# THE BILL OF RIGHTS

### Article I

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or of the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

### Article II

A well regulated Militia, being becessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infraged.

# A tiple III

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be apertered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manyer to be presocrated by law.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, to is a papers, who ffects, against unreasonable searches and seizures shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

No person shall be held to answer for a copital, or observise infamous crime, unless in a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases a sing in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; has shall any person be subject for me same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compalled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without the process of law: nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

### Article VI

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of Counsel for his defence.

### Article VII

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United states, than according to the rules of the common law.

# Article VIII

. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

### Article IX

The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

### Article X

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.





Well, that's all for this month. I hope I haven't left anything out. Take it easy and see you at the Portland chapters' Summer Run. Marty




Been out of town lately, missed a couple of meetings, and am a little behind on what's up.

# Greetings fellow soldiers,

This month I want to tell you about government impropriety and how to deal with it.

Upon arriving home from the Fossil Run, I was informed by a co-worker that a certain government agency (one which shall remain nameless to protect the idiots) issued a stop-work order that deemed a friend and I "Unacceptable to the Government" in regards to driving trucks on a certain contract. The reason for this was that we had been consuming beer while driving. Some background:

There is suspicion that the government agent who signed the stop-work order has been working in cahoots with a former employee to screw up this contract. So, seeing this coming last fall, I informed the contractor and another representative of this agency that I would no longer drive equipment for this contractor. Consequently, for nine months I have only worked for this contractor as a subcontractor doing mechanical and maintenance work.

Putting my name on this stop-work order was at least BS as well as slanderous and harassment. I was in Fossil when this BS came down, so how could I be involved? Being just a little unhappy about all this, I proceeded to the local office of this agency and informed the representative I had talked to previously and his supervisor that this was BS and I wanted this problem corrected and my name cleared immediately or I wanted to see their evidence against me. Neither of these two individuals were the ones who signed the stop-work order. Through two days of meetings I was told I was guilty by association, guilty without evidence, I had no right to due-process, it was no big deal, it didn't affect my reputation as a CDL driver, we can't do anything about it, and generally heard a bunch of placating BS. I hate being placated.

This was gutter politics and some of you know gutter politics is one of my favorite games. So I went above their heads, pleaded my case, insisted on due process, and may have hinted at law-suite occasionally. The heads above the heads did not like being drug into this and saw no reason why it had happened. Within two days my friend and I were deemed acceptable as safe drivers and the fecal matter flowed downhill as it's suppose to.

The point of this lengthy story is I learned to deal with government wrongdoing, sluggish public agencies and abuse of my civil rights through my work with ABATE of Oregon. Ten years ago I would not have known where to start. I would have been just another American controlled and had by big brother. Today I feel like a free American because I know my rights and how to enforce them. We all have this power within us and I want to thank all the people in ABATE, BikePAC, etc. for giving me this power. I hope you all can learn what I have, and someday use it to defend your rights as I have and together we can take back our state and our nation.

Next time someone asks what ABATE can do for me, perhaps you can refer them to my story. Chris Vieira

Coordinator's Comments: This last month has been very busy, from the energizing NCOM meeting, to the always fun but draining FOSSIL experience. The passing of our sister Angie is a great loss to our organization.

Correspondence: Letter regarding new "pat-down" searches in Florida. Letter regarding Police enforcement tactics during the Rhody Run. MRF press release.

# OFFICER'S REPORTS

Legislative Director: Looking for a motivated person to work at getting current trauma information from the Health Department. See Teresa or Brian if you are interested in helping with this. We are looking at scheduling at legislative retreat in early fall, to help plan legislative activities for next year. A suggestion was made that BikePAC form a "Roving campaign team" to attend and assist at certain political functions and to inspire others to contribute time.

On the Federal Level, the dust has settled, and all the main points that motorcyclists asked for in the new national transportation bill (now known as TEA 21, the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century) are part of the final legislation passed by Congress last month, which provides federal highway funding for state transportation projects for the next six years. 1. Language that prohibits banning motorcycles from roads designed, built or maintained with federal funding. 2. A provision to include motorcycles in the planning and development of the Intelligent Transportation System (ITS). 3. A change in the mission statement for the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) to include "accident prevention" (in contrast to current focus, which is heavy on "occupant protection".) 4. Language to prohibit NHTSA from lobbying state and local governments. Thanks to all who wrote or called their representatives, and Mel Yeager and John Ehmer deserve special thanks for their especially timely visit.

# Motorcyclists to Benefit Under New Federal Highway Bill

WESTERVILLE, Ohio -- The U.S. Congress has approved an omnibus transportation reauthorization bill containing several provisions that will benefit motorcyclists, reports the American Motorcyclist Association (AMA). The legislation will now be sent to President Clinton for his consideration. The president is expected to approve the bill.

legislation, titled Transportation Equity Act for the Twenty First Century (TEA 21), provides \$270 million for recreational trails over a six-year period; ensures motorcyclists needs are represented in development of the nation's Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) technology; curtails helmet-law lobbying efforts by National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) officials and directs the agency to focus on programs that will reduce motorcycle accidents. Additionally, TEA 21 ensures motorcycle access to all roads built with federal highway funds, thus assuring continued access to the growing number of high occupancy vehicle (HOV) lanes in many of the nation's urban transportation corridors.

"This legislation represents almost a complete victory for all motorcyclists," said Edward Moreland, AMA Washington representative.

"However, we would have preferred stronger language in the final version of the bill to ensure that NHTSA was out of the lobbying business altogether. Despite this one shortcoming, motorcyclists stand to benefit greatly from the enactment of the new highway bill.

"This victory is the direct result of the combined efforts of countless AMA members and other motorcyclist rights activists, working together with our counterparts at the Motorcycle Riders Foundation, to ensure that motorcyclists needs were taken into account during the drafting and subsequent passage of this legislation. Everyone who took the time to call, write, or visit their elected officials should be commended for their hard work."

The American Motorcyclist Association is a 220,000-member non-profit organization. Established in 1924, the Association's purpose is to pursue, protect, and promote the interests of motorcyclists, while serving the needs of its members. For more information, visit the AMA web site at;



I've asked this question over and over. I've asked it of members at ABATE meetings as their Legislative Coordinator. The same at PCOM meetings- same position. Years ago I wondered rhetorically as I stood in front of a platoon of unhappy draftees and starry eyed recruits. I still ask this question of anyone who vows to enter the fray whole heartedly, but somehow finds later there are sacrifices which must be made. There is a rather simple formula, ratio, whatever you wish to call it. A man's commitment to a given desire is directly proportional to the amount of sacrifice which he willingly undergoes in order to achieve that desire.

What is riding without a helmet worth to anyone in terms of sacrifice? The time it takes to make a phone call, write a letter or visit a legislator? Is it worth spending some free time in a campaign office an evening or two or is it worth giving up a day of vacation time to attend a rally? What about an entire week of vacation time? How much of a paycheck is worth sending to a PAC?

Would you die so your kids could ride without a helmet or sacrifice your home for the cause? Think about your level of commitment on the sliding scale of sacrifice from "attending" a meeting to losing everything as you read the following:

# THE PRICE THEY PAID

Have you ever wondered what happened to the 56 men who signed the Declaration of Independence?

- \* Five signers were captured by the British as traitors and tortured before they died.
- \* Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned.
- \* Two lost their sons in the Revolutionary Army, another had two sons captured.
- \* Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or the hardships of the Revolutionary War. They signed and pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor.

What kind of men where they?

- \* Twenty-four were lawyers and jurists.
- \* Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners, men of means, well educated. They signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured.
- \* Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British navy. He sold his home and his properties to pay his debts, and died in rags.
- \* Thomas McKeam was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him and poverty was his reward.

- \* Vandals or soldiers, or both, looted the properties of Ellery, Clymer, Hall, Walton, Gwinnett, Heyward, Ruttledge, and Middleton.
- At the battle of Yorktown, Thomas noted that the British Jr. Nelson, Cornwallis had taken over General Nelson home for his headquarters. urged quietly General George Washington to open fire. The home destroyed, and Nelson died bankrupt.
- \* Francis Lewis had his home and properties destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife, and she died within a few months.
- \* John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and his gristmill were laid to waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home to find his wife dead and his children vanished. A few weeks later he died from exhaustion and a broken heart.
- \* Norris and Livingston suffered similar fates.

Such are the stories and sacrifices of the American Revolution. These were not wild-eyed, rabble-rousing ruffians. They were soft-spoken men of means and education. They had security, but they valued liberty more.

Standing tall, straight, and unwavering, they pledged:

"For the support οf firm reliance the declaration, with of Divine the protection the Providence, we mutually pledge to each other, our lives, our fortunes, sacred honor."

Is it no wonder then, that Samuel Adams said:

"If love wealth more than you tranquility of servitude the liberty, better than the animating contest of freedom, go home from us in peace. We ask not your counsels or arms. Crouch down and lick the hands which feed you. chain be set lightly upon you and your forget posterity ye were our mav countrymen."

.....what then, is freedom worth to you?

Casting my thoughts north, I encouraged Angie to fight her way back to this side if she could. If the struggle was too much, I tried to let her know that is was okay to let go.

The spirit knows when it is time to move on.

Letting go is hardest for those of us left behind. So much seems left unsaid.

It is important now, while the veil between here and hereafter is so nearly transparent, that we write down everything we remember about Angie, no matter how painful the process might be presently.

In the years ahead our notes from today will help keep Angie alive for us after time has dulled our grief and blurred our memories. And as we recall how Angie touched us, we will be able to smile and be thankful that she was a part of our lives.

Angie was the main person who pushed me to take a leadership role in ABATE. She always thought the best of everyone, and I credit her for guiding us all to being better people. She was content to let others take credit and get the glory, but her work at Fossil and in ABATE was monumental. I guess my man Hank Williams said it best: "I'll never get out of this world alive". The one thing nobody has control over is the end.


I don't talk to the Higher Powers much, I think I've used up all my favors, but I hope they are taking good care of her.

By now, all of you have heard about the Supreme Court's ruling on police pursuits that end up killing someone. Unfortunately, the case heard dealt with the death of an individual who was riding as a passenger on a motorcycle when the operator decided to flee. There is some consolation in the wording of the court's ruling, however. The officer can be held liable when his act would shock the public's conscience. (As in going to fast after a minor offender and killing someone in the process like Ken Fowler).

According to the local paper here, Gayle Fowler settled with the State of Pennsylvania. Unlike the DA who valued Ken's life at \$403.50, the state will pay Gayle \$450,000 for killing her husband. I personally don't think that's even close to being enough money. Ken had 26 years left before being eligible for social security. Surely he would have produced an annual income of more than \$17,000 each year.

I'm not a fan of some of the things the ACLU says and does (I suppose that makes me a partial supporter of rights), but I heartily agree with the following:

# Ruling on High-Speed Police Chases 'Unfortunate'

Statement of Ramona Ripston, Executive Director ACLU of Southern California

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE Tuesday, May 26, 1998

LOS ANGELES - Today's decision by the United States Supreme Court absolving police officers from any liability in the deaths of innocent people who are killed or severely injured as the result of a reckless police chase is extremely unfortunate. This decision means that police officers may disregard rules and guidelines concerning high-speed vehicle pursuits. A review of the deaths of innocent bystanders from these out of control chases reveals the folly of this decision.

The ACLU of Southern California is not suggesting a ban on police pursuits. We believe that pursuits may be justified to apprehend individuals suspected of committing violent crimes, who have taken hostages or who pose an immediate threat to themselves or others. Still, even under those circumstances, a pursuit should be undertaken only after careful consideration of the conditions that may influence the outcome.

Safer alternatives involve police agencies cooperating to track the location of a vehicle to safely stop and apprehend fleeing suspects. Flight from the law is no way to freedom, but jeopardizing the lives of bystanders, and indeed the officers themselves, is not sound police strategy.

New safety recommendations for jet-skis

New York (Reuters) – Fatalities caused by personal watercraft, the motorcycle-like water scooters commonly called jet-skis, are on the rise.

In its first report on the vehicles, the National Transportation Safety Board has recommended that manufacturers make the machines better padded and easier to steer and stop, and that jet-skiers be trained to operate them more safely.

According to the report's abstract, there are over one million jet-skis in operation; about 200,000 of those were sold last year. Deaths caused by the watercraft are also rising, according to the May 19th release. In 1993, there were 26 fatalities, but by 1997, there were 83. Jet-skis have 'a high risk of injury," according to the agency, since accident statistics indicate that 4 out of every 10 accidents results in injury.

Most boating fatalities are caused by drowning, but jet-skiers, who usually wear life vests, often die from "blunt trauma" instead. The head, neck and face, or the lower extremities are most often injured.

Based on this information, the agency recommends that manufacturers change the steering and braking mechanisms on the vehicles, so that they are easier to control when the power is off. Jet-skiers should consider wearing helmets, and rental businesses should use a checklist to evaluate customers' ability to safely operate the craft. States may also want to require a license to operate a Jet Ski.

The Silver Spoke Awards Banquet on Saturday evening, always one of the highlights of the Convention, was almost



# PRESIDENT SIGNS HIGHWAY BILL...MOTORCYCLISTS WIN AGAIN!

Congress has passed the new federal highway reauthorization bill, and motorcyclists have come out big winners in the multibillion dollar transportation package. On Friday, May 22, 1998, the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives overwhelmingly approved the final Conference Committee report on the ISTEA reauthorization bill, renamed the Transportation Equity Act for the Twenty-First Century (TEA) 21), and President Clinton signed it into law on June 9. TEA 21 includes all of the major items that motorcyclists from coast to coast have been lobbying for over the past two years: it includes provisions to include motorcycles in the future development of Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) technology; restricts lobbying efforts by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) on such issues as helmet laws; amends NHTSA's mission statement to include "accident prevention"; ensures that motorcycles have access on all roads built with the use of federal funds; and provides \$270 million for recreational trails development and maintenance. There are no federal mandates contained in TEA 21. Congratulations to every motorcyclist who visited or contacted their federal representative on these important issues, and we urge all concerned riders to write members of Congress to thank them for including all these pro-motorcycle provisions in the final version of the bill. 


# JUDGE ISSUES FAVORABLE RULING IN SPARTANBURG TRIAL

On May 13, 1998, the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals issued its decision in Norwood v. Bain and the City of Spartanburg, S.C. The Court upheld Judge Anderson's lower court ruling that the defendants violated the Plaintiff bikers' constitutional rights under the Fourth Amendment by conducting searches of the plaintiffs, their possessions and saddlebags at the Fairground checkpoint. The Court also found that Chief Bain was not entitled to the defense of qualified immunity because he should have known, based upon the law existing at the time of his actions, that the searches would be unconstitutional. The Court reversed Judge Anderson's ruling that the members of the class action suit were not entitled to any damages, and remanded the case back to Judge Anderson with instructions to enter a judgement for nominal damages not to exceed \$1 for each plaintiff who was searched.

While greater monetary compensation would have been nice, we have always understood the class members' primary goal to be the vindication of their rights by a judgment declaring the City and Bain's actions unconstitutional.

Therefore, we are extremely pleased with this ruling. Some class members are considering an appeal to the United States Supreme Court on the issue of videotaping, which the court ruled was not in violation of their Fourth Amendment rights because it took place after plaintiffs' were already lawfully seized at the checkpoint and the court found that the videotaping did not make the lawful seizure become unlawful. # COURT GIVES COPS IMMUNITY ON CHASES

The Supreme Court made it far more difficult for police to be sued by people who are hurt during high-speed chases, ruling that pursuing officers can be held liable only if their actions would "shock the conscience." The unanimous ruling against the parents of a California teenager killed when a deputy sheriff's car in high-speed pursuit rammed into the motorcycle he was a passenger on. The court's decision came within days of another unrelated incident in which Pennsylvania motorcyclist Ken Fowler was tragically killed when a police cruiser crossed over the center line during a high speed chase of a car with expired license plates and hit Fowler head on. Fowler's sister-in-law sought the legal services of Pennsylvania's Aid to Injured Motorcyclists (AIM) attorney Boyd Spencer, who declined the case after it was learned that the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania was willing to settle out of court with Fowler's widow. While the Supreme Court ruling sent shock waves through the motorcycling community, Oregon A.I.M. attorney Sam Hochberg researched the ruling and found that, "As I read the case synopsis, the Supreme Court issue was only as to whether the officer or his agency might be liable under section 1983, which is Federal law addressing deprivation of civil rights. 1983 cases are commonly police harassment, police beatings, etc., and carry special kinds of privileges if you prevail, including attorney's fees. Some lawyers prefer using section 1983 because it puts the case in Federal Court, but the high court ruling does NOT prevent persons injured by police, whether in car chases or otherwise, from pursuing ordinary civil remedies for claims in state courts for negligence, or for intentional acts of police which cause harm." Aid to Injured Motorcyclists (A.I.M.)

### GETTING REAR ENDED IN FLORIDA

Florida motorists are watching their rear-view mirrors this week after an appellate court ruled that rectal searches by police are legal. According to the Fifth District Court of Appeals, the removal of 54 grams of cocaine from a suspect's rectum by a member of the Orange County highway drug squad was "part of a legal patdown to make sure the man wasn't armed." America, the land of the free and the home of the rectal patdown.

### SMILE! YOU'RE ON CANDID CAMERA!

Drivers who run red lights cause thousands of traffic crashes a year and a growing number of deaths, reports a recent study to support a new federal and state effort to ticket red light runners through the mail. Last month, transportation secretary Rodney Slater announced a nationwide campaign to educate drivers about the problem and install more cameras at intersection to catch offenders. Ten states in a pilot program are now allowing cameras to be mounted atop traffic signals; AZ, CA, CO, DE, IL, MD, NY, NC, VA & WA. According to their figures, from 1992 to 1996, there were 3,753 crashes caused by a motorist running a red light — about 3% of all fatal crashes. The study also said that red light runners are six times more likely to be legally drunk (.10 BAC or higher) and more than three times as likely to have two or more speeding tickets. 
# RIDING RUGER PAYS OFF

The firearm manufacturer Sturm Ruger & Company has changed their policy on motorcyclists' health-care coverage and will no longer require its motorcycle riding employees to wear helmets in order to be covered under the company's insurance policy.

In 1995, the AMA instituted a program called "Riding Ruger" intended to persuade the company to reevaluate its health insurance restrictions. The cornerstone of "Riding Ruger" was a call for all interested motorcyclists to purchase shares of Sturm. Ruger stock, then attend the annual stockholder meetings to challenge the company's discriminatory policy. AMA representatives have attended the past four stockholder meetings to object to Ruger's unfair policy. Simultaneously, a letter-writing campaign was mounted, and individuals, clubs and entire police departments pledged not to purchase Ruger firearms until motorcyclists were treated like other employees. Motorcyclists pointed out, among other things, that the 3 states where Ruger maintains offices do not require adult motorcyclists to wear helmets; that the company's requirement for its motorcycling employees to wear helmets interferes in these employees rights to engage in legal activities while away from the workplace; and that the company has no similar policy regarding seatbelt use for motorists. # GOVERNMENT TO REGULATE GOLF CARTS

Golf carts aren't just for duffers any more, and with an increasing number of senior citizens and others using the carts on city streets, the federal government decided recently to put the motorized buggies in a special class and make them follow certain safety rules including a requirement that faster ones have seat belts, turn signals and rear-view mirrors. Golfers won't have to buckle up as they trundle down the fairway, though. since most carts used for golfing have a top speed of 15 mph and are exempt from the new standards, which became effective June 17. Under the new rules developed by NHTSA, "low-speed vehicles" - classified as those with top speeds of 20 to 25 miles per hour - will need safety features including seat belts, headlights, windshields, signals and rear-view mirrors. But they will be exempt from federal crash-test standards and such heavy-duty safety equipment as air bags. The required equipment is expected to add \$1,000 to the cost of the carts, which range in price from \$4,000 to \$15,000. An estimated 400,000 low-power vehicles are in use in the United States, particularly in Sun Belt states where ailments prevent some elderly people from having licenses. The Consumer Product Safety Commission has reports of 7,218 injuries from golf carts, including 25 deaths. (AP)



# LOUISIANA BILL WOULD MORE THAN TRIPLE MOTORCYCLE REGISTRATION

**FEES** 

Proposed legislation in Louisiana, House Bill 202 introduced by Rep. Raymond Jestson, would require sport utility vehicles, motorcycles, vans and pickup trucks registered prior to January 1, 2000, to pay a \$10.00 annual registration license tax. It further provides for the registration license tax for motorcycles to be determined according to the value of the motorcycle: \$10.00 per year for the first \$10,000 value of the motorcycle and \$1.00 for each additional \$1,000 of value. Present law provides for an annual registration license tax of \$3.00 for motorcycles. Has Big Brother discovered yet another way to get motorcycles off the road? ABATE of Louisiana

# PENNSYLVANIA MOTORCYCLE LICENSE PLATE MAY SHRINK

Keystone riders may soon be affixing smaller license plates to their motorcycles, as PennDOT has announced that four-by-seven inch plates that are the norm in forty-seven states may be available by next spring. Thanks to the efforts of the Pennsylvania Motorcycle Dealers Association, who conveyed to transportation officials the problems that dealers and riders have with the current abnormally large plates. State officials estimated the approximate total cost at \$30,000, and time would be needed to exhaust existing stock before any change could be effected. PennDOT also referenced the need for input from law enforcement officials to determine if smaller plates would present any enforcement problems.



# U.S. To Sign Auto Safety Agreement .c The Associated Press By CATHERINE STRONG

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Clinton administration plans to sign an agreement next week setting up a forum to seek global uniformity in auto safety regulations, a move U.S. automakers say would lower production costs without sacrificing safety.

Auto regulations cover many areas of car safety but conflicting standards in the United States, Europe and Japan mean expensive design changes for each market, automakers contend.

But some insurance and consumer groups say the agreement will jeopardize auto safety by restricting the ability of federal regulators to make independent decisions and respond to the American public. Critics also worry that uniform safety regulations among countries could wind up being weaker.

"There has never been a global system for vehicle safety," said Dave Snyder of the American Insurance Association, a trade group representing 300 insurers.

"It's a sleeper issue now, but it could dramatically change the whole landscape down the road," he said. "Instead of raising the bar on safety, it might be maintained or lowered."

Government officials say the agreement, to be signed June 25 in Geneva, will improve safety.

"The opportunity here is to improve safety by finding the best practices (among nations) and speeding them to the American public," said Ricardo Martinez, head of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

"It's a win-win situation," he said. "The manufacturers get one standard instead of two or more, but we get the better standard for the American public."

The so-called framework agreement would allow countries to advertise their auto safety regulations in a common forum under the United Nations and to work to achieve common regulations - one at a time. In addition to the United States, countries expected to sign the agreement include Japan and the 15 member nations of the European Union.

It was a glorious victory here in Oregon. I only needed three, so I got a full ONE-THIRD MORE VOTES than I needed!

We're planning a victory party. You can do the same next election!

If you call your party ahead of time, before the deadline, and just tell them you'd like to serve (I think I wouldn't tip 'em off as to your agenda just yet), you can be nominated and get a charge

to see your name on the ballot! Or, you can wait and sneak in, like I did, if no one else bothers to run.

State Reps will be voting on these changes to the bylaws at the July State Board Meeting. Once approved and adopted, your chapter will be expected to operate with these guidelines in place. Please be prepared to vote!

In a nutshell: These guidelines were designed to protect ABATE members, chapters, officers, and the organization. Approval means that these guidelines and officer descriptions will supersede all other past Board decisions. I encourage the board to maintain these documents. Media Officers will now be empowered to make decisions with this process in place, if and when problems arise. State and chapter officers will be operating from the same guidelines and expected to offer constructive changes if they aren't working well.

# ABATE of Oregon, Inc. Media Guidelines FINAL Draft 13 June 1998

The following Media Guidelines are applicable to all chapter members, chapter officers, and state officers:

- 1) Any ABATE member responsible for providing content to any of ABATE's media outlets, including but not limited to press releases, newsletter editing, newsletter articles, chapter newsletters, e-mail sent on behalf of ABATE or any of it's chapters or officers, and any web page publication, shall take reasonable steps to assure that the material published is accurate.
- 2) Any such article or media publication as described in 1) above, shall be presumed to be accurate, absent some obvious reason to believe otherwise, if it comes from a source which is regularly relied upon for accurate information. It shall also be presumed that the material submitted does not violate copyright laws.
- 3) None of these guidelines should be construed to inhibit the free flow of opinion by, from, and for ABATE members, except as normal editorial considerations of taste, space, and appropriateness for publication may dictate, and which discretion should be vested in the editor of the publication, subject to the authority of the Board and the State Coordinator.
- 4) Submissions of articles from other sources, such as from ABATE members, or reprints from other ABATE newsletters, should be reviewed for accuracy and potential libel issues, when such articles or links are more than mere opinions of policy. Both the author of any submission has an obligation to make reasonable efforts to insure the accuracy of any facts and the editor's obligation is to review for same, as needed. It shall also be presumed that the material submitted does not violate copyright laws.
- 5) ABATE requires all members submitting articles for publication with specific factual allegations which might be libelous, to take reasonable steps to insure that the facts alleged are accurate. This policy is not intended to stifle healthy public debate on any issue of importance to motorcyclists, nor of ABATE's members to engage in same, in print or otherwise, particularly as to matters of opinion on public policies. It is intended, however, to encourage responsible fact-checking of any potentially libelous fact intended for publication. Due to our non-profit incorporation, no one is allowed to either promote or demean a political candidate during the electoral process.
- 6) The ABATE of Oregon, Inc. newsletter and web site are official publications of ABATE of Oregon, Inc. The views expressed by advertisers, member links or correspondents do not necessarily reflect those of ABATE of Oregon, Inc., nor of its officers or members, and no warranty, either express or implied, is conveyed by ABATE of Oregon, Inc. regarding advertised products or services. ABATE of Oregon, Inc. reserves the right to edit or refuse advertising.
- 7) All ABATE of Oregon, Inc. chapter web sites must use the state domain: http://www.abateoforegon.org/. The Chapter Web Site Editor is expected to work independently unless

there is a problem and then either the Chapter Coordinator and/or the State Web Site Editor can override any editing decision. The State Web Site Editor has final authority for legal reasons.

- 8) Publication of flyers at no cost is limited to MROs. Exceptions are to be made by the Executive Committee and not the editor.
- 9) Material appearing in any ABATE of Oregon, Inc. publication will be published as space and time permits. ABATE of Oregon, Inc. also reserves the right to edit or refuse all submissions. Submissions must be signed or non-anonymous when sent to the editor with name withheld only by request. Newsletter articles, letters, or other materials must be received no later than the 10th of each month preceding publication.

WEB SITE EDITOR: Directs and edits the content of ABATE of Oregon's web pages on the internet.

NEWSLETTER EDITOR: Responsible for providing the official state newsletter for mailing to the general membership.

PUBLIC RELATIONS DIRECTOR: Works to inform members, the public and the media of ABATE of Oregon activities. Also acts as a liaison to the media.

# ABATE of Oregon, Inc. Officer Guidelines FINAL Draft Changes 13 June 1998

MEDIA OFFICER (Newsletter Editor, Web Page Editor and PR Director) GUIDELINES:

Media Officers shall:

- 1. Perform such duties as assigned by the Coordinator, Executive Board or Board of Directors. Media officers shall also operate in accordance with ABATE bylaws, rules of operation, guidelines, policies and procedures.
- 2. Have the authority to 'speak' publicly on behalf of the organization, for the good of the organization.
- 3. Involve other media officers when making a potentially controversial decision. An opinion must be sought from at least one other Media Officer or the Coordinator when making

these decisions. In accordance with the Media Guidelines, these decisions should be brought to the attention of the Board through the Coordinator, if there are liability concerns.

- 4. Recommend any additions or changes to the ABATE bylaws, rules of operation, guidelines, policies and procedures, as they relate to organization's media efforts and issues. Media Officers shall also recommend organizational media priorities.
- 5. Assist other media officers in their efforts to acquire materials for publication. Media Officers will also assist chapter officers in their media efforts.
- 6. Receive cooperation and support from individual members, chapters, and officers. Media Officers shall also have the authority to establish a committee with the purpose of getting assistance with establishing priorities, projects and other work tasks.
- 7. Recommend vendors, electronic services, procedures, etc. to the Board for approval. These officers will also be responsible for contracting for services as needed.
- 8. Meet publishing deadlines.

# WEB SITE EDITOR OFFICER GUIDELINES: Web Site Editor (1 person)

The Web Site Editor shall:

A. Have overall responsibility and authority for construction and maintenance of http://www.abateoforegon.org/ which shall include, at a minimum:

A list of chapter contacts and meeting times

Appropriate hot links for state officers and chapter web sites Distinctive "Recommended Motorcycle Links" and "Individual Member Links"

- B. Be responsible for the editorial content of http://www.abateoforegon.org/ and shall report inappropriate material to the Board.
- C. Assist chapters in establishing their own web sites and familiarizing them with the media guidelines.
- D. Monitor chapter and/or linked web sites and it is expected that the Web Site Editor will clear all web site material with the Coordinator, or if unavailable, the Public Relations Director.

# NEWSLETTER EDITOR OFFICER GUIDELINES: Newsletter Editor (1 person)

The Newsletter Editor shall:

- A. Produce a monthly newsletter monthly which shall include, at a minimum:
  - 1) Minutes from State Board meetings and chapter highlights as submitted.
  - 2) A list of chapter contacts and meeting times
  - 3) Appropriate correspondence or information of interest to our members.
- B. Report all advertising income to Treasurer for records with list of advertisers.
- C. Monitor chapter newsletters and report inappropriate literature to the Board.

# PUBIC RELATIONS DIRECTOR GUIDELINES: Public Relations Director (1 person)

The Public Relations Director shall:

A. Provide and coordinate public relations on behalf of the organization, which includes but is not limited to: public

speaking, multi-media productions, press releases and other means of communication.

- B. Clear any advanced promotions materials with the Coordinator, or if unavailable, at least one Vice-Coordinator or another Media Officer. All official press releases for local chapters must be cleared through the State PR Director or State Coordinator before release.
- C. Responsible for actively promoting the organization and individual contributions by ABATE members, internally, as well to the general public, media sources and other motorcycle organizations.
- D. Responsible for tracking public relation products, such as the tri-folds and PSA tapes.

# **GUNNY'S SACK**

It goes without saying that if you ride in Oregon you can expect to get rained on from time to time. This year's Fossil run was no exception. It was still great as always and I wouldn't miss it for the world. Actually, the weather at Fossil was super except for Sunday. It did rain on some folks coming and going there.

Fossil is our time for renewal of old friendships and getting the riding season baptized. There's a lot going on this year so none of us should cry because there isn't anything to do. Speaking of things to do...

I rode my scoot to Dallas, Texas! I'm still all up in the air over the trip. I went to the annual conference of Aid to Injured Motorcyclists (AIM) and the National Coalition of Motorcyclists (NCOM).

It's too many years since I did a ride like that. I learned one important thing: If you procrastinate doing things that are important to you, you'll wake up one day and not be able to do a lot of things you wanted to do because you're too old or too sick or something is in the way. Like they used to say at Nike, you just gotta do it. I did, and what a trip it was. The Confederations of Clubs were present at the NCOM conference in Dallas. They're the fastest growing motorcycle rights organizations in the world today. This may signal the end of those problems some of us that have been around awhile remember. The clubs in Confederations are able to sit down and talk over problems in their own forum.

There are 26 Confederations around the US and Canada, and each operates similarly, under the wing of NCOM. Each state's Confederation is autonomous and is run by the clubs as they see fit. There is always an officer of the court present at each meeting, usually the AIM attorney in the area, to insure there are no problems with overzealous law enforcement entities. The Confederations direct their grievances at the judicial level, fighting discrimination, harassment, and other legal issues for us while we in the MRO's go after legislative solutions to our problems. Nonpatch groups are sometimes invited to attend meetings as well, to keep the information flowing for everyone.

I think it bears mentioning that it was the patch clubs that really gave birth to the motorcycle rights movement, and then stepped back as the rest of us learned to take the reins. Now, they're back and fighting for bikers' rights again. Welcome back!

News Bits'n Pieces: Washington, DC: Because of the sacrifices made by those that took the time to go to DC and lobby our elected officials, we have another important win in our pocket. everything we wanted from the new BESTEA federal highway legislation is ours. We made it clear that we are part of society and will be recognized. The provisions we got: 1) NHTSA is banned from using Federal money to lobby state legislatures regarding issues that effect motorcycle legislation, 2) Highways may not be banned from motorcycle use if they are built or maintained with tax money, 3) NHTSA's mission statement has been changed to read "ACCIDENT PREVENTION," and 4) Bikes will now be included in the development of the "Intelligent Highway Systems."

A statement from MRF says in part: "The motorcycle rights community can be proud as well, despite our many differences, we are successful when we work together." Those words are very encouraging for me. I've said that all along.

Pittsburgh, PA: Mercy Hospital and the city police have teamed up to bring a stop to the game of running red lights. This stunt is a major cause of preventable accidents and injuries. Across the nation this problem has increased by 15% in the last year, according to a recent Insurance Institute for Highway Safety report. Red light and stop sign running account for an astonishing 22% of the trauma in vehiclerelated injuries in this country. This costs an estimated seven billion dollars in loss of life, medical costs, damages, and lost wages each year - not to mention all the heartache that goes with it for the families involved. Who would have thought we needed to start a campaign to remind people to stop at stop signs!! I guess it's a sign of the times. People don't respect anything anymore.

Paris, France: Thousands of French bikers rode in cities all over France to protest a new law that doubles fines for speeding and allows owners of motorcycles to be fined if someone else riding their bike breaks the law. Look out, it won't be long before we are faced with the same kinds of stupid laws here if elected safetycrats get wind of this.

Paris, France: Film actor Gerard Depardieu, 49, suffered leg injuries when he lost control of his bike on a curve near a small village west of Paris. Sounds to me like he needs to take a rider ed. course. If it were you or I no one would know about it except family and insurance companies.

**Sebastopol, CA:** Officials at *Electric Motorbike* announced the start of production of their electric powered bike "*Lectra*." The top speed is 45 mph and it cruises at 30. The range is 30 miles between charges. It'll take a while to cross the country with this one. We'll see if the technology catches up.

Sam's AIM Tip'O the month is about UNCONTROLLED intersections - those are those nasty deals with no stop sign, no light, and not even a Yield sign. Sam says if you crash your scoot (or your car, for that matter) into another vehicle in an uncontrolled intersection, in almost every case, the insurance company or a jury or an arbitrator is gonna figure it was at least PARTLY YOUR FAULT, no matter who had the "right of way." A lot of Sam's cases have involved just these sorts of collisions, and it's usually because BOTH vehicles were rolling a little too quickly. For safety's sake, you just have to treat them as if you had a "Yield" sign, no matter who's there first. Sam claims he never drives or rides through one of 'em at more than 5 mph. And he's right. Then again, I saw he put a nasty little bash on that Mercury of his! Claims a little white fence ran up and hit the side of it. Unfortunately, he can't sue the fence.

Hey, seriously, remember if you have legal questions about any kind of vehicle issues, and accidents in particular, Sam will give you a free consultation, and he works all over Oregon. 

It's time for us all to start gearing up for the fight ahead of us in the next session if we really want to win. It's time to take back our birthright - freedom.



#### SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the hody thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the assential features of the measure.

### A BILL FOR AN ACT

- 2 Relating to protective headgear; creating new provisions; amending ORS 814.260, 814.269, 814.275,
- 814.280 and 814.290; and repealing ORS 815.050.
  Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon;

- SECTION 2. "Motorcycle helmet" means a protective covering for the head consisting of a hard outer shell, padding adjacent to and inside the outer shell and a chin-strap type retention system with a sticker indicating that the motorcycle helmet meets standards es
  - tablished by the United States Department of Transportation. SECTION 3. ORS 814.260 is amended to read:
- 814.260. (1) A person commits the offense of failure of a moped rider to wear (protective headgear) a motorcycle belinet if the person:
  - (a) Operates or rides on a moped; and
- (b) Is not wearing a [protective headgear of a type approved under ORS 815.050] motorcycle

  - (2) Exemptions from this section are established under ORS 814.290.
  - (3) This section does not permit passengers on mopeds in violation of ORS 814.330 or 814.340.
