs have been averted, according to the *M.I.C. "Had the tariffs been enacted, that* would have meant extremely high prices for our [U.S.] consumers of European motorcycles, parts, and accessories," said Erik Pritchard, incoming *M.I.C.* president and C.E.O. Increased costs would have even discouraged motorcycle riders from performing routine but critical maintenance, such as brake pad and tire replacements, due to potential doubling on the price of parts.

Federal Legislation Would Limit Ethanol Blending In U.S. Fuel Supply

A bipartisan bill has been introduced in congress that aims to prevent *Renewable Fuel Standard* (*R.F.S.*) blending obligations from requiring ethanol to make up more than 9.7% of the total volume of gasoline projected to be sold or introduced into commerce in the U.S. for a given calendar year.

Introduced by U.S. representatives Bill Flores (R-TX) and Peter Welch (D-VT) on 07 May, HR–2540, titled the *Food and Fuel Consumer Protection Act of 2019*, would cap the ethanol mandate and stop the federal government from forcing E15 fuel into the market, and ensure continued availability of E10 and ethanol-free gasoline (E0), which is safer to use in motorcycles and smaller-engined vehicles and gas powered equipment.

House resolution 2540 has been referred to the house committee on energy and commerce.

Illinois Green Ice Initiative Promotes Grass-Free Streets

A.B.A.T.E. of Illinois and Sangamon county sheriff Jack Campbell have joined together on the *Green Ice Initiative* to keep the streets safer by spreading the word about the dangers of grass clippings on roadways. Dumping grass clippings on the road, they said, not only clogs storm sewers, it presents real dangers to motorcyclists and bicyclists. It is also illegal.

Josh Witkowski, the state legislative coordinator for *A.B.A.T.E. of Illinois*, told *KPVI Channel 6 News* in Pocatello, Illinois that the problem is often worse in rural areas, where grass can reach two or three feet high before someone cuts it. The clippings then blow onto the roadway, sometimes two inches deep, where it can remain a hazard to riders for days.

Witkowski said he was aware of at least two fatalities, one in Kentucky and one in Illinois, where grass on the road was a factor.

As with so many other safety issues, Witkowski said, it will take both education and police enforcement to create change. Dumping is a violation of the state's litter regulations.

Outdoor Recreation Is Powerful Economic Driver

[Beware: Statistical dweeb article ahead.]

Motorcycling, A.T.V. riding, and sideby-side driving are among the country's three largest outdoor recreational activities, when ranked by economic output, says a new federal report.

According to newly-released data from the U.S. Bureau of economic analysis (B.E.A.), the top three conventional outdoor activities generated \$9.1 billion in economic output in 2017. Outdoor recreation accounts for 2.2% of U.S. G.D.P., creating \$778 billion in gross output supporting 5.2 million jobs.

And, it's a growth sector.

The bureau defines conventional outdoor recreation as activities done for pleasure,

such as camping, hiking, hunting, and fishing, and involving some physical effort.

The economic data on the national and state levels reinforce what the outdoor recreation industry has long believed: Outdoor recreation is a powerful driver of national and local economies and it is growing faster than the U.S. economy as a whole.

This is the second consecutive year that the bureau of economic analysis (B.E.A.), an agency of the U.S. department of commerce, has released formal, nationallevel data, a notable milestone for the industry now identified as a unique sector of the economy. Having a rich set of both state and national data on outdoor recreation to draw upon will inform decision-making by businesses, policy makers, and managers of public lands and waters, notes the *Motorcycle Industry Council.* (*M.I.C.*)

Australian Authorities Deploy A.I. Cameras To Detect Texting Drivers

If you feel somebody's watching you, it may not be paranoia.

While modern mobile devices are the ultimate tools of convenience, when in the hands of drivers these handheld computers also contribute to increased crashes and fatalities on our roadways, particularly for motorcyclists who are more vulnerable.

To help curb distracted behavior behind the wheel, Australia has deployed surveillance devices that peek inside the passenger compartment and cite those driving under the influence of smart phones.

During the pilot phase of the mobile phone detection camera (M.P.D.C.) initiative, 8.5 million vehicles were checked from January 2019 to June 2019 in the Australian state of New South Wales. Though citations were **not** administered during the test period, 100,000 drivers were caught handling devices while operating their vehicles.

Once the pilot phase ends, violators will receive a \$344 AUD fine (about \$230 USD)

2019 Meeting of the Minds Report by Ted Tracy

I would like to start out by thanking and will properly react. A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon for giving me the opportunity to attend the 35th annual Meeting of the Minds in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

This year's conference was hosted by the Motorcycle Riders Foundation and A.B.A.T.E. of Minnesota. There were over 300 attendees representing over forty states.

The conference started on Thursday night where each state gave an update on their accomplishments for the year. I told how Oregon passed legislation including motorcyclists in with the vulnerable road users, permitting higher penalties when your right-of-way is infringed.

Saturday started with a legislative update by Rocky Fox, legislative director of the M.R.F. They have pushed a bill through the U.S. senate prohibiting profiling and are now working on pushing the bill through the house of representatives. They are making great strides as there is now 88 co-sponsors compare to only 37 in 2018.

We also discussed the definition of a motorcycle. This is very important for many reasons, such a crash statistics and training. Their definition is: A vehicle with the seat straddling the engine, with not more than three wheels, that will exceed 30 mph, and has handlebars.

Of great concern was autonomous vehicles. These things should scare the hell out of all motorcyclists. We must be sure that these vehicles can detect motorcycles

Right now, that is not the case. These vehicles will be able to communicate with each other and one issue is who owns the data in case of a crash?

Also discussed was the liability issue of truck platooning. This is where three trucks go down the road keeping an equal distance from each other through computer communications.

The M.R.F. is also committed to maintaining the ban on federal funds for motorcycle checkpoints, maintaining the ban on N.H.T.S.A. lobbying, and maintaining a designated seat on the Motorcycle Advisory Board.

Later in the morning my good friend, Slider Gilmore, gave his highly popular seminar, Live to Ride. His seminar highlights the importance of personal health to be able to ride safely and competently. He gave many ideas about how to not only ride well, but to be ably to ride well into our old age. His seminar was not only informative, but highly uplifting.

On Friday afternoon, I attended the Three Rs alcohol awareness program. Impaired riding is increasingly becoming a serious problem, causing escalating attention in both the motorcycling community and the various bureaucracies with oversight of motorcycling fatality statistics. According to N.H.T.S.A., riding impaired was the cause of 27% of the 4.885 motorcyclist fatalities in 2017.

The first part of the seminar was Be

Responsible, Know your Limit. Set your guidelines and stick to them. Don't let your friends change the place where you've crossed the line. Don't get in the trap of "just one more".

The second part was Ride Responsible. We are about freedom of choice, but with that freedom comes a responsibility to try to make good choices. Do not ride impaired. If you are going to party, go ahead and have a good time. Just don't make a bad choice and ride your motorcycle. Find someone to take you home. Call a friend or stay put.

The third part was Take Responsibility. Probably the hardest "R" of all. We are a brotherhood, whether it be your organization or your circle of friends. The camaraderie of shared experiences is a major part of our lifestyle. Do not let your friends ride impaired. Be the person who says "You shouldn't ride. Let's get someone to lock your bike up and you can come back and get it tomorrow." Do not let your friend ride impaired.

Friday evening, Rick Prentice and I found time to visit Wildhorse Harley-Davidson for some T-shirts, have dinner with Slider and his brother, Chopper, and to attend a biker carnival in the hotel lobby. This was a great event that raised money for the M.R.F.'s awareness and education program. Since we were all staying at the hotel, there might have been some drinking involved, and a great time was had by all.

Saturday morning, after various awards were given out, there was a presentation given concerning profiling and how it affects all motorcyclists.

and a five point penalty on their driving record. Drivers also have little clemency with the system as the M.P.D.C. can be fixed or mobile, works day or night, and operates in all weather conditions.

By the end of 2019, Australia will deploy 45 M.P.D.C.s with plans to expand the program through 2023.

Harley–Davidson Launching Group-Guided **Cruise Control**

Harley-Davidson has applied for a patent that will enable groups of riders to maintain a constant speed thanks to kinematics and radar-guided cruise control. This new type of adaptive cruise control is specifically aimed at Harley's current target demographic: groups of riders.

Adaptive cruise control is nothing new

in the world of four-wheeled transportation, but now a major motorcycle manufacturer has stepped in with a system that is claimed to allow a bike to lock on to another bike and keep a set separation distance or separation time from the target bike while offering the rider the chance to pick multiple bikes or cars within a lane to follow.

The Harley system incorporates a transceiver that can ping out the bike's location to other vehicles on the road, so with a group of riders sharing the same piece of tarmac, and using the same H-D adaptive cruise control system, a group of bikes can track and monitor the location of each other in real-time for a safer and more controlled group riding experience.

[*c.o.e. note:* In the world of motorcycle riding where split seconds can mean the difference between life or death, this seems like a killer idea. (i.e. A bad one.)]

IT IS HEREBY ADJUDGED AND DECLARED that Oregon House Bill 3422 means that as long as a motorcycle rider is wearing a protective covering on his head that has a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle belmet meets standards established by the United States Department of Transportation the rider is in compliance with state law with respect to his helmet and a police officer may not inquire further to determine if the helmet worn meets United States Department of Transportation testing standards
