Let Those Who Ride Decide Dedicated to Freedom of the Road

- HOW A BILL BECOMES LAW -

In Oregon, laws are made and changed by the legislature. Citizens or groups may not introduce legislation, but may request a legislator or committee to do it.

The idea is first written in bill form by an attorney. Most of this work is done in the office of LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL, attorneys employed at the Capitol in Salem for this purpose. After being written in bill form, a legislator or standing committee (such as the House Transportation Committee) introduces it in either the HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES or the SENATE.

This article describes the path of a House Bill. A Senate Bill goes through a similar process, but is introduced in the Senate first.

When a bill is introduced, it is assigned a BILL NUMBER (such as HB 2345), processed and printed. After printing, it goes through FIRST READING before the House (a clerk reads the title of the bill, very loudly and rapidly). This formally starts the bill on its way through the House. The SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE (the "president" of that body of the legislature) assigns it to a COMMITTEE, which considers, debates, holds public hearings to receive testimony, and often amends the bill. This portion of the bill's passage is the most time-consuming part. Often, months will pass before a Committee takes action on a bill.


After hearing testimony, the Committee may do one of several things:

- -TABLE IT: postpone further action. A tabled bill may "die in committee" or later be removed from the table and considered further.
- -REPORT IT to the body of the House with or without a recommendation to pass or not pass.
- -Send the bill to the House with MAJORITY and MINORITY REPORTS. This may be done if a bill is controversial and the committee can't agree on recommendations.

After the bill comes out of Committee, it goes through SECOND READING (again, only the title is read aloud by the clerk), and is put on the agenda. Within two days, a bill goes through THIRD READING, is debated by House members, and voted on. A majority vote (31 votes in the House) is required to pass it.

After passage, the bill is sent to the Senate, where it goes through a similar process. In the Senate it must have 16 votes (a majority) to pass. If the Senate makes changes in the House version, or vice versa, it must go to a CONFERENCE COMMITTEE to resolve the differences, then back to both Houses for approval. If a compromise cannot by reached, the bill dies.

When both Houses pass a bill in the same form, it is signed by the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate, and sent to the Governor, who has five days to sign or veto it. If he does neither, it becomes law, and takes effect 91 days after the end of the legislative session.





THE BILL OF RIGHTS-1791

FIRST AMENDMENT

Forbids the Congress to interfere with religion, free speech, a free press, or with the right to assemble peaceably, or to petition the Government.

SECOND AMENDMENT

Guarantees to the people the right to have weapons.

THIRD AMENDMENT

Guarantees against ladging soldiers in private houses without the consent of the owners.

FOURTH AMENDMENT

Provides that there shall be no search or seizure of persons, houses, goods, or papers, without a warrant.

FIFTH AMENDMENT

Declares that there shall be no trief for sections offenses without a grand jury indictment, no repeated trials for the same offense, no condemnation without trial, no compulsion to be a witness against oneself, and no property taken for public use except at a fair price.

SIXTH AMENDMENT

Requires a speedy and public trial for criminal offences in the district where the crime was committed, a fair jury, a plain statement of the accusation, gives the accused the right to be represented by a lawyer and to compel the attendance of his witnesses, and requires all witnesses to testify in the presence of the accused.

SEVENTH AMENDMENT

Provides that in lewsuits about anything valued at more than \$20, a trial by jury shall be allowed.

EIGHTH AMENDMENT

Prohibits too large ball or fines, and areal or unusual punishments.

NINTH AMENDMENT

Declares that rights not stated in the Constitution are not therefore taken away from the people.

TENTH AMENDMENT

States that powers not delegated to the United States nor prohibited by the Constitution to the States are reserved to the States or to the people.



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AMENDMENTS PASSED AFTER THE BILL OF RIGHTS

ELEVENTH AMENDMENT (1795)

Declares that the Judiciary of the United States does not have authority to hear a suit against a State if brought by a citizen of another State or a foreigner.

TWELFTH AMENDMENT (1804)

Provides a better way of electing the President and Vice President.

THIRTEENTH AMENDMENT (1865)

Puts can end to slovery.

FOURTEENTH AMENDMENT (1868)

Defines citizenship of the United States and of a State, prohibits States from taking away the rights of citizens unlawfully, defines the basis of representation in the House of Representatives, states certain disqualifications from halding public office, and confirms certain Civil War debts and disclaims others.

FIFTEENTH AMENDMENT (1870)

Declares that no citizen shall lose the right to vote because of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

SIXTEENTH AMENDMENT (1913)

Gives Congress power to endet income-tex laws.

SEVENTEENTH AMENDMENT (1913)

Provides that United States Senators shall be elected by the people.

EIGHTEENTH AMENDMENT (1919)

Prohibited the menufacture, sale, or transportation of alcoholic beverages. (Repealed in 1933.)

NINETEENTH AMENDMENT (1920)

No citizen shall be refused the right to vote because of being a woman.

TWENTIETH AMENDMENT (1933)

Changes the date of the inauguration of the President and of the opening of the Cangress, and provides for filling the Presidency and Vice Presidency under certain conditions.

TWENTY-FIRST AMENDMENT (1933)

Repeals the 18th Amendment and forbids the carrying of alcoholic liquers into any State, Territory, or pessession of the United States in violation of its laws.

TWENTY-SECOND AMENDMENT (1951)

Limits the number of times anyone may be elected to the office of President.

TWENTY-THIRD AMENDMENT (1961)

Gives citizen residents of the District of Columbia the right to vote for the P dent and Vice President.

TWENTY-FOURTH AMENDMENT (1964)

Declares that no citizen shall be prevented from voting for the President, the Vice President, or members of the Congress because he has not paid a tax.

TWENTY-FIFTH AMENDMENT (1967)

Sets forth the method of determining Presidential disability, and provides a plan for filling a vacancy in the office of Vice President.

TWENTY-SIXTH AMENDMENT (1971)

Provides that no citizen, who is 18 years of age or older, shall be denied the right to vote in Federal or state elections because of age.

Do you want to help? YES How? ANYWAY POSSIBLE

Several of you want to help, but don't know how, or what to do. It is all too easy to let the "other guy do it".

Remember one thing however-YOU ARE THAT OFFER GUY (or GAL). This state, as of December 31, 1981, has 92,316 motorcycles registered in it, yet we are less than 450 strong. Get the idea? By joining ABATE you have at least shown your concern for your cycling future in Oregon. But this can only be the start of your participation.

Now we are telling you that you (yea YOU) must speak for several hundred of your fellow cycle enthusiasts. Put this in perspective with the fact that cyclists are a very small segment of the total population and hopefully you will understand that each and every one of us has one hell of a job to do.

Now, back to the point. How can you help? Start with talking about ABATE and your views on cycling to your friends...whether they ride or not. Remember we're not struggling against other bikes, we're struggling against a system that resists change and depends on public apathy to let status quo prevail. Most folks simply can't imagine why anyone 'would ride "one of the damn things" anyway, never mind without a helmet. Yet these same individuals would scream if they were faced with a \$25.00 or higher traffic ticket if they failed to wear their seat belt! We don't want these people on a cycle anyway, but we do want them to know that we have rights too!! Maybe they'll stop and think about us.. and not make that left turn into us.

When an article appears in the local newspaper concerning cycling-good or badlet the paper hear from you. Speak up and let them know your views. Don't wait for the other guy to do it-both of you need to write! If you are frustrated with the way cyclists and cycling are treated as a whole send a letter to your local paper. This way, people who have never had an opportunity to hear your point of view-and don't already share your views-will be exposed to them, and again...maybe make them stop and think about cyclists and what "FREEDOM OF THE ROAD" really means.

Here is a list of how you can help:

- 1) Be a vocal and visible support of motorcycling.
- 2) Keep your Oregon/Coordinator advised of cycling news from your area.
- 3) Write articles to your local paper and our own newsletter.
- 4) Keep abreast of what's happening by reading cycle magazines that address political issues.
- 5) Sign your friends and strangers up as ABATE members.
- 6) Make sure the bike shops you frequent know what ABATE is, and have our applications prominently displayed. If they don't know, TELL THEM, and if they are out of applications, let us know, and we will get them sent out.
- 7) See if the bike shops are willing to give our members discounts, and then favor the ones that do with your business. Let us know what shops agree to give discounts so we can run a list in the newsletter.
- 8) Let your Oregon Coordinator know if you have a special skill and/or inside pricing on goods or services at your disposal. For ABATE members there will be a free classified ad service. Send in the ad, your name and membership number and we will run the ad in the next newsletter.
- 9) When there is an event forthcoming, volunteer to help run the booth, sign up members, unload materials, make up posters, etc. There's never to much help and the overworked few would really appreciate it.
- 10) Avoid the "we gotta"s. All too often we've heard the "we gotta" to this or "we gotta" do that. Recognizing the problem is one thing, but tackling

the solution is another. Why don't you think it's your responsibility? Who do you think is going to do it?

- 11) For our political future, this is the most important: Write your legislative letters. Remember to send copies of your letters and the responses so we can amass a file to find who our political allies and opponents are.
- 12) Register to vote-if you haven't already-and then VOTE, riding your scoot to the polls.
- 13) Support local ABATE events-initiate local events.

This list is far from complete, but we hope you get an idea of what you can do for your organization. We need your input to grow and be politically successful. We also need to know what you would like to see in the newsletter. LET US KNOW YOU ARE OUT THERE!!!!

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Appearances: can be deceiving

I think most of us got into motorcycling for many of the same reasons that you've heard over and over before: the smell of fresh air, the feeling of freedom-all those buzzwords that sound so trite.

But there's one more reason that's often overlooked. Most of us got into biking, and continue to be involved with Ñ, because we strive to be different. Drive up to a restaurant in your Tovota and nobody will give you a second glance, but show up on your bike and you'll get noticed-for better or worse. I like that - always have and elways will. I may be a debt-ridden, taxpaying, overworked and underpaid clowns just like you, but at least I am something that 94 percent of the rest of the restaurant clowns aren't: I'm a motorcyclist and proud of it.

Even when I'm off the bike and chasing after the revolving blue light at the local Chee-Z-Mart, I still look like a biker. I've got a leather jacket, motorcycle boots, gloves, a motorcycle Tshirt. I guess I consciously advertise the fact that I'm a biker.

When I first became a motorcyclist I realized i'd joined an unofficial brotherhood of others who would to some degree help, respect and accept me because I rode a bike. The fraternity of bilters was a very real thing when I first started riding.

But now there is a widening schism in the brotherhood that disturbs me. All of us spend a great deal of time defending ourselves against nonmolorey-cling critics who stereotype us as burns by our mode of travel and by the way we dress. But how do we handle the very real dissension that axists within our ranks?

*"So you re from the AMA." the biker bogan et a California event i atlanded last summer. "Well, let me tell you, the reason I'm not a member is becaut you guys created and now support the Hell's Angels with all that money you make off racing. My old tady and me have a helf of a time getting into campgrounds anymore on our dresser because of the image those burns give us all, and I sin't about to support enybody that supports THEM!"

The man indeed owned a full-dress machine. He had short hair, an earring, I -shirt with a calchy (albeit obscene) slogan, jeans and boots. He were a cutoff denim lacket with a giant winged patch on the back that identified him as a road club member, while the rest of the vest was covered with an assortment of pins, patches and badges.

of I'm writing to tell you about an kicident in our town that both saddens and angers me. . ." the letter began. it seems the owners of a local cate frequented by a loose organization of Sunday morning riders recently had banned all motorcycles from their parking lot and made it clear they didn't want any bikers coming there

The reason? "A Irland of ours who is -tuo' to grap a cu blot ered these a laws' began hanging out there on the weekends. They made a tot of noise, parked their choppers right in front of the door and scared the other patrons away, so the owner put up a sign that bens all motorcyclists." the men wrote. "Nobody should have the right to undo all the positive things that motorcyclists have accomplished in the last 20 years. . and that includes other motorcyclists who dress and act that way," he concluded.

Who is right here? Don't all motorcyclists have the right to dress as they please and personalize their motorcy cles to any extent permitted by law?

Are "scruffy" bikers perpetuating a bad image for all motorcyclists simply by their appearance? Whose sport is

"Indiana Police" is a magazine for and about policemen in the Hoosler state. It recently reprinted an article from another police magazine titled "Outlaw Bikers." The enticle briefly traces the history of the Helf's Angels, then gets down to the business of informing policemen in every little burg in Indiana about the horrors they can expect when they stop a so-called "one percenter" or "outless."
For example, it werns the pelice to

watch out for the old outlew tolck of s gnimia ed of amens offer encomes handlober at the officer, or lining him up in the reerview mirror," the article states. Se il you're ever pulled ever in Indiana. I'd recommend that you don't touch your handlebars or look in your mirrors! But wall, because the article also tells policemen to be wary of take exhaust pipes that house shotguns and "solenoid-operated mechanisms that allow the biker to fire with a nudge of his love against the side of the bike, even though his hands are releed." "Officers anticipating trouble when

stopping a run should perhaps be issued rifled-stup loads for their shotgens," the erticle continues. "This would be an Ideal mission for light 223-caliber semi- or full-automatic assauft rifles, since (they) will easily penetrate soft armor and neutralize the wearer, but have enough audiosive expension that they won't always exit a nonermored effender's body." And finally, "A department that intends to bring a run to a half without bloodshed should plan on having at least one fully semed officer for every two bitters. This is also a good ratio for patrol officers stopping small groups of one-percenters.

What's going on here, folks?
I propose the following not-sooriginal idea: Anybody who breaks the law is an outlew and should be treated as prescribed by the law, no matter how they dress or transport themselves down the road

I've been involved with motorcycling for 16 years and I've seen thousands of bikers who drass a little differently than and ride mechines that might run contrary to my tastes. I've sean AMA members who wear three-place suits to work and others who wear Jeans and a cutoff yest. I've seen AMA and ABATE volunteers working side-by-side to stop the povernment from regulating our sport to death. I've seen a lot of bikers in my time, yet i've never seen even one of their police records. Therefore, to my knowledge I've never seen one motorcycle outlaw.

One more thing: There are great folks and jerks in motorcycling, just like in any other walk of life. I seek out the great folks and avoid the jerks. But God help any fellow biker, lerk or otherwise, that looks like a "one-percenter" to an overly-nervous smalltown Indiana cop who has read that article. You could die for that.

Let's stick together, folks. Molorcycling has too many problems to face in splinter groups.

<u>Teacher's Standards and Practices Committee</u> - Six ABATE members attended the session to get a portion of the minutes from the committee's previous meeting reviewed for possible corrections on some wording of the regulations governing the qualifications for instructors for motorcycle education in the schools.

Governor's Motorcycle Safety Advisory Committee to the Oregon Traffic Safety Commission - The meeting began at 1100.

Chairperson David Lawson passed out copies of a letter from Vinita Howard outlining legislation the Motor Vehicles Division would like passed. Among these regulations are bills which would allow headlamp modulating systems to be used during daylight hours only and exempt the turn signal requirement for motorcycles and mopeds if the speed attainable in one mile is less than 30 mph. Riders would still be required to have turn signals if they plan to ride at night.

We were reminded of the important part that ABATE will play in the letter writing campaign in support of these bills.

Bill Spencer, Washington State Coordinator for motorcycle safety was introduced. He explained how his position as Coordinator started and some of the areas that he has been involved in this past year.

He outlined the Washington Motorcycle Training Program and how it works. He emphasised that the people buying motorcycles today are in the 29 to 45 year old age group and he feels that the people who need it the most the 16 to 24 year old group are not signing up for the course. Also, the course is set up in the counties with the most motorcycle registrations.

Bill emphasised that motorcycle safety is not confined to rider education programs, that it includes automotive driver awareness of motorcycles and he passed out several sheets of ideas for publicizing motorcycle safety awareness. He also passed out the laws for obtaining an instruction permit in Washington and the law regarding the categories of motorcycle endorsements. These categories are one for cycles with an engine displacement of 150cc or less and two and three for 500 cc or less and 501 or more respectively.

Following Bill's presentation, the ABATE legislative committee passed out our recommendations for legislative action this term. Among the recommendations are establishing a state coordinator for motorcycle safety to work under the Oregon State Highway Traffic Safety Commission and cleaning up the language in the present education law to allow wider dispersal of the funds.

The next meeting of the committee will be December 30, 12 noon at the International King's Table on Edgewater, NW in Salem. The public is invited.

The committee made a motion which states that any committee member who does not show up for two meetings in a row without a good reason be replaced. The motion passed. It was also recommended that Roberts Rules of Order be followed so the credibility of the committee will be established.

SUMMARY OF STATE DECEMBER BOARD MEETING

REPORT FROM MEMBERSHIP SECRETARY: Al Cole needs first and last names plus complete zip codes on all new membership applications. He said that there can be up to a two month delay before now members are entered on the list.

REPORT FROM . 3 COORDINATOR: Roger stressed that all chapters buy and use Roberts Rules of Order to conduct meetings. All chapters have a sample of the state letterhead which can be adapted for use by individual chapters.

ABATE LOBBYIST: Jim Dodson of NE Portland is our lobbyist and Dave Huby of SE Portland will assist him in the next legislative session. Jim is an experienced lobbyist and an avid motorcyclist.

STATE BOARD MEETINGS: It was decided to have all state board meetings on the second Saturday of the month for 1983.

STATE LEGISLATIVE PATCH: Choke from ME Portland presented information on a limited editation patch which will have our ABATE exple and "United the Stand, Divided We Fall, 1987 on it. These will be limited edition patches with all proceeds going to the state treasury for the legislative year. Each chapter will have 19 patches to sell and they will be available after the January state board meeting.


