FROM YOUR LEGISLATIVE DIRECTOR:

How good do you look in a HELMET???

This will be one of several priority questions that each member should be asking themselves this legislative session.

In the upcoming election, there are a few candidates worth voting for, the rest, unfortunately, are a matter of choosing who is going to be least objectionable to have to live with.

Whether it looks that way or not, we are still a country of GOVERNMENT OF, BY, AND FOR, THE PEOPLE. Flag waving? It sure is But if you don't vote and voice your opinion - or vote and become involved - a breakdown starts to occur. We lose our rights and our money.

The two major problems this year will be the MANDATORY HELMET LAW, and the PERSONAL INJURY PROTECTION scam (PIP). Both have far reaching monetary value to the industries supporting them. If the helmet laws get passed, think of the hundreds of thousands of dollars it will bring into the helmet manufacturer's hands. Same goes for PIP insurance and the insurance companies. Both helmet manufacturers and insurance companies will gladly spend money campaigning, because they will make thousands of dollars for every dollar they spend, now.

Get involved with what's happening in your local (city and county both) politics. Stay close to your chapter, that's what this organization is all about. Report all information to your chapter's legislative director, no matter how unimportant that information may seem. Verify it, we need facts not rumors. Your chapter's officers will make sure it gets to me. All information will be entered on the computer and we will have statistics to work with. If you can't get information to your chapter officers, write to your state organization at PO Box 4504, Portland, OR 97208.

Remember - ABATE is your voice with the State of Oregon's legislature and to the public. The insurance and helmet people have told us, up front, that they want what's good for everyone. But, they didn't ask the MOTOR-CYCLISTS, THOSE WHO RIDE SHOULD DECIDE, how about hearing us first, then LET US DECIDE ABOUT MANDATORY LAWS.

Every member needs to be aware of the rights we may lose. This year I'll be asking a lot of personal effort from each and everyone of you. Help yourselves preserve your right to:

BIKER RIGHTS--SOME FRESH AIR by Howard Segermark

--Note: Howard Segermark is a 19-year veteran of politics in our nation's capital and has testified on behalf of helmet freedom before the Florida legislature. In '76, he worked with Senator Jesse Helms, co-sponsor of the law which removed federal penalties on states allowing helmet freedom. He commutes to work on his cycle which has 83,000 miles on it.

For the second year in a row, several hundred cyclists joined Mike Farabaugh, President of ABATE Indiana, to work from October 3rd to 5th, on promoting and preserving motorcyclists' rights. It was "A Meeting of the Minds," the "U.S.A. Seminar" and the "U.S.A. Rights Group Leadership Conference and Seminar." It was mainly Farabaugh's production, and a good one it was.

There was precious little riding done in those days but a lot of learning. It was my first time with the group and it was a great experience. We traded riding stories and tales of political wars late both nights.

My purpose was to come and talk about lobbying-working with the state (and national) legislatures. Some of those in attendance were close to professionals and matched my 19 years of experience. Bob Illingsworth of Minnesota has developed a close rapport with his state government and runs a successful business himself. Linda Stewart teaches and knows many of the Sunshine State's Tallahassee legislators on a first name basis.

Having worked in Washington, D.C. is supposed to make me an expert and I talked about the techniques of getting the job done. I have long felt from my experience that bikers can be successful acting politically. We're passing up a crucial opportunity if we don't.

My message: bikers are acting politically all the time. Those that don't vote, don't write, and don't work are, by deciding to not act, playing into the hands of the regulators. They are abdicating political power to those who would control and restrict our freedoms.

That is not to say that the political activists are not always going to be in the minority. Or, that a minority of bikers acting politically can't have massive effect. Those that are willing to act in a positive way are always going to carry the ball for the free riders. The activists should know that they don't need all the political power in the world to get a lot done. How many voters does Joan Claybrook have? She has a lot less than we do and they're a lot less motivated.

Our opposition may be a mile wide, but it's an inch deep.

In my work Florida ABATE and with Virginia ABATE, I've found a good number of men and women who have the commitment but lack the confidence in their ability to be politically effective. Or, they havn't learned some of the basics of dealing in politics and with politicians. Our goal was to teach some of those basics to avoid the scars and wasted energy of the learning process.

There are a number of states facing fights to preserve helmet freedom. Some that have it are working on fighting compulsory seat belt laws. Some are helping to further the development of cycle education programs. We'll all be threatened by possible federal helmet laws in the 100th Congress convening in January.

In my comments to the Rights Seminar, I pointed out that when I worked on the staff of a member of the U.S. Senate, part of my job was to come up with new ideas for laws. This would help make my boss look like an active legislator. Granted that was only part of the purpose, but for many of the 15,000 Congressional staffers, their pay raises and promotions depend on making their boss look good. Here's the bottom line: What is surprising is that there has been no compulsory lid law offered in recent years!

We all know that it is only a matter of time before that bill is put on the the table. What we must ask is what kind of effort will bikers make to fight that bill? The American Motorcyclist Association has provided invaluable help in the past. What help should other bikers give them? What do they need?

During the discussion period, a question was asked about the American Medical Association's position on compulsory helmet laws. When I got back to Washington, I started going through their bureaucracy. It seems that the doctors voted back in 1980 to favor "legislative measures" which would require helmet use. When I tried to find more about their lobbying plans and asked if this might be moved to the top of their priority list, I was told that in the past they have tended to stress state rather than national legislation—perhaps an easier target. Among other things, the American Medical Association will help provide "expert" witnesses to testify before state legislators.

Another group that has come out against bikers' rights to decide is the Motorcyle Industry Council. This group, is composed of the big makers (Yamaha, Suzuki, Honda, Kawasaki, BMW) with the exception of Harley-Davidson, and a lot of small ones. It has recently adopted a statement of policy favoring the adoption by states of compulsory helmet laws. I havn't been able to figure out if they also advocate a federal law, but if they're heading in that direction, it is likely.

What was universally agreed at the Rights Seminar was the need for an effort to persuade or pressure the MIC to reverse their position. Roger Hull reported that the cycle makers think that the way to sell motorcycles is to make them look "safe" (have they looked at their own ads for the steaming, 150 mph crotch rockets?). Evidently they think they can promote the "bikes-are-safe" image by requiring helmets.

As Hull, former editor of Road Rider said, what a lot of folks just don't realize that cyclists sell cycles.

From a pragmatic, political point of view, the decision is loaded with downside risks. They make their customers mad. They confuse their legislative priorities (do they want to require helmets or fend off catalytic converters?). They threaten to split their industry.

And, of course, splitting the industry is what would reverse this decision in a hurry. As soon as we get one of those boys to back off, they all will. I can't imagine Yamaha hanging on to the compulsory helmet position if Kawasaki comes out for rider freedom. It would really be nice to know which one of them is the weakest link in that chain. In the mean time, an excellent project was endorsed to let all of these companies know how their customers and potential customers feel about their decision.

This can be done through direct contact with the companies (write me for a list at 1701 Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006), or ask your local dealer to communicate this to his distributor. Boycotts can be tremendously effective tools—often for their publicity value. No one likes to get their name in the paper the wrong way.

Should I report that I finally got to meet Willie G., and found cycle jockeys that made me more determined to go out and get my instructors' certification? That and more. But, most importantly, I think that cycling took another step forward. Organizing is as American as apple pie, and Mike Farabaugh assembled enough talent to get a lot of organizing done.

That energy and talent channeled the right way will move a lot of mountains.

Indiana Bikers;

Yea, I agree, that ain't funny! Everyone of you better convince yourself and everyone you ride with to look for it, because believe me, this General Assembly (a long term assembly in '87) will try and mandate helmets on us and it is going to require a STRONG effort by us to keep the lid off our heads.

In addition to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, there are 12 different national and state organizations pushing for a MANDATORY HELMET LAW. Added to the list today, September 16, 1986, was the Motorcycle Industry Council. Ah you say! Who are the M.I.C?

A Vet Tip

I'd like to pass on the following bit of info that will be of special interest to any Bro's who are vets. The government owes veterans money: A bill passed in congress gives vets a dividend of 55¢ to \$1000 of their GI insurance for each month of service, regardless of whether or not they still carry this insurance.

You won't receive this dividend unless you ask for it. The Veterans Administration urges you to apply, regardless of whether you had insurance or not. They will check it for you. Years of service: two years, \$264; three years, \$316; four years, \$528. Write to the Veterans Center, Box 8079, Philadelphia, Pa. 19101. Include your name and address, GI insurance number, birthdate, enlistment (or reenlistment) date, and discharge date can be found on DD Form 214. Check with the Veterans Administration and file a request for payment. This is no bullshit it's legit. You could be entitled to some money. You don't have to be a Vietnam Vet either, so take the time to find out. It could be to your benefit - Ride Free - Dewey.
