What is A.B.A.T.E.?

We are a State Motorcycle Rights Organization (S.M.R.O.) dedicated to educating riders, drivers, and elected officials about issues affecting motorcyclists.

We help fund a political action committee (BikePAC) that directly interacts with the legislature about motorcycles issues and bills that affect us.

What does "A.B.A.T.E." mean?

A.B.A.T.E. stands for A Brotherhood Against Totalitarian Enactments. The organization was formed when legislators passed bills adversely affecting riders without consulting them.

We also do business as A Brotherhood Aimed Towards Education.

What is BikePAC?

- **2019** Drivers can be held criminally negligent for motorcycist injuries. (SB-810)

By now (hopefully) we may have gotten word that SB–574 (the lane sharing bill) passed both the Oregon house and senate. And that our governor signed the bill.

There are three reasons the lane sharing bill makes good sense:

- It is good for the environment in that many riders will leave their cars at home and commute on their motorcycles. The net effect being less car pollution.
- The second reason is the reduction in congestion. As riders move from a lane to between-lanes, that saves a car space thereby reducing congestion on our highways. Also, as riders leave their cars at home and hop on their bike to go to work, that helps the congestion problem as well.
- And finally (and I think the most important reason) is safety. Lane sharing reduces the risk of a rear-end crash.

Hopefully we were able to get the bill approved this time around. They say the third time is the charm. On 24 April we set up a booth at the *SeeSee Swap Meet* in St. Johns. A number of familiar mugs were seen: Rotten Roger, Diesel Dave, Willie, Jacque, Bud Selvy. And Smokin' Al who was part of the *Northeast Portland Chapter* and coordinator way back in the day came by and sat with us. It was really good to see him. He is looking good.

STATE OFFICER GUIDELINES

Proposed Revisions (14Apr2021)

State Officer Descriptions

A. State coordinator

The state coordinator shall:

- 1. Preside at board of director and executive board meetings.
- 2. Exercise the general supervision and administration of *A.B.A.T.E.* organizational affairs.
- 3. Follow and comply with the directives of the board of directors and executive board.
- 4. See that the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations are maintained and followed.
- 5. Oversee all state level committees and all chapter operations.
- 6. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* bylaws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.
- 7. Be the official spokesperson for *A.B.A.T.E.*
- 8. Be one of the three (3) authorized signers for state funds.
- 9. Exercise any and all duties, powers, and functions, for or incident to the office of the coordinator.
- 10. Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- 11. Perform such duties as assigned by the board of directors or executive board.

B. Vice-coordinator (1 - 3 people) The vice-coordinators shall:

- Work under the direction of the coordinator and perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator or executive board.
- 2. In the absence of the coordinator, exercise the duties of the coordinator.
- 3. Be responsible for smooth continuous operations of the state board.
- 4. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.
- 5. Assist the Fossil Campout and State Swap Meet coordinators in the

operation and planning of state events, with the assistance of the state sergeantof-arms.

- 6. One of the vice-coordinators may be designated by the coordinator to be in charge of the *A.B.A.T.E.* inventory list and the inventory locations.
- 7. Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- Perform such duties as assigned by the state coordinator, executive board, or board of directors.

C. State secretary

The state secretary shall:

- 1. Take accurate minutes of all regular and special meetings of the the state board of directors or the state executive board.
- a. Date and sign all minutes taken to verify authenticity.
- 2. Make all minutes available for use at state board or executive board meetings.
- 3. Read minutes from prior state board meetings.
- 4. Forward a copy of any meeting minutes to all board member and officers within one week (7 days) of the meeting.
- 5. Submit a copy the state board meeting minutes to the newsletter editor for publishing in the state newsletter.
- 6. Verify the proper writing of motions and keep a running record of all motions made in a motion logbook.
- a. The motion logbook is to be available for viewing at all state board meetings.
- 7. Keep a record of all correspondence received by *A.B.A.T.E*.
- 8. Write all correspondence, letters, notes, cards, and etc.
- Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- 10. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.
- Perform such duties as assigned by the state coordinator, executive board, or board of directors.

D. Membership Secretary

- The membership secretary shall:
- 1. Maintain and keep an accurate list of names and addresses of all members.

- Process all new or renewal memberships and changes of address.
- Send an updated monthly membership list to all chapter membership secretaries and provide membership forms and packets to the chapter membership secretaries.
- Assist the treasurer in maintaining an accurate account of all dues and fees collected.
- 5. Make all possible efforts to assist the chapter membership secretaries in the recruitment of new or renewal members.
- On a monthly basis, send renewal notices to members whose membership is due for renewal.
- 7. Provide updated mailing lists and labels as required for monthly newsletter mailing or other *A.B.A.T.E.* business.
- Obtain and maintain legislative district information for each member.
- Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- 10. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.
- 11. Perform such duties as assigned by the state coordinator, executive board, or board of directors.

E. State treasurer

The state treasurer shall:

- 1. Be responsible for all *A.B.A.T.E.* financial transactions and keeping accurate records of all *A.B.A.T.E.* financial transactions.
- 2. Be responsible for all accounting and record keeping at state fund-raising events.
- 3. Oversee all chapter treasures and chapter bank accounts in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* financial policies and procedures.
- Cause to happen, all tax filings, records, etc. and any tax payments required by law.
- 5. Be one of the three (3) authorized signers for state funds.
- Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- 7. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other

A.B.A.T.E. documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.

 Perform such duties as assigned by the state coordinator, executive board, or board of directors.

F. State auditor

The state auditor shall:

- 1. Receive all chapter bank and financial statements on a monthly basis. This can be in the form of *Quicken*, general ledger or hand written, if necessary. Refer to the current financial policies and procedures.
- 2. If a chapter does not submit their monthly financial report on time, the state auditor must make contact with the chapter treasurer in a timely manner. If the chapter treasurer is unresponsive, the state auditor must then make contact with the chapter coordinator. If neither the chapter treasurer, nor the chapter coordinator are responsive, then the state auditor will report noncompliance to the state treasurer and / or the state board of directors.
- Print and review all chapter reports and compare with bank statements. The state auditor is responsible for filing and maintaining a hard copy of all transactions.
- 4. Create a reconciliation summary.
- Import chapter transactions into state accounting package.
- 6. Generate a status of chapter financial reports statement for the monthly state board meeting and send to the state treasurer. The state treasurer will then present the statement to the board of directors at the state board meeting.
- 7. The statement must be received by the state treasurer at least one full week prior to the state board meeting.
- 8. At the end of the calendar year, all information acquired should be transmitted to the person responsible for doing the state tax report.
- Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- 10. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant

to A.B.A.T.E. operations.

- 11. Perform such duties as assigned by the state coordinator, executive board, or board of directors.
- **G. Newspaper Editor** (media officer) The Newsletter Editor shall:
- 1. Produce a monthly newsletter which shall include at a minimum.
- a. Minutes from the state board meetings and chapter reports as submitted.
- b. A list of the state officers which shows their phone numbers, fax numbers and e-mail addresses as applicable.
- c. A list of chapter contacts, chapter meeting place addresses and meeting times.
- d. Appropriate correspondence or information of interest to the member-ship.
- 2. Report all advertising income to the treasurer for records with a list of advertisers
- 3. Monitor chapter newsletters and report inappropriate literature to the state board.
- 4, Have the authority to edit, approve, or reject material submitted for publication.
- 5. Have the authority to "speak" publicly on behalf of the organization, for the good of the organization.
- 6. Involve other media officers when making a potentially controversial decision. An opinion must be sought from at least one other media officer or the state coordinator when making these decisions. In accordance with the media guidelines, these decisions should be brought to the attention of the state board, through the state coordinator, if there are liability concerns.
- 7. Recommend any additions or changes to the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws, guidelines, policies, and/or procedures as it relates to the media operations of *A.B.A.T.E.*
- Recommend organizational media priorities.
- 9. Assist other media officers in their efforts to acquire materials for publication.
- 10. Assist chapter officers in their media efforts.
- 11. Receive cooperation and support from individuals members. Media officers shall also have the authority to establish a committee with the purpose of getting assistance with establishing priorities, projects, and other work tasks.

H. State web site editor (media officer) The state web site editor shall:

- 1. Have overall responsibility and authority for construction and maintenance of the *A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon, Inc.* web sites which shall include at a minimum:
- a. A list of the state officers which shows their phone numbers, fax numbers and e-mail addresses as applicable.
- b. A list of chapter contacts, chapter meeting place addresses and meeting times.
- Appropriate "hot links" for state officers and chapter web sites.
- d. Distinctive recommended motorcycle links and individual member links.
- e. A list of state and chapter runs, events, fund raisers, and etc.
- 2. Be responsible for editorial content of the web site.
- 3. Establish general guidelines for material to be published, subject to approval by the state board of directors.
- 4, Have the authority to edit, approve, or reject material submitted for publication.
- 5. Have the authority to "speak" publicly on behalf of the organization, for the good of the organization.
- 6. Involve other media officers when making
 - a potentially controversial decision. An opinion must be sought from at least one other media officer or the state coordinator when making these decisions. In accordance with the media guidelines, these decisions should be brought to the attention of the state board, through the state coordinator, if there are liability concerns.
- 7. Recommend any additions or changes to the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws, guidelines, policies, and/or procedures as it relates to the media operations of *A.B.A.T.E.*

- Recommend organizational media priorities.
- 9. Assist other media officers in their efforts to acquire materials for publication.
- 10. Assist chapter officers in their media efforts.

- 15. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.
- Perform such duties as assigned by the state coordinator, executive board, or board of directors.

I. Public Relations Director (Media Officer)

The Public Relations Director shall:

- 1. Provide and coordinate public relations on behalf of *A.B.A.T.E.* which includes, but is not limited to: public speaking, multimedia productions, press releases and other means of communications.
- 2. Coordinate the education of non-members and the general public about the existence, policies and objectives of *A.B.A.T.E.* with the assistance of the chapter public relations officers.
- 3. Arrange and communicate information to *non-A.B.A.T.E.* organizations.
- 4. Responsible for actively promoting *A.B.A.T.E.* and individual contributions by *A.B.A.T.E.* members internally, as well as to the general public, media sources and other motorcycle organizations.
- 5. Maintain and provide advertising for *A.B.A.T.E.* with multi-media, tri-folds, press releases and other means of communication.
- Responsible for the tracking, handling, distribution and return of public relation materials, such as tri-folds, flyers, public

service announcement (P.S.A.) tapes, and etc.

- 6. Clear any advanced promotion materials with the state coordinator, or if unavailable, a vice-coordinator or another media officer. All official press releases for chapters must be cleared through the state public relations director or state coordinator before release.
- Have the authority to edit, approve, or reject material submitted for publication.
- Have the authority to "speak" publicly on behalf of the organization, for the good of the organization.
- 9. Involve other media officers when making a potentially controversial decision. An opinion must be sought from at least one other media officer or the coordinator when making these decisions. In accordance with the media guidelines, these decisions should be brought to the attention of the state board, through the state coordinator, if there are liability concerns.
- 10. Recommend any additions or changes to the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws, guidelines, policies, and/or procedures as it relates to the media operations of *A.B.A.T.E.*
- Recommend organizational media priorities.
- 12. Assist other media officers in their efforts to acquire materials for publication.
- 13. Assist chapter officers in their media efforts.
- 14. Receive cooperation and support from individuals members. Media officers shall also have the authority to establish a committee with the purpose of getting assistance with establishing priorities, projects and other work tasks.
- Recommend vendors, electronic services, and etc. to the state board for approval.
- a. Be responsible for contracting for services as needed.
- 16. Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.

J. Legislative director

The legislative director shall:

- Be responsible for disseminating legislative information to the membership by any means available.
- Submit legislative information to the newsletter editor and the state web master for publication when appropriate.
- Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- 5. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.
- Perform such duties as assigned by the state coordinator, executive board, or board of directors.

K. Education director

The education director shall:

- 1. Coordinate and administer the efforts to educate the motorcycling public and public road users at large, on the positive aspects of motorcycles as transportation.
- 2. Be responsible for the logistics, organization, scheduling and presentation of the *Seminar to Educate and Motivate*. (*S.T.E.A.M.*)
- a. Monitor teaching techniques, program content, and outreach efforts.
- b. Update the program materials and information as required.
- c. Works with the media officers to promote *S.T.E.A.M.* to the membership.

d. Keep records of classes given.

- 3. Work to find new avenues of educating the public and meeting the education needs of the motorcycling community.
- 4. Administer any education programs established and/or operated by *A.B.A.T.E.*
- 5. Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- 6. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other

A.B.A.T.E. documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.

 Perform such duties as assigned by the state coordinator, executive board, or board of directors.

L. Fossil Campout Coordinator

The Fossil Campout coordinator shall:

1. Make all arrangements and contracts to provide any properties or permits required to have the A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon, Inc, Fossil Campout event.

2. Coordinate all functions related to staging the A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon, Inc. Fossil Campout event.

3. Coordinate the staffing required to provide an *A.B.A.T.E.* information booth, gate and security functions at the *A.B.A.T.E.* of Oregon, Inc. Fossil Campout event.

4. Operate the A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon. Inc. Fossil Campout event in accordance with the relevant A.B.A.T.E. policies and procedures.

5. Assist with chapter efforts to have chapter runs, events, fund raisers and etc.

6. Work with the media officers in promoting the A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon, Inc. Fossil Campout event.

7. Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.

- 3. Coordinate the staffing required to provide an *A.B.A.T.E.* information booth, gate and security functions at the *A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon, Inc.* swap meet events.
- 4. Operate the A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon. Inc. swap meet events in accordance with the relevant A.B.A.T.E. policies and

procedures.

- 5. Assist with chapter efforts to have chapter runs, events, fund raisers and etc.
- 6. Work with the media officers in promoting the *A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon*, *Inc.* swap meet events.
- Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- 8. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.

N. Sergeant-at-arms (Three people) The sergeants-at-arms shall:

- 1. Be responsible for security at state board meetings, state runs, events, fund raisers and any other state functions requiring security.
- 2. Be responsible for the orderly operation of state board meetings, and shall carry out their duties with the assistance of the vice-coordinators for proper parliamentary procedures.
- 3. Be responsible for the proper handling of the *A.B.A.T.E.* banner and U.S. flag.
- 4. One of the sergeant-at-arms may be designated by the state coordinator to be in charge of the *A.B.A.T.E.* inventory list and the inventory locations.
- Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- 6. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.
- Perform such duties as assigned by the state coordinator, executive board, or board of directors.

O. Products director

The products director shall:

- 1. Be responsible for the purchase, storage, distribution, display, and selling of *A.B.A.T.E.* products at state runs, events, fund raisers, and etc.
- 2. Be responsible for the ordering and distribution of *A.B.A.T.E.* products to the chapter product directors and keep records of the transactions.
- Keep accurate records of orders, purchases and funds received; and

report these transactions to the state treasurer.

- Cooperate with the state treasurer in maintaining a working capital account for the purchase of *A.B.A.T.E.* products.
- 5. Work with the media officers in promoting the *A.B.A.T.E.* products to the membership.
- Conduct the raffle drawings and/or 50/50 drawings at state runs, events, fund raisers and etc.
- 7. Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- 8. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.
- Perform such duties as assigned by the state coordinator, executive board, or board of directors.

P. Historian

The historian shall:

- 1. Have the responsibility of maintaining a running record of the *A.B.A.T.E.* activities that occur throughout the year.
 - a. Keep an album/albums of appropriate newsletters, photos, articles, flyers, newspaper clippings, and other items of interest or information about state runs, events, fund raisers, and activities.
 - b. Insure that all albums or records are preserved as well as possible and that they are made accessible for events or fund raisers upon request.
- 2. Be responsible for the recording of events by means of a camera, video equipment, or sound equipment as applicable.
- Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- 4. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.
- Perform such duties as assigned by the state coordinator, executive board, or board of directors.

Q. Sanctioning officer

The sanctioning officer shall:

- 1. Be responsible for the proper sanctioning of all *A.B.A.T.E.* events that require sanctioning.
- a. Have an exact understanding of, and act in accordance with the A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon sanctioning guidelines.
- 2. Be responsible for maintaining records of the sanctioned *A.B.A.T.E.* events.
- Transmit / deliver the flyers of sanctioned events to the newsletter editor and the web page editors

prior to or by the 10th of the month.

- 4. Be responsible for obtaining event insurance coverage for *A.B.A.T.E.*
- 5. Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- 6. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.
- 7. Perform such duties as assigned by the state coordinator, executive board, or board of directors.

R. Quartermaster

The quartermaster shall:

- 1. Be responsible for the procurement, purchase, maintenance, storage, inventory, distribution, disposition and record keeping of the entirety of *A.B.A.T.E.* properties.
 - a. Keep accurate records of orders, purchases, work orders, incurred costs, monies handled and etc. and report these to the state treasurer.
 - b. Cooperate with the state treasurer in maintaining a working capital

account for the management of *A.B.A.T.E.* properties.

- 2. Have internet access, electronic hardware, and software required to receive and deliver on-line information.
- 3. Operate in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* by-laws and all other *A.B.A.T.E.* documents that are relevant to *A.B.A.T.E.* operations.
- Perform such duties as assigned by the state coordinator, executive board, or board of directors.

This bill lets riders escape the "pinch point" between cars in stop-and-go highway traffic by riding between lanes of traffic. This is going to be a major benefit to riders who pass through traffic-congested areas. We've seen some of the strongest support ever for lane splitting.

If you haven't dropped a line to *your* state senator or *your* state representative asking them to support SB–574, why not take a minute to do so? Just go to

https://laneshareoregon.com/ and enter your address. The tool will then automatically populate an e-mail message to your state senator and representative. Send them a short and polite note to *support* SB–574 with their vote. It really helps.





new friends on both sides of the aisle during our efforts to obtain broad support for this important bill.

That said, there are some undeniable truths in the U.S.A.'s current legislative landscape.

I'm not going to call out specific elected officials in this piece but I would ask *A.B.A.T.E.* members to take note of the letter beside each person's name who is sponsoring or voting for legislation that negatively effects motorcyclists. And more broadly, which party seems to be forwarding bills that further restrict our freedoms and rights as Americans.

I'd also ask our membership to become more familiar with the voting records of those legislators in Salem and in particular, the voting records of their own representatives and senators.

Legislators who actively support dismantling the U.S. second amendment and promote nanny state regulations and policies tend to be the same people who vote against *BikePAC* bills or propose bills that *BikePAC* strongly opposes.

Does this mean that we should actively work to get members of the opposing political party elected to replace those who would vote against us?

Not necessarily.

Mitch Greenlick (H–33) was my state representatives and neighbor for several decades. I had a long time cordial relationship with representative Greenlick and he was always polite and professional with me.

However, up until his last years in Salem, he was pretty much a guaranteed "no" vote for any bill that *BikePAC* initiated.

In fact, in the early 2000's, he was so antagonistic towards us that I ran against him in the primary of 2004. I ran against this democrat as a long-time democrat myself. You can do this too.

Running for political office is a lot easier than most might think.

(Of course winning an election is something else again.)

There are 90 legislators down in Salem and about half of them are at least lukewarm supporters of motorcycling issues. If less than 10% of our membership ran for elected office in 2022 and won, it would be close to 100% support for anything motorcycle

related down there!

You have six months or so to get your ducks in a row, so to speak, if you want to file to run.

So once again, I am proposing that the way to change the direction a political party is heading is to not just fight them but to join them!

Introduce yourself to your elected officials and get to know them.

Attend their town halls and visit them at the capitol or at an on-line *Zoom* meeting.

All it took in my case was sending my representative and senator an e-mail requesting a meeting. They were both very gracious and even though they may not turn out to be supporters, at least I have a one-toone relationship with both of them.

Start attending your county central committee meetings. Each political party holds them, usually on a monthly basis.

Become a precinct committee person. (P.C.P.) It's ridiculously easy.

Get involved with committees aimed at solving problems in areas of life that interest you: Health, education, transportation.

You'll be surprised at how fun, exciting, and empowering it can be to be part of the grass roots political process.


Get yourself elected to be a delegate at your party's annual convention which is where the real action happens.

Twenty years ago, a crew of about three dozen *A.B.A.T.E.* members showed up at the democratic party annual convention in Eugene and they moved mountains.

I'm a life member of A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon, so I will be here as long as the organization continues to exist. I'm ready, willing and able to serve, but only if those services are actually wanted.

If all the membership wants is a bland, one sentence legislative report once a month, that's certainly easy enough to accommodate. I believe that we can do better than that though.

Should any A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon member or prospective member care to participate in the legislative process or hear about what *BikePAC* is doing down in Salem, they are warmly welcome to join us at the *Indian Creek Tavern* happy hour first Mondays at 7 p.m.

Guidelines For Forming A New Chapter

proposed revisions (15Apr2021)

Section 1

- To receive a charter as a chapter in *A.B.A.T.E.*, a group must:
 - A. Have ten (10) paid-up members.
 - **B.** Elect from those paid-up members a coordinator, treasurer, recording secretary, membership secretary and one (1) state board representative.
 - **C.** Make application to the state board of directors for a charter.

Section 2

To remain as a chapter in *A.B.A.T.E.*, the chapter must:

- A. Abide by the A.B.A.T.E. by-laws, the state guidelines for forming a new chapter, the A.B.A.T.E. financial policies and procedures, the A.B.A.T.E. media guidelines, the A.B.A.T.E. event sanctioning guidelines and any other A.B.A.T.E. documents that are relevant to chapter operations or the corresponding future provisions of the aforementioned items.
- **B.** Abide by the decisions rendered by the state board of directors.
- **C.** Send copies of chapter minutes to the state coordinator within seven (7) days of the chapter meeting.
- **D.** Insure the participation of chapter state representatives at state board of directors' meetings unless excused by the state coordinator.
- E. Submit a monthly chapter report to the state newsletter by the 10th of each month.
- **F.** Any chapter in noncompliance with any of the aforementioned items for over:
 - **1.** Thirty (30) days, will be put on probationary status.
 - **2.** Sixty (60) days, will not be allowed to vote at the state board meeting.
 - **3.** Ninety (90) days, action will be taken to revoke the chapter's charter.
- **G.** The charter of any chapter may be terminated upon receipt of a written request by the chapter's coordinator, delivered by a chapter representative to the state board of directors.
- **H.** The state board of directors has the final authority in this matter.

Section 3

Chapter structure

- **A.** The structure of the chapter shall consist of the following:
 - 1. The general membership
 - 2. Committees
 - **3.** The executive board

Section 4

Delegation of authority

- **A.** The affairs of the chapter shall be governed by its members in accordance with the *A.B.A.T.E.* of Oregon, Inc. by-laws in the following manner:
- **1.** Through action taken at membership meetings.
- **2.** By actions and decisions of the executive board between membership meetings.
- **3.** The actions and decisions of the executive board between membership meetings, may be overruled by the membership at a regular scheduled meeting.

Section 5

Executive board

- **A.** The executive board shall consist of the coordinator, treasurer, recording secretary, membership secretary and one state representative.
- **B.** One person may hold more than one office, but not more than two offices.
- **C.** The chapter may also have, at the discretion of the executive board, other officers.
- **D**. Board meetings shall be held as frequently as determined by the coordinator or a majority vote of the executive board.
- **E.** A majority vote of the members present at the board meetings shall be necessary to decide any business.
- **F.** A majority of the members of the board shall constitute a quorum, at any scheduled meeting.
- **G.** The board shall, subject to the authority of the membership, supervise the administrative affairs of the chapter and:

- **1.** Coordinate activities of the chapter with the activities of the state board.
- **2.** Establish rules and regulations governing expenses and compensations for officers and members, subject to approval by the general membership.
- **3.** Establish committees and appoint such members thereto, to carry out the functions of the chapter.
- **4**. Establish rules and regulations not inconsistent with the *A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon, Inc.* by-laws for proper administration.
- **5.** Be authorized and empowered to take such action and make such decisions as may be necessary, to carry out fully and adequately all *A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon, Inc.* by-laws and decisions and such actions necessary to safeguard and promote the best interests of the membership.

Section 6

The call of membership meetings

- A. Regular membership meetings shall be once monthly or as often as required.
 - **1.** Special meetings may be called for by the executive board.
 - Chapter meeting places should be at establishments that are open to the general public, including children. (*i.e.* – Pizza parlors, restaurants, etc.)

Section 7

Conduct of membership meetings

- **A.** Membership meetings shall be conducted in conformance with the *A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon, Inc.* by-laws. (As per article **VII, F**)
- **B.** The order of business at membership meetings shall be as follows:
 - **1.** Call the meeting to order.
 - **2.** Reading and actions of the minutes of the previous meeting.
 - **3.** Report of officers.
 - 4. Report of committees.
 - **5.** Unfinished business.
 - **6.** New business.
 - **7.** Good and welfare for the organization.

C. The order of business may be changed or suspended by a majority vote of the members present.

Chapter Officer Descriptions

Section 8

Chapter coordinator

- The chapter coordinator shall:
- **A.** Preside at membership and executive board meetings.
- **B.** Exercise general supervision over the affairs of the chapter.
- C. Enforce observance of the A.B.A.T.E. of Oregon, inc. by-laws.
- **D**. Assume responsibility for the furtherance of the purposes of the chapter and state organizations.
- **E.** Act as official spokesmen of the chapter.
- **F.** Follow instructions from the state board and comply with the instructions of the chapter executive board and membership when not in conflict with the provisions of the *A.B.A.T.E.* of Oregon, Inc. by-laws.
- **G.** Authorize and approve all expenditures.
- **H.** Supervise all committees of the chapter and be an *ex-officio* member of all committees.
- **I.** Be one of the minimum two (2) signatories for the chapter bank account.
- **J.** Exercise any and all duties, powers and functions, for or incident to the office of the coordinator.
- **K.** Have such additional duties assigned by the chapter or required by the state board.

Section 9

Vice-coordinator

- The vice-coordinator shall:
- **A.** Work under the direction of the coordinator and perform such duties as assigned by the coordinator or executive board, and in the absence of the coordinator, exercise the duties of the coordinator.

B. Be the parliamentarian.

C. Be one of the minimum two (2) signatories for the chapter bank account, unless living in the same household as one of the other signatories.

Section 10

Treasurer

The treasurer shall:

- A. Be custodian of all assets of the chapter and make available an up to date financial report at all executive board and scheduled chapter meetings.
- **B.** Cause the payment of all bills properly approved.
- **C.** Immediately collect all chapter monies and deposit them in the name of the chapter, in the bank designated for such.
- **D.** With the coordinator, or the vice coordinator, who are not living in the same household, sign all checks drawn on chapter funds.
- E. Forward all funds to the state board as required.
- **F.** Be custodian of all financial records of the chapter.
- **G.** File monthly reports to the state auditor as required by the financial policies, as established by the state board of directors.
- **H.** Make financial reports available to the state treasurer immediately upon request.
- **I.** Record all accounts held by the chapter.
- **J.** Work in accordance with financial policies as established by the state board.
- **K.** Perform such other duties as assigned by the coordinator and executive board.

Section 11

Recording secretary

The recording secretary shall:

- A. Have the responsibility of maintaining and keeping a record of all membership meetings, committee meetings and executive board meetings.
 - **1.** Be prepared to make the first report to the chapter after the meeting has been called to order, by reading the

minutes of the previous scheduled meeting.

- 2. Record revisions to this report as deemed necessary by the chapter membership.
- **B.** Send a copy of the meeting minutes to the state coordinator within one (1) week of the meeting.
- **C.** Be responsible for furnishing the state board with all proper forms signed by the chapter members which required by the state board, state and federal laws immediately upon their execution.
- **D.** Have the responsibility of maintaining and keeping all correspondence of the chapter.
- **E.** Perform such other duties as assigned by the coordinator and executive board.
- F. Submit a monthly chapter report to the newspaper editor by the 10th of the month. (Make sure said report for the November newsletter is in by the 10th of October so that it will make the November issue and so on.)
- **G.** Perform such other duties as assigned by the coordinator and executive board.

Section 12

Membership secretary

The membership secretary shall:

- A. Maintain and keep an accurate list of the names and addresses of all chapter members and transmit these to the state membership secretary as necessary.
- **B.** Provide and process membership application forms to new members, collect initiation fees, and transmit these to the state board.
- **C.** Assist the treasurer in maintaining an accurate account of all dues and initiation fees collected.
- **D.** Perform such other duties as assigned by the coordinator and the executive board.

Section 13

Sergeant-at-arms

- The sergeant-at-arms shall:
- A. Be responsible for the orderly operation of the membership and executive board meetings and shall

carry out his/her duties with the aid of the vice-coordinator, for proper parliamentary procedure.

- **B.** Assist members of the executive committee and committee chairman in collecting any chapter funds.
- **C.** Make sure that the United States flag and/or the chapter colors are present at chapter meetings and events.
- **D.** Perform such other duties as assigned by the coordinator and executive board.

Section 14

State board representative (1) The state board representative shall:

- A. Attend all scheduled state board meetings wherein our chapter representatives are required to participate.
- **B.** Arrange to have the position filled by an alternate, if unable to attend the state board meeting.
- **C.** Give a report of the state board meeting to the chapter membership at the earliest chapter meeting following the state board meeting.
- **D.** Report all issues that require attention, opinion, or vote by the chapter.
- **E.** Perform such other duties as assigned by the coordinator and executive board.

Section 15

Public relations director

The public relations director shall:

- **A.** Educate non-members about the existence, policies and objectives of the chapter and *A.B.A.T.E of Oregon, Inc.*
- **B.** Arrange to communicate information (approved by the membership, coordinator or executive board) to non-*A.B.A.T.E.* organizations or individuals that will assist in achieving certain goals, consistent with the polices of *A.B.A.T.E of Oregon, Inc.*
- **C.** Perform such other duties as assigned by the coordinator and executive board.
- **D.** Work in accordance with the media guidelines as established by the state board of directors.

Section 16

Ways and means / products director

The ways and means / products director shall:

- **A.** Arrange for the purchase of chapter related items necessary to conduct chapter functions as requested by the coordinator and executive board or membership.
- **B.** Keep accurate records of orders, purchases and monies that are received.
- **C.** Report all monetary transactions with the chapter treasurer.
- **D.** In cooperation with the chapter treasurer, maintain a working capital account for the purchase of drawing prizes.
- **E.** Work in accordance with financial policies as established by the state board of directors.
- **F.** Perform such other duties as assigned by the coordinator and executive board.

Section 17

Legislative director

The legislative director shall:

France Bans Lane Splitting

Thousands of Motorcyclists Protest

Lane-splitting was never legal in France, but some urban roadways in Paris, Bordeaux, Marseille, Lyon trialed the practice over a five-year test period from 2016-2021. Following some disappointing results, the country has now banned it, much to the chagrin of French riders who are protesting the move.

On 20 February, following the end of the filtering experiment, the French motorcyclists organization *Fedration Franaise des Motards en Colre (F.F.M.C.)* put 20,000 angry motorcyclists in the streets to demand the legalization of filtering between lanes of slow moving or stopped traffic.

The government is ready to listen to the bikers.

On 25 February, at the initiative of the *Road Safety Delegation* (D.S.R.), the *F.F.M.C.* (a member of *F.E.M.A.* -*Federation of European Motorcyclists Associations*) met the interministerial road safety delegate and was assured that a ban on this practice in the future was absolutely not envisaged. But for the state to validate this practice and for the highway code to be modified, more experiments are necessary.

Since the last experiment did not give convincing results, it is necessary to conduct a second new experiment.

While waiting for the signing of the decree which will give it the starting signal, filtering remains prohibited. As of 01 February, riders could be fined and potentially even lose their license for weaving through traffic in France now.

Montana Legalizes Lane-Splitting

Montana governor Greg Gianforte signed senate bill 9 into effect on 03 March, which will allow motorcycles to filter through stopped and slow-moving vehicles beginning 01 October 2021.

With lane splitting, lane sharing, or filtering (whatever it's called), Montana now joins California and Utah in legally recognizing the practice that allows motorcyclists to maneuver through traffic.

Sponsored by state senator Russ Tempel (R-SD14) and state representative Barry Usher (R-HD40), SB–9 defines lane filtering as the act of overtaking and passing another vehicle that is stopped or traveling at a speed not in excess of 10 miles an hour in the same direction of travel and in the same lane.

The entire text of the bill is one page long, and reads:

An operator of a two-wheeled motorcycle may engage in lane filtering when:

A. The operator of a two-wheeled motorcycle is on a road with lanes wide enough to pass safely.

B. The overtaking motorcycle is not operated at a speed in excess of 20 miles an hour when overtaking the stopped or slow-moving vehicle.

C. Conditions permit continued reasonable and prudent operation of the motorcycle while lane filtering.

While controversial and contentious, even amongst motorcyclists, a *U.C. Berkeley* study confirmed that lane-splitting is less dangerous for motorcyclists than being stopped in traffic.

California Will Be Banning Sales Of New Non-Electric Vehicles

Huge news, as the sale of new off-road combustion engine vehicles (including dirt bikes) will be banned in California by 2035 in an attempt to bring the state down to carbon-neutral, and reduce pollution in the most-populated

state in the country.

Golden State off-roaders will be looking at a future of electric power and no combustion engines, after governor Gavin Newsom issued an executive order to ban the sale of any non-zeroemission passenger vehicle (cars and pick-ups) by 2035.

On the face of it, this will be affecting four-wheel vehicles only, but it was ruled off-road vehicles of all types will be included in the forthcoming ban, be it off-road motorcycles, A.T.V.s, quads, or side-by-sides.

Bummer, dude.

80th *Daytona Bike Week* Historically Successful

As businesses are still recovering from a devastating year of *Covid–19* shutdowns and lower capacity restrictions, Daytona Beach is coming off one of their best *Bike Weeks* ever.

Bob Davis, president of the *Lodging* and *Hospitality Association* in Volusia county, said it was one of the best *Bike Weeks* they've ever had for revenue, rating it among the top 5 in event history.

Billing itself as "*The World's Largest Motorcycle Event*", *Daytona Bike Week* celebrated 80 years during the first full week in March, the 5th through the 14th, 2021, with crowds coming in a steady stream throughout the ten days of festivities.

Last year, the nationwide lock down to battle the pandemic began during the last weekend of *Daytona Bike Week*. A year later the country is finally beginning to open for business.

There are still health concerns. Signs encouraging social distancing and mask wearing were posted everywhere. But hopefully the successful turnout will signal better times to come as more and more events find their way back onto the ride calendar.

Capital Hill Briefing on Outdoor Recreation

Outdoor Recreation Roundtable (O.R.R.), the country's leading outdoor recreation coalition, is set to outline the \$788 billion industry's objectives and priorities for 2021 and beyond to congress on 24 March, including briefings presented by representatives of the motorcycle, R.V., boating, outfitter, ski, and other outdoor sectors.

Much of the focus will be on the industry's 21st century recreation agenda, capitalizing on soaring participation rates for job creation and economic recovery and particularly how recreation can create jobs in rural America.

The group will also discuss implementing the goals of the *Great American Outdoors Act* and the process of choosing and implementing *Land and Water Conservation Fund (L.W.C.F.)* projects.

Spain Ponders Mandatory Motorcyclist Airbags

The Spanish directorate-general for traffic, within measures to reduce the crash and severity of its consequences on the motorcyclist collective, is considering the mandatory use of airbag vests or jackets.

65% of motorcyclists surveyed do not agree with the mandatory use of airbags, and many riders consider that before imposing more obligations, the Spanish government should fulfill its obligation to have the infrastructure in optimal security condition.

Riders also want the government to fulfill old promises such as legalizing intercoms for motorcyclists.

"The problem we have is that, when a European country legislates something

in relation to motorcyclists, others follow," said Juan Manuel Reves, president of Asociacin Mutua Motera. (A.M.M.) "This is what happened with gloves in France. When they became mandatory in our neighboring country, the Spanish government wanted to imitate the measure immediately. That is why I believe that any measure that is approved in a European country, must be monitored by all European motorcyclists, because sooner or later, it is possible that it will be extended to others."

A.M.M. has scheduled a meeting with the spanish directorate-general for traffic to further discuss the matter. Also on the agenda: the directorate-generals wish to make wearing motorcycle gloves mandatory.

Philippines Requires Face Masks While Riding Motorcycles

These days face masks are an all too common sight, and although studies have shown that wearing a mask can reduce the risk of Coronavirus the Philippine contamination, government has taken it a step further to mandate that face masks be worn at all times when outside of your residence, including while riding your motorcycle.

According to the land transportation office (L.T.O.) memorandum circular 2020-2185, the act of driving, or riding a motorcycle, while failing to comply with the minimum health and safety protocols is tantamount to reckless driving.

Specifically, article IV, section 7, makes it clear that there are pretty hefty fines involved for those caught disregarding the sanitary protocols in place, with fines between PHP 2,000-10,000. (\$50-\$250 USD) That's pretty hefty penalties for the average Filipino.

Oz Bikies Could Be

Banned From Wearing Club Colors In Public

Outlaw bikie gangs could be banned from wearing gang colours in public and subject to greater stop-and-search powers under regulations proposed by police to dismantle and destroy Western Australia's (W.A.) criminal networks, according to a 17 March article in WA Today.

Western Australia police commissioner Chris Dawson announced the reform plan shortly after confirming detectives had made a breakthrough arrest in relation to the outrageous killing of a former biker boss in a crowded public place, resulting in 136 search warrants issued and 102 arrests.

restrictions Anti-consorting are already in place in Queensland and New South Wales, where bikies could face prison time for being caught talking to each other on a telephone call.


