


COORDINATOR'S CORNER



State Board Meeting Minutes

April 8, 1995

Meeting was called to order at Lane Co. Community College at 12:22 by Coordinator Rotten Roger. Minutes were read with no corrections. There were 10 chapters in attendance with 5 not present. All chapters present were in compliance with rules of operation.

Coordinators comments -- Has FAX machine running with the number of 503-286-5830. Things are moving along well legislatively. The legislative buddy system is working very well. We got a hearing for HR3419, keep up the good work!

Correspondence--Gov. Advisory Committee meeting on April 13th in Woodburn.

Education Report-- Nic reports that 2 Motorcycle Awareness classes were given to 65 students. These classes were in Dalles High and Toledo. Nic will speak at the May awareness rally. OTSEA conventions going well and Nic had some bad info that was being spread from insurance people stopped and pulled out of circulation. Our info is being well received.

Legislative Report-- On the federal level there are now 157 co-sponsors for the repeal of the federal blackmail provisions in ISTEA. Keep pushing at the Federal level about what we want at the state level. Thanks to all who phoned or wrote about HR3419, it worked! Great job by Bob Avery who got info about the stall of HR3419...he had some help putting flyers all over the valley... Testimony is set for the hearing on Tuesday April 11, at 1 O'clock.

Membership Report-- Not present. Look for report in newsletter.

- 4. Foxcreek: Larry Bolton was invited to the meeting to present permits, applications, contracts and agreements between San Cemente Prod. and ABATE or any other agencies involved. Due to transportation problems Larry was unable to attend, nor was and paper work sent in to the board...Proposed letter to be sent from the Executive Board in the attempt to straighten up any misunderstandings...and for verification of information...



I talked with Butch Harbaugh, the Legislative Director for BikePAC, and he tells me we had **98 people and 48 scooters** in attendance. For a weekday I think we did very well. All aspects of the motorcycle world were represented, from Patch holders to Goldwings to dirt and off-road bikers.

Everybody acted like ladies and gentlemen. Hats and caps came off in the building and nobody left any territorial marks on the walls or in the shrubbery. Bikers are welcome in the Capitol building because now they

know, we are for the most part housebroken, have good manners, work for a living, and raise families just like the rest of the public. This is the kind of thing that gets us the respect we expect from our state legislators. By the time this is printed this same "Biker Day" will have been repeated on April 7th. Lets everybody try and be there.

Incidentally, when adjourned for lunch, most of us went to the Westside Station Restaurant in West Salem. What a lunch! I still don't believe the low prices, not to mention the amount, and quality of the food. When you're down that way be sure and try them out. They are located to the immediate left, off the west end of the bridge, at 610 Edgewater NW.During the evening of March 18th I was privileged to participate in the annual

pledge drive for OPB (Oregon Public Broadcasting) TV by the GWRRA (Gold Wing Road Riders Assn). another great idea by Arletta Harrison of GWRRA Chapter "I" Oregon City. We handled the phone lines and took pledges to help this valuable tool for education stay on the air. Needless to say we had a great time, and raised \$28,000.00 while we were at it. VITAL STATISTICS...

From NHTSA (National Highway Transportation Safety Administration) NATIONAL STATISTICS that should bother us all enough to want to do something about it. In 1992 motorcycles made up just 2% of all registered vehicles in the United States and accounted for only 0.5% of vehicle miles traveled. Motorcycles were involved in only 1% of all policereported traffic crashes, but they accounted for 7% of all occupant fatalities and 6% of total traffic fatalities. This was even though there were 15% fewer motorcyclist fatalities than reported in 1991. The good news is this was the largest decrease in fatalities in all vehicle categories. Statistically: of the five most dangerous states for bikers only one is a helmet state. know we can do better than that with rider education and driver awareness programs across the country.

BikePAC Meeting Minutes April 1, 1995

The meeting was called to order at 6:15. There was a great turnout at this first meeting in Salem so we did a round of intros.

Secretary/Treasurer/Membership Reports

Cindy read a synopsis of the last meeting's minutes. Steve reported that we have \$4,533.27 in the legislative/general fund and \$227.51 in the "contributions to candidates" fund. He also said we currently have 497 members. Brian welcomed AMO back as a member of the Advisory Board. Oregon Legislative Report

Butch said that the next few weeks are critical in our success with this year's legislation session. Two of our bills have a hearing on April 11 at 1:00 in Room 357 of the Capitol. One is HB-3421 which allows a medical exemption from wearing a helmet. The other is HB-3422 which has been "gutted and stuffed" (which means it was completely changed from the original version) and now includes an easy-to-understand description of a legal helmet and the reduction of non-compliance penalties from Class C to Class D making it the same as not wearing a seatbelt. It is very important that we get as many people to this hearing as possible.

Rep. Cedric Hayden has not scheduled our helmet-repeal bill (HB3419) for a hearing despite our many phone calls. We are concentrating on stepping up grass roots pressure on Rep. Hayden (seeking out motorcyclists who living in his district and having them call his office) as well as looking for help from other legislators, including Rep. Tiernan, who is chair of the Government Committee Transportation Subcommittee is part of this committee). Phone and FAX tree has been in operation and getting mixed results: it is working in some areas and has problems in others. When it works it is VERY EFFECTIVE! Butch reported that we got lots of compliments for our April 17 Bikers' Day at the Capitol. The visitor's center said that we were the best organized group she has seen this year. The people who work in the "bill room" said they had never had so many requests for copies of the same bills. They put together packets so they'd be ready for people when they came in. Oregon State Police also told Butch that they were impressed with our group.

We need lots of people at our next Bikers' Day on April 7.....we have never been this close to regaining our freedom of choice. It's time to act. Walk the hallways while you're there. Go visit your legislators. If they are not in, talk to their staff and share our message with them.

COMAC (Central Oregon Motorcycle and ATV Club) has expressed interest in joining BikePAC.

What's next? After the hearing, we'll want to convince the Transportation Sub-committee to vote to send our bills on to the General Government Committee with a "do pass" recommendation. Then we'll have to convince everyone on the floor of the House of Representatives to vote in favor - this means your representative needs to know how you want him or her to vote!

When a bill passes the House, it goes to the Senate where we start the process again in a committee. And all of this needs to happen by June 30 when the legislature hopes to be done for the year. We have strong support on the Senate side with Senator Joan Dukes and others on the Transportation Committee.

Some great news....for years we have been trying to get a way of designating motorcycles for handicapped parking spots. It just doesn't work to hang a placard on your bike. Well, success at last...you can now go to the DMV and get a sticker for your license plate. If you experience ANY difficulty with this contact Butch immediately. Field offices outside of Salem may not be prepared to issue you a sticker, but can be helped along.

We need more Legislative Buddies. We need more phone calls, letters, and visits to our legislators.

Rep. Carolyn Oakley was endorsed in the last election by BikePAC. This was as a result of answers to our questions that indicated she was a supporter of ours. Now she is not being supportive. If you live in District 36 (Albany, Tangent, Millersburg), call her office and aske for her support for our bills.

Butch thanked Daryl and Cliff from the Salem Chapter of ABATE for helping him distribute information around the state. And special thanks to Daryl for visiting the Capitol two times a week for the past few weeks.

Federal Legislative Report

Brian reported that HR.899 has 137 co-sponsors as of a week ago and they're adding between 9 and 13 co-sponsors every week....great news. Let's send another round of letters to Senators Packwook and Hatfield to support the Senate version S.388 and a letter to Reps. Wyden, DeFazio, and Bunn to support HR.899. Just like at the state level, keeping up the grassroots pressure will get us results. Representatives Cooley and Furse are already signed on so you might want to write and thank them. These bills will become part of the National Highway Transportation Act which MUST be passed by September 30 so the time is ripe on the federal level, too.

Mary Beth suggested we send another round of folks to Washington, DC. Brian will discuss the national strategy with the

MRF.

Brian and Mary Beth reported on the success we've had with Rep. Wyden's office. They got us a copy of the budget for the state's transportation safety money that they receive from the federal government. Oregon has budgeted \$110,000 of federal 153 funds for 3,000 police overtime hours, with the goal of issuing 6,500 citations for seatbelt and helmet violations during 1995. Susie and Teresa will work on getting additional information about past years use of 153 funds.

New Business

UPDATE ON THE DOINGS IN SALEM

The April 7 Biker's Day was an even bigger success than the first. Attendance was about the same, but with many new faces. Our grassroots strategies are really making an impact on the capital. While we were sitting in the House Gallery watching floor procedings, we could see some activity happening in the chamber behind the Speaker's dais, and wondered what it might mean.

The tour group went to the Senate next, though Gallery and We were the Senate session disappointed that we soon adjourned we received astounding message. Rep. Hayden had decided to hear HB 3419 on April 11, and when Butch made the announcement we sure heard how the Biker's Day Bunch felt about it!

We had only a few days to spread the word, but by Tuesday noon we knew the phone tree, fax tree, and word of mouth tree had all been in high gear. When the hearing started, the room was full and we had filled three overflow areas in public areas of the Capitol as well. We estimate that more than 200 bikers had arrived to witness the procedings or offer testimony.

APRIL 11 HEARING ON HB 3419, 3421, 3422

Unfortunately, our bills were not scheduled to be heard right away. Rep. Hayden announced that work sessions and other bills would be first on the agenda, and our bills would probably not come up until after 3:00. At about three, the committee took a 15 minute break, and during that time many of the people in the

overflow areas left. That's too bad, because they missed the real show.

We had less than two hours to present testimony on three bills. HB 3422 was first, then HB 3419, with an interruption for HRB 3421. HB 3422

This bill originally was written to make it illegal for retailers to sell any helmet that did not meet the state's standards. Sen. Joan Dukes had offered a "gut and stuff" amendment that would throw out the original language and instead establish a new, clear, easy to understand definition of what qualifies as a helmet under Oregon law.

The committee discussed the original bill, and noted that amendments had been offered. Ed Marges, head of the Traffic Safety Section of the Oregon Department of (ODOT) submitted Transportation testimony a preliminary copy of a brochure that is being prepared by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). The brochure lists about 153 Highway helmet models that NHTSA tested during 1994, and whether they passed or failed. The list indicates that some helmets were subjected to full testing, but many were only tested under one or two conditions rather than the whole set of tests.

The committee discussed adding to the bill a requirement for ODOT to provide that list to all the dealers, then voted to move the original bill, with several amendments, to the full General Government Committee with a "do pass" recommendation. This would be a confusing law, since the amendments throw out the NHTSA standard and redefine a helmet in plain language, then refer to the NHTSA list as a way to determine what helmets were OK. That wouldn't be helpful, just confusing.

Since then, objections to the content of SB3422 have come from several sources, and we expect the bill will be sent back to the Subcommittee for reconsideration. Sen. Joan Dukes, who submitted the amendment, asked specifically that had restrictions on helmet sales be removed and replaced by a new definition of a helmet, and has written a letter objecting to the current wording of the bill. State police officers paid a visit to Walker's Cycle in Salem with a copy of the NHTSA list in hand, and found many helmets on the shelves were not included on the list. Dealers are unlikely to find the list to be helpful to their sales, since last year's helmet models are often this year's history. SB 3419

This is the bill that would amend Oregon's helmet laws to allow responsible adults freedom of choice in helmet use. By the time we got to this bill, only Rep. Hayden and Rep. Strobeck were left in the room. Reps. Markham and Roberts have already committed their support. Reps. Lehmann and Grisham are question marks. We

do not have any commitment from them about their position, and although they will receive the written documentation, both of them missed the impact that we made with

our spoken testimony.

BikePAC led off the testimony with 11 witnesses, each covering a different topic. Several additional witness followed, all testifying in favor of the bill. Toward the middle of the time period, Rep. Hayden recessed the hearing on HB 3419 convened a hearing on HB 3421, which would allow a medical exemption from helmet use. already allows a exemption from seat belt use, when in a is unsafe doctor's opinion it ar unrealistic for a patient to use a seat belt. This bill would give motorcyclists the same consideration. After testimony was complete on HB 3421, we went back to 3419 and finished the testimony at exactly 5:00 p.m.

Testimony covered the following topics:

INTRODUCTION AND GENERAL SUMMARY of what witnesses were going to present. (Butch

Harbaugh)

ENFORCEMENT AS HARASSMENT - The helmet law is used as an excuse to stop motorcyclists for questioning or inspection, when there is no other cause. Motorcyclists are treated with disrespect, or even as though they have committed a felony crime by wearing a helmet that an officer thinks might not be approved. (Spencer Neal, Cliff

Tennant, Daryl Orpilla)
SOCIAL BURDEN THEORY - Motorcyclists are citizens, as far as income, employment, education, etc. When they are involved in an accident, their medical bills average the same costs as for other trauma victims. Helmet use or non-use does not figure significantly in total injury severity or medical costs. (Judd Whitcher) HOW MOTORCYCLISTS SERVE THEIR COMMUNITY by being active in service projects (such as food drives, charity fund raisers, etc) and how the law targets motorcyclists for discrimination based on appearance. (Kenny

FEDERAL REGULATIONS REGARDING 402 FUNDS, and what would happen to traffic safety funding if Oregon chooses to modify the helmet law to allow freedom of choice for adults. (Brian Stovall)

FATALITY RATES PER ACCIDENT, USE OF FEDERAL 153 FUNDS TO PAY FOR POLICE OVERTIME ENFORCEMENT OF SEAT BELT AND HELMET LAWS, AND OREGON'S INABILITY TO COLLECT AND ANALYZE ACCIDENT DATA TO DESIGN SAFETY PROGRAMS - ODOT and NHTSA present only the kinds of statistics that look good. Total numbers of registrations, accidents, and deaths are declining but the relationship between deaths and accidents is rising. ODOT is in the fourth year of using federal 153 funds to pay police overtime hours, with the goal of writing a certain number of seat belt and helmet tickets. The 1993

and 1994 Highway Safety Plans included, YEAR, 7000 hours οf enforcement with goals of 15,000 tickets for seat belt and helmet violations. The 1995 plan is 3000 hours and 6,500 tickets. And finally, ODOT itself admits it doesn't have the ability to collect and analyse traffic accident data with sufficient accuracy to design and evaluate its own traffic safety programs. So all this discussion of statistics and how effective the helmet law has been, is based on incomplete and inaccurate data. (Teresa

MOTORCYCLISTS EXPERIENCES IN THE COURTS - How confusing the law has been for riders, police, and judges, and how impossible it is for anyone to use FMVSS 218 as an enforcement standard. (Sam Hochberg)

AN EMT SPEAKS UP - An experienced EMT, who is a motorcyclist, testified that in the many motorcycle accidents, injuries that affect parts of the body below the head are frequently the worst, and presence or absence of a helmet law will not affect that reality.

Sturm, Ruger discriminates against motorcyclists

The American Motorcyclist Association (AMA) and a growing number of individual motorcyclists have mounted a grassroots program to combat discriminatory health-care policies of Sturm, Ruger and Company, a major firearms manufacturer based in the Northeast.

The AMA-backed program, entitled "Riding Ruger," is intended to pressure Sturm, Ruger into changing a corporate policy, implemented last year, which denies health-care coverage to employees who are injured while riding motorcycles without a helmet.

A series of motorcyclist initiatives and letter-writing campaigns were mounted in an effort to point out the discriminatory nature of the Sturm, Ruger policy. Motorcyclists have pointed out, among other things, that the two states where Ruger maintains offices do not require adult motorcyclists to wear helmets; that the company's requirement for its motorcycling employees to wear helmets interferes in their right to engage in legal activities while away from the workplace; and that the company has no similar policy regarding scatbelt use for motorists.

All efforts to date have failed to convince the company to reconsider its policy, however, and company president William Ruger Jr., has made it clear that he does not answer to the countless motorcyclists who have written him about the policy.

Ruger is technically correct that he does not answer to all motorcyclists. But Sturm, Ruger is a publicly held company, and its officers do answer to shareholders. That is the inspiration behind

the "Riding Ruger" campaign conceived by a group of motorcycling activists.

The cornerstone of "Riding Ruger" is a call for all interested motorcyclists

to purchase shares of Sturm, Ruger stock, then attend the upcoming annual stockholders' meeting to challenge the company's discriminatory policy.

A number of motorcyclists have purchased shares, and several made plans to attend the

shareholders meeting in Phoenix. Then, for no apparent reason, Ruger announced that the meeting's date and location would be changed. Ruger has now announced that the meeting will be held in Westport, Connecticut, on April 25, but company officials say that the new date and location remain tentative.

"Sturm, Ruger likely believes that by moving up the date many new share-holders will not be able to change travel plans or purchase shares of stock by the required 45-day period before the share-holders meeting," stated Robert Rasor, Vice President of AMA Government Relations. "But Bill Ruger should be aware that plans are already being made to attend the meeting in Westport. And those motorcyclists who cannot make it can call the AMA's Government Relations Department to assign their voting rights to another motorcyclist who will be in attendance.

"If Mr. Ruger believes that he can reduce the turnout at the meeting by moving up the date that stock must be purchased," Rasor added, "he sadly underestimates the commitment motorcyclists have to reversing this form of discrimination. We are in this for the long haul. If the issue isn't resolved at the upcoming shareholders meeting, those who were unable to purchase stock in time for this year's meeting will be

eagerly awaiting their invitations to next year's."

Shares in Sturm, Ruger are currently trading for approximately \$30 on the New York Stock Exchange under the symbol RGR.

and U.S. Forest Service kick off new OHV program

The American Motorcyclist Association (AMA) has signed a landmark agreement with U.S. Forest Service officials that will give trail-riding enthusiasts more chances than ever to get involved in creating and preserving offroad recreational opportunities nationwide.

The agreement calls for the formation of the Rider Watch Volunteer Project, which will build upon past cooperative projects between the AMA and the U.S. Forest Service. Plans are already under way to establish a national database at AMA headquarters that will connect trail-riding enthusiasts with clubs and organizations working to improve riding opportunities.

At the same time, the AMA's Government Relations Department has been busy updating the Association's highly respected guide to trail construction and maintenance, and assembling additional resource materials, including a

compilation of ideas for volunteer projects.

The program will work by putting trail-riding volunteers in touch with local Forest Service officials to plan ways to enhance off-road riding opportunities. The volunteers will then be able to contribute their work as part of a cost-share agreement to get projects completed. In addition to the rewards of more trails and improved trail maintenance, the program offers other incentives for participating clubs.

"I'm excited about the new Rider Watch Volunteer Project," notes project administrator Eric Lundquist, legislative affairs specialist for the AMA's Government Relations Department. "It breathes new life into our trail-riding programs and enables the off-highway community to become more involved with the Forest Service in improving their riding opportunities."

Maher joins AMA's team of freedom fighters

Sean Maher of Columbus, Ohio, has joined the staff of the American Motor-cyclist Association (AMA) Government Relations Department in the position of legislative affairs specialist. Maher's primary responsibility will be to respond to road-related motorcycle legislation and regulatory issues at the state level.

Maher recently graduated from Ohio State University with a bachelor of arts degree in political science. He brings to the Association a diverse background that includes several years in political and economic research in the public sector as well as a four-year stint as an intelligence analyst for the U.S. Army.

"We're excited to have Sean on board," stated Robert Rasor, AMA vice president of government relations. "He is an avid motorcycle enthusiast who brings enthusiasm and a strong analytical background to the department. His skills will complement the strengths of other staff members and allow him to make an immediate contribution to the Association."

Supporting the Spartanburg lawsuit

Ever since the announcement of the lawsuit in South Carolina addressing the violation of motorcyclists civil rights by police authorities at a Red Cross charity event last fall, unsolicited donations have been flooding into the American Motorcyclist Association's Government Relations Department. The AMA, along with the South Carolina American Civil Liberties Union, initiated the lawsuit after South Carolina law enforcement officials had indicated that they intend to conduct searches and seizures similar to their actions at Spartanburg at other motorcycling events in the future.

Without any prompting, concerned motorcyclists who wanted to ensure that riders civil rights were not violated in the future began sending the AMA's Government Relations Department checks and money orders to help cover the cost of the class-action lawsuit against the authorities involved.

"It is not unusual for motorcyclists to help financially support an effort they feel is important to motorcycling's future," said Robert Rasor, vice president of AMA government relations.

"But it is the first time that I can remember people sending in donations to support a cause without any prompting on our part. The riders who are sending these donations just decided that they had to weigh in on this issue and we will keep forwarding all donations to the law firm handling our case in South Carolina."

Hearings held on state helmet law mandates

Support for legislation to eliminate penalties for states failing to enact mandatory helmet laws is increasing on Capitol Hill.

A key hearing was held in the nation's capital on March 1 by the Subcommittee on Surface Transportation to discuss legislation approving the National Highway System Act and its many related issues, including helmet use

mandates. The legislation, H.R. 899, is sponsored by Rep. Don Young (R-AK), and currently has 114 co-sponsors.

Those testifying at the hearing included Republican Sen. Ben Nighthorse Campbell of Colorado, who is in favor of repealing the section of the legislation regarding penalties on states without mandatory helmet laws; and Republican Sen. Olympia Snowe of Maine, who introduced similar legislation as a member of the House of Representatives before gaining her U.S. Senate seat last fall.

Also lending their support to the legislation were State Sen. Beverly Fawell, chairman of the Illinois Senate Transportation Committee; and State Representative Sherman Packard of the New Hampshire House Transportation Committee, a founder of the New Hampshire Motorcyclist Rights Organization. Also present was Rep. Scott Klug (R-WI), sponsor of H.R. 607, another bill which calls for repealing federal mandates tied to transportation issues.

The Surface Transportation Subcommittee is expected to mark up the National Highway System Act in the early spring.

Wyoming establishes motorcycle safety education program

Wyoming has become the 44th state to provide its resident motorcyclists with a state-administered motorcycle safety education program.

Wyoming Gov. Jim Geringer recently signed the legislation, H.B. 313, into law, ensuring that motorcyclists in the state can receive the safety training they need.

Some details remain to be ironed out, but the new rider education program should be ready for implementation in the near future.

Only six states remain without state-administered motorcycle safety education programs--Alaska, Arkansas, Mississippi, Missouri, New York and Oklahoma. However, Alaska, Missouri, New York and Oklahoma currently have legislation pending to establish these types of programs.





THE BILL OF RIGHTS

Article I

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or of the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

Article II

A well regulated Militia, being hecessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be apprecied in time of war, but in a manyer to be prescribe by law without the consent of the Owner, nor in

s papers, who ffects, against unreasonable allow shall issuer but upon probable cause, the place to be searched, and the persons The right of the people to be secure in their persons, to say searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warre supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the or things to be seized.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or objective infamous crime, unless in a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; he shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limh; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liherty, or property, without the process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

Article VI

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of Counsel for his defence.

Article VII

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United states, than according to the rules of the common law.

Article VIII

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and umusual punishments inflicted.

Article IX


The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

Article X

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

This day began with a trip to Kinkos to copy flyers that Teresa put together for distribution in Rep. Haydens district. I met Dary Orpilla and Cliff Tennant at the Capitol to plan the attack so to speak, they took oft from the Capitol to passout this info to every telephone pole, restaurant, tavern and any other likely place that would attract attention to the issue it worked cause by the time I returned home there were already phone messages from people asking what they could do. . WAY TO GO FREEDOM FIGHTERS. .. also sat down with Tweedt again to discuss agenda alsopassed out information through out the capitol.

4-6-95

B.S. composed a letter to Rep. Bob Tiernan to request that He intervene in our behalf because of Mr. Haydens refusal to schedule a hearing... this letter was hand delivered to His aid who assured us that Mr. Tiernan was supportive of our issues and would see that he got the message. Also dropped off a letter to the Speaker of the House Rep. Rev Clarno asking for Her help. Met with Rep. Roberts to bring him up to date and ask for advice... verified with Visitor Services and the Const. Dept. to verify parking for tomorrow's Lobby Day.

4-7-95

BIKER LOBBY DAYS #2 is here and we are ready for the "Really Big Show" the weather is not as good as we would like but none the less the Freedom Fighters begin to show up in the rain to show there support. This day began with Mr. Haydens staff telling me that he was not going to schedule a hearing so we began to send everyone to his office to ask him why????? . Well we began the tour as scheduled and as we were on the House Gallery my pager went off with a msg. from Anne Tweedt telling me to come to her office.... I proceeded to see her and was very happy to hear from her that we were now on the schedule for HB# 3419,3421,3422 I could hardly contain myself...just another example of how successful our efforts being....PERSISTENCE has really paid off....I caught up with the group in the Senate Gallery;

while Sen. Randy Leonard was taking questions from the group, He assured them that He was a Motorcyclist himself and that he supported our efforts. Bob Avery of the Willamette Chapter asked Him how we were going to get theChairman of the Committee to move on giving us a hearing I interrupted the good Senator and asked to make announcement....I then proceeded to announce that Mr. Hayden had Caved into the pressure and had indeed scheduled a hearing... well my FRIENDS... the Jubilation and the ROAR that Followed was heard through-out the Capitol... GOOD WORK FREEDOM FIGHTERS.. What a day, everyone was excited and walked the halls of the Capitol to share the news and to talk to the Elected Officials and ask for their support 4-8-95

A meeting was called for at B.H.'s house to discuss the up-coming hearing and all persons that were scheduled to testify were present and we rehearsed for many hours what a pure show of dedication. . many thanks to all who participated

4-9-95

B.H. Teresa and Brian began the day with more discussion about our agenda with plans to fine tune it as time allowed. . .B.H. then went to the Salem Chapter meeting to up-date them and ask for support.

4-10-95

B.H. met with Administrator with a outline of Our testimony... it was to work passing out info and visiting with any and all who would listen and to ask for help in getting our side of the story told including Rep. Terry Thompson, Rep. Qutub, Rep. Markham and Rep. Roberts. I then proceeded to prepare my written testimony until the wee hours...

4-11-95

Well the day we have waited for is here and needless to say there was not much sleep to be had the night before. Some of us met early to discuss the plan and to fine tune our presentation it did not take long for the hour to arrive and by then we were up to three overflow rooms for the hearing. . . the agenda included several bills before ours and the tension grew minute by minute. . The ATV Helmet Bill was

upfirst and was met with the usual confusion but the sponsors seemed to satisfied. . . Our concern was that they would not suffer the same results as we the street riders have gotten to know. We also requested that the fine that was proposed would be changed to require education in lieu of a monetary fine... Time was beginning to become a factor and I was getting nervous but finally our time arrived. . .Rep. Roberts requested that HB#3422 be heard first because he had to go to another meeting this took us by surprise but we were prepared to deliver our message of how much Harassment there was present in this state being aimed toward us as a group... we were successful in getting our amendments added to the Bill which basically stated that Helmet is a Helmet is a Helmet and also to lower the Helmet Fine to a Class "D" infraction from a class "C".... Then it was time to get to HB.#3421, this Bill would provide a Medical Exemption from the required use of a Motorcycle Helmet, only one (1) person to testify which showed up disappointment...especially since we worked so hard to get a Hearing... Those folks who wouldhave been effected by this Bill needed to be there and voice there opinion. This did not happen and the bill usually died in committee. HB#3419 The Adult responsibility Bill went off really well, I understand that some PeopLe left before this Bill was heard and choose to go away feeling that we had gotten the SHAFT...THIS WAS NOT TRUE AND IS NOT THE CASE we were very well received and as it turned out, given a work session to determine the future of the Bill.

4-12-95

B.H. met with Anne Tweedt to discuss just how the bill and the hearing went. . . She felt that we did a good job and that we keep up the pressure on the committee also met with L.Roberts to discuss how things went. He was concerned with HB#3422 and how we were going to respond B.H. also met with the Video productions Dept at the Capitol to pick up a copy of the Hearing on video tape. .. They also gave BIKE PAC many compliments as to the quality of the presentation....

B.H. met with Rep. Grisham and Sen. Dukes to discuss the issues. it should be noted that anyone that is in Mr.Grisham's District needs speak with him as to just what his lob is as a Legislator. . .For surely does not know 4-14-95

B.S. meets with several Legislators to discuss how our agenda is going and to request their help in planning an agenda and also to track how our package is progressing. Met with Transportation Administrator in reference to the agenda of a upcoming work session.

4-17-95

Early A.M. mtgs. with Committee Members for the purpose of getting a commitment in case you've never dealt with a Politician, this is not an easy task...!!!!Met with Representatives Lehman, Grisham, Stroebeck, Roberts and Hayden we are definitely on the agenda for a work session on H.B.3419 & 3422. 4-18-95

B.H. met with Jack Fassel at the CapitoL to look at the questionnaire that committee Members sent back to BIKEPAC...it clearly shows that both Mr. Strobeck and Mr. Lehman said that they believe that a responsible adult should have a choice when it comes to personal safety.....Somewhere along the road to Salem they both threw that concept out the window you folks need to remind them of that and surely when it comes time for re-election... You might remind them just why Oregonians do not trust them!!!! Jack hand delivered their written responses to their offices in an attempt to wake them up.. B.H. was called into Sen. Dukes office ,She was quite concerned that we were working towards ending the HARASSMENT that the Police establishment has CLEARLY shown by the documented reports received by BIKEPAC. She called the Administrator of Oregon Traffic Safety to voice that concern and asked his help in getting HB # 3422 out of the Committee with a do-pass recommendation. He told her that he would but I decided to walk across the street to see him eye to eye. By the time I got there hehad already changed his mind because in his words he was concerned about being in compliance with the Federal Gov. We talked for awhile, both agreeing that indeed there was a

HARASSMENT Problem. After that I met with Mr. Cedric Havden to discuss our Bills, he agreed that HB# 3422 would go through the committee as we requested. After a meeting with the Committee Administer it was time to go to the work session, it's important to understand that most times the Committee does not take testimony, and is there to make a decision about the bill. After some confusion H.B.#3422 was passed with a do pass recommendation. Now to H.B.#3419 Rep.Lehman requested that the Bill have an amendment attached to it for a referral to the people in the form of a Ballot Measure, BIKEPAC was in objection to this but knew that it would give us some more time to try to get the full Committee to remove the referral language. Well that is where we are now....We must put the pressure on the Full Committee to do this....SO get those letters flying and those phones ringing to the General Government Committee. I will meet with the Chairman in the Morn, to discuss our options and plan the next step....In closing I would like to say THANK YOU to all the FREEDOM FIGHTERS that showed up for the Lobby Days and the Hearings....YOU have made a difference.... YOU have changed the opinions of a lot of people and now they see us as Motorcyclists in a different light.....FREEDOM is definitely not FREE as I'm sure you will agree. Well until the next report I thank you for your support.



ALCOHOL!!

Now we all know I have no objections to the use of alcohol and I've proven that in the past. However, here are some **STATISTICS** that are frightening.

According to the National Center for Statistics & Analysis (a department of NHTSA) this is what is happening to bikers:

Motorcycle operators involved in fatal crashes in 1992 had higher intoxication rates, with blood alcohol concentrations (BAC) of 0.10 grams per deciliter (g/dl) or greater, than ANY OTHER type of motor vehicle driver. Intoxication rates for vehicle operators involved in fatal crashes were 35.6% for motorcycles, 25.5% for light trucks 21.7% for passenger cars, and 1.4% for large trucks.

In 1992, 36.9% of all fatally injured motorcycle operators were intoxicated (BAC of 0.10 g/dl or greater). An additional 12.0 % had lower alcohol levels (BAC 0.01 to 0.09 g/dl). This is saying that 49 motorcycle deaths out of 100 were ALCOHOL related. The intoxication rate was highest for fatally injured operators between 30 and 34 years old. (52.9%) and somewhat lower for ages 35 to 39 (46.6%) and 25 to 29 (44.1%).

More than half (52.4%) of the 1,016 motorcycle operators who died in single-vehicle crashes in 1992 were intoxicated. (There are 537 DEAD RIDERS [in SINGLE-VEHICLE crashes alone] because they were drinking and driving motorcycles, that adds up to 10.7 DEATHS for every State in the Union) More than two-thirds (67.7%) of those killed on weekend nights were intoxicated.

In night crashes motorcycle operators killed were nearly 3 1/2 times as likely to be intoxicated as those killed in the day (51.4% and 15.4% respectively).


Now these figures are from 1992, (the latest available at this time) and of course in a few instances the fact that the rider was drinking may possibly have been unrelated to the cause of the accident. But generally, <u>any drinking</u> is documented to be enough to impair judgement, if not reflexes. If you lose some of that, you

are less of a defensive rider, and you are just as dead even if it is the other quy's fault.


It bothers me that all those brothers and sisters are DEAD, and more die each year, because they thought they weren't too drunk to ride. ANY AMOUNT OF BOOZE IS TOO MUCH to have in your system if you plan to ride a MOTORCYCLE even though, in Oregon at least, scooter people are the safest drivers on the highway.

These numbers should make you want to sit down and cry your eyes out. I DON'T KNOW HOW ELSE TO SAY IT: IF YOU ARE GOING TO DRINK, PLEASE, PLEASE, STAY OFF YOUR MOTORCYCLE. Have a friend take you home or stay where you are for the night. I don't want to go to your funeral. We already go to too many.




