# HELMET REPEAL

Yes, it's an actual reality now! In last months newsletter you received information and helpful hints on who and how to write letters pertaining to legislation we proposed. This month we can give you the bill numbers of some of our proposals, their sponsors, and reactions some members have received in response. Let us give you the bill first and then go in to what it means and where we go with it from here.

HERE'S THE ONE YOU WANTED!!!

First of all, take note of the sponsors. These people should be sent a note of thanks - without them, we go nowhere, so please help by showing your appreciation.

Now, look at the bill itself. You'll notice HB 2340 is really two acts: (1) amending ORS 487.735 - check last months newsletter and see where we are substituting "that may" for "to" to eliminate this directive and insert an elective. This retains the requirement to establish standards for protective headgear. Hopefully this would mean the helmets people may elect to wear will be of the better constructed type. And, (2) repealing ORS 487.730. and we all know that one "Protective Headgear Required" - 'nuff said?

This bill is now before the House Transportation Committee - this is where most of you come in. We need to convince these seven people to mass this bill to the House floor for a vote. If it does not mass from committee, it's all over! Now, later on, if we get this bill out of committee, we'll have to write all of our lawmakers but for the time being let's concentrate on the committee members, as listed below. Note Mr. Starr, one of the principal sponsors, is on the committee.





#### STATE MEDICAL REPORT SOON

Word comes in the form of a letter to "Doc" Laffoon that the State Medical Examiners office will soon complete an in-depth study on motorcycle fatalities. Fatal accidents for a period of three years prior to the bassage of the m/c helmet law and three years after the law was in effect. All fatal injuries will be reviewed in such a manner so the examiners will not know whether the injured was wearing a helmet or whether the death occured before or after the law was bassed. We will have access to the results of this study and will bass on the results as soon as the re made available to us.

Fact 1 — Georgia was the first state to enact a mandatory helmet law. Although enacted in 1962, it was not enforced until 1968.

Fact 2 -- Georgia has not enacted any other motorcycle safety laws.

Fact 3 - Accident ratios remain constant.

Fact 4 - Fatality ratios remain constant.

CONCLUSION: Compulsory helmet laws have not reduced fatality ratios in Georgia. Unlike other states which have embarked upon over-all safety campaigns, Georgia's accident ratio remains virtually unchanged.

DATA SOURCE: Dept. of Public Safety.

I have gathered similar information from many other states and the results are identical: mandatory helmet laws, in themselves, do not reduce motorcycle accidents nor do they reduce the number of injuries and fatalities resulting from motorcycle accidents. To the contrary, there is some reason to believe that the wearing of helmets increases the rate of both accidents and injuries, including fatal injuries.

### SOME THEORIES REFUTED

During, California's unsuccessful attempt to enact a mandatory helmet law in 1972, the Highway Patrol introduced many state-

STATEMENT: Although the fatal accident rate per 10,000

registrations have increased 148%.

registered passenger vehicles has been slowly decreasing since 1965, the fatal accident rate for motorcycles has remained at a level 200%

while the motorcycle population has risen

above the rate for all passenger vehicles.

COMMENT: The fatal accident rate for automobiles has

decreased from 0.07% to 0.05%, or a net reduction of 2/100 of 1 percent. The fatal accident rate for motorcycles has decreased from 0.10% to 0.07%, or a net reduction of

3/100 of 1 percent.

The California Highway Patrol's statements appeared valid on the surface and it was not until all of the statistics could be gathered and examined logically that any sort of rebuttal could be made But when these statistics were examined impartially, some interesting and heretofore unknown facts emerged.

Contrary to what we may have thought in the past, it would now appear that not only is motorcycling practically as safe as operating an automobile, but California has made better strides is reducing motorcycle accidents, injuries and fatalities than it has with automobiles: even without mandatory helmet laws, eye protection laws and headlight laws.

#### **UNSAFE HELMETS**

If things weren't bad enough, the government recently discovere that most of the helmets they are forcing motorcyclists to wea

won't even pass a minimal safety test. The following is quoted from the U.S. Department of Transportation News, dated October 12th, 1972:

"Almost 90 percent of the motorcycle helmets tested for the Government failed to meet the performance requirements set by industry specifications, the Department of Transportation announced today.

"The Department's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) said that 74 tests of 54 different model helmets showed that only eight complied with the standard set by the industry's American National Standards Institute. The tests were conducted by Dayton T. Brown, an independent laboratory."

One of the unfortunate facts of the whole helmet controversy is that almost everyone, including the motorcyclist, has the mistaken notion that a motorcyclist's head is indestructible once encased in a helmet. Although protected somewhat, his head is far from being considered indestructible. To many people's surprise, a helmet is only designed to withstand a 13 or 14 mph impact. Perhaps now we can understand why even the motorcycle helmet industry does not support mandatory helmet laws.

#### CONSTITUTIONALITY AND DISCRIMINATION

Throughout the U.S., there have been more than 45 attempts to repeal mandatory helmet laws on the basis that such a law is discriminatory or unconstitutional. These same arguments have been used, mostly without success, to defeat such laws in the proposal state. While we do not deny that such laws appear unconstitutional or discriminatory from the motorcyclist's outlook, it appears that such arguments are not in themselves sufficient to forestall such legislation.

In California where mandatory helmet legislation has been defeat-

ed four times, the answer seems to be in making legislators aware that there is a distinct possibility that helmets take more lives than they save. That argument, based upon the foregoing statistics, stopped California's 1972 attempt at a mandatory helmet law in the Senate Transportation Committee. Previously with only constitutionality and discrimination voiced as a rebuttal to the proposed law, it had breezed through the Assembly (or House). When later heard before the Senate Transportation Committee with the added argument of "Let the motorcyclist make up his own mind as to how he wants to die!" the bill failed to receive one single vote for passage.

If there is a question of constitutionality to be raised at all, it can be with regard to being placed in jeopardy. And motorcyclists must first convince the legislatures and courts that their lives are being placed in jeopardy when they are forced to don a helmet. The statistics contained in this article should be sufficient to create that type of defense. If government, either state or federal, doubts the authenticity of such statistics, then let them research the records of coroners and medical examiners. Let them prove to us, with honest and straightforward data, that helmets do save lives. That is all that we have ever asked them to do. . from the start.

- 1. Do know your legislators full name. Spell it correctly.
- 2. Do inform yourself about the measure of concern to you. Know what you are talking about.
- 3. Do use plain stationery or personal stationery. If you are writing as the representative of a group, use organization stationery.
- 4. Do use first class mail.
- 5. Do let the legislator know how a particular measure will affect your locality his own home district.
- 6. Do be concise.
- 7. Do be complete enough to give pertinent reasons and facts.
- 8. Do be sincere.
- 9. Do he courteous always.
- 10. Do clearly identify the bill, using the title and number, if poss.
- 11. Do follow through. Let your legislator know you are watching his record with deep interest.
- 12. Do write a letter of appreciation whenever your legislator does something that meets your approval.

#### DON'TS

- 1. Don't guess at the spelling of your legislators name or initials.
- 2. Don't guess at facts or base your letters on rumors.
- 3. Don't use mimeographed letters or printed postcards; they give no evidence that you can think for yourself.
- 4. Don't use form letters under any circumstances.
- 5. Don't limit yourself to generalities.
- 6. Don't be wordy.
- 7. Don't leave out essential details.
- 8. Don't use insincere flattery or flowery terms.
- 9. Don't use threats ever!
- 10. Don't get mixed up on the name, the number, or the contents of the bill.
- 11. Don't write letters of criticism or request only.
- 12. Don't forget to write a thank you letter.

You have heard and read that since the mandatory helmet law was introduced, that deaths due to BROKEN NECKS, have increased. But did you know they have increased over 118% ???

That's right over 118%. This is mainly due to the extra weight your head is not accustomed to. A sudden snap or jar can break your neck.

487.705 Unlawful motorcycles operation. (1) A person operating a motorcycle commits the offense of unlawful motorcycle operation if he:

(a) Fails to sit on a permanent and regular seat, attached to the

motorcvcle:

Carries a person on a motorcycle who is not seated on a per-(b) manent and regular seat, if the motorcycle is designed to carry more than one person, or upon another seat attached to the motorcycle at the rear or side of the operators seat;

(c) Fails to sit astride the motorcycle seat facing forward and

with one leg on each side of the motorcycle;
(d) Carries a package, bundle or other article which prevents him from keeping both hands on the handlebars;

(e) Carries a person in a position that interferes with the oper-

ation or control of the motorcycle or the operators view; or

(f) Carries a person, other than in a sidecar or inclosed cab, on a motorcycle with no footrests for that person.

(2) Unlawful motorcycle operation is a Class B traffic infraction.

487.710 Required position of equiptment. (1) No person shall drive any two-wheel motorcycle equipped with handlebars so positioned that the hands of the driver, when upon the grips, are at or above his shoulder height when sitting astride the seat.

(2) A person who violates subsection !1) of this section commits

a Class C traffic infraction.

487.715 Motorcyclist's right to full traffic lane. (1) A person operating a motorcycle on a roaway has the right to full use of a lane thereof.

Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, persons may (2)

operate motorcycles two abreast in a single lane.

(3) A driver commits the offense of depriving a motorcyclist of traffic lane if he drives his motor vehicle on a roadway laned for traffic in a manner that prevents a motorcyclist from full use of a lane.

(4) Depriving a motorcyclist of traffic lane is a Class B traffic

infraction.

487.720 Unlawful passing or moving in lane with vehicle. motorcycle operator commits the offense of unlawful passing if he:

(a) Overtakes and passes in the same lane occupied by the vehicle he is overtaking, unless the vehicle he is overtaking is another motorcycle: or


(b) Operates a motorcycle between lanes of traffic or between ad-

jacent lines or rows of vehicles.

(2) Subsection (1) of this section does not apply to a police officer in the performance of his official duties.

(3) A motorcycle operator who unlawfully passes commits a Class 3 +raffic infraction.





487.730 Protective headgear required. (1) A person commits the offense of failure to wear protective headgear if he fails to wear protective headgear of a type approved by the Motor Vehicles Division while he operates or rides on a motorcycle.

(2) This section does not apply to any person who is either within an enclosed cab or is operating or riding on a vehicle designed to travel with three wheels in contact with the ground at speeds of less than

15 miles per hour.

(3) Failure to wear protective headgear is a Class C traffic infraction.

487.735 <u>Division to establish standards for protective headgear</u>.
(1) The Motor Vehicles Division shall:

- (a) Set up a procedure, similar to the procedure provided by ORS 483.482 and 483.488, which will be followed for approval of protective headgear.
- (b) Establish standards for safe protective headgear to be worn by persons operating or riding on motorcycles as required by subsection (1) of ORS 487.730.
- (2) Standards established by the division under this section shall conform, in so far as practicable, to the safety standards for such headgear issued by the Federal Government, and to the extent there are no such federal standards, to the safety standards promlgated by the United States of American Standards Institute.
- 487.740 Motorcycle head lamps required to be on. (1) Subject to the specific exceptions with respect to parked vehicle, lighted lamps and illuminated devices as specified in ORS 483.492 to 483.442 shall be displayed by every motorcycle upon a highway at all times.

(2) Failure to display lighted head lamp on a motorcycle at all

times is a Class C traffic infraction.

487.410 Signals by hand and arm or by signal lamps. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, a driver shall give a stop or turn signal by activating signal lamps as described in ORS 487.415

(2) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, a driver shall give a stop or turn signal either by means of signal lamps or by means of the hand and arm if:

- (a) He is driving only in daylight hours between a half -hour before sunrise until a half-hour after sunset and there is sufficient light to discern clearly persons and vehicles at a distance of 1,000 feet ahead; and... ((h) does not apply)
- (3) A driver who fails to give a stop or turn signal by activating signal lamps in violation of subsection (1) of this section commits a Class C traffic infraction.
- 487.475 Fuel conservation maximum speed limit. (1) Whenever the Oregon Transportation Commission determines that there is a need to conserve fuel because of current or imminent fuel shortages, and further that limiting the maximum speeds of vehicles will conserve motor fuel, the Department of Transportation is authorized to fix a maximum speed of not more than 55 miles per hour upon all highways within the state. A maximum speed limit so set shall not be subject to the provisions of ORS 487.465, except where a special hazard or condition exists that requires a lower speed for compliance with ORS 487.465. The maximum speed limit shall also not be subject to ORS 487.480,487.490 or 487.510.

(2) Violation of a fuel consevation maximum speed limit is a





Here are some statistics that should get some strange reactions from your legislator.

It is a comparison of states with similar motorcycling density, and climates.

The national average cyclist death rate, as of 9/75 was 8.16% per 10,000 registered motorcycles. Below is the comparison of states using their individual state percentage rates during that same period.

California: 7.78% (no helmet law) Kind of strange ain't it? I mean (helmet law) it's odd that the states with no Florida: 10.17% helmet law seems to have a better 9.18% (no helmet law) Illinois: record than those with the law. (helmet law) New York: 13.73% Not only that, but two of the three 5.03% (no helmet law) were lower than the national rate Utah: (helmet law) average. Georgia:

P.S. At that time these were the only three states that did not have a helmet law.

#### CALIFORNIA REPORT 1975:

The fatality ratio from 1971-75 is 2.79% per 100 motorcycle accidents, with no helmet law.

The national average per 100 motorcycle accidents, during the same time span was 5.12% ---mostly states with helmet laws.

We ended up with eleven letters and it only took a couple of hours All you people who do write, take all the necessary things to your friends and get them started.


We got our bill, now we need to let our legislators know what we want.

## LEGISLATORS RESPONSE

These responses are offered as a guide line - an inside look at where your lawmakers are coming from. We ask everyone who receives a reply, be it pro, con, or middle of the road, to furnish us with a copy so that we may share it with all the members. If you don't have access to a means of reproduction, send the original, we'll copy and return it shortly.

Most of the replies were received by David Thierolf, Ray Payton, Greg Schab, and Jerry Graham. In some cases all four received an answer.

From Stephen Kafoury, " I am in favor of repeal. I hope you will continue to keep me informed of your concerns on other issues".

Rep. Lloyd Kinsey writes..." I cannot give you a firm statement of my position....need of further study....will consider your views".

Tony Meeker says..."..have mixed emotions.....am interested in hearing testimony and not comment until I do".

Philip Lang supported the helmet law when it was passed. "...I did so on the basis of documented traffic safety information and because the exposure of a cyclist to injury, when he is not wearing a helmet submits the rest of society to serious potential financial penalties.

However, a possible composite has been suggested, which makes some sense to me. It provides that a cyclist's medical payments insurance coverage would be limited in the event of head injury to those cases where a helmet was worn. In addition, defendants sued by a motorcyclist would be given similar protection.

In this way, freedom of choice would be allowed and no one but non-helmet-wearing cyclist would be required to underwrite the additional risk involved!

(This Rep. would seem to have us all lying out in the street bleeding to death after "some little 'ol lady pulled in front of usbut officer, I didn't see the motorcycle" trip just because we weren't wearing our "protective headgear" I think we'd better all educate him.)

There's more... we've a lot of work to do.

George Starr...." You'll be glad to know Ive a bill drafted to repeal the mandatory helmet law".

Senator Heard straddles the fence...." I will be looking at both sides of the question quite closely before making a final decision".

Rep. Jim Chrest writes...." There are many good arguements on both sides of the question.... I know of several people personally who have had accidents, some of whom were wearing helmets and some who were not. Everyone said that the helmet was a factor in their either not receiving severe head injuries or, if not wearing one, the lack of the helmet caused them to received injuries they fell tiey would not have otherwise incurred.

I have talked to bike riders over the years about the issue and am aware of some of the problems of excessive heat, poor visibility, etc. I am not at this time prepared to say whether or not I will vote for repeal.

I am not trying to dodge the issue. I just don't know at this time how I would vote. I apologize for not being more concise. Once again thanks for your interest. I will keep your opinion in mind when the time comes."

Senator Dick Groener is... "very much in favor of this law. I have a son alive and well because he was wearing a helmet at the time of a motorcycle accident. The helmet was severely damaged. The doctor said, "you can be very thankful for the helmet or your son would be dead or left with severe brain damage".

I would never, under any circumstances, vote to repeal the helmet

law.

(Now that seems to be a hard line to take - I'm not quite sure this is representation of the people)

Senator Cook makes one feel better with..." I will be happy to sponsor a bill repealing the helmet law..." ( Thank you, Senator)

Jan Wyers, Senator from District Six, in a rather long letter, at first seemed quite pro-helmet but in a later hand written addition, went on to say..." I want to learn more about injuries and costs. If helmets actually don't save lives or mitigate injuries, then they should not be required."

Senator Mike Thorne says..." I agree with your position and would support the repeal of the helmet law".

As this list grew so did that of those members receiving repliesadd to those already mentioned the names of Ron Caswell, Chairman of Indian Creek Chapter( previously known as LaGrande), and John Pesciallo of Milton-Freewater. Thank you Gentlemen. Where's YOURS?


